



"The Anna Kristina was in the Great Lakes participating in last year's tall ship festival in Chicago," said Scott Denman of Grosse Pointe Park, who helped spearhead the ship's storoger in Detroit. 

Anderson-Smith could face over 100 charges of fraud, or the case could be combined into one charge. Or the matter could fall into civil court.

Riley won his first speaking contest while in grade school. In high school he won the college Riley went to the University of Nebraska.

"I was frustrated," said Riley. "They had just added radio broadcasting to the journalism curriculum. Our professor was great at teaching us to write a newspaper story, but he'd say that radio stories were different. He never got around to teaching us how to write a radio story.

There was an outlet in Lincoln where broadcasting students could get experience, Riley said. However the only on-the-air experience students would get would be acting in radio dramas.

"I always tried to be the narrator instead of playing a character," said Riley. "I was young and impatient and asked myself how did appearing in radio dramas prepare me for journalism. So I quit and went to KAIA Brown's Institute, a radio school in Minneapolis. It was a trade school, but it was very good."

Students, said Riley, received pages of vocabulary they had to memorize every week. They were then tested on pronunciation and had to use the word properly in a sentence. Students had to keep up with the curriculum and if they didn't pass the weekly tests they would be placed on conditional status and could be asked to leave.

"The instructors were all radio pros from Minneapolis," Riley said. "We really learned Riley's radio career was

Does NATO need ground forces to win?

he latest question raised about the war in Kosovo is whether NATO and the United States belatedly will decide they must use ground troops.

Cloudy weather over Kosovo hampered NATO attacks, and military spokesmen said they had ordered "a night of relative restraint" because of the Orthodox

Easter celebration.

President Clinton seems dead set against bringing in the ground troops, as are most Democrats in Congress. The GOP, however, seem to be gaining ground with their call for ground troops.

The Republicans revived one of their

heroes of the Reagan area, Caspar Weinberger, whose piece on the New York Times Op-Ed page was titled, "Losing Track of the Main Objective of War."

Weinberg contended that a worthy cause deserved an all-out effort to win, and criticized President Clinton and his

military command for their failure to arrive at his opinion.

More people in the United States seem to be going along with that GOP view these days, and it will not be surprising if Clinton is forced to send in ground troops despite his obvious aversion to doing so.

While NATO is slowly winning more support for ground troops in view of the lack of success of the bombing sorties, that possibility reminds many of Vietnam, during which a shift in tactics

led to increased U.S. casualties. Whatever course is finally followed in Kosovo, winning the war will not be easy.

But NATO will lose much of its clout if it cannot master the Yugoslavian tyrant, even if it takes an all-out war, including

The Farms commissioned the study in October after receiving a petition from residents along the Boulevard.

"Our goals are simple," wrote petitioners Robert Peoples and Earl Heenan III, "reduce the speed limit from 30 mph to 25 mph (to reduce) vehicle speeds, and reduce the volume of vehicle traffic.

"We believe the city does not need two north-south thoroughfares," they continued, "i.e., Kercheval and the Boulevard.

The mistake's in the mail: How to amend an erroneous federal income tax return

Given the complexity of today's tax laws notify you, and adjust your return auto- have it applied to next year's return. and the average taxpayer's tendency to matically. put off filing until the last minute, it's no surprise that more than a few tax returns are sent to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) with incorrect or missing informa-

Fortunately, it's easy to make changes to your return by filing Form 1040X, Amended US Individual Tax Return, reports the Michigan Association of CPAs.

Amending the return

There are a number of reasons you might need to correct your income tax

Perhaps you claimed deductions or credits you should not have claimed or, conversely, you did not claim deductions or credits to which you were entitled.

Overstating or understating your income is another error that might necessitate filing an amended return.

A taxpayer who discovers, after filing, that he or she should have claimed a different filing status can set the record straight by submitting Form 1040X.

Oversights on your part are not the only reason tax returns are amended. Sometimes Congress makes changes to the tax law, and the IRS permits you to benefit from a retroactive change by Care Expenses," in order to qualify. amending your original return.

According to the IRS, if you should discover after filing that you made an error in Settling your tax bill arithmetic, there is no need to file an amended return.

