



# City spends \$57,000 for SOC

The City of Grosse Pointe Council approved spending \$57,000 for programs for senior citizens in 2000. This includes \$33,000 for the minor home repair program and \$18,200 for PAATS, a transportation program to help seniors get

The money for these programs comes from the federal government's Community Development Block Grant program. Funds from this program must be used for specific programs as defined by the federal government. 



# U.S. Navy recruit hopes for calm seas and prosperous voyage

Say goodbye to one of the good guys.

Brandon Henderson is shipping out next month and probably won't be back.

"I have a good feeling that it's going to be the right move," said Henderson, 19. "I'm just nervous about leaving my friends and the area. In all honesty, I don't think I'll be

Henderson, a resident of Grosse Pointe Park, will weigh anchor next month on what he hopes will be a career in the U.S. Navy.

He leaves town the second week in April for the Great Lakes Naval Training Center near Chicago, a facility familiar to Navy recruits dating to before World War II.

Following boot camp, he wants to specialize in military intelligence.

"Military intelligence is a broad description that covers a lot of specific jobs," said Henderson. He said the job is more than spying and cracking

Intelligence personnel also "serve as liaisons between nations, representing the Navy in their matters," he said.

in the military and graduate from officer's candidate school.

Better yet, he said, "The Navy sets aside positions at the Naval Academy for enlisted men who show outstanding traits or perform exceptional duty. If I got approval for that, I could graduate an officer and come away at least with a captain's rank.'

Henderson, a 1999 graduate of Grosse Pointe South High School, isn't joining the military because he's an "at risk teenager," he joked.

He has worked since his sophomore year. His first job was as a member of the morning cleaning crew at the Ye Olde Tap Room, a watering hole on Charlevoix just inside the Detroit border.

"I cleaned up the peanut shells," said Henderson.

Tired of peanuts and the odor of stale beer, Henderson then worked for a landscaping company ("I was in dirt most of the time," he said.), then a clothing store at Eastland.

His senior year at South, Henderson worked and shopped at the same time. He had a part-time job at Brooks Brothers on Kercheval.

"It was easy to buy too many clothes in there," he said.

Despite school and work, Henderson showed a sailor's resourcefulness by finding

time for a social life. 'You always have to make time for social occasions," he reasoned.

Henderson has taken a job at a local gasoline station to pay off some outstanding bills

before putting on a uniform. He's wanted to join the Navy

since childhood. "My father was in the Navy," said Henderson, "When I got older, the discipline and prestige of making it into the higher ranks became more appealing. You have a lot of people relying on you in the Navy. Even doing the simple things like wearing your uniform in public, you're representing a

nation. It's kind of a big task." He added, "I don't think I'll feel overwhelmed. I'll have my personal responsibilities, yes, but will also have other people there who are helping me and at the same time relying on me. It will give me self-confidence if they trust what I'm doing.

# Engler Bush's running mate in November?

he recent unusual upset in Michigan's presidential primary has the whole country talking about Sen. John McCain's Michigan comeback in the race against Gov. George Bush Jr. of Texas.

However, with huge "Super Tuesday" primaries this week in New York and other Eastern states still to be played out (as of press time), Bush is still in the running, as McCain's presidential hopes have declined since his surprising victory in the Michigan primary.

nce again Pointe voters bucked the state trend by choosing George W. Bush over John McCain in the Tuesday Feb. 22 Republican presidential primary.

Statewide, voters chose Arizona Sen. McCain over Texas Gov. Bush.

GOP candidate Alan Keyes garnered a meager 354 votes from among all the

Before the election, political pundits predicted a possible McCain victory in Michigan due to the Republicans' open primary process, where anyone can vote, including Democrats and independents.

It appears the experts were correct.

Democrats took advantage of the open Republican primary in Michigan and went to the polls and voted for the lesser of the top two Republican candidates, McCain, figuring that would make it easier for a Democrat to win in November.

The Democratic primary in Michigan this Saturday will be closed, preventing state Republicans a chance to get even by sabotaging their rivals' primary process by voting for the lesser Democratic candidate, Bill Bradley.

Prior to the Republican primary, we noted in a news story and editorial that many Grosse Pointe public officials were endorsing Bush, and we concurred.

One loyal reader, however, took issue with our editorial and with the local politicians' endorsement. She points out that all our municipal elected officials are non-partisan, and she believes they should publicly remain non-partisan in their views.

We disagree. Our municipal elected leaders are non-partisan more due to city charter provisions than to any attempt to be apolitical.

