Clinton's record examined

t was back in 1992 that I first heard President-to-be Clinton when I sought some different programming on my home television

He was making his first speech from the state capitol in his home state of Arkansas as a presidential candidate after having served two terms as Arkansas governor.

In general terms, he was outlining plans for a Democratic party that would move to the middle of the road from its long-held position as the more liberal, and even occasionally, the more radical party in the United

I listened to Clinton's speech with considerable interest because of my own interest in government and in the two competing parties that have run this country in recent genera-

He explained in detail that he had come to these beliefs though meetings with governors and other Democratic officials who had somewhat similar ideas for the future of his party.

He did not explain what he meant. but he emphasized that he felt the changes would make it possible for the Democratic Party to appeal to more American voters than it had in the past.

Hearing and reading about Clinton over the next few days on TV broadcasts and in Michigan newspapers as well as in the New York Times, tended to support the idea that Clinton was somebody to watch in the future.



I am not a Democrat and remained an independent even after Clinton spoke, but as a newsman, I was always interested in new figures who popped up in politics.

What caught my attention from Clinton's remarks were his obvious appeals to the general public by insisting that the people had not been given enough benefits by the ruling parties.

As I watched the Arkansas candidate operate in future weeks, I heard him often explain what he felt his party should offer the public.

It was reasonable to assume that as a presidential candidate he would offer more of the fruits of each person's own labor and earnings to be invested in his own future through government programs.

And so, as the campaign developed, we heard Clinton proposing more and more governmental activities to serve working people and in general the middle class.

Early on, he emphasized the need for more and better education for young people, better care for our national forests and public lands, cheaper and better care for the poor, and better attention to the medical services that were then available to the people.

He broadened his appeal as time went on, but those early aims were repeated in many of his programs that began to cast the Democrats as the party of the middle class and one to balance the budget.

The Republican Party often took issue with Clinton, but, in fact, the GOP began to inch forward with its own programs to benefit people.

However, the GOP more often took issue with Clinton's programs to serve the people by calling for much larger tax cuts to reduce the spending and make possible bigger tax refunds to each individual taxpayer.

Clinton also had embraced the recommendations of the head of the Federal Reserve System, who was basically a GOP lawyer, but helped Clinton's popularity by defending some of his financial proposals.

That is the way things went until the election of 2000, when Clinton was barred by law from running for more than two terms.

The result was that Clinton's vice president, Albert Gore, took on the presidential mantle.

But Clinton's own record was marred by his effort to convince everyone of his effectiveness, even after a personal affair with White House intern Monica Lewinsky.

The House brought impeachment charges against the president, charging he had not been consistently truthful in answering questions about his relationship with Lewinsky.

But the Senate didn't see it the way the House saw it, and promptly defeated the House recommendation for Clinton's impeachment.

That was still a blemish on

the campaign Gore was unable to offset the personal animosity toward Clinton, and declined to use him very often in his campaign for the presi-

The result was that Gore lost his election by a tiny margin, and the Republicans took over the White House and even held onto tiny margins of control in both the House and Senate.

Some Democrats felt Clinton could have elected Gore if the president had been called upon more often to support Gore during the campaign.

That, of course, is second guessing, and with the economy and the market under siege at the time voters went to the polls, nobody really knows what impact a more active Clinton contribution would have had on the elec-

What will Clinton do now?

He has not announced his plans, but rumors are flying around Washington indicating he might accept the presidency of an important university.

Or he or might even become a top public relations man for some industrial enterprise that would serve his purpose to improve society in certain respects.

There's some talk that Clinton, who is known for a quick wit, may have his own radio show.

But how will Clinton fare in the history of our time?

He will not be listed among the great presidents, but he will be remembered by many American voters as the man who often fought their

Should teenagers work?

Suggestions from an excellent book on parenting, "Parenting Teens With Love and Logic" (Cline & Fay), coincide with a Monday, Jan. 8, front-page article in the New York Times.

The Times article relates how it is not "cool" among suburban teenagers to flip hamburgers at McDonald's. Working after school or evenings or weekends is not cool at all, according to many teenagers. It interferes with all aspects of shopping, partying and just hanging out.