The IRS computer will detect the error, ment refunded to you, or you can ask to eral returns.

Completing 1040X

Form 1040X is a single sheet that you must complete front and back. On the front side of Form 1040X, you can record changes in your income, credits, or deductions and calculate any net increases or decreases in your taxes.

On the reverse side of the form, there is space for you to provide a complete explanation of the changes you are making and the reason for each.

Be sure to write clearly and concisely. If you need more room, you may attach additional sheets of paper.

It's important to show the year of your original return and, if the original return was filed jointly, both spouses must sign the amended return.

Along with Form 1040X, you must submit any forms or schedules that are applicable to the changes you are making.

For example, if you are correcting the amount of wages you received or the tax withheld, you will need to attach a copy of your corrected W2 Form.

Credit, you will need to complete and submit Form 2441, "Child and Dependent

When you file an amended return, you can have all or part of any tax overpay- cedure for amending state, local, and fed-

If you choose to get a refund, it will be sent separately from any refund due on

your original return. Taxpayers who owe tax must pay the

full amount with Form 1040X, even if the original return showed an overpayment. The IRS will not reduce your refund

check to cover the additional tax due on your amended return. You must pay the amount due and you

will receive the original refund check sep-Send your return to the IRS Service

Center for the area where you live (see Form 1040 Instructions for addresses of Service Centers).

If you are amending returns for more than one year, you should send each one in a separate envelope to the proper IRS Service Center.

The statute of limitations — that period during which the IRS allows you to make corrections and changes - is generally three years after the original timely return was filed or two years from the date the tax was paid, whichever is later.

If you do not file your claim within this If you failed to file for the Child Care period, you may not be entitled to a credit or refund Since the IRS routinely shares informa-

tion with states that have income taxes, CPAs recommend that you make any necessary amendments to your state and local returns as well.



From page 1B Much of the interior was designed or donated by Players members and their friends, such as Thomas diLorenzo, who decorated the timber ceilings and painted Shakespeare's "Seven Stages of Man" over the proscenium, or Paul Honore, who painted the panels which line the theater walls.

The auditorium is composed of five tiers of tables that lead to the stage. Lining the tables are chairs with plaques, each with a Player member's name inscribed on

Two of the more noticeable features of the playhouse are the pair of huge urns that sit on either side of the stage. The contents of the urns, according to Player tradition, are all the dropped lines throughout the years. But, according to Rohloff, the right one is physically empty and the left contains the ashes of the original mortgage of the playhouse, which has remained virtually unchanged since 1925 and has a Federal Historic desig-

nation. The Players cast calls its monthly performances "frolics." They are usually composed of three one-act plays and are not open to the public. Guest observers say the "frolics" range from good to bad to awful. One of Players' many traditions is to per-





The Pastor's Corner Many questions, one answer

I drove my teachers crazy being like the little girl with a curl in the middle of her forehead: when I was good at math, I was very, very good (junior high champ at mental arithmetic); when I was bad, I was horrid (and boy, did I hear about it!). Whatever I was, I came by honestly with no back-of-the-book crutch to save either my face or reputation.

Sometimes the times are a little as I was then clueless as to what "the answer" is. I think that's the way it is as far as the situation with the Balkans is concerned. I know I have no answer. I do have a lot of questions. My questions are not only about the situation or about what the president and his advisers decide to do, but about what me and some other people of faith have to say about the mess

Though I believe that injustice should and must be addressed and tyrants halted, the hard question is which injustices should be addressed and which tyrants confronted. There is certainly no paucity of choices. How will decisions be made? A claim has been made for the "national interests" of the United States.

If you believe, as many people do, that we now live in a "global village," doesn't every land in turmoil represent a threat to our "national interests?" And if this latest threat has become so severe, why did we not act sooner? What about dialogue with other nations? Who is included and who isn't? If the situation is critical. when does talk turn into paralysis by analysis? Is the United States the "moral leader" of the world? Who says? Since when?

