Pointe Farms Sept. 8, 1995, from its owners at fair market value, say city officials.

Since then, the Farms has purchased three more homes on the south side of Moross between Mack and Chalfonte in an effort to "square off" the Mack/Moross property the Farms purchased in 1994, which used to be occupied by retail stores including Sears and A.L. Price.

The Farms officials can save thousands of dollars by not tearing down the houses they purchased and clearing away the debris, but rather by selling the houses - upon the condition that they are moved, and the lots cleared -- to real estate renovators, such as Louis Gormley and Albert Shaheen.

So far, only the house moved last Thursday has been vacated. Despite that the other three homes were purchased May 16, Aug. 9, and Nov. 1, 1996, Farms will not take possession of all three homes until the summer of 1997.

They have not entered into any contracts to sell these three homes to Gormley and Shaheen, although parties on both sides are interested.

"This was the ultimate recycling project," said Farms city manager Rich Solek.



Crowley's CEO proves nice guys don't finish last

Next year's edition Webster's dictionary could easily pair the word "efficient" with a photo of Crowley's President and CEO Denny Callahan because the man defines it.

Yet "efficient" can imply impersonal, and nothing could be further from the truth; Callahan, a resident of Grosse Pointe, is a jovial, compassionate person.

When snow falls each winter, Callahan jumps in his 1987 black Chevy S-10 truck with a snowplow, and clears the driveways not only of his neighbors for free, but also a few driveways of classmates of his children Todd, 12, and Lindsey, 13.

"There are a number of single parents in Todd and Lindsey's classes. I thought with all that they have to take care of alone that this is just one small thing I could do." Callahan said.

In fact, it is Callahan's unique blend of efficiency and kindness that has kept Crowley's from bankruptcy.

Four years ago this month when Callahan came here from

In one year, Callahan succeeded in turning a profit for Crowley's, and now tripling its net book value.

He brought in about 200 state-of-the-art computers into company headquarters. Before he arrived, there were about 10, he said. He set higher goals for administrative staff members and helped them rise to his expectations. He said he believed there were many employees at the capable Michigan headquarters, and when given the chance, they would rise to the occasion.

Operating expenses as a percentage of sales went from 35 percent in 1992 to 32 percent in 1993. In 1994, expenses were 31 percent. Expenses now hovers at about 30, and Callahan predicts he can bring the percentage lower still.







Let's reform way we pick highest court

ow that the State Bar of Michigan has succeded in passing one reform, it is proposing another and more sweeping one to reorganize the way we nominate and elect our state Supreme Court justices in Michigan.

The modest reform passed in our November election would require that all elected judges have at least five years of experience as a lawyer, but the new and larger proposal was set forth by the State Bar's Representative Assembly's resolution directed to the state Legislature last Sept. 15.

In short, it proposed that 15 persons be named to a bipartisan citizens' commission representing a cross section of people to ensure race, ethnic and gender diversity "to study and report on the need, if any, to change, in whole or in part, the manner in which Michigan

judges are selected."

The commisson would be named by legislative leaders of both parties, the governor and the chief justice of the current Supreme Court.

In its report, the assembly pointed to some of the important failings of the present system of selecting judges. At the time it was proposed it did not require any experience or evaluation of ability to serve as a judge. The November reform does require a year's experience as a lawyer, as we have urged.

Beyond that, however, voters generally have little or no information about judicial candidates, the report said. Most voters would agree that shortening the ballot is important, and especially after facing a huge ballot or ballots in November that included long lists of candidates,

both lawyers and judges, seeking judicial posts

Another important point is that the current party nomination of Supreme Court justices, followed by "ostensibly nonpartisan election, breeds cynicism about the process.'

In fact, in our Supreme Court judicial selection process this year, both parties were naturally involved in the nominating process, and then campaigned for their respective candidates "Democrats" or "Republicans, " even though all four ran on the nonpartisan ballot.

The report also reminded us that while incumbents are so identified, presumably to encourage stability in judicial tenure, that practice not only protects good judges but inadequate judges as well.

Pernaps the most important of the nine reasons the report offered in seeking state legislative action is that there has been no comprehensive review since the constitutional convention of 1961 of judicial selection in Michigan.

However, the report added that "twothirds of our sister states, prompted by similar concerns, have moved to selection procedures that appear to provide greater emphasis on quality and accountability.'

The report also pointed out that a substantial percentage of voters do not cast ballots for judicial candidates. That failure no doubt reflects a lack of information about the candidates.

Finally, the report deplores the heavy reliance in judicial elections of large campaign expenditures, with financial support often sought from interest groups and lawyers whose agendas and clients' interests may well come before them if they're elected.

The State Bar is to be congratulated for making this reform effort, which, in our view, deserves public support. That support should be directed to the Legislature to make sure that the proposal gets a fair public hearing.

We'll miss Rep. Bill Bryant

Tith the retirement of Rep. William R. Bryant of Grosse Pointe Farms, the Pointes will lose their most active and con-

scientious legislative defender of the Grosse Pointe Public School System as well as one of the state's best supporters of public schools in general.