A few jobs have some cache, such as working at The Gap or Starbucks, but fast-food emporiums are low-class. Working there can get derisive comments from peers, who come there and the working teen may even be the target of arrogant behavior and petty

This book recommends teenagers work for at least part of their college expenses. Experience shows that many teenagers given a free ride from their well-heeled parents neglect their studies and play instead of work. They skip classes, drop courses and lie about their grades. They make endless excuses that the parents accept. Of course, it is still true that subsidized students can be serious and work hard to learn and get good grades. But they are not the problem.

The book recommends that parents take a realistic approach to college students with failing grades. The example given is the father who puts his arm around his son, explaining that he understands that C is average. He admits that most of us just do average in life, in the workplace and in the family home. We are also average at sports for the most part.

Average is acceptable, but below average is not. The father explains that if he work, he would not be able to keep a good job or earn a decent income, and could therefore not be able to afford to send his kid to col-

The father explains further that he doesn't feel good about working hard doing average work, making mortgage payments and buying groceries, while the son is doing below average work and squandering the parents' money. It's just not responsible, and the main goal of parenting is raising responsible children who contribute to society, rather than be a drain, a pain and a burden.

Parents may even tell the boy or girl while in high school that they must work and earn the money for their first college semester semesters as long as the

Parents may also let the offspring go it alone and get his or her college education later, when they have worked and saved up for it. Although colleges nowadays are permissive about allowing students to take five or six years to graduate, this can be a hardship for the parents, and so many parents are now insisting that they will pay for four years only. Getting a degree will be up to them after that.

Research has shown that

students who have to pay their own way rarely get failing grades or flunk out. This is true even though it is very hard to work part time or full time and still keep up with a full academic program.

It is also possible to work full time and take college courses at night. Many a successful professional or businessperson did just that, getting an education the hard way. Succeeding at work and school is the best way to establish real selfesteem and a sense of adequacy and responsibility.

An important aspect of working, especially at entry-level, minimum wage jobs, is learning about life and about people. Most successful business and professional people are successful because they know about life and people and relation-

We need to learn about being the target of envy and prejudice. We need to understand how and why there is racial polarization and conflict and why there is antagonism between the haves and the have-nots.

It should be no shame to do any work, and those who do work are making a contribution, however small. Sometimes these small contributions are also essential to the working of society.

Working is in itself an education, and the fact of flipping hamburgers is not lost on admission committees of colleges and graduate schools. Many security analysts and professional investors draw a line at \$5 per share.

They may look at and investigate an especially attractive stock with a price above \$5, but won't even listen to a "story" about the possibilities of a stock under

They say you have to be a real casino player to buy the year-end level was above into a speculative situation under \$5.

There's an old saying on Wall Street that stocks that have sunk to or below \$5 per share will continue to go

It's not like looking at a chart of a stock that went up and then back down. The left side of the chart shows the price starting at around \$2, zooming up to \$30, then backing down to \$5.

A close inspection of the chart will probably show the starting price was caused by stock splits or stock dividends. On a pre-split basis, the stock price was actually much higher.

Stocks presently trading on the cheap-list (under \$5) usually reflect something radically wrong with the company's business plan.

Coyhis teaches Wellbriety prevention and recovery strategies Native to American communities throughout the country using — among other things - the Medicine Wheel and Healing Forest models.

He uses the Medicine Wheel, which traditionally traces the stages of life and development, and the Twelve Steps to create a circle of healing. The eastern spoke of the wheel represents birth and launches the first three steps of the recovery journey. The southern spoke symbolizes adolescence and family - the middle ground where Steps 4-6 are addressed. The west represents the place where adults connect to community through Steps 7-9. The journey culminates in the

world.

The journey of healing from inner self to outer world is a model of change summer. Coyhis calls The Healing Forest. It is based on the idea that when you take a sick tree from a diseased forest, heal it, and then return it to the forest, the tree will get sick again and die unless the root system of the forest

'Motor City Triptych' paints portrait of Detroit

DSO launched the millennium and Detroit's 300th birthday year with a funky swagger last weekend with the world premiere of a new work by composer-in-residence Michael Daugherty.

Following his trademark practice, Daugherty drew on contemporary pop music styles that blossomed in Motown to create in "Motor City Triptych" a musical portrait of the city's most characteristic qualities of

His score is plenty funky. Järvi and the orchestra provided the swagger.