How do we appear to the rest of the world? Are we saviors or bullies? Whose reports about the situation in Kosovo are we to believe? Is President Milosevic guilty of - and here is a truly 20th century euphemism — "ethnic cleansing," or is he dealing with rebels in much the manner that our government has been accused of dealing with rebels in places like Ruby Ridge?

The questions don't seem to stop. Is peace-keeping through war an oxymoron, or, is it genuinely the best thing that can be done to prevent further bloodshed? How many more people would have been killed in Hitler's Holocaust if the beaches of Normandy had not

What dilemmas this can present to thoughtful people. Are there not people who oppose capital punishment and yet believe we should stop oppression at the cost of blood? Is there not a contradiction in that? What about people who oppose the draft yet believe our country should resist ethnic cleansing by the use of arms? Or should we just stay on our side of the ocean and "let people take care of their own damn problems?"

Among concerned people there will be a lot of different answers to these questions as well as a lot of other questions, yet no one will find "the" answer. There is no back-of-the-book solution. I'm sure, however, that advocates for this or that group will try to convince us that there is, and that they have it.

There's not much redemption in a situation like this. Perhaps the most we can get out of it is the struggle each of us has assessing his or her values and beliefs and how they are tested by it. Consider Kosovo and know who you are.





Outsmarting osteoporosis

If you are a woman and over age 50, you could have a fracture in your future. While doing a simple activity like bending to pick up a laundry basket, you may feel a burning stab in your back as one or more of your spinal bones collapse due to osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis occurs when the loss of bone over time has caused a drastic weakening of the skeleton. It affects more than half of all women over the age of 50 and is accountable for the majority of spinal bone, hip and wrist fractures in the aging population.

Bones change as you age

Throughout life, it is normal for healthy bones to break down and re-form. In healthy persons, new bone grows to replace the lost bone. This cycle continues so that the amount of new bone is equal to the amount of bone lost.

During young adulthood — between the ages of 25 and 35 bones thicken and reach their peak mass, or strength. From this time on, in both men and women, bone mass begins a slow

Bone loss accelerates during menopause in women because of the decrease in estrogen. This bone-friendly hormone helps maintain bone mass, plus it aids in the absorption of calcium and vitamin D, crucial bone-building elements.

Later in life

As we age, bone loss slows down, but we still may lose bone faster than it can be replaced. Our bones act as a warehouse for a number of minerals vital to daily functioning of the body. One of these minerals is calcium. If extra calcium is not avail-

able through the diet, the body withdraws it from the warehouse, decreasing bone density. The best source of calcium is in the food we eat. But if you can't get enough from food, you can get the rest from supplements. Women from age 25 to menopause need 1,000 mg of cal-

After menopause, the daily requirement goes up to 1,500. A good non-prescription supplement is Tums, which provides as much as one-third the daily calcium requirements. Don't overdo the calcium supplements. Taking more than you need could be harmful.

Risky lifestyle choices can harm bones

Following are some lifestyle choices that can have adverse effects on bone growth, bone mass and the body's ability to absorb calcium.

Try to avoid excessive:

- alcohol
- smoking
- some medications • protein-rich or salty foods
- caffeine
- · inactivity

Active bones are strong bones

An important partner to a healthy diet in keeping bones strong is to do regular weight bearing exercise. Recent research indicates that activities that put pressure on the bones are the most beneficial in preventing bone loss. These would include walking, stair climbing, low-impact aerobics and jumping rope. Brisk walking is one of the best because it is easy, free and can be done almost anytime, anywhere.



Two years previously, in 1936, the Alger House had been opened to the public as the East Branch of the Detroit Institute of Arts. European decorative arts were exhibited on the first floor,

modern works of art. In 1938, 63 pieces of our local artists were displayed along with the paintings from the DIA collection. Clyde Burroughs of the DIA thought the caliber of these pieces was even better than the annual Michigan Artists Exhibition which had been held that same year at the DIA. The show was such a success in the community that on May 10, 1938, the first meeting was held to officially organize the **Grosse Pointe Artists** Association.

The association has had a long history of working toward the advancement of art in the community. Each year, lectures on a wide range of art topics were organized with speakers from the DIA, Wayne State and other universities and colleges in the region. These lectures were open to the public.