As he nears the end of his 26th and last year in the House at the end of 1996. Bryant was asked what he felt his major mission in Lansing had been over the years. His reply:

"To try to defend the right of the people to live in a community of their choice and maintain good schools. In a time of change in Lansing, that meant helping negotiate a new system that the Grosse Pointe system could live with."

As he retires to South Carolina, his original intention was to write several more books. He's already the author of three. But friends there have begun talking to him about the opportunity to continue to serve the public, perhaps in the South Carolina House. He's interested.

In Michigan, Bryant got involved in educational problems when he moved up to the House in 1970 after serving as the Grosse Pointe representative on the old Wayne County Board of Commissioners.

In his very first term in 1971, the chairman of the House Education Committee appointed him a one-man subcommittee to write a bill to mandate state aid for special students. Bryant then helped persuade the House to enact it into law.

After 22 years in the minority, Bryant achieved half a chairmanship of the

Education Committee in the 1992-94 session in which the GOP and Democrats jointly controlled the House, and each party served as the majority for half the

> That meant that Bryant did not become full chairman of the Education Committee until his very last term in the House.

Over the years, however, he has been an active GOP leader, especially supportive of moderate measures and actions by other GOP moderates in the Legislature. At his retirement, he is the senior GOP member of the House.

He has served as the GOP administrative leader, GOP floor leader, and GOP leader from 1979 to 1982. Before moving into leadership roles he served on the House taxation and urban affairs (now

urban policies) committees. His bill in 1993 revised the school code and then he helped revise his own measure in 1995, but he also has been active in many other important pieces of legislation as well.

These are only four stories that never made it to the evening news or the local newspaper. Yet who can doubt that they deserve national attention?





Hello, do any G.P. Shores LINCOLN-MERCURY residents want a phone call?

No resident has signed up for the free program installed more than a month ago in Grosse Pointe Shores in which they or a loved one can receive a daily telephone call to confirm their safety and/or check their health status.

Stationed inside the public safety office of Grosse Pointe Shores is the new KindCall computer unused, but capable of making hundreds of phone calls daily.

The KindCall computer system cost between \$3,000 and \$4,000. It was donated anonymously in early October by a long-time Shores resident who wished to honor her deceased husband, who had served as a village official for years.

"If anyone would like to subscribe to this wonderful and free service, they just need to call me, and we'll get them an application," said Shores public safety director Daniel Healy.

For more information or to sign up for the free program, call (313) 881-6565.

Healy said he believes some people may be reluctant to sign up because they may feel that it is admitting that they are old or in poor health.

"This computerized calling system is for all residents, regardless of age or health. Residents should consider signing up for this program, particularly if they live alone." Healy said.

It should not be looked upon in a negative way, he empha-

He said, "This is a busy world we live in; not everyone can call daily to their relatives, friends and neighbors."

Grosse Pointe Farms also uses the KindCall system. The Woods uses a similar system called Compute-a-Care.

The computers are programmed to make daily telephone calls at designated times to residents requesting the ser-

vice. Residents who do not need any assistance merely answer the telephone when the com-

puter calls, then hang up. If a resident needs help, he/she can remain on the line

for further assistance. In the event no one answers the telephone, the computer will call the residence again in

a few minutes. After a few unanswered telephone calls to the same residence, public safety officers proceed to the residence to check that the occupant is all right.

The Shores public safety officers do not need to use force to enter a home to check on a resident. Police will have access to a key; people who choose to partipate in the KindCall program inform the officers of the name and phone number of a friend, relative or neighbor with whom the participant chose to leave a house key.

Outback Sport Impreza wagon is both 'looker' and 'doer'

Subaru, backed by a solid history of all-wheel and 4-wheel-drive vehicles, is heading off the Interstates and into uncharted regions again. town and through the mountains gracefully thanks to a 2.2-liter, 16-valve, 4-cylinder aluminum-alloy engine that, in spite of its size, puts out

Flushed with the success last year of its impressive new sport utility wagon, the Legacy Outback, the New Jersey-based company is offering a similar "sport utility" package on its smaller Impreza wagon.

About the size of a Ford Escort wagon, the Outback Sport Impreza is a real cutie. With its outsize air scoop atop the hood, big-time luggage rack and available two-tone paint, the Impreza is kind of like a talented kid trying to break into show biz. I confess to having spotted a couple of the latter on an afternoon television gossip show. (Honest, I'm not a regular viewer!) When you see them, wellgroomed, confident and appearing to love the limelight, you think, "pul-eeze — poor little offspring of an overanxious stage parent." Then the 8-year-old starts to sing and you have to admit she or he has the right stuff.

So does the Impreza. The Outback Sport gets around

town and through the mountains gracefully thanks to a 2.2-liter, 16-valve, 4-cylinder aluminum-alloy engine that, in spite of its size, puts out 137 hp. It has full-time all-wheel drive and anti-lock brakes all around. A 5-speed manual transmission is standard. Small and responsive, this Impreza wagon is fun to drive and always brings a

smile to the lips because it looks like it's just itching to go out and have some adven-

The steep rake of the windshield and sloping and curved rear window make the wagon appear smaller than it is. Inside there are safety belts for five; four persons on board is probably a more realistic number in terms of comfort. And in spite of tiny rear doors, it is fairly easy for a full-size adult to get into the back seat where there's adequate leg room and head room. Storage behind the back seat, in the traditional station wagon cargo area, is limited by the slanted rear end styling.