The work opens with a retrospective movement that the composer calls "Motown Mondays." Musical entertainers who were topping the charts in the '60s, when Detroit was a major player in the pop record business, were Daugherty's inspiration for the segment. He draws on memories of sessions at local lounges that they played on the off day of the

Motown sounds and beats mingling rhythm and blues. with such other styles as soul and rock. The music jumps and swings with rhythmic energy, the innovative vocal harmonies of that era and the feeling of improvised performances.



Appropriately, the recordings of that era were often blessed with background sound provided by members of the DSO string section. Many of those string players are still in the orchestra and remember well the fun they had at those gigs. But it could not have been any

more pleasure than they seemed to have in this performance. They stretched the limits of their instruments to evoke the vocal qualities and instrumental effects of the Motown musicians. Violinists strummed their fiddles like guitars. Woodwinds rumbled at the extremity of their range. Percussionists produced lively counterpoint in the unique patterns of performers with jazz in their blood. And Maestro Järvi, who is a master of tricky rhythm, danced like a dervish on the podium to make it happen.

That was only the first movement.

"Pedal to the Metal" followed with a musical impression of a high speed drive out Michigan Avenue. The landscape is neon signs, diners, bars, Middle Eastern restaurants, used car lots, and all the other conglomeration lining the curbs of that sample of automotive Americana. The music, like life on the street, is often discordant.

It was the third movement, titled "Rosa Parks Boulevard," that seemed to probe most profoundly aspects of music that are most deeply embedded in Detroit's soul - raw rhythm, wailing brass and gospel. Here, Daugherty's inspirations included his acquaintance with Rosa Parks, her favorite hymn "Freedom," and the wide expressive powers of the trombones.

It was an especially remarkable experience to hear these contemporary musical idioms treated symphonically with verve and genuine feeling for the idiom with all the rich and artistic force of which the orchestra is capable.

It also provoked a surprising recognition that in adopting pop culture for symphonic treatment, Daugherty shares a basic principle that was also used earlier composers like Mahler, whose first symphony was the other work on the program.

But what a difference in content. The well-chosen companion piece for the program carried the listener back to a time of clear, straightforward melody with orderly, romantic development. From the opening offstage trumpets and imitations of the sounds of nature, to the blaring brass climaxes, the Mahler First is a thriller that makes easy listening and never fails to hold attention. It also highlighted the difference in many of the instrumental effects between Mahler's time and Motown's.

But as marvelously as Järvi showed off the virtuosity of the DSO in the Wagnerian scale of this

I was looking for a recipe to feature this week when — bingo — in the mail came a free cookbook (because I subscribe to Bon Appetit).

Perfect timing. I scanned the cookbook and found a recipe for spicy oven-fried chicken. I had all of the ingredients on hand except for the chicken and the butter-

My husband loves spicy food. This recipe is definitely a kitchen adventure worth taking. Treat the following recipe as a twoday, two-step method.



Spicy Oven-Fried Chicken

1/4 cup olive oil 3 tablespoons red 2 garlic cloves,

mustard

2 teaspoons salt 1/2 teaspoon black pepper

1 large onion, sliced 12 pieces chicken (drumsticks, thighs and breasts) on the bone, with skin

1 cup dry plain bread crumbs

flour 1/3 cup grated

Parmesan cheese 2 teaspoons dried thyme

1/2 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon cayenne

pepper 3 tablespoons butter, meited

To prepare the marinade for the chicken, combine the buttermilk, olive oil, pepper sauce, garlic, Dijon mustard, salt and pepper in a large bowl and whisk together. Add the onion and the chicken pieces and turn to coat all of the chicken. Cover and chill in refrigerator for at least 3 hours, preferably overnight, occasionally turning the chicken. You need to allow nearly two more hours (preparation plus bake time) before the chicken can be served.



The warming glow of old, dark ruby glass

Ruby glass became popular during Victorian times. Its major revival was in the 1940s when modern-shaped ruby glassware became stylish.

There are many different types of ruby glass. Sometimes the red color is added to clear glass by a process called flashing or staining, made by the application of a thin layer of color over clear.

I enjoy collecting ruby souvenir glass and realize ruby glass has to have a special appeal to me before

I first noticed the beauty of ruby glass at a very young age -- around 5. I remember admiring the ruby glass collection my aunt displayed at her house on a hill atop a tall, modern, light colored, wooden cupboard set against a high, narrow window that overlooked the roof. It was then that I claimed red as my favorite color.