Likewise, this newspaper is non-partisan, but we do, nevertheless, reserve the right to endorse any candidate we feel is best for the community, state or country.

In this case, we happened to agree with our local leaders who supported Bush.

I firmly believe that responsibility and education are the key factors in turning troubled children around.


If your child wants a pet, then he must be the one to feed, walk and clean up after it. And we shouldn't allow a child to have a pet before he is old enough to take care of it.

Therefore, the survey failed in its goal to obtain the opinions of all high school families. The fewer people respond to a survey, the less accurate it

Pointe Aquatics is a swim club available through a community education program.



# Sportage: The mini truck with mighty plans

pick up a Kia Sportage 4X4. The killer snowstorm so eagerly predicted by the meteorologists appeared to be slowly taking shape. An inch or so had fallen, one of a possible six, eight or more, we were led to believe

The little 4-door Sportage

overhead cam engine under the hood was originally designed by Mazda. Kia says it modified it to meet Transitional Low Emissions Vehicle standards. It has a fuel injection system from

should have been the ideal vehicle. Instead, it proved surprisingly skittish, with a tendency to fishtail on even modest accelerations on the freeway service drive. Going around corners, again at cautious speeds, also required patience.

The floor-mounted shift that allows the driver to put the vehicle in 2-wheel "hi" or low or 4-wheel hi or low configurations appeared, according to the diagram atop the stick, to be in a 4-wheel-drive mode. As it turned out, the little truck was in 2-wheel drive and its rear drive was causing the rear end to swing on the snowcovered pavement

Moving from 2WD to 4WD is not easy in this vehicle, which can be transformed through vacuum-operated front hubs while it is being driven. And we could find no indication on the instrument panel of whether we were in 2WD or 4WD - that seems simple enough and an oversight on the part of Kia.

The 130-hp. 2.0-liter dual

trolled 4-speed automatic or heavy-duty Getrag-designed 5speed manual. In fifth gear at highway speeds, the engine revs at over 3,000 RPMs and creates a fair amount of noise.

What the Sportage lacks in refinement it makes up for in features like relative ease of entry to both front and back seats; a surprisingly capacious storage area behind the second seat, and a sporty appear-

And, in spite of a neighbor's comments that it looks no bigger than a tractor lawnmower, it is attractive.

The SUV has some surprising numbers. One is its wheelbase. While the 4-door Sportage looks almost stubby, its wheelbase is actually longer than those of close and even distant - competitors. The Sportage rides on a 104.3-inch wheelbase. The Honda CR-V compact sport utility has a 103.2-inch wheelbase, and the 4-door Chevrolet Tracker rides on only a 97.6inch wheelbase. Even the Ford Explorer 2-door Sport has a

smaller number: a 101.7-inch wheelbase for a substantially darger vehicle

Another surprising number is the fuel economy rating for this compact truck: 19 miles per gallon in the city and 22 miles per gallon on the highway. It's no fuel miser.

One more number - perhaps one of the most importance to potential buyers — is its manufacturer's suggested retail price. That rings in at \$16.295 for a model that includes: 4-wheel drive system with automatic locking hubs and 2-speed transfer case; power windows/locks/mirrors; split-folding rear seat; tilt steering wheel; deluxe cloth interior; alloy wheels, and a theft-deterrent system.

Air conditioning adds a cool \$900 to the pricetag. Anti-lock brakes run \$490; automatic transmission is \$1,000; a sound system with CD player is \$475; and a rear window wiper is \$125.

Kia says its Sportage was the world's first vehicle to feature a knee airbag. This, coupled with a steering-wheelmounted airbag, provides added protection for the driver. The sport utility has a ladder-style frame with six crossmembers for torsional stiffness

The 4X4 model has a 7.9inch ground clearance which may appeal to an owner intent on going off-road. What that means to everyday drivers is that the Sportage is quite convenient to get into. No searching for grab handles or lighted running boards. For most of us, they aren't necessary for climbing on board. Another pleasant surprise is the ease of entry into the back seat. While the seat itself is pretty shallow and might tire a fullsize person on a long trip, the second doors open wide and it is not a problem to put your

tush on the back seat cushion. There is decent knee and chin room and plenty of headroom for back seat passengers. The vehicle is equipped with three rear seat safety belts and bills itself as a five-passenger truck.