Impreza has a 99.2-inch wheelbase and an overall length of 172.2 inches. By comparison, Ford's Escort wagon rides on a 98.4-inch wheelbase and measures 171.3 inches stem to stern. Another small wagon, the Toyota Corolla, has a 97.0-inch wheelbase and it's 172 inches long. (Toyota dropped the wagon from its lineup for 1997.)

Our initial reaction on seeing and then sitting in the snappy Impreza Outback wagon: Ooooooooh. Then we

More than 300 hand tools available to service cars

You may find it difficult to believe, but there are well over 300 different non- power hand tools on the market specifically intended for servicing cars.

At least 30 of these tools are for servicing brakes only; the remaining hundreds of other tools, each with a special configuration of its own, are used to service other parts of the car, such as the carburetor, cylinders, drive train, valves, shock absorbers, windshield wipers, and the list goes on and on.

Some of the tools are shaped to reach into difficult places and remove special fittings while other tools, such as the slide hammer puller, will make the removal of a flange-type rear axle from a car a relatively easy job.

If you're a weekend auto mechanic who enjoys working on the car in the driveway or a professional mechanic who uses tools all day, safety begins well before the car ignition is turned on; it begins with using the proper tool for the job and using it safely.

"Making do" with a poor assortment of inadequate tools simply will not do, points out the Hand Tools Institute, a trade association of American hand tool manufacturers.

Approximately one million persons are injured each year in hand tool related cases and "making do" with incorrect tools is one way of risking serious personal injury as well as possibly damaging expensive equipment.

This could be devastating if it's a hard-to-replace auto

Think the job through completely; knowing how to do the work is only half of the job, the other half is using the proper tools the safe way.

Remember how easily the Keystone Cops silent flicks made a steering wheel come off the steering column.

It's not that easy today; as a matter of fact, it's a fairly tough job, unless you use a small rather unobtrusive looking tool with three cap screws, called a steering wheel pulley. the proper tool is using it safely. An important safety tip to remember when using the steering wheel pulley is never use an impact wrench to drive or loosen the cap screws for any reason—serious injury could result.

Another important reason for using the proper tool in addition to saving considerable time and preventing injury is saving money.

An example is installing a new thermostat or water pump — a common occurrence most car owners will experience several times. Whether you do the job or have it done professionally at a service station, considerable money can be saved by using a relatively inexpensive tool called a hose pinch-off plier.


The plier is designed to pinch off the hose to prevent the coolant from draining during replacement of the parts; at \$5 a gallon of coolant, the pinch-off tool reduces the repair bill considerably.

So next time, whoever does the job, be certain to use the pinch-off plier.

added years is the opportunity it affords to look back at beginnings. "Do you remember?" is a question that frequently comes up when members of the older set get together to talk over old times and share memories of their younger days.

The answers are often interesting. Past generations saw more beginnings and changes than those in the electronic age are likely to experience. What we now have are largely refinements and extensions of what we have now.

Telephones and planes were first-time experiences to earlier generations. We've come a long way from those early models.

Those who enjoy going back in time and those who wonder how it was before the space age took over are likely to count among their favorite American artists the one who immortalized the America of his time with his Saturday

Evening Post covers and his illustrations in ads for new products.

From 1914 to 1978 Norman Rockwell captured the fancy of the American public with his paintings reproduced for both magazines and advertisers. It was Horace Lorimer, the editor of the Saturday Evening Post, who first introduced Rockwell to the advertising

Rockwell intended to devote himself to fine arts and magazine illustration, But in 1914 he did a pen and ink drawing for Heinz Baked Beans which

appeared in the "Boy Scout Hike Book"

In 1919, Rockwell's first full color ad for Piso's Cough Syrup and Overland Automobile appeared. In the years that followed, countless companies sought his services.

The earlier work was done in either sepia or black and white. Most of the later ads were beautifully detailed paintings.

Many of those ads were treasured and placed in archives. The largest collection belongs to the Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance

Company of Springfield, Mass., which commissioned him to do sketches for the American Family Series.

Taken altogether, Rockwell's paintings for various companies provide a fabulous journey through Americana. For those who might enjoy a look at Rockwell's world, Dr. Donald R. Stolz, Marshall Stolz and William F. Earles all collectors, exhibitors and chroniclers of Rockwell's life and work, have compiled over 200 Rockwell illustrations in a book.

Rockwell's own zest and sense of poignancy came through in his work. So did the honesty, sincerity and truth with which he portrayed each subject.

The fact that the painting was to be used commercially made no difference. He never gave less than his best and never changed his focus, always projecting an old-fashioned goodness in his choice of

It's tax loss time again

The following commentary is only for those readers who might own some investments, or trading speculations, which, over time, may have gone south instead of north (the north arrow usually points to the top of the map).

It is assumed that all security purchases, especially common stock, are made with the expectation, the hope and the prayer that the investment 1) will be fruitful and increase in value, 2) will maintain at least its purchased value and 3) will not deteriorate in value and thereby create a potential

But all the efforts of mice and men of letters sometimes cannot evercome the demons of evil, which, somehow or other, cause the value of certain investments to go below water level. This underground environment is hardly conducive to good sleep habits, needless to say!

