

In a short series of routine actions, city officials approved buying trucks for the public service department and laid the groundwork for continued improvements to the city water system.

The moves cost the city about \$75,000, all of which was either budgeted or anticipated.

The water project involved installing a large valve at the end of a recently replaced 12inch water main that runs under Marter Road to Hawthorne.

When the water pipe is extended as part of future construction, the valve will already be in place for a hookup.




nection. The extra work totaled \$14,783 and brought this year's Hawthorne sewer and pavement project to \$852,321. The valve will be financed from a contingency fund built into





State reps at a loss in Dems' primary vote

ne of the two candidates for state representative in the Democratic Primary Election last week would like to celebrate and the other needs to make a concession speech, but neither knows which it will be.

As of press time Tuesday, neither Patricia Irving Cwiek of Grosse Pointe Woods nor John Patrick Anderson knew whether they won the contest to challenge incumbent state Rep. Andrew Richner, R-Grosse Pointe Park, for his job in November.

According to preliminary county election figures, Anderson won the primary vote by 17 votes. But both candidates said a precinct-by-precinct tally shows Cwiek edged Anderson by 123 votes.

The county election commission has

until Aug. 22 to certify the outcome. Meanwhile, both candidates are being cautiously optimistic and are wishing each other well.

"If John Anderson is the candidate, I wish him well," Cwiek told Grosse Pointe News reporter Brad Lindberg.

Even more curious is the vote count for Richner, who ran unopposed on the Republican primary portion of the ballot. The county election commission says Richner received a total of 2,716 votes — 2.480 in the suburbs and 236 in Detroit. But city clerks of the five Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods show that Richner

garnered 3,827 votes in their cities alone. Apparently 1,000 votes have disap-

peared between here and downtown. If this were Chicago, we would be dragging the bottom of Lake Michigan. Maybe we should look at the bottom of the Detroit River for the missing ballots!

Regardless, Richner will fight in November to keep his seat for his third and last term in Lansing.

Along with running for re-election, Richner will be busy working as the eastside's campaign director for George W. Bush for president. The state representative will also be hitting the stump to get a Republican majority elected to the state House of Representatives.

The young family man and lawmaker has a full plate before him between now and November and we wish him well.

For 1st District county commissioner, incumbent Christopher Cavanagh of Grosse Pointe Park easily defeated challenger Cheryl Watson on the Democratic primary ballot. Republican candidate Eric Steiner, a Grosse Pointe Woods city councilman, was unchallenged on his party's primary ballot.

With Cavanagh and Steiner facing off in November, at least Grosse Pointe has the luxury of knowing a hometown candidate will be representing us on the county board.

On the state level, it remains to be seen if Cwiek will be the Democratic challenger. But if she is, then we will be even more fortunate in that no matter how the state representative race goes in November, there will be a Grosse Pointer in Lansing.

But with the discrepancies in vote totals between our local city clerks and the county, it would be nice if we had a Pointer with the election commission as

I would confirm that would be the case after 92 years and perhaps she ought to start napping, but she argued that if she did that she might miss something and probably wouldn't be able to sleep at night. I certainly couldn't contest that her way had worked so

From the moment we entered the

people who welcomed us with hugs and warm smiles. We knew we belonged here and felt connected to the beautiful, open faces of Gladys' friends and family. We were a small group, around 40 of us, bonded by happy memories and our mutual love for our dear friend.


The minister had a wonderful, robust voice and the scriptures he read were from the King James version of the Bible, which I learned as a child and still prefer.

The analogies he used comparing our homes (bodies) to the many mansions of our Father's house resounded with common sense and truth. He spoke to us about the silliness of some of the ways in which we attempt to deal with our "houses," by patching with cosmetic adornments, and how, in our later years, we struggle with leaking roofs and bad plumbing, all in preparation for our permanent home when we leave this place.

His strong delivery reinforced the sense of privilege we experience by being permitted this time on Earth.

Mourners were invited to come to the podium and speak if they wanted, but to hold their remarks to two minutes. One neighbor sang a magnificent gospel song in her powerful, pure voice. Another young man reminisced about the many years he and Gladys had been neighbors and the ways in which they had shared. Those who spoke chose their words carefully and painted loving portraits of the woman we all loved.

The service lasted less than an hour, yet we weren't ready to leave. Rarely have I felt so reluctant to walk away. Yet, difficult as it was to say goodbye, we felt that we had truly opened more doors than had been closed that day. We experienced joy, strength and tenderness in a short span of time, and we felt that we would be fortunate to have this same service at the close of our own lives. It was truly a celebration of a life well lived and loved.