The interior is nicely finished - modest, but comfort-

Opening the rear door requires both hands. First, the spare tire must be released and swung on its arm outward until it locks; then one must use the ignition key to unlock the rear door. In order to swing the spare tire back into place, you must turn a knob that releases it from a locked

The 4X2 Sportage starts at \$14,795. The top-of-the-line 4X4 Sportage EX runs \$18,595. For the latter figure, a vehicle with ABS and traction control might prove a better investment.



It was ideal weather for a 4X4, yet the Kia Sportage seemed to lack confidence.





Beginning in February, Volkswagen will offer a 1.8-liter, 150-hp, four-cylinder engine as a \$1,550 engine option in its 2000 model year Golf and Jetta. In the Golf GTI GLS, the 1.8 T will be the new standard powerplant. That trans-

lates to a horsepower adjustment of from 115 to 150. In VW's upcoming 2000 Golf and Jetta models, the 1.8 T will be a stand-alone engine option exclusively on the GLS trim levels of both cars.

On the economy scene, in the Golf, Jetta and (Golf) GTI, the 1.8 T with manual

transmission gets 24 mpg in the city and 31 mpg on the highway. With automatic,

the numbers are 22 mpg city, 28 mpg highway.

On the fast-getaway scene, VW says the 1.8 T takes the GTI from zero to 60 mph

in 8.0 seconds. With a 5-speed manual, the 1.8 T takes the Jetta from nothing to 60 mph in 8.2 seconds.

Although its press materials sure made it sound like you could pick up your new Buick Rendezvous next week, closer reading indicated that the good-looking, midsize sport utility with Buick badge will be marketed as a 2002 model.


The first truck-based Buick in almost 80 years, Rendezvous goes into production a year hence. It was unveiled at press conferences in February at the Chicago Auto Show and in San Diego (California), in conjunction with the Buick Invitational Golf Tournament there.

Well, why not? Even Porsche is bringing a sport utility to the marketplace. So why not Buick, maker of traditional and popular sedans. No one wants to be left out of the SUV marketplace.

Buick says its truck combines the best features of premium sedans and minivans as well as the all-road capabilities of sport utilities.

Rendezvous will feature low door sills for easy entry; various seating combinations with room for up to seven passengers; a center console large enough to handle a full-size laptop computer; instrumentation that includes a new generation of heads-up display; a new rear suspension, and optional "Versatrak" all-wheel drive.

Buick built some trucks from 1909 to 1918 and again in 1922 and 1923. In additional, some coachbuilders have used Buick chassis to create small numbers of buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles over the years, Buick says.

# Lake St. Clair falls from grace

Low water causes more problems than high water

# Is it old age or alcoholism?

Dear Jeff and Debra:

My dad is 78 years old and ever since my mother passed away he is increasingly incapable of taking care of himself. His health has deteriorated, he's retreated into his own private world, and his personal hygiene has declined. My brother and sister have begun researching assisted living facilities for my dad because they don't believe he can continue living alone in the family home. While I am not opposed to assisted living, I don't know if this is the answer at this point in my dad's life. I think it's his drastic increase in drinking alcohol that may be at the bottom of the problems.

Dad started drinking a lot after my mother died. She was the center of his world, and I think alcohol is his way of dealing with grief and loneliness. He drinks every day and sometimes begins in the mornings. He shakes, forgets things and doesn't eat. I wonder if Dad wouldn't function much better if we could get the alcohol out of his life. I've brought this up to my brother and sister but they don't take it as seriously as I do. My brother said we can't take away Dad's last pleasure. Can you give me some information I could share with them that might open their eyes?

 Looking for Answers Dear Looking:

A nationwide survey recently found that 6 out of 10 people are concerned about an older adult's use of alcohol or other mood-altering drugs, so you are not alone. In fact, many people are sur-

prised to learn that widowers over the

age of 75 have the highest rate of alcoholism in the country.

As with your father, older adults go through many life changes: death of a spouse, retirement, loss of life roles, deaths of friends, separation from children, loss of health and youth. These are all grief issues and may lead to an increase in the use of alcohol. This increase in drinking can cause serious problems, including alcoholism.

Alcohol problems are a leading cause of illness, accidents and decline in quality of life among the elderly. Contrary to your brother's sentiments, no pleasure comes from alcohol problems. However, this misconception continues to thrive. The problem is hidden and elderly alcoholics often don't get proper help. This is due, in a large part, to

family denial. Perhaps the following facts will help your brother and sister get past their denial about your father's problem:

 Three million Americans over the age of 60 have an alcohol problem (American Medical Association).