As early as 1943, the association gave awards to outstanding high school students, a practice that continues today. And when the first art wing was constructed at the War Memorial in the late 1970s, the Grosse Pointe Artists Association contributed generously to help with its construction.

Today, its monthly meetings with guest lecturers are still open to the public.

Advice on security for people living alone

The number of people living alone is increasing as many people postpone marriage, are divorced or are left alone after the death of a spouse.

Single persons may be vulnerable to personal attack while entering or leaving their homes and even when they are alone in the home or apartment.

The number of single-adult households is not likely to decrease in the near future. Single individuals must make it more difficult for crimes to be committed against them or their homes, according to Cheryl Krysiak from the Michigan State University Extension Service.


Here are some suggestions:

- Install exterior lights at all doors. Keep the lights on all night -- as long as it is dark. Replace light bulbs as soon as they burn
- Install good wide-angle peepholes on exterior doors so you can see who is outside. Do not rely on voices to identify visitors.
- Do not hide an extra key outside your home anywhere. Leave a key with a trusted friend/neigh-
- Trim heavy bushes around all doors. This reduces the opportunity for an intruder to lie in wait or to break in, out-of-sight of neighbors.
- Make sure all windows are completely closed and locked. even above-ground-level windows, each time you leave your dwelling.
- Replace hollow-core and/or. windowed outside-exterior doors with solid wood or metal doors and install cylinder locks with deadbolt features.
- Leave at least one light burning in your dwelling when

you leave in the evening. Keep other lights on timers.

- Leave a radio on, tuned to a talk station when you leave.
- Never leave a note on the outside of your door.
- Never let a stranger know you are alone, whether you are talking on the telephone or talking to someone at the door.
- If you lose a key, replace the lock immediately.
- When you go on vacation tell your trusted neighbors so they will watch your home. Also have someone pick up your mail and newspapers, mow the lawn, or shovel the snow.
- Join or organize a Neighborhood Watch group. Local police departments are usually willing to help with this process.
- Mark all your valuables with your driver's license number and put a decal in your windows stating you have done so. This deters some thieves and makes it easier for you to reclaim your possessions when police find the
- Keep a separate key ring with car keys only to give to car repair persons, valet parking attendants and attendants at car washes. They cannot make a copy of your house key if they do not have it.
- Have your key ready to open your door when you go out to your car or arrive home.
- Always be alert and aware of your surroundings when walking from driveway/garage to your house or when pulling into your attached garage.

By taking simple precautions, persons living alone can make themselves and their dwellings less vulnerable and greatly reduce their chances of becoming victims of crime.



The discovery of gumtrees, known as the eucalyptus

One of the most notable botanists of the 18th century in England was Sir Joseph Banks, who lived from 1734 to 1820. He was always interested in botany, and while still an undergraduate at Oxford he established a botany lectureship, and, once out of college, he went on his first expedition (to Newfoundland) to collect plant specimens. In 1768 he sailed with Captain Cook on the first of his memorable voyages.

A little later, under the auspices of the royal society, Banks sailed with Dr. Daniel Solander to New Zealand and New South Wales, in Australia. At each point Banks and Solander landed and collected many treasures. From the Australian bush they found many varieties of eucalyptus, which Banks dubbed "gumtrees." At Botany Bay they found 1,000 species, and named the bay because of their splendid finds.

Gumtrees are the tallest trees in Australia where they sometimes reach a height of 300 feet. They are members of the myrtle family and are native to all of Australasia, where they are the dominant plants of Australia and the most important timber trees there. The trees have lance-shaped, thick leaves and bell-shaped flowers. Almost all the varieties produce a gum called kino — hence the name, gum trees.

Eucalyptus adapt well to many environmental conditions but cannot survive in climates with severe winters. They make good shade trees and the wood, which resembles mahogany, is used for ship building, railroad ties, telegraph poles, fencing and piers. The leaves are almost the exclusive food of Australian koalas, and the oil extracted from the leaves is used in medicine, cosmetics, soaps and perfumes.

The perfume industry relies heavily on eucalyptus oils. It is an interesting fact that the different species have different scents and the oils extracted from the leaves can be used in many different ways. Some smell like lemons, some like mint and some like menthol or apples.