Sen. Lieberman — the messiah?

To those of you who don't recognize the name Peggy Noonan, she was the top speech writer for Presidents Reagan and Bush, an articulate and eloquent spokesperson for the conservative point of view. It was Noonan who originated the concept of the "thousand points of light." She had a gift for words.

As time went by, she became somewhat disenchanted with Ronald Reagan, whom she had previously idolized, because she felt he didn't take her seriously enough. She failed to inning to show the signs of Alzheimer's. For a while she continued to write speeches for President Bush and continued to write independently, taking the ideological conservative position, which included criticism of the many pitfalls of the liberal Democrats.

One could only wonder how this committed conservative would view the pick by Al Gore of Joseph Lieberman, senator from Connecticut, the first Democract to openly criticize the behavior of president Clinton in the Oval Office.

Further knowledge of Lieberman included the facts that he is a very principled and moral man and respected on both sides of the aisle. He was an outspoken critic of Hollywood and the media, insisting on higher moral standards for the benefit of our children and society at large.

Despite his open criticism of Clinton, which was rare for a Democrat, he voted with the Democrats for acquittal when it came to the question of impeachment. He decided that bad as Clinton's behavior was, it was not at the level to undo a general election. The voters would have their chance at the polls in the year 2000.

Vice President Gore will have difficulty distancing himself from the disgraced president, but his stunning selection of the first Jew who could conceivably become president was a large step in that direction. Lieberman's moral stance is in direct contrast to that of the sitting president and is part of a longstanding commitment to Orthodox Judaism, to



the point where he refuses to work on the Sabbath unless absolutely necessary.

Rather than set himself apart from his senatorial colhoweiv se viewed exceptional politician in that he is more independent than ideological, one who has proven that he is not a creature who goes with the flow or refuses to rock the boat.

Lieberman is a man of conscience and consistency of moral values, and so although a "liberal" Democrat, he shares similar values to the Christian religious right. He may not win many Christian votes and will not add much to the traditional Jewish vote for the liberals, but he will not be susceptible to attack from the right, as his voting record includes many votes with the senatorial conservatives.

Most people who have come to know the style of Noonan would have expected some nuanced curves directed at this "clever" Democratic choice for vice president, but instead her eloquence was showered on the choice of the Jewish Lieberman, reminding her of the '60s when this country accepted a Catholic candidate for president for the first time.

Here is what she said soon after the announcement of the candidacy of Sen. Lieberman:

"The choice of Joe Lieberman of Connecticut as Al Gore's running mate is so smart, so clever, so good, so satisfying, so striking that it iust may turn this election a bit on its head for a while Certainly its most immediate effect is going to be a successful Democratic convention next week in Los Angeles, because now the Democrats, badly hit by their own form of Clinton fatigue and acutely aware of the particular charmlessness of their presidential

candidate, have something to cheer about. They respect Joe Lieberman. They think he has a center, a moral and ethical view of the world. He is experienced and articulate. He is decent and intelligent. He is independent. The media love him. He is a regular co-star on Imus, and all of the columnists and reporters for the elite newspapers and all of the electronic pundits and anchors know him and admire him."

She went on to say:

"If Joe Lieberman had been Joe Lee, and an Episcopalian, Al Gore would have been smart to pick him. He would have been an obvious choice. The only reason he would have hesitated over Mr. Lieberman is that he's Jewish. Mr. Gore decided that was just fine. I think that I have never seen Al Gore do such an elegant, intelligent and original thing. Well done, Mr. Gore.'

And furthermore:

"A powerful and respected political officeholder told me Monday that there's "no upside" to the Lieberman choice. I told him there's no downside. He was surprised and said, "He can't even campaign on Saturdays!" I said so what, America would love to see a politician who actually put God first one day a week."

Her coda for this paean is as follows:

"The headline is: "It Is Good for America." It is a wonderful country that does something like this, that takes a good man who is a member of a small ethnic/religious minority to be one of its two major vice presidential candidates, and that greets that choice with resounding hurrahs. This is really a great day. We should all be happy. We really are a



The redesigned 2000 Dodge Neon seems to have abandoned its cute "Hi!" approach in favor of looking like a small version of the Chrysler Concorde.