• Up to 50 percent of nursing home residents have alcohol-related problems (U.S. House of Representatives, Select Committee on Aging).

 Physicians often miss the diagnosis of alcoholism in the elderly, only identifying the problem correctly in 22 to 37 percent of the actual cases in hospitals (American Medical Association).

• Up to 70 percent of the elderly in hospitals have alcohol-related health problems and more than 1 out of 5 have a diagnosis of alcoholism (U.S. House of

Symptoms of alcoholism are somewhat different among the elderly than younger adults. Older adults are less likely to be arrested for drunken driving, for example.

Some common symptoms are shakiness; forgetfulness; chronic health complaints; isolation; poor eating habits; decline in hygiene; depression; hostility; loss of interest in hobbies; falling, accidents and bruising; confusion; frequent napping; and increased blood pressure.

Since these symptoms mimic old age, it's easy to understand why physicians and families alike attribute these problems to the aging process. But it's alcoholism, not age, that is causing the fast



# Morning has broken

Grosse Pointe Woods Presbyterian Church In the book "Desert Wisdom," there are writings of fourth century Christians who left behind the cities of Egypt and lived in the desert. The hermits subsisted on solitude and prayer. They sought simplicity and separation. It is said of Abba Poeman, one of the desert fathers: "Every morning he made a new beginning."

It is a radical idea to make a new beginning every day and at first glance, it strikes me as being very unpractical.

There is a comfortable stability about a morning routine. Some of us barely function in the early a.m. It is our habits that help us get moving. The paper is waiting in the box. The automatic coffee maker has turned on at the prescribed hour so we can pour out a black steamy mug. Morning road reports are as close as our favorite radio station and the shower turns warm just as we expect. Starting over each morning without a routine would be a waste of time and energy.

But it misses the point to see Abba Poeman's example as a demand to drop all routines. Another way to consider his message would be to look at each new morning as if you had never seen a new day — to see morning as if it were created and appearing to you for the first time. You would notice the long shadows of early day growing shorter, the sky a rosy, orange blue or misty gray, a fresh hue unknown to your eyes.

You would hear the quietness of the house — the refrigerator humming or computer left on overnight, a cardinal whistling, a whining siren or feel the chill air touching your skin as you walk to the end of the driveway. You would embrace the softness of children's faces as they climb out of bed, and smell the baby-aroma of your little ones who coo or cry to welcome the new day.

What a feast of sight and sound and smell and touch and taste is ours if we notice it! And, in that awareness, memories of other new days in other places come to mind - morning on the gently rocking boat, sunrise over the Grand Canyon, cowbells in the Swiss alpine village, or the silent beauty of the autumn woods as you wait for deer to come.

In another way, Abba Poeman's "Every morning he made a new beginning" reminds us that there is promise and possibility in each new day. We do get to start over, let go of troubles, worries, demands, pressures and hurts.

To make each day a new beginning is to be fully aware that, while you will face many of yesterday's demands and cares, you have the opportunity to start over, to see troubles in a new light, to gather fresh strength and new resolve, to discover insights and to enjoy the fullness of life anew.

The day ahead looks full; your appointment calendar leaves not a minute for quiet, but this morning you start afresh thinking "I will take it as it comes" and the day will unfold moment by moment.

Or maybe your day ahead looks long and empty; the house is quiet where children once ran; arthritic knees refuse to bend, dust piles up on lovely old dishes and the furniture hasn't been polished for

Still it is a new day and you realize that while it may seem like every other day, this one is new. "I will take it as it comes and live it fully as I am able."

we are still a month away from daylightsaving time, I am enjoying the earlier sunlight. Before-work walks are now possible and the everearlier-lightening sky beckons me, sometimes before my alarm beeps its welcome. In the warming weeks ahead I'll keep Abba Poeman in mind and do my best to make every morning a new beginning.

And when I'm disappointed with my efforts. well, there's usually another new beginning when the stars fade and a new day dawns.

# Everything's good about 'Our Town'

"Our Town" hits home. One of the best Hilberry Theatre productions in recent years will be playing through April 1, and that's no joke.

The entire cast of "Our Town," which includes every member of the Wayne State University Hilberry repertory company plus a few additions, performs the deceptively simple Pulitzer Prize-winning play by Thornton Wilder with a naturalness that comes from talent, teamwork and a director with a deft hand.

Everyone does a fine job, not just Fred Shahadi, the second-year actor who stole "My Favorite Year" and "The Merchant of Venice" this season. In this outing, Shahadi's short time on stage melds smoothly with comparably good performances by his colleagues.