Let it be known, first of all. that it's almost impossible to make money by taking tax losses! But if you already have some unrealized capital losses, either short-term or long-term, there are possible tax benefits which can be obtained by converting the unrealized paper losses into actual cash losses.

First you should consult your tax adviser, because brokers and stock advisers are not licensed to give tax advice.

However, the tax laws generally allow you to deduct up to \$3,000 of net security losses against "ordinary income" each year, thus creating a tax saving at your respective tax bracket. But, first, check this with your tax adviser!



It's tax loss time again

The following commentary is only for those readers who might own some investments, or trading speculations, which, over time, may have gone south instead of north (the north arrow usually points to the top of the map).

It is assumed that all security purchases, especially common stock, are made with the expectation, the hope and the prayer that the investment 1) will be fruitful and increase in value, 2) will maintain at least its purchased value and 3) will not deteriorate in value and thereby create a potential

But all the efforts of mice and men of letters sometimes cannot evercome the demons of evil, which, somehow or other, cause the value of certain investments to go below water level. This underground environment is hardly conducive to good sleep habits, needless to say!

Let it be known, first of all, that it's almost impossible to make money by taking tax losses! But if you already have some unrealized capital losses, either short-term or long-term, there are possible tax benefits which can be obtained by converting the unrealized paper losses into actual cash losses.





Home care services

In the late 19th century, America's population mushroomed, the automobile was born and physicians made house calls. In fact, most health care was delivered at

But as technology advanced and Americans' financial means grew, so did advances in medical research and technology, giving rise to the modern American hospital. Medical practice had become too sophisticated for the

Now, however, economics and the evolution of managed

care are fueling the return to home care.

November is National Home Care Month, which honors all of the dedicated physicians, nurses, therapists, aides and social workers who provide high-quality health care

and supportive services in patients' homes throughout the United States.

What is home care? Home care encompasses a wide range of health and social services that are delivered at home to recovering, disabled, chronically or terminally ill people.

Generally, home care is appropriate whenever a person prefers to stay at home but needs ongoing care that cannot easily or effectively be provided solely by family and friends. Also available to persons receiving home care services are medical supplies and durable medical equipment such as

hospital beds, wheelchairs and infusion pumps for intravenous medications or solu-

Older persons, electing to live independent, non-institutionalized lives, are receiving home care services as their physical capabilities diminish. Younger adults who are disabled or recuperating from acute illness are choosing home care whenever possible. New moms are enjoying at-home assistance during the early post-partum days as they adjust to the demands of motherhood. Chronically ill infants and children are receiving sophisticated medical treatment in their familiar home environments. Adults and children diagnosed with terminal illness also are having their needs met while receiving compassionate care at home. And some patients are able to avoid costly hospital stays altogether by receiving home health care services. Why get care at home?

Home care experts say one of the best explanations for the growing resurgence of home care is that it is a humane and compassionate way to deliver health and supportive services. When asked, most people say they would prefer to receive care at home rather than in a hospital or institu-

Technology also is playing an increasing role in our nation's return to home care. Transportable medical equipment, such as respirators and infusion pumps, make it easy to provide health care services at home that just a few years ago could only take place in the hospital or doc-

Moreover, community-based services are becoming increasingly attractive because they provide a lower-cost setting in which to receive care that was formerly provided in the hospital. As more people are paying a larger portion of health-care expenses out of their own pockets, reducing these costs has become extremely important.

A variety of health care and support services Home care providers deliver a wide variety of health care and supportive services, ranging from professional nursing care to physical, occupational, speech and respiratory therapies. They also may provide social work and nutritional care, laboratory, dental, optical, pharmacy, podiatry. X-ray and medic upment and supply sei vices. Supportive and personal care services may not require a physician's orders and typically include activities of daily living, such as getting in and out of bed, walking, bathing, toileting and dressing. Services for the treatment of medical conditions usually are prescribed by an individual's physician.

Care covered by various sources Home care is paid for directly by the patient or through a variety of private and public sources. Private insurance programs typically cover services for acute needs, but benefits for long-term services vary from plan to plan. Public third-party payers include Medicare, Medicaid, the Older Americans Act, Social Services Block Grant programs, the Veteran's Administration and CHAMPUS.

Home care to thrive into the future

Home care is one of the fastest growing segments of the American health care system. Since becoming Medicare certified in 1994, Bon Secours Home Care has experienced about an 80-percent increase in its number of home care

If you, a family member or a friend require home care services, it is important to determine which services you need. You may consult with your physician, a hospital discharge planner or a social service organization. Home care providers also are listed in the yellow pages under "home care," "hospice" or "nurses."