Everything is new inside and out in the second-generation Neon, which is not quite as cute as the first. It has totally redesigned suspension and steering, low-speed traction control and a complete exterior redesign.

It is relatively roomy, handles well and is pleasant to drive. But the peppy 150horsepower dual overheadcam engine is not available any more, the car has a lower roofline and is not as easy to get in and out of and it isn't as cute.

Under the hood is the familiar 132-horsepower 2.0-liter inline four. Improvements to the air intake system provide torque over a broader range of speed and a new exhaust manifold, cylinder head and tim-

ing-belt cover cut engine noise. The ride is smooth and is absorbers and rear sway bars. The power rack-and-pinion steering and revamped suspension also contribute to the cruising quality.

Unfortunately, Chrysler has done some things that have been troubling in the past in American cars and a reason so many favor imports. For example, the top end model has power windows in the front, but not in the rear. There is no cruise control.

Exterior changes include new, jewel-like headlamps, a smoother roofline and updated taillamps. With a longer wheelbase and wider track, the new Neon offers more interior room and a more stable ride than did its predecessor. Interior features include four

big cupholders. The increase in price from a year ago is small because the Neon lacks some expected features. The top end model has power windows in front and crank windows in the back,

which remind you that this is a cheapie.

This was a mistake in the past and probably still is. The starting price of \$13.175 sounds like a bargain, but our test car's sticker topped \$18,000 — and you still couldn't raise or lower the back windows from the driver's seat. Most Japanese and Korean cheapies come fully equipped and American buyers have indicated they like this.

The Neon carries a basic three-year/36,000-mile warranty, which includes road service. The warranty against rust is five-years/100,000

Itch, scratch — could be a sign of head lice By Dr. Brian Engel

As summer fun comes to an end and children return to school, they once again are gathered in close quarters. This usually generates a few colds, coughs and flu, but it can also spread pesky little parasites called head lice.

As many as 12 million Americans are affected by head lice every year, but few discuss the topic

There are many misconceptions about lice, including the beliefs that:

- Only poverty-stricken people get head lice
- Animals, especially dogs and cats, carry head lice
- Lice can jump from head to head
- Children with head lice should be kept out of school until all itching subsides.

socioeconomic boundaries and are carried only by humans. They do not have wings to fly and usually spread from direct contact with lice-infested clothes, hats, brushes and combs. After treatment, children who have had lice can return to school within 24 hours.

The truth is, head lice know no

Head lice infestation becomes a public health epidemic every fall and winter. These tiny insects live on the scalp and cannot survive longer than 48 hours away from a human host.

Lice have three life stages: • Nits are lice eggs. These tiny, oval, yellowish-white specks usually attach to the hair shaft approximately onehalf inch from the scalp. Resembling lint or dandruff, they hatch in about one week.

· Nymphs are immature lice. They resemble adult lice but are much smaller, about the size of a pen tip. They mature in about seven days. • Adult lice are about the size of a sesame seed.

They have a tannish-brown body and six legs. They are difficult to see because they quickly scatter under light. They can live up to 30 days and the females lay nits, continuing Lice cause itching of the scalp, and some children scratch

so hard they create sores. If you suspect head lice, look closely through the hair and scalp for nits, nymphs or adults. Use a magnifying glass and good light. Finding a nymph or adult can be difficult, since they move quickly. Typically, the diagnosis is made by finding nits at the

base of the hair shaft, often behind the ears and near the hairline at the back of the neck. Other signs of infestation are a rash or sores on the scalp.

If you suspect your child has head lice but are not sure, see your child's physician. Waiting to see if symptoms worsen or go away puts your entire family, as well as your child's friends and classmates, at risk.

Once the diagnosis is confirmed, contact the child's school. Children may return to school within 24 hours of being treated. Other household members who are affected also must be treated and the house deloused.

Researchers currently recommend the following threeweek, five-step treatment plan due to the increasing prob-

lem of resistant head lice: Step One: Use a permethrin- or pyrethrim-based pediculocide, which is an overthe-counter head lice shampoo. Follow directions carefully: products can have side effects if not used correctly.

Step Two: After shampooing, apply olive oil to the scalp. Leave it on overnight and wear a shower cap so the oil does not come off. This method has been found to be effective in improving nit removal

Step Three: In the morning. meticulously comb out the nits with a nit comb before removing the olive oil. Nit combs usually are included with the head lice shampoo. If nits aren't removed, reinfestation is likely to occur.