Actor Eric Gratton has an even smaller part than Shahadi. Coming off a fine job as the lead in "Some Americans Abroad," Gratton doesn't sluff off his tiny roll in "Town." Nor does he try to make something bigger of it. Likewise Heidi Olsen.

Why focus first on the small-part players rather than the leads?

Because that's the point. As Wilder would want, it's the little things you notice in the Hilberry's "Our

Director Edward G. Smith of the WSU theater department is spot-on with "Our Town."

Like the dotted rhythms of the Vivaldi lute concerto with which Smith serenades the theater in the play's final moments, his direction and staging are simple and understated, heartfelt and warm.

Smith doesn't hammer home Wilder's message

about not realizing that in life it's the little things that make the difference.

The current crop of Hilberry actors are coalescing into a team. The company hasn't been this good since the early 1990s.

It's nice to start caring again about the Hilberry, especially when they do a good job with a play about not letting the important things pass unnoticed.

Sean Ramey handles the role of the down-home Stage Manager without being hokey. Without forced innocence, he pulls off the line, "It's like one of those European fellas said, 'Every child born into the world is nature's attempt to make a perfect human being."

Ramey isn't one of those fellers who has to interject, "yup, yup," like Goofy to play a New Hampshire Yankee.

Mike Schraeder plays schoolboy George Gibbs. He shares the lead with Tanisha Gonzalez, who is in the roll of Gibbs' next door neighbor Emily Webb. The actors are reserved and the innocence of their developing love is convincing.

With a church choir rehearsing in the background, George and Emily talk at night from their respective bedroom win-

# Chicken and veal develop French accent

Fricassee (FRIHK-uhsee) refers to a dish made with meat that has been sauteed in butter before adding vegetables. Mirepoix (mihr-PWAH) refers to a mixture of finely diced carrots, celery and onions that are sauteed in butter with (in some cases) the addition of ham or bacon. This week's feature, classic French chicken in white wine sauce, is the pairing of the two culinary techniques.

If you're looking for a new way to bring chicken to the dinner table, this is your dish. This rich and tasty recipe is even worthy of your next dinner

Classic Chicken in Wine Sauce 2 tablespoons butter

into 6 pieces salt and pepper to season

1 4-lb. chicken, cut

1 medium onion, finely chopped 1 medium carrot,

finely chopped 1/2 rib celery, finely chopped

2 oz. proscuitto OR country ham, finely chopped

3/4 cup dry white wine 3/4 cup chicken stock

OR broth 3 tablespoons heavy cream

chopped fresh flatleaf parsley (for gar-

Melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat. Season the chicken with salt and pepper and cook in the skillet, skin side down to brown it and render the fat from the skin, about 15 minutes or so. Turn the chicken over and cook for another 5 to 10 minutes. Remove chicken pieces from pan and set aside. Pour off all but 2 tablespoons of remaining fat from the pan. (If you choose boneless, skinless chicken there won't be any excess fat and you may have to add additional butter before sauteeing the veg-


etables.) Add the chopped carrots, celery, onion and proscuitto and saute until the onion is brown and the vegetables are softened, around 10 minutes or so. Add the wine and the chicken broth to the pan and stir to combine with the cooked vegetables. Put the chicken pieces back into the pan, bring the liquid to a boil, then immediately reduce the heat to a simmer. Cover and cook for another 25 minutes or until the chicken pieces are cooked through. (Always check the thickest piece for doneness.)

Once again, remove the chicken pieces from the pan and cover with a piece of foil to keep warm.

#### Bring the sauce back to a boil and cook to reduce the liquid volume by about one half, about 5 minutes or so. (Longer if you want a thicker sauce.)

Add the heavy cream,

remove from heat and stir



To serve, place a piece of chicken (or two, depending on size) over a bed of cooked rice or pasta and ladle the sauce over both. Sprinkle with the fresh chopped parsley. To serve family style, place all of the chicken on a serving dish and top with the sauce and parsley. Serve the starch on the side. Roasted redskin potatoes are also a nice complement to this French chicken dish.

I've also prepared this sauce using thinly sliced medallions of veal (instead of chicken), with excellent results. Simply dredge the veal in flour that has been seasoned with salt and pepper before placing it in the heated skillet with butter. Cook the veal for a few minutes (until it is just done) and remove it from the pan and cover with foil. Don't overcook it.