Writer roams the world, writes about his adventures

"Anatomy of Restlessness: Selected Writings 1969-1989"

By Bruce Chatwin Viking. 205 pages, \$23.95. Bruce Chatwin (1940-1989) was a writer who wore many hats; he was versatile in his literary field and he produced travel sketches, essays, short stories, book reviews and nov-

During his relatively short lifetime, he produced seven or eight books, which was no mean accomplishment considering he was almost constantly roaming about the world, from one exotic place to anoth-

"Anatomy of Recklessness" is a posthumous book, an introspective gathering of many of his occasional pieces which appeared in a number of publications. Two dedicated researchers, Jan Borm and Matthew Graves, deserve our thanks for their tracking along with an explanatory introduction and a very complete bibli-

ography of Chatwin's oeuvre. His opening essay, "I Always Wanted to Go to Patagonia," reveals Chatwin's psychological urge to travel. In explaining the unusual title of his book, he says, "Gradually the idea for a book began to take shape. It was to be a wildly ambitious and intolerant work, a kind of 'Anatomy of Restlessness' that would enlarge on Pascal's dictum about the man sitting quietly in a room.

"The argument, roughly, was as follows: that in becoming human, man had acquired, together with his straight legs and striding walk, a migratory 'drive' or instinct to walk long distances through the seasons; that this 'drive' was inseparable from his central nervous system; and that, when warped in conditions of settlement, it found outlets in violence, greed, status-seeking or a mania for the new.'

Not only is he thought-provoking, Chatwin likes to spring surprises on his readers. "Gone to Timbuctoo" is an amusing travel sketch where the author's mischievous wit rears its head: "Timbuctoo, Tumbuto, Tombouctou, Tumbyktu, Timbutku or Tembach? It doesn't matter how you spell it. The word is a slogan, a ritual formula, once heard never forgotten. At 11, I knew of Timbuctoo as a mysterious city in the heart of Africa where they ate mice — and served them to visitors. A blurred photograph, in a traveler's account of Timbuctoo, of a bowl of muddy broth with little pink feet rising to the surface excited me greatly. Naturally, I wrote an unprintable limerick about it. The words 'mice in the stew' rhymed with Timbuctoo and for me both are still inextricably associated."


The Estate of Maximilian Tod" is a chilling tale which, I believe, no reader will ever forget. The main character is an extremely strange person, very reclusive, yet with glorious ideas of dwelling in solitary grandeur deep in the heart of a South American

jungle. Chatwin describes Mr. Tod's house as "an airy pavilion built on a knoll about 100 yards from the water. It was 35 feet square, aligned to the cardinal points, and he had five sash windows on each face except for the north. The walls were of battened vertical planks painted the color of pewter. The glazing bars were a warm ivory." The author's descriptive powers succeed in setting up fantastic scenes, both outdoors and indoors, along with haunting overtones of something dire and

macabre. This story is tied neatly together from the first sentence to the very last sentence which gives the reader a real jolt for which he is completely unprepared.

Chatwin again returns to the theme of Pascal's dictum in "It's a Nomad Nomad World:" "Some American brain specialists took encephalograph readings of travelers. They found that changes of scenery and awareness of the passage of seasons through

the year stimulated the rhythms of the brain, contributing to a sense of wellbeing and an active purpose in life. Monotonous surroundings and tedious regular activities wove patterns which produced fatigue, nervous disorders. apathy, self-disgust and vio-



lent reactions. Hardly surprising, then, that a generation cushioned from the cold by central heating, from the heat by air-conditioning, carted in aseptic transports from one identical house or hotel to another, should feel the need of journeys of mind or body, for pep pills or tranquilizers, or for the cathartic journeys of sex, music and dance We spend far too much time in

shuttered rooms.' Further in the same essay, Chatwin reveals his appreciation and understanding of strange lands and customs: "Each spring the nomadic tribes of Asia shrug off the inertia of winter and return with the regularity of swallows returning to their summer pastures. The women put on fresh flowered calico dresses, and literally 'wear the spring.' They sway to the rhythm of their pitching saddles, and mark time to the insistent beat of the camel bells. They look neither right nor left. Their eyes are glued to the way ahead - over the horizon. The spring migration is a ritual. It fulfills all their spiritual requirements, and the nomads are notoriously irreligious. The way up to the mountain is the path of their salvation.



As a book reviewer, Chatwin raphy of Robert Louis displays his obsessive interest in the world of Arabs and life in the desert. In "Abel the Nomad," he discusses Wilfred Thesiger, the author of "Arabian Sands" and "The Marsh Arabs," both considered classics along with Doughty's Travels in Arabia Deserta.

Yet his new autobiographical sketch, "Desert, Marsh and Mountains," though it borrows large chunks of the two earlier books, is more absorbing than either. The subtitle, "The World of a Nomad," gives a clue about what he is up to.

The nomad in question is Thesiger himself, as he travels by camel or on foot, in Africa or in Asia, among tribesmen who are - or were - for the most part nomadic.

At first sight, the book appears to be a collection of short travel pieces illustrated with photographs by someone with an unerring sense of composition. A closer look reveals a declaration of faith that goes a long way toward explaining the strange compulsion which drives men like Thesiger to seek, and find the consolation of the desert.

Another book review by Chatwin shows his perspicacity in sensing and recognizing how certain environmental factors influence sensitive people, himself included.

The Road to the Isles" by

Stevenson, begins with Chatwin's assertion that "No biographer should embark on Robert Louis Stevenson without taking stock of the effect of Edinburgh on its inhabitants. For the gaunt northern capital demands from them, and usually gets, a very specific moral commitment.