The way the extra large, clear-



stemmed ruby glassware was displayed at that stylish window not only reflected my aunt and uncle's stylish, modern decor, but a warm and love-filled home. My mother tells me the ruby glass is still there — a perfect spot.

When I think of my aunt and uncle's beautiful, spacious home I remember the ruby glass; the hill my sisters, cousins and I would roll down; and the tall rock garden next to the entrance. I also think of a story my mom told me of when my aunt cared for her mother-inlaw at the hill house when her mother-in-law was stricken with Alzheimer's. The mother once complained to my aunt — about my aunt — "Marie's house looks like a bowling alley!"

As a teenager I admired a very good friend's large, heavy, rimmed 1940s dark ruby pitcher that was set out on her spotless kitchen counter one day. I told her it was beautiful old ruby glass and worth money. She was surprised and exclaimed that her family always used it to hold ice in the refrigerator's freezer for as long as she could remember. A couple years later she gave it to my husband and me as a wedding present. Sometimes I take the pitcher out of the curio cabinet and set it on top — by the window.

Q. My cat loves to sit in my lap and be pet, but he tends to flex his claws against my leg as I do this. It's rather annoying. Is there a way to break him of this habit?

A. Possibly, though you may never completely rid him of it.

Cats signal their affection in a number of ways. Kneading their paws against an owner's leg or arm while being pet shows gratification; possibly, they equate this warm, fuzzy feeling with their earliest memory, that of feeding at their mother's breast. Cats who knead may also lick or suck your skin or clothing.

While most felines knead a bit, some do it to the point that it becomes annoying. Anxiety may cause excessive kneading; kittens who are separated from their mothers too early may display this tendency in adulthood.

A deficiency in his diet could be a cause, so a checkup with the vet is a good idea.

Discourage kneading as soon as it begins by distracting your cat with a soft toy (specially made for cats); praise him when he takes interest in it. Try playing a favorite game with him instead of petting, to give him another outlet for his emotions. Sprinkling catnip on his scratching post will lure him away from your lap, as well. And if all else fails, put him on the floor and go to another room as soon as the kneading starts.

Keep your cat's nails trimmed to ease the discomfort that occurs when you pet him.

If your cat sucks or licks while being pet, try giving him a baby pacifier or a bottle nipple to satisfy his craving. Slowly wean him away from the pacifier by using the distractions listed above.

A reader, Carl, cites a column I did on why a cat would suddenly forget her toilet training and use any corner of the house as a litter box. He says: "You were right to mention how important privacy is to a cat. I put up a small screen (available at most pet supply outlets) around my cat's litter box, and I've never had an accident since."





Test home for radon

One out of eight homes in Michigan are expected to have elevated radon levels, said Cole Shoemaker, a toxicologist with the Macomb County Health Department about a statewide survey.

"The risk is relatively low in Macomb County, but problems do exist, and the only way to find them is to test," he said. "We are encouraging area residents to start the new year right by obtaining a radon test kit and using it to test their home."

Since radon is invisible, tasteless and odorless, people tend to ignore it, he said.

"It doesn't cause headaches, nausea, fatigue, skin rashes or other warning symptoms that might be experienced as a result of exposure to many other environmental toxins, yet extended exposure to elevated radon levels increases one's risk of lung cancer, a generally fatal disease," Shoemaker said.

Radon is a radioactive gas that occurs naturally in soil and rock. It

moves upward through the soil and enters buildings through cracks and openings in the foundation floor or walls. Once it is indoors it can accumulate to unhealthy levels. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers, and according to the EPA, radon is responsible for about 14,000 deaths nationwide each year.

Testing is easy with a do-it-yourself kit available at the health department, free of charge.

Professional testing services are also available, though they are most often used for testing as part of a real estate transaction.

Homeowners are cautioned to use only EPA-listed test kits or testing companies, he said.

High-speed Internet connections via D

If you're ready to graduate from the annoyances of dial-up Internet service, namely the frequent busy signals and slow downloads of photos and shareware, not to mention the lengthy series of tones and squawks emanating from your modem, consider DSL.

With DSL (digital subscriber line) service, your computer is always connected to the Internet via the service provider. That means no dialing, no waiting. Better yet, DSL data-transfer rates are up to 140 times faster than those of state-of-the-art 56k analog modems.


With DSL service, you'll be able to surf the web and download music, photos and other large data files with blazing speed. DSL also enables computers to receive broadcast-quality video and handle bi-directional video-conferencing applications.