Proceed with the sauce and omit cooking the veal a second time. After the vegetables are cooked, add the wine and broth and proceed to the boiling reduction of the sauce. After the cream is added, place the cooked pieces of veal back into the sauce to heat it for serving.


It took about one hour to prepare this dish from start to finish. The fact that everything is cooked in one large skillet keeps things simple in the kitchen.


This recipe was pulled from Taunton's Fine Cooking Magazine (February 1999) which I have found offers detailed lessons on a wide variety of cooking techniques.

The proscuitto adds a salty bite while the wine and cream give this heavenly sauce a smooth finish. Classic French chicken will be a welcome change to the chicken that usually ends up on our dinner tables.













# How many keys should it take to unlock a house?

Q. Mr. Hardware, we have updated the locksets on our exterior doors. The problem is that after purchasing hardware from different sources we now have three different keys for the same house. Is there a way we can make the locks work with the same key or do we have to purchase new locks? Goldylocks, Grosse Pointe.

A. Goldylocks, your dilemma may not be very difficult to solve. Keying locks alike is something we do every day. In fact we'll rekey a new door lock sold at our store to your old key at no extra charge. The only restriction is that the keyways are compatible. Another step further is to key your vacation home to the same key as your house. How about close relatives that exchange keys for each other's homes? Key them alike and both of you only need one key. Don't advertise what you have done and no one will know or care anyway.

Back to your locks, try your three house keys in all the different locks. Does one key fit into all of them? Don't expect it to turn the lock, just fit it all the way in the cylinder. If it fits you are in fine shape. Pick the key you want all the other knobs keved to. That would be the key that currently fits the most locks. Then remove all the locks that need to be



changed; just the side a key goes into, and take them to a locksmith or any full service hardware store. Don't forget to bring both the old keys and the one key you want all the locks keyed to.

What if one of your locks has a different keyway and none of the other keys fit in it? Bummer. Possibly a cylinder can be special ordered that will still fit the lock and will have the same keyway as your other locks. That will best be researched at the place of purchase, then try locksmiths and hardware stores.

# Gas heaters acomodate more hot water

Natural gas water heaters provide more hot water faster and less expensively than electric water heaters, according to the American Gas Association.

Comparing the annual operating costs before buying a water heater can pay off in substantial savings, because the water heater is the second biggest energy user in a typical home, after the heating and cooling system.


Water heaters are required by federal law to carry an EnergyGuide label that shows the average annual cost of operating the unit. Although electric water heaters are often less expensive to buy, operating a gas water heater will cost about half as much as operating an electric water heater, depending on local utility rates.


To select a unit to meet your home's hot water needs, look at the first hour rating on the label.

This shows the most hot water that can be supplied in a one-hour period.

To get maximum efficiency from a water heater:

- Drain a pail or two of water from the faucet, located at the bottom of the heater, several times a year.
- Set the water heater at "normal," or about 120 degrees, in order to save energy. However, you may wish to set the water heater at 140 degrees if your dishwasher does not have a water heating booster as part of its automatic cycle.
- Keep the burners clean.
- If the pilot light goes out, follow the appliance instructions and relight it. If any difficulty occurs, turn the controls off and call a plumber or heating dealer. If you smell gas, call your local gas company.





Gas dryer advantages

Consumers can dry three loads of laundry in a natural gas clothes dryer for the same amount of money it costs to dry only one load in an electric dryer, according to American Gas Association (AGA).

Cost-conscious consumers will consider the cost of operating a clothes dryer as well as the purchase price, when deciding what to buy.

Gas dryers require little upkeep. Cleaning the lint screen regularly keeps air circulating properly in the dryer.

Dryer exhaust should always be vented to the outside. This will carry moisture-laden air out of the home, preventing it from being recirculated by the dryer. It will also cut drying time, using less gas and saving money.

Consumers who purchase natural gas appliances should look for the Blue Star Design Certification Seal from the AGA or another nationally recognized testing agency.

Getting the look down

 Rag rolling: Applying a finish with rags attached to a roller leaves an elegant and blurry flow of textured color that resembles watered silk. Remember to work from the bottom up and keep your directional pattern fairly vertical, parallel and equidistant. The base coat you select will show through. Softer colors work best.

• Sponging: The quickest and easiest technique, sponging can create dramatic looks. Use more than one topcoat color for a more vibrant, "dimensional" look. The key is to sponge randomly to avoid overlapping or lines. It is best to start sparingly and continue to add. Be sure to rotate the sponge to achieve an irregular, mottled effect.