"Stevenson was an Edinburgh phenomenon; his childhood in the city set up a repetitious see-saw of attraction and loathing that almost predetermined his death in the South Seas.

"Coddled in the sickroom by masterful women, he turned in boyish fancy to all-male adventures in bright islands in the sun. Once installed in Samoa, in the style of a laird, with his family and the solid furniture of his father's house about him, he finally grew up and came to terms with the 'precipitious city' he had once hated to the backbone.

In another essay, "Among the Ruins," Chatwin draws a portrait of the German writer, Curzio Malaparte, who early recognized the ridiculous fallacies of the Hitler-Mussolini regimes. He points out that Malaparte fancied himself a 'man of action' rather in the mould of T. E. Lawrence or Andre Malraux. He shared their flare for self-advertisement and their mythomania:



Bird feedin ng basics: Seeds, suet and feeders

The success of attracting birds to your yard for your enjoyment is a combination of the most desirable seed in the proper feeder, placed in the best possible location for the type of birds that

you hope to attract.

Studies by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology show that the most desirable seed to offer at a feeding station is black oil sunflower. It is the favorite seed of more birds than any other kind of seed and will attract cardinals, house finches, chickadees among many others. This is not to say that other seeds aren't also desirable. Striped sunflower seed is the favored food of tufted titmice and blue jays. Cardinals love safflower in addition to sunflower.

White millet is the favorite food of ground eating birds and attracts sparrows, doves and slate-colored juncos. Combining these favorite seeds in a blend and offering them at your feeding station will bring in a greater variety of birds than if you choose to offer one seed.

If you use a clear tube feeder with perches, offer either a "straight" seed such as sunflower or safflower or use a mix that does not contain millet. Since the millet is meant for ground feeding birds, it is best to offer it in a seed blend in a wood feeder. This allows the millet to fall to the ground for the doves and sparrows, while the larger seed remains on the sides of the wood feeder where cardinals and other birds can easily sit and feed. If you have a tube feeder and want to attract a larger bodied bird such as a cardinal, add a tray to your tube feeder.

Both tube feeders and wood feeders can be easily placed in your front or back yard so that you may be able to easily view the birds from inside your home. Keep in mind that the birds need the safety of being close to bush-

es or trees in the event that they need to quickly leave the feeder because of the danger of a cat or hawk. If possible, it is also a good idea to keep the feeder out of prevailing winds. The windchill factor will affect birds in the same way that it affects us. The variety of hardware that is available will allow you to post mount or hang feeders almost anywhere in your yard or on the deck.

Window feeders are also a great option for seed eating birds. Birds find seed by sight. Clear feeders and baffles make it easier for birds to find the food. If using a wooden feeder or a metal squirrel-proof feeder, seed scattered around or under the feeder will draw the birds to the location and allow them to find the feeder.

If it's finches that you want to attract, studies have shown that thistle is their favorite seed. Avoid a mix that may be called "finch mix." It usually consists of thistle mixed with grains that finches don't find desirable but offer color and a lower price to the consumer. Thistle should be offered in a tubular feeder with perches. The opening that dispenses the seed should be very small. If thistle is exposed to the air, it retains too much moisture in its thin shell, causing it to be difficult to crack open.

Thistle is also prone to mold if it is not kept dry. Therefore, fresh thistle in a feeder is also very important. Make sure that you purchase thistle that is fresh and kept stored in a cool, dry place. This is also the way that you should store it at home. When you fill your finch feeder, pour out the old thistle instead of constantly "topping up." Goldfinches like to eat away from the center of bird feeding activity. They are shy and retiring and prefer their own spot. If your finch feeder is placed on a pole or hung from a tree, choose a spot where tree

meets lawn. This simulates the finches natural feeding habitat of woods' edge near a field. In winter, look for goldfinches to be joined by pine siskins, redpolls and purple finches - northern finches that visit us and help pass our time on a winter's day.

Suet eating birds naturally eat insects, grubs and egg cases which they locate on and under the bark of trees. Placing a suet feeder close to or on a tree is more likely to be successful than if those same feeders were placed in an open area. The chickadees, woodpeckers and nuthatches that are so fond of suet are in their natural element while in trees. If you watch them closely, you'll see that they are rarely found on the ground. The type of suet that can be offered includes pure suet or suet that has added peanuts, raisins or insects. Raisins tend to

be popular among the fruit eating birds such as cardinals and mockingbirds. Peanuts are more attractive to chickadees and nuthatches.

Rendered means that the suet has been processed so that the impurities are removed, causing less chance for disease and spoilage. Suet can be offered in any cage that allows the suet eating bird to cling while eating. It can be as fancy as a vinyl coated wire cage surrounded by wood or as simple as an onion bag. Commercial suet feeders are made that are starling resistant, offering access to the suet from the bottom only. This makes it difficult for the starlings to feed for a long period of time, while other suet feeding birds can adeptly cling upside down and feed for long periods of time, allowing you to enjoy them. Suet feeders can be hung from feeder poles as long as they are placed in close proximity to a tree so that the suet feeding birds can safely fly to their "home base."