Originating in Australia, eucalyptus trees are now grown in tropical and sub-tropical areas around the world, especially in California and Ethiopia. They were introduced into California in 1853 and have thrived there ever since. They are extensively used for highway planting and as windbreaks to protect citrus and other crops.




The most widely used species is blue gum, a very tall, straight tree. A particular characteristic of this tree is the fact that the bark peels off in long, narrow strips and piles up in heaps at the foot of the tree, which becomes smooth and grayish or ivory colored. The bark is brown or gray. The red iron-bark, another species, has surprisingly, coal-black bark and blue-green foliage. Another species, the Murray red gum, has dark gray bark. This one flourishes in Arizona, Texas and Florida and is one of the hardiest species.

Sir Joseph became director of Kew Gardens in England in 1772, a post he held for many years. Under his direction, a catalog of the plants in Kew Gardens was published in 1789.

Dr. Daniel Solander was a pupil of the great botanist, Linnaeus, and continued to be an associate of Banks for many years after their explorations in Australia and New Zealand. Another botanist of note at that time was Francis Masson, an associate of Banks and who was sent to Africa in 1772 at the fabulous salary of \$500 a year with annual expenses limited to \$1,000. He collected some hundred new species of plants before his return to England, but in 1776 Banks sent him out again to the West Indies, and later to South America and still later to Canada, where he died in Montreal in 1806.

Banks went to Iceland after his return from Australia, and when he returned to England as director of Kew Gardens, he wrote extensively about his explorations and was really the guiding genius of botany in England during his lifetime.

Banks' books are now in the British Museum. Another associate of Banks was William Curtis, apothecary and botanist, who became demonstrator at Kew Gardens and wrote a famous book, "Flora Londoniensis," regarding the flowers that grew within a 10-mile radius of London. He, with Banks, started in 1787, the Botanical Magazine, a periodical which has continued uninterrupted to the present day.



Try this squeegee-less recipe for washing windows

Q. Mr. Hardware, is there some way I can get the oxidation off of my windows? I've always used ammonia and newspaper to clean the windows but the last couple of years I haven't been able to get the scum off the glass. Mertzy of Chesterfield Township.

A. Mr. Mertzy, it is very satisfying to look out nice clean windows. Shiny windows on a house are like polished chrome on a car. Remember when cars had chrome? Armed with the proper tools this job can be an enjoyable one, especially if the sun is shining.

Using a bucket of warm water, a soft truck brush on a broom handle, a hose with a nozzle and a solution of Mr. Hardware's win-



dow magic, your project can be a cakewalk.

Window magic is simply a gallon of water with two tablespoons TSP (Trisodium Phosphate), 1/2cup vinegar and one drop of liquid soap (any kind). This is not my recipe, nor is it new; window washers have been using this formula or variations of it since the 1940s.

I attach my soft brush to a


broom handle so I can reach the upper windows from the ground. Why work off a ladder or get my hands wet unless I have to. I spray the window with water first then apply the mixture. Now I leave that window to soak and go to the next window and soap it up. Then go back to the previous window and reapply the solution, this time also washing the surrounding trim. What I have found is that the TSP and vinegar works better if it is on the surface for about 10 to 15 minutes. After scrubbing the second time, rinse with the hose and let dry the same as after a summer rain. Only the perfectionists will want to use a squeegee now.

Washing the screens on the driveway with the same procedures as above gets the spider crud and dirt off for a clean start for the summer. Use silicone spray or Teflon lubricant on the tracks of self-storing storms when reinstalling the screens and windows to make them slide easier.

Safely power up lawn and garden tools this spring

Most people look forward to venturing outside when temperatures are on the rise. When spring hits, spring cleaning enthusiasts break out lawn and garden tools to do their seasonal spruce-up around the house. The safety Underwriters at experts Laboratories Inc. (UL) recommend the following tips to remember when using lawn and garden appliances.

• Before using any appliance or tool, read and follow the manufacturer's use and care instructions that come with the product.

Always look for the familiar UL Listing Mark before purchasing a power tool, garden appliance or any other electrical product. The UL Listing Mark on a product means that representative samples of that product have been tested by nationally recognized safety standards with regard to fire, electric shock and related safety hazards.