Step Four: Clean the home of lice, everything the head touches such as hats, hair ribbons, combs. earphones. scarves, coats, bed linens, pillows, stuffed animals and helmets. All washable items should be machine washed in hot water and dried on high heat. Non-washable items may be dry cleaned or sealed in plastic bags for two weeks. Soak combs and brushes in hot water for one hour, and vacuum all rooms thoroughly.

Step Five: Continue to check the scalp for nits for up to three weeks after treatment. If there is evidence of new nits or lice, repeat steps one through four. Itching may persist after lice and nits are gone, but do not repeat treatment for itching only.

In order to prevent head lice, take time to educate your child about them. Explain why hats, earmuffs, scarves, combs, brushes and hair accessories must not be shared. Through cooperation with schools, families and physicians, yearly outbreaks of these annoying critters can be controlled.




This year's is "Collected Stories" by American playwright Donald Margulies, It is a superbly crafted study of the mentoring relationship between an older woman writer and her talented student and it comes to the Tom Patterson stage practically straight from its off-Broadway success

Better yet, its New York director and two-woman cast have come with it. Best of all, the lead is

played by Uta Hagen. Longtime theater fans will remember Hagen's award-winning career in Broadway's heyday where she starred in such hits as "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf," "A Streetcar Named Desire," and "You Never Can Tell." It is a major treat to see her once again in a role that she can really sink her teeth into

And sink her teeth she does. The role of Ruth Steiner is that of a famous short-story author and college professor in New York. With her mannerisms and the cadences of her voice, Hagen creates the personality of a fascinating, often funny, ruggedly independent and highly individualistic woman. She glows with the assurance of success and the confidence of a lifetime of experience. She is set in her ways and not about to be trifled with, but she is also warmly human and — deep down - vulnerable.

At home in her city apartment, where she has obviously lived for decades, the routines of a life devoted to her writing paint an amusing picture. She ignores a ringing phone, grudgingly accepts the interruption of a

visibly irritated by the ringing of her doorbell. The bell brings a major change in those routines, however, for it heralds the arrival of student Lisa Morrison for a tutorial appointment.

As Lisa, Lorca Simons creates another gem of a characterization. Her gushing adulation of her famous teacher and her often tact-

less questions are punctuated repeatedly with ingenuous exclamations of "Oh, my God," or "This is incredible!"

In the first inning of the relationship, Professor Ruth Steiner gets all the sympathy for putting up with this gauche sophomore. And Simons plays the part to perfection.

The fun and fascination increase as the relationship develops. At first, Ruth maintains her mentor status. She tries to put her student at ease. She advises on rules of good writing style. She recognizes a great talent and gives encouragement, all the while unable to conceal her impatience with Lisa's lack of sophistication.

But as in all relationships, things change. They become friends as Ruth lets down her professional guard and Lisa gains confidence.

The situation becomes more than mentor and pro-

tegee. They confide in each other the autobiographical truths that they put into their writing and Ruth reflects on one personal story she will never tell. Alternately, they are a codependency, a mother and daughter, and, as Lisa tastes success, they become competitors.

But the incidentals of the script are as much fun as watching the situation develop. Their discussions of writing and creativity are engaging and enlivened by Ruth's comments.

On the human foibles of a political figure, for example: You've confused the man with his persona." Or in the role of movie stars, "We invented them so they could act out our fantasies."

Hagen delivers these pronouncements with haughty authority.

With intervals of a year or two between each scene, Lisa matures and enjoys her success as a writer. The effect on Ruth is subtle but powerful. Ultimately it finds expression in Ruth's resentment of what she perceives as Lisa's violation of her friendship and trust. The confrontation is a crisis with two points of view that are hard to reconcile. It makes a moving conclusion to the play and provokes a lot of thought on issues of friendship, trust and a writer's

The audience leaves the theater with a satisfying sense of having been a fly on the wall, witnessing a genuine and special slice of life.

Fresh peaches, French toast make keen summer dessert

The peaches are finally here, the really good ones,

A recent trip to the Eastern Market was a reminder to get them while they're sweet and juicy. This week's feature lends a twist to peach cobbler that will leave French toast lovers yelling for more. The follow ing recipe from Cooking Light Magazine manages to cut the fat without cutting the flavor.

Peeling the peaches is a little work but overall the prep was simple. Turbinado are large, coarse sugar crystals that have a light molasses flavor. Also called sugar in the raw, turbinado sugar is available at Kroger's in the village.