• Color washing: This technique gives your walls the subtle transparency of an Impressionistic watercolor. Using a brush, simply slap the finish on loosely and irregularly. Make crosshatch designs as you go. For a softer effect, dab surface with a dampened rag.

Decorative, or faux, finishes continue to be the hottest trend in home painting today, and it's simple to see why. For the same effort it takes to paint a wall white, you can now create stippled, mottled or distressed-looking surfaces that define a room much more than any piece of furniture or artwork.

We contemplated she should have my vase but she ended up declining because the vase also holds great sentiment to me. I bought it a week before I was married and found a special spot for it through the years.



It's easy to see hard water deposits on faucets, showers, sinks and tubs. However, Luepke also recommends using a nonabrasive cleaner on household appliances where build-up may not be so visible.


The insides of tea kettles and automatic drip coffee makers, for example, may be coated with hard water deposits. Luepke's advice is to fill a tea kettle with Lime-A-Way until all deposits are covered. Let the kettle soak for 30 to 45 minutes. Discard the product and rinse the kettle thoroughly with clear water. You may have to repeat the process if deposits are more than 1/4-inch thick.

Monthly cleaning of coffee makers is recommended. A coffee maker can be filled with four parts water to one-part Lime-A-Way. Brew the solution once, then brew at least two pots of clean water to rinse out the remaining cleaning product.

Mineral deposits can settle on small-necked bottles and ice cub trays, making drinks taste funny. Bottles and trays can be rinsed with a mineral-dissolving product deposits disappear. Remember to rinse them thoroughly with clear water before refilling with water or other liq-

Removing mineral deposits in the laundry room is also easy with the right product. Keep your washing machine sparkling clean by using a mineral-dissolving product once a month. Pour one cup into a machine full of hot water and run the washer through a normal cycle.

A product such as Lime-A-Way can be used in your steam iron. Pour 1/4 cup of cleaner into the steam chamber and then fill it with water. Set the iron flat on a rack in a plastic dishpan with the



dial set to "steam." This will let the solution drip through. This step may be repeated several times. Do not plug in the iron. Rinse it by letting two more chambers full of clear water drip through.

Is hard water a problem for you out in the yard? Sprinkler nozzles and garden tools should be soaked in cleaner, rinsed thoroughly and dried before use. Luepke advises always reading the directions on any cleaning product and testing a small hidden area of a surface if you are unsure the product should be used on that material.

"Keeping a step ahead of hard water build-up will keep your indoor and outdoor household appliances working and looking like new," says Luepke.

# Top tips for an important household purchase

#### Cleaning experts advise on the best way to buy a vacuum

Guests are on their way over. You have just enough time to give the house one more pass with the vacuum. You lug the heavy, old cleaner out of the closet. It coughs, wheezes and then kicks out more dirt onto the carpet than what was already there in the first place. Sound familiar? Perhaps it's time to shop for a new vacuum. But, with so many options on the market today, where do you start?

The following are a few key factors consumers should consider when buying a vacuum, courtesy of the experts at Dirt Devil.

"For the average consumer, a vacuum purchase is a major decision, and with so many product options available at retail today, it can become overwhelming," says Rick Farone, Dirt Devil's vice president of product development. "Several key factors should be considered before consumers begin their search. Getting started can be as easy as logging onto the Internet to look for background product information. In short, get to know the top industry brands. Do some research to understand current industry trends to evaluate the price versus the value of each unit. And lastly, consider your lifestyle needs and compare them to available vacuum types as well as current industry trends and product features."

#### Selecting a brand

There are a handful of companies currently in the business of manufacturing vacuums. Familiarize yourself with the brands — the number of years in the business and a company's overall reputation speak for itself. Make sure that your purchase is through a reputable company that will not only be around in the future, but is known for quality products and customer service.

Most of the vacuums sold are manufactured by the three industry leaders: Dirt Devil, Hoover and Eureka. If you have particular questions, call a toll-free consumer hotline or visit your local vacuum specialty store to talk directly with someone who is upto-date on the industry.

#### Evaluate lifestyle needs

Whether you are young or old, live in an apartment or a house, there is a cleaning product made to fit your every need. Before deciding on a particular cleaning product, consumers should consider these types of questions: Does your home have more carpeted areas or hard floor surfaces?

Are stairs and landings a concern? Do you have any physical limitations? Do you suffer from allergies? Do you have kids or own a pet? Consider these needs when deciding what type of vacuum is appropriate, such as whether to buy an upright vacuum or a canister.