• Before each use, inspect power tools and electric garden appliances for frayed power cords and cracked or broken casings. If the product is damaged, stop using it immediately. Don't attempt to repair it yourself. Return the product to the retailer or manufacturer or have a qualified repair shop examine the prod-

• When using power tools and garden appliances, always wear proper attire. Keep your clothing, hands and feet away from cutting blades at all times. Never wear jewelry when working with tools. Always wear safety glasses.

Pay attention to warning markings. Don't allow tools to get wet unless they are labeled

"immersible." When using tools or extension cords outside, make sure they are appropriate for out-

door use.

 Never alter a product or remove safety features, such as blade guards or electric plug grounding pins.

 Use only properly rated outdoor extension cords with outdoor electrical tools.

 Check the switch on a power tool or garden appliance to make sure it's "off" before you plug it in.

 Unplug all portable electrically operated power tools when not in use. These tools contain electricity even when turned off but still plugged in.

 Use and store power tools and garden appliances away from water sources to avoid electric shock. Never use power tools and appliances in the rain.

Have a qualified technician install ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) receptacles in all outdoor outlets. After installation, test your GFCIs monthly.

Never carry an appliance by the cord, and never yank the cord when removing it from a receptacle. When disconnecting the cord, always grasp the plug not the wire. Keep the cord away from heat, oil and sharp edges.

Power tools and garden appliances, like any household appliance, need to be maintained and used in accordance with the maninstructions. ufacturer's Following these precautions and the manufacturer's instructions may help you to enjoy longer, safer use of your spring cleaning



Household Help

Here's more information on how to care for your appliances so that they last longer:

Washers: Washing machines should last up to 12 years if maintained properly.

 Clean screens — Cleaning the screens at both ends of the hose will make sure the washer can fill with enough water.

• Check drain hose — If the hose is restricted, the water will not be able to be pumped out of the machine.

• Loop drain hose higher than water level — If the hose is too low and the water level is not high enough, your washer will continuously refill with water.

• Replace belt — If the belt is very worn, it needs to be replaced. If the belt looks OK but you can stretch it more than half an inch, you should tighten it so that the machine can spin properly and won't be overworked.

Dryers: Dryers can last more than a decade when properly maintained.

 Check drum belt — Listen to see if the motor is running; if the motor is running and the drum is not turning, the drum belt is broken and needs to be replaced.

• Clean screens — Drver screens should be cleaned after each load.

• Check vent — Obstruction of the vent will cause the dryer to take longer to heat and clothes will take longer to dry.

Air Conditioners: With proper maintenance, air conditioning units should run smoothly for 10

• Check the coil — If the coil in the front freezes up partially but not completely it is likely to be low on refrigerant, which can occur when the outside temperature is less than 75 degrees or the space that is to be cooled is very large. In both of these situations, the compressor is forced to run continuously and the cooling system will break down.

• Change air filters — The air filter should be changed each month because it helps take out particles floating in the air so that your cooling system can keep your air temperature at an optimal level.

Q. We bought a colonial-style home a couple of years ago and it has four bedrooms and a finished basement. The house is in good condition, but because it is over 50 years old, there is work to be

The bedroom floor is covered with parquet and is badly marred. I have been told it's beyond hope. I'd like to have a carpet installed in that room. The basement room is a small den and also has damage, but the floor is tiled. I would also like to install carpet there.

We are going to have this done by a professional once the old floors are removed. However, for cost-cutting reasons, we would like to remove these floors ourselves.

A. It's unfortunate that parquet floor is ruined because it highlights an entire room. Generally speaking, if a parquet floor is not scratched more than 1/8-inch in depth, it can be sanded down and repaired.


The best way to remove an old parquet floor is with a floorremoval tool which consists of a long metal bar on one end with a 6-inch wide wedge. The blade is tapered and sharp and quite thin. Parquet floors are not usually nailed, but are secured down with an adhesive cement.

Try to start at the doorway and drive the flooring tool under the tiles. You should wear heavy gloves and a good pair of work shoes when doing this job. Make sure the underlayment is in good condition and free of any remaining adhesive.