Peachy-Keen Toasty Cobbler

12 large ripe peaches 1 cup granulated sugar, divided

1/3 cup all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon grated

orange rind 1/3 cup orange juice 1/4 cup butter or stick margarine, melted 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

8 slices of hearty white bread (such as Pepperidge Farm)

3 large egg whites

Bring a large pot of water to a boil. Meanwhile, wash the peaches and cut an X on the bottom of each peach. When the water is almost boiling, prepare a large bowl of ice water and set aside. Submerge the peaches in the boiling water for about 20 seconds and quickly remove them using a slotted spoon. (You can use a smaller pot of water and boil half of the

Transfer the peaches to the iced water. Use your fingers to slid the skins off. Cut the skinned peaches in half, remove the pits, slice, and place in a 9- by 13-inch glass baking dish that has been coated with cooking spray.

peaches at a time.)

Toss the peaches with 3/4 cup of the granulated sugar and the flour. Let stand for 30 minutes or so, tossing occasionally.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. While the sliced peaches are resting, prepare the French toast. Cut the crusts from the sliced bread and slice each piece in half diagonally.

In a medium bowl, whisk together the egg whites, orange juice, grated orange rind, cinnamon and the remaining 1/4 cup of 2 tablespoons turbinado granulated sugar. Dip each sugar or granulated sugar half slice of bread into the egg white mixture and arrange the pieces on top of the peaches.

Sprinkle the turbinado sugar over the French toast slices. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until the French toast slices become golden brown.

Serve warm. Top with vanilla ice cream for a really special dessert.

I used Pepperidge Farm white toasting bread for the French toast. Quickly boiling the peaches makes removing the skins a breeze. If this recipe sounds like too much, cut the ingredients in half and choose a smaller baking





Where does your relaxing garden path lead?

Creating a meandering garden path offers you an escape for a few moments for relaxation and a return to nature. Where your path leads is up to you although it's nice to show off your garden to those traveling down the path. Many front walks need to take the shortest path to the front door. Backyard paths give us the opportunity to create more than just an access from here to there.

Highlight your efforts in the garden by curving the paths to slow the travel of your garden visitors. Widening the path next to the focal points of your garden creates a spot to sit and enjoy the view. A garden bench or maybe a set of chairs can create a secluded spot in the garden to get away to. An arbor can close in an open yard, creating a ceiling for your bench or a doorway into your secret garden. If you want people to be able to stroll side-by-side you should make your walk 4-foot wide. Planting taller shrubs or perennials on the curves of your walk will create interest and draw your attention around each hidden curve. Create interest with fragrant flowers, mixing colors and texture of your plantings, or sounds of a container water garden.



Well-traveled paths should be made of durable material such as pavers or flagstones. Other materials such as stone or mulch are also available. Flagstone and other irregular stones allow room to plant some creeping ground cover to be planted between the stones. Low maintenance materials such as pavers will fit closer together. Pavers can be made from granite, concrete or fired clay. A new introduction in concrete pavers includes tumbled pavers. The bricks are intentionally chipped around the edges to create an old-world look.

Edging around the path can be seen or hidden, but it is necessary if you wish to keep the garden from growing into the path. Available edging materials include steel or plastic to hold together the walk materials and is unnoticeable. Other material such

as cobblestones, brick or retaining wall will give more definition to the edges of the walk.

Unforgettable gardens are those that are beautiful as well as functional. If you are starting from scratch, look through garden magazines identifying the look you are trying to achieve. You can find many types of paths made from all sorts of materials.

When you are determining the route of your path do not always take the shortest route. Allow for a few gentle curves to direct your

view to the focal points of your garden. Avoid adding curves just to add curves, but make each curve in the walk to allow you to discover a new feature of the garden. Happy travels.

Pet Care

If you've noticed your pets starting to shed, it's not the weather that's to blame; it's the sunlight.


In the spring, as sunlight increases, animals begin to shed their longer, thicker winter coats to let their thinner, warmer-weather coats come in. In the fall, as sunlight decreases, the animals' physiology responds by reversing the process. The thinner coat is shed so the thicker coat can replace it. Pets who are largely indoor animals may shed all year in response to the constant presence of artificial light.

Proper daily grooming helps

both you and your animals deal with the shedding situation. Frequent brushing, for example, removes the hair that might otherwise form your cat's next hairhall

Excessive shedding should alert you to take your pet to the veterinarian immediately. She or he may find an underlying and relatively easy-to-treat skin condition that's causing the hair to fall out. Or the symptoms may point to a far more serious illness such as a kidney or liver problem.