While canisters were once thought to be ideal for a larger variety of floor surfaces, uprights today have added features and onboard tools that make the units more versatile than ever before for all types of cleaning. Uprights are easier to use and more effective at cleaning larger areas in the home, and most vacuums sold in the United States are uprights. In fact, consumers bought more than 9 million uprights in 1999, compared to less than 500,000 canisters, according to NPD INT-ELECT, a syndicated sales tracking system which measures actual cash register sales at participating retailers, representing 70 percent of the industry.

Product design is also an important consideration. Many design enhancements not only address ease-of-cleaning issues that are of interest to average users, but also are extremely helpful to those with physical challenges or limitations. For example, seniors or those with arthritis, in particular, have concerns regarding a cleaner's weight because of carrying and pushing considerations.

Manufacturers have addressed this issue by offering lightweight, but effective cleaning products, such as the Dirt Devil RoomMate. At less than six pounds, the RoomMate works as hard as a full-size vacuum, but weighs half as much. This unit offers effortless maneuverability, an easy-to-empty dust cup and large on/off foot pedals to eliminate unnecessary bending.

While the majority of house-holds purchase an upright, those households that require more frequent cleaning, due to kids or pets, may also opt for smaller lightweight products, such as hand vacs and stick vacs, which are ideal for quick pick-ups between regular cleanings.

#### Price versus value

Most large manufacturers offer products at a variety of prices, which are primarily determined by power (suction and amps), materials and product features. For example, a metal unit will invariably cost more than its plastic-molded counterpart, although the motor may be identical.

Vacuum prices range from \$50 to \$1,200. For a maximum of \$250, consumers can get all the value, features and benefits in a vacuum to more than satisfy their

daily cleaning needs. In fact, at a price of just \$79, the Dirt Devil Featherlite Plus, the lightest full-size upright you can buy with tools on-board, was one of the top five vacuums sold in stores in 1999, as measured by NPD INT-ELECT.

#### Features and amenities

From motor power to specialty filters to on-board tools, each of these features can greatly affect a vacuum's overall performance.

 Amps and suction — 12 amps is the maximum allowable amperage for upright vacuum cleaners. Some manufacturers use a rating system to indicate a vacuum's cleaning ability — this number can easily be confused with the amps. To verify exactly what the vacuum offers, check the unit's patent plate (generally located on the base of the unit). This will indicate the true motor amperage. Combined together, a unit's amps, suction and the power of its rotating brush are the true indicators of how well a cleaner lifts dirt from the floor.

Bagged versus bag-less—consumers continue to search for products that effectively complete chores more quickly and easily than ever before. Thanks to advances in technology and trends in the industry, consumers in the market for a new vacuum now have an alternative.

Traditional upright vacuums that collect dirt and debris into a paper bag are still a popular choice among many consumers. However, the recent introduction of bag-less vacuums is gaining widespread appeal. One example is the Dirt Devil Vision, which was designed with a clear dirt container that easily removes for hassle-free emptying. There are no bags to change or buy. And because the dirt container is seethrough, consumers can see when it's full and how much dirt is being picked up.

 Product features and onboard tools — most upright vacuums come with a selection of onboard tools. Some on-board tools that consumers should look for as part of a vacuum purchase include a crevice tool, telescopic extension wand, furniture brushes and other unique options, such as innovative triangular-shaped attachments that have proven to be invaluable for cleaning stairs and hard-to-reach corners in the home where dirt accumulates.

There are a number of units today, such as the Dirt Devil MVP Swivel Glide, that offer a variety of innovative features that have eliminated some of the hassles of traditional vacuuming. With its patented swivel caster wheels, this unit is easy to push and turn around furniture and in tight areas. It also comes with the patented Hide-A-Hose system that enables consumers to clean an entire flight of stairs while leaving the vacuum on the landing or at the base of the stairs.

• Filtration — a more recent feature that has taken the industry by storm is filtration. While filtration started as a marketing idea, it has now evolved into a true, quality product enhancement.

Ideal for allergy sufferers and those with small children, the newer High Efficiency Particulate Air or HEPA-type filter cartridges are effective at trapping 100 percent of pollens and ragweed and 99.97 percent of all other dust and allergens. These cartridges are readily available and easy to replace. An average household will need to replace the cartridge once a year. The cost of a replacement filter varies by manufacturer from \$15 - \$80. Consumers may want to consider the cost of replacement filters when purchasing a particular upright.

There are many options to consider when buying a vacuum, but with a little homework, consumers are sure to find the unit that best fits their individual household needs.