A platform feeder that offers chopped up apple and raisins soaked in warm water is a way to



More than cold, November ushers in holidays

November is an important month. It heralds the beginning of the winter season. It means Thanksgiving with its attendant festivities and feasting, and it is the beginning of the winter holiday season with Hanukkah, Christmas and New Year to brighten the darkest days of the year.

Even though we think of Thanksgiving and turkey as almost one word, cranberries play a very big part in our celebration of the winter festal days.

In 1677, in the hope of charming Charles II into relaxing the crippling restrictions of the Acts of Trade and Navigation, Massachusetts sent him a gift of native foods, including 10 barrels of cranberries. A letter accompanied the cranberries. "Wee humblie conceive that the laws of England are bounded within the four seas, and doe not reach America. The subjects of His Majesty here being not represented in Parliament so we have not looked at ourselves to bee impeded in trade by them." His Majesty did not agree and the laws remained unaltered.

Interestingly enough, cranberries did not appear at the first Thanksgiving feast, although they were used by the Indians, largely medicinally and not often as food because they were so "sower" and needed much sweetening to be used as we use them now. But where would the Thanksgiving turkey be without its accompaniment of cranberry sauce in our world.

In the early days of the colonies, however, cranberries were much used by the English and Indians. John Josslyn wrote, "They are boyled with sugar or honey for a Sauce to eate with their meete, and it is a delicate sauce, especially for roasted fowl or mutton. Some make tarts of them as with Goose Berries."

Cranberries quickly became a favorite and quantities of them were sent, preserved, to Europe and the West Indies.

Josseln's readers in 1672 learned that American cranberry leaves are "like Box, but greener, thick and glistening, the blossoms very like the flowers of our English nightshade, after which succeed the berries hanging by long stalks no bigger than a hair. At first they are pale yellow, afterward red and as big as a cherry. They are ripe in August and September and are excellent against the Scurvy"

(Mr. Jossely had never heard of vitamin C, which cranberries have in abundance.)

In 1784 cranberries were sold in the Philadelphia market every Wednesday and Saturday and were often sold as "bearberries" because everyone knew how popular they were with bears in the woods.

Cranberry vines require an acid soil that is constantly moist. such as a bog area. They make a lovely ground cover with their bright green leaves, small clustered bell-shaped flowers of shades of pink, and their red berries. If you try to grow cranberries be forewarned that they must be flooded in winter to protect them from cold damage, and sometimes in summer if the weather is very hot. Because of the mucky soil in which they grow it can be difficult to keep them weed-free.

Cranberries are grown commercially in Maine, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Oregon and Washington state.

In Victorian America when Christmas trees became popular, cranberries were often strung like beads and looped on the tree along with strings of popcorn for great decorative effect.

Other winter plants come into

their own at this time of the year. The Christmas cactus, or Christmas rose as it is sometimes called, is one. The lovely rose or white or red flowers of this decorative plant bloom exuberantly from November until February and are decorative greenhouse plants the rest of the year.

It won't be long now until the annual flood of poinsettias will inundate stores, public buildings and homes, with their dramatic red, pink or white blooms. Named for Dr. Joel Poinsett who developed them, they are a wintertime brightener of dark days.

One of the best ways to view poinsettias during the holiday season is the annual show of these flamboyant flowers at the Belle Isle Conservatory, which will open early next month. The

Anna Scripps Whitcomb Conservatory is operated by the Detroit Recreation Department's Forestry and Landscape Division's Floriculture section.

This organization maintains the Conservatory with its several seasonal flower shows as well as the gardens on the Island. The Belle Isle Botanical Society, founded in 1988, maintains the beautiful water lily gardens between the Conservatory and the aquarium and the garden of Heritage Roses in front of the Conservatory. The annual plant sale in May which is a fund-raiser for the gardens, is also under their direction.



provide for robins that stay for the winter. They prefer to eat low to the ground and will welcome the fruit you offer once natural fruit stores on the trees are depleted. Make sure that the platform feeder is not directly under other feeders so as to avoid contamination from the

droppings of birds. The platform feeder also needs to be placed in an area where protection in the form of bushes is close by.

Follows these guidelines of the favorite seeds in the right type of feeder placed in a bird friendly area, and you will see results in the bounty of birds that will visit your yard.

Household Help

Q. The hot water heater in my basement has recently been making strange noises and is not working properly. At times, I'll hear sizzling and rumbling sounds as if the tank wants to explode. The water heater does not shut off and thus causes boiling noises and overheating. Additionally, the hot water faucets expel steam and then a popping noise follows.

The hot water heater is about 7 years old and the warranty has long been expired.

A. I can't make a 100-percent accurate diagnosis, but it sounds as if you'll need to replace your present hot water heater. The description that you've made above tells me that the potential for an explosion is very real if the problem isn't addressed very soon.

However, I'd like you to check a few things first. Begin by holding a pail beneath the valve in the middle of the heater and release the pressure. This is known as the "T and P" valve or the temperature and pressure relief valve. Be extremely cautious because very hot steam and water will discharge from the valve when you


lift the lever. If water continues to drip from the valve after you shut it, you'll have to replace it. It most likely has reached its effectiveness and the internal needle valve is probably worn.