Rain gutters: Why bother?

Q. Why does my house need rain gutters around the roof? They seem like nothing but a maintenance hassle. Would I be better off without them? — Derek M., Anniston, Ala.

A. That depends. Would you rather be faced with the once- or twice-yearly job of cleaning the gutters, or would you prefer to battle constant flooding in the basement or crawl space and possible foundation damage?

Rain gutters handle the important task of shunting rain water (and melting snow) away from the house. Without gutters, that water would quickly seep under the house, creating all sorts of problems.

So, give your rain gutters plenty of TLC. Each fall and spring, put up your ladder (don't work from the roof — it's unsafe) and inspect them. Clear away debris with your hands and toss it onto the ground or a tarp. Clean the screens covering the downspouts, and replace any that are broken. Tug on the gutters as you work to check for loose sections.

Using a hose, run water through the gutter. If the water pools instead of heading straight for the downspout, adjust the gutter's angle by repositioning the nails or screws in the cross-straps that hold the gutter to the roof.

If the water pools at the top of the downspout, try clearing the clog by directing a strong stream of water from your hose down the spout. Run a plumber's snake (not a stick, which could break) all the way through the spout to clear it, then run water down the spout again.


Then, run water through the gutter one more time, and check for leaks on the underside. Patch small holes (1/2-inch or less) with

roofing cement and a putty knife (make sure to completely clean and dry the area first). Use canvas or vinyl patches to patch larger holes, and secure them with roofing cement.

Finally, make sure that the water pouring from the downspout actually drains away from your home. Do this by adding a spout extension. Some homeimprovement experts recommend a 20-foot extension, which is fine if you have the space; attach a watertight plastic drainpipe to the downspout and run it away from the foundation. Bury the pipe to keep folks from tripping over it (but leave the open end out so water can actually drain).

If an extension isn't possible, guide the water away from the foundation by placing a grooved paving stone beneath the spout, or dig a channel six inches wide and three feet long, away from the spout, and fill it with gravel. Both methods will keep water from pouring directly onto the foundation.

New technology is changing our world, and toys reflect these changes. The toy telephone no longer has a rotary dial and a bell. It is pushbutton and looks cellular so children can imitate real life. Space toys must keep up and predict the coming technology in order to intrigue future collectors. Imaginative designers often created toys that predicted the look of the future. The first mass-produced robot toy was Robot Lilliput, which was made in Japan in the 1940s. The 6-inchhigh toy now sells for more than \$8,500. In the 1950s and '60s Japanese toy makers made many futuristic toys, especially robots. The idea of a robot that resembles a person has been part of science fiction for many years. The most famous of these early robot toys were known as the Gang of Five. These five robots, about 15 inches high, were similar. Each one had a lithographed tin body with graphics that suggested machine parts.

"Lavender" robot and red "Machine Man" were similar but different colors. "Giant Sonic Train" robot was red and made a train sound. "Radicon" Robot was radio remote-controlled. "Target" robot had a red target on its chest. It reversed direction when the target was hit by a dart. They were all made by Masudaya in Japan in the 1950s. "Machine Man" is the rarest and most expensive today. It has sold for more than \$42,000.



Shockingly easy, switch a basement light

Q. Dear Mr. Hardware, I decided to put an electrical switch in my basement bathroom to turn on the light. The old light is activated by a pull chain. The job seemed simple enough until I disconnected the light fixture from the ceiling and found four wires leading into the junction box. This box is already cramped with wires without adding two more for the switch. I was thinking of putting a deeper junction box in but I can't reach the old one from on top. — Ron.

A. Ron, remember to turn off the power first. You'll notice the four wires consist of two white and two black wires. The whites are connected together with a short third wire, which is called a pigtail, connecting to the silver screw on the pull chain fixture. The blacks are also connected to each other with a short wire, another pigtail, to the brass screw on the fixture.

This indicates a feed-through situation where the power comes to the fixture and continues on to another location. Controlling this light from a wall switch is an easy "first time" electrical project.

First acquire the proper mate-



rials to do this project safely. You will need:

 Romex wire that is the same gauge as the existing wire. Never use wire of a smaller gauge than the existing wire, which is usually 14/2.

• Wire nuts rated for three wires. Improperly sized wire nuts lead to poor connections. Tighten wire nuts securely and give a little pull to ensure a strong connection.