The recommended method for removing floor tiles is to use a rented heat pad. Simply heat the tiles, but slowly move the heat pad back and forth on only several tiles at a time. When the adhesive becomes soft, the tiles are ready to be scraped off. If the tile floor is on concrete, the heat pad can be used as well.

You can remove the tiles with a small, flat pry bar. Once you have started, the same floor removal tool will finish the job. Again, be sure the floor is clean and adhesive free.

Coupon Corner

Moving from one residence to another can be extremely stressful. There's the packing, of course, but then there's the choosing of the mover. This can be particularly daunting if moving out of state.

A friend recently moved and I feel he was ripped off by the moving company, a large national firm whose name I won't mention here (it's still in the process of being resolved). He was going from a four-floor walkup to a two-floor walkup. All this was laid out in the initial contract. However, when they arrived on moving day, the movers said they had no idea they had to tackle so many flights of stairs and tacked on another \$1,000 to the estimate! They came unprepared (no tools, etc.) and they complained about having to wrap certain items. Well, I'm

sorry, but protecting furniture by wrapping it should all be part and parcel of a move. They also chipped a dining room table and then had the audacity to claim that the chip was "an old one."

To avoid such horrors, my suggestion is to shop around thoroughly. Get several estimates. Contact the local Better Business Bureau to find out if there are complaints registered against the movers you're considering. Get recommendations from friends and family. Word of mouth can be quite useful in these situations.

Don't necessarily go with the lowest estimate. Go with the most reliable, efficient mover and make sure the company is fully licensed, bonded and insured for your pro-

How to alleviate mold and mildew problems

Spring rains bring damp weather and dampness is an invitation to mold and mildew to develop, according to Cheryl Krysiak of the Michigan State University Extension Service.

Mold and mildew — both members of the fungus family — have a musty odor and appear as dark gray blotches on surfaces. Like other fungi, mold and mildew need moisture to grow. They — thrive in dark, humid, poorly ventilated and improperly cleaned places.

Favorite places for mold and mildew:

- 1. Shower stalls and tubs.
- 2. Toilet bowls and tanks.
- 3. Basements.
- 4. Unventilated storage areas, luggage and trunks.
- 5. Collecting trays at the bottoms of frost-free refrigerators.
- 6. Fan blades and air conditioner coils.
- 7. Air vents and filters in heating and cooling systems.
- 8. Carpet backings, especially on floors below ground level or where spills were improperly dried.
- 9. Closet and shelf walls.
- 10. The water chambers of dehumidifiers, humidifiers and vaporizers.
 - rporizers.

 To remove mold and mildew:
- 1. Use disinfectants such as a chlorine bleach mixture 1/2 to l cup of liquid household bleach to a gallon of water. Rinse and wipe as dry as possible. Keep windows open and exhaust fans going until

the surfaces are dry.

- 2. Use anti-mildew tub and tile products. They will remove the stain and help prevent future mildew growth.
- To prevent mildew problems in the future:
- 1. Control causes of dampness. Be sure drainage is adequate around basement walls. Consider waterproofing concrete and other masonry walls above ground. Spread a layer of moisture barrier material (plastic) over soil in a crawl space.
- 2. Remove moisture with good ventilation. Drier outside air will absorb excess moisture when brought into the house. Use an electric fan to circulate air. Air conditioners and dehumidifiers can help control humidity. Do not operate dehumidifiers below 65 degrees Fahrenheit as frost may form on the coils and damage them.
- 3. Turn the furnace on in a damp, musty building. Open doors and windows to let moist air out.
- 4. Keep closets, basements, bathrooms and other areas as clean as possible. Some surfaces may require regular care with detergent suds, special cleaners or disinfectants such as chlorine bleach.
- 5. Store home furnishings only when they are clean and dry. Dirt on surfaces can cause mildew on fabrics:
- **6.** Use water-repellent sprays, mildew inhibitors, fungi-

cides and chemicals to absorb moisture and help keep fabrics and surfaces moisture and moldfree.

The key points to remember in the battle against mold and mildew are to ventilate well and disinfect.