Next, attach a garden hose to the drain valve at the base of the heater and extend it outdoors, if possible. Be sure to examine the water in a large pail after you initially discharge it. You'll need to check if any sediment or lime deposits have developed at the bottom of your heater. Lime deposits mean that you have hard water and you should have a water softener installed. With the tank now empty, replace the T and P valve and check its condition. Close the discharge valve at bottom.

Water temperature should be set at about 130 degrees and make sure the heater's thermostat is not defective. Refill your water heater to capacity and if it does not start, press the reset button. Once your water heater is operating, listen for those same troublesome sounds. If they're gone, you have succeeded. If there is no improvement, you'll need to call a professional.





Prevent burglaries with a basic home security plan

It's known in law enforcement circles as the "Crime Clock" — the rate at which criminal offenses occur in our country.

Homeowners should be particularly alarmed at the startling number of burglaries that occur in the United States. A burglary takes place an average of once every 12 seconds and according to the most recent FBI statistics available, almost two million residences are victimized each year.

In the face of these startling statistics homeowners can greatly reduce their chances of becoming another "Crime Clock" statistic. What many people fail to realize is that effective protection against thieves is neither difficult nor expensive.

"The key to burglary prevention is eliminating a would-be burglar's opportunities for success" says Mike Bruening, executive director of the Burglary Prevention Council, a national non-profit organization dedicated to the prevention of residential burglaries. "Surprisingly many burglars don't even have to use forcible entry to gain access to a residence because they can enter through an improperly locked door or window"

Create a plan

According to the Burglary Prevention Council, homeowners should implement a basic security plan and start by performing an inspection of their home. Identify all vulnerable points in your home, including weak door and window locks.

"Many homeowners violate some of the most basic rules of home security like making certain all possible points of entry are secure" says Bruening. "If a burglar happens to approach your home, he won't turn down an open invitation like an unlocked window or an attached garage that is easily accessible."

Eliminating these types of unprotected areas are necessary elements of a home security plan. However, homeowners should take further steps in order to deter burglars from even approaching their residences.

Outside appearances matter when it comes to residential burglary. Do not make it easy for burglars to get close to your home without being noticed. Keeping the outside of your home neatly groomed and well lighted will reduce a burglar's opportunity for success. Trim trees and bushes because any shrubbery that is overgrown and touches your home provides a perfect cover for a burglar

One of the best methods of deterrence is keeping the perimeter of your home well lighted at night. Low voltage outdoor lighting systems not only are very effective but also make your home look more attractive. Because they use safe 12-volt current they are easy to install and inexpensive to operate.

Security timers create the impression of movement throughout the house at different times of the day or night. You can set the timers to operate lamps, radios, televisions or other appliances at specific times. Random security timers vary the time at which lights or appliances go on and off in order to eliminate any predictable schedule.

Other tips

The Burglary Prevention Council also advises stopping all mail and newspaper deliveries during vacations, or at least arranging for a neighbor to pick them up so that they don't accumulate. Ask a neighbor to park in your driveway to make it appear that you are home.

The average dollar loss in a residential burglary is over \$1,300. When you consider the fact that implementing a home security plan and securing your residence with some basic products will cost a homeowner only about \$100, it's a wise investment indeed.

"The biggest payoff of all is security and peace of mind" says Bruening. "You can't put a price tag on those benefits."

Antiques

What makes one table a piece of furniture, another a masterpiece of museum quality?

Experts can look at paintings and tell the name of the artist and judge the importance and quality of the work. Serious furniture collectors, dealers and curators, can see the subtle differences between several tables and tell good from better from best. The type of wood, the carving of the legs and the overall proportions of the table are studied.

Chippendale-style pieces from the Philadelphia area seem to be the stars in furniture auctions. Card tables and tea tables generally attract more bidders than dining-room tables or drop-leaf tables, perhaps because they are usually smaller.

Pieces that can be attributed to an important maker have added value. And pieces that were owned by important, well-known families have extra interest.

Few collectors can afford the very best American furniture; a few pieces have sold for more than a million dollars. But all collectors should read the books, visit the museums and study the best furniture, so they will be able to judge the lesser pieces offered for sale.

Q. Is Poppytrail dinnerware collectible?

A. Poppytrail dinnerware by Metlox Potteries of California is popular with collectors. Metlox Potteries went out of business in 1989.

There are many available styles. Some are solid; others have hand-painted designs. The handpainted patterns picturing roosters or flowers are especially popular on the West Coast

Prices for solid-colored pieces range from \$3 for a small bowl to \$40 for a coffeepot.

Q. I have a bottle shaped like a black waiter. The head is removable, and the liquid can pour from the neck. Do you know where it was made?

A. There are at least eight different figural black waiter bottles and some black waitress bottles.

Some of the bottles were made by Dalzell Bros. and Gillmore glassworks in Brilliant, Ohio, in 1884. Similar bottles were made in Germany.

The bottle heads usually are made of dark amethyst glass. The body usually is frosted glass decorated with red and black details.


Some of the bottles were part of a set. A brass tray hung around the neck of the waiter that held three small liquor glasses.

All the black waiter bottles are popular with collectors of figural bottles. They sell for \$250 to \$350 in good condition.