DSL service works through ordinary copper telephone wiring. In fact, a single pair of phone wires

can carry voice and data transmissions simultaneously — you can talk on the phone and surf the web at the same time on the same line. DSL works by splitting the phone line into two frequency ranges; frequencies below 4kHz are reserved for voice, and those above that for data.

"Over a single, ordinary phone line, DSL can allow users to talk on the phone and browse the vast resources of the Internet," says Bill Rodey, vice chairman and treasurer of the DSL Forum, an industry group formed to disseminate information and promote the technology. "More important, DSL has vast potential for virtually everyone who connects to the Internet. It brings higher access speeds, lower costs and is now broadly available to consumers."

Provided you have a phone line and a computer, all you need to get DSL service at your home or office is to contact a DSL provider. Most phone companies that provide

Internet service now offer DSL, as фo other Internet service providers.

One proviso: Your home's internal telephone wiring must be adequate to handle the increased speed. If your home phone lines are not Category 5 cable or better, consider upgrading them to get the most from your DSL service.

The DSL provider will arrange a service call to install a DSL modem and, in some cases, a filter on the phone line to separate voice from data. There may be a onetime charge for the DSL modem, although some service providers offer them at reduced rates or free to long-term subscribers.

Increasingly, consumers will be able to purchase and install a DSL modem themselves, without a ser-

vice call from the provider. Monthly fees for DSL vary with the provider and level of service, and are somewhat higher than for conventional Internet access, but generally are not prohibitive

Not all DSL services are created equal. To begin with, there are actually several different types of DSL that perform in different ways, each meant for different types of users and applications.

ADSL (asymmetric digital subscriber line) is the most common type for home and office use. ADSL offers faster download speed than upload speed and is appropriate for users who typically receive more large data files than they send. Full-rate ADSL downloads data at 8 Mbps (megabits per second) and uploads at speeds of up to 1 Mbps.

But because full-rate DSL is faster and more costly than most users need, a new standard called G.lite or DSL Lite, sanctioned by International the

Antiques and Collecting

The late-Victorian period was a time of innovation and invention. Furniture designers took advantage of new technologies, making turnings and ornaments that were impossible earlier. Designs were either traditional with hand carving and marquetry, or in a more modern style with geometric turnings, strange protrusions and cutouts.

The center table was an important piece of furniture in a Victorian home. It was a focal point in the room, and it held a lamp. Designers had a few choices. The table had a round, oval or rectangular top. The corners of a rectangular table were usually rounded. The top surface was marble, or plain or inlaid wood. The base had a pedestal, four corner legs or a trestle-type leg. Most of them had stretchers.

Some of the finest Renaissance Revival Victorian tables used several kinds of wood. The most popular were satin wood, pine, mahogany and walnut. The top was shaped and inlaid. The base had an intricate mixture of curved and fluted legs with dark and light woods. Rosettes, masks, hoofs or shields, and often an urn, were in the center of the stretcher. This type of table was out of favor until Today, a good the 1970s. Renaissance Revival table costs more than \$2,000 and a great one can cost \$25,000.

Q. I have an old, perforated silver ball about 2 inches in diameter that opens on a hinge. It is attached to a chain. What could if be?

A. It is probably a tea ball. To make tea, fill one-third of the silver ball with tea leaves. Then soak it in a cup or teapot of boiling-hot water for a few minutes, until the tea is dark enough. Veneer

There are several misperceptions among consumers about veneer tables when in actuality, the use of veneers have several advantages. Veneers allow consumers to afford quality wood furniture. This is possible because a veneer table has only a thin layer of wood atop a more stable wood base. They can actually add to the longevity of the table, giving it resistance to the warping and movement that can take place with wood tables.

Chairs

Buy wood dining chairs at the same time as the table. Wood is a material that oxidizes over time, and the color of your table will become richer and deeper through the years. Wood dining chairs will change as well. Optimally, you will want them to oxidize at the same rate so it does not appear that your

chairs are lighter in color than your table.

Leg detail

A table with a standard top can be dressed up or simplified depending on the style of legs. Shapely curves, detailed scrollwork, beveled edges, or straight Spartan legs each give a table a different feel.

Not only will the shape and detail of the legs determine the style of the table, but the material they are made from will as well. There are several table options with one material used for the top and another used for the legs and base.