• A junction box extension. These are readily available and easy to install.

Install the romex wire from the ceiling box to the switch box by the door. Strip off 6 inches of the outer shielding from the romex (do not damage the insulation on the black and white wires) and install into the boxes with a romex clamp. Plastic

boxes require stapling the romex within 6 inches of the box.

Strip off about 1/2 inch of insulation from the ends of the black and white wires. In both boxes tape the white wire black (for the 6 inches) to indicate this wire is being used as a switch leg.

Up in the ceiling box leave the old white wires alone. They will be connected to the white wire of the new fixture, or the silver screw. Disconnect the old black pigtail from the two black wires and attach one of the new "switch-leg" wires (either the black or the white wire taped black). Now the white wires will be hooked together and the blacks hooked together. The remaining new black wire in the ceiling box will connect to the black wire or brass screw of the new light fixture.


Move down to the switch box and connect the two wires, one black and one taped black, to the two screws on the switch. You have now just installed a switch


Turn on the power and test your wiring job. Does the light go off and on from the switch? We certainly hope so.

Whenever doing electrical

work around the home pull a permit and have your work inspected. This will ensure your work is safe and sound and that you've complied with the local



All fired up: Take your cooking to the outdoors

If you are ready to buy a barbecue but don't know where to start, here's some budget-conscious tips for buying the grill that's right for you.

Check your frequency

When shopping for a new barbecue, consider how you will use it. Someone who plans to grill on the patio several times a week needs a different unit than the person who will occasionally barbecue at the beach or the park.

"Also consider how much room you have for a barbecue," suggests Steve Zimberoff with The Home Depot. "Will you simply cover it when not in use, or do you want a unit that can be rolled away into the garage or a shed?"

The best fuel for you

Charcoal grills are portable, making them easy to transport for camping trips and other outings. Propane or natural gas models are easy to start and operate and provide better temperature control. Electric grills are an excellent choice for people who live in condos or apartments, or for the elderly or people who are uncomfortable with gas or charcoal. If the unit gets too hot, it can simply be unplugged.

"Remember that you don't have to buy a top-of-the-line barbecue to get good results. For under \$100 you can buy a sturdy charcoal barbecue, and gas units are also reasonable," says Zimberoff.

No frills or bells and whistles

Once you have settled on the type and size of your barbecue, you can select from an array of models featuring different amenities. Consider the following when making your choice:

 Cooking surface. Porcelain is the most common and least expensive, while cast iron offers better heat distribution and tem-

perature control.

- Heating media. Ceramic briquettes are excellent and can be turned over and used twice. A steel flavorizer bar provides slightly more consistent temperature.
- Burner type. A gas grill with more burners allows you to vary temperatures in different areas of the grill when simultaneously cooking more than one type of meat.
- Rotisserie/back burner. This type of operation is great for slow cooking meats with indirect heat.
- Side burner. These are handy for corn, beans or clams. Instead of cooking some food inside and some food outside, it can all be done on the grill. This can be particularly helpful on those hot summer days when you don't want to overheat the kitchen.

The newest grilling accessories allow the master outdoor chef to cook everything from the main course and side dishes to dessert on the grill. Roast chicken on the rotisserie, grill potato wedges, fry bananas and brown sugar on the side burner and even keep bread warm on a warming tray.

Smokers are a hot product in the barbecue scene, so instead of smoking the traditional bacon or pork, try smoking a steak or stuffed chicken. Barbecue smoking can take anywhere from one to two hours or up to 20 hours or more, depending on what is being smoked.

Using a wok on the grill lets that delicious barbecue smoke flavor smaller foods that otherwise fall through the grill. Try making teriyaki chicken with asparagus, scallions and garlic on a grill wok.

Thermometers allow the chef to test for "doneness" and chimneystyle lighters eliminate the need for starter fluid when lighting a charcoal grill. To give food cooking on a gas grill that smoky flavor, try using hickory- or mesquite-flavored wood chips at your next barbecue.

Zimberoff recommends that you protect your investment by keeping it clean and covered, once you get it home.

"Just like a cast iron skillet, a cast iron grill must be seasoned prior to its first use," says Zimberoff. "No matter which type of barbecue you use, clean it after each cookout with a product designed for use on an oven or grill."

You can also quickly review archives of past shows without having to go to all the trouble and storage space associated with recording a show with a VCR, as you would have to do for television.


