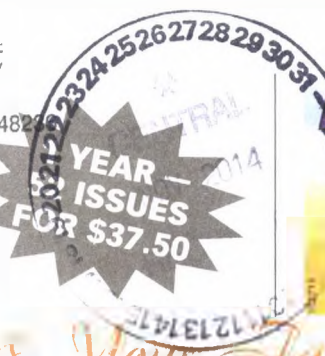

Village tree lights Santa's way

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Merrymakers primed the way for Santa's arrival to the Village in this week's Grosse Pointe Santa Claus Parade.

They lit the municipal Christmas tree at the corner of Kercheval and St. Clair, a beacon to Santa's annual post-Thanksgiving landing in downtown City of Grosse Pointe.

The parade starts at 10 a.m. Friday, Nov. 28, on Kercheval at Lewiston in Grosse Pointe Farms.

The route is down Kercheval through the Hill to Cadieux in the Village shopping district of the City of Grosse Pointe.

Santa brings up the rear in a sleigh drawn by Rudolph, his red nose blinking, and the other reindeer.

The holiday season began downtown last week, Friday, Nov. 21, with the annual Village Aglow Tree Lighting Ceremony.

"I always wait for the tree lighting to say, 'Merry Christmas,'" Mayor Dale Scrace told a crowd greater than 200. "This is the largest crowd I can remember."

"It's our pleasure to provide the best-looking tree around," said John Shook, president of the Grosse Pointe Foundation.

The foundation sponsored the tree decorations.

"Of course, this is the season of children," said John Stevens, chairman of the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Parade.

The friends provide floats for the parade, but this year are putting extra effort into soliciting donations to Toys for Tots, a charity founded by U.S. Marine Corps Reserves shortly after World War II.

"We're collecting unwrapped toys and donations for underprivileged children," Stevens said. "There are a lot of children who need some help. If you have toys or donations to Toys For Tots, bring them to Calico (near the Village Christmas tree) or Morgan Stanley, (130 Kercheval, on the Hill in the Farms)."

Numerous organizations sponsored various aspects of the ceremony.

 - ◆ Grosse Pointe Beautification Commission for Village decorations.
 - ◆ Friends of the Grosse Pointe Parade for sponsoring the Grosse Pointe South choir and display of a reindeer.

 - ◆ Grosse Pointe Boat Club for free hot chocolate.

"This is the time, especially this year with nine new stores in the Village, to shop local," Scrace told the crowd. "We'll see you all at the parade."

THE GROSSE POINTES — Giving goes both ways at Shop With a Cop.

Shop With a Cop teams special needs and financially needy children from the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods with law enforcement officers on a free shopping trip to Target department store at Eastland Center.

"They get a \$100 gift card to shop at Target for whatever they want," said Grosse Pointe Farms Public Safety Officer Veronica Cashion, who is coordinating the 10 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 2, event.

The children often use gift cards to buy presents for family members, not themselves.

"One kid last year bought a bike for his brother and didn't have money left to buy his sister something," Cashion said. "I gave him an extra gift card."

This is the fourth consecutive year officers are volunteering to accompany the children.

"We'll probably have 35 to 40 kids from 5 to 12 years old," Cashion said.

So many children participate, organizers get reinforcements from additional law enforcement agencies.

"In addition to officers from the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods officers (and their K-9 teams), we'll have officers from Detroit, Ann Arbor, Milford, Macomb County Sheriff's Department and Taylor," said Officer Joe Adams, the City of Grosse Pointe's officer of the year for 2013 and president of Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 102.

Cashion recruits children through the school system.

"I contacted teachers and told them if

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Salt in supply

THE GROSSE POINTE — Public works crews aren't shaking in their boots over the supply of road salt.

Supplies are plentiful. So are budgets to buy more if needed.

The state is helping, too.

"The state is awarding one-time funding to cities and counties that maintain roads," said John Lamerato, Grosse Pointe Farms finance director. "It has to be used for road maintenance. We'll probably dedicate it toward winter maintenance, which will help us fight the increased cost of

salt."

Quarterly distributions during the fiscal year will total:

◆ City of Grosse Pointe \$29,000;

◆ Grosse Pointe Farms, \$51,000;

◆ Grosse Pointe Park, \$59,000;

◆ Grosse Pointe Shores, \$16,000 and

◆ Grosse Pointe Woods, \$82,000.

This week's snow didn't warm Lamerato's hopes for a milder winter than last year, when the Farms needed \$69,000 worth of road salt.

"That was one of our worst winters in a while," Lamerato said.

The salt bin is full in the Grosse Pointe Shores

public works garage behind city hall.

"We're ready for snow," said Brett Smith, department director.

Salt is costing the Shores \$48.42 per ton this year, an increase of a "couple of dollars" over last year, he said.

"Salt prices are much higher this year due to last year's demand," said Peter Dame, manager of the City of Grosse Pointe.

"We have a supply of about 50 tons left over from last year and we can order up to 390 tons if needed this season," said Gary Huvaere, City public services director.

Marines meet at Aglow

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Two guests of honor, one official, the other not, met at the Village Aglow Tree Lighting Ceremony Friday, Nov. 21, in the Village.

Marine Sgt. Eduardo Santillan, representing the Marine Reserves' Toys for Tots campaign, lit the tree at the corner of Kercheval and St. Clair in downtown City of Grosse Pointe.

"The Marines are always on the job," said Mayor Dale Scrace, presiding.

Santillan, of Long

Beach, Calif., is stationed at Selfridge Air National Guard Base.

After the ceremony, he exchanged Marine mottoes, "Semper fi," ("Always faithful") with Dick Kulikowski, 91, a World War II Marine veteran from Harrison Township.

Kulikowski attended the lighting with his wife, Doris, and daughter, Theresa Miller, of Grosse Pointe Park. Kulikowski and Santillan reminisced about earning sharpshooter ratings.

"I'm honored," Santillan said.

Kulikowski's service in the South Pacific was a road map to the victorious island hopping cam-

aign.

"We started on Guadalcanal," he said. "Then, we went to Bougainville, the Marianas, to Saipan, Tinian and Guam. From there, we went to Iwo Jima, and from there, Okinawa."

He and Doris have eight children and celebrate their 70th anniversary in January.

"We met at the Vanity Ballroom on Jefferson," he said.

The story's a family favorite.

"He came home that night after he met my mom and said, 'I met the girl I'm going to marry,'" Miller said.

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The rest is history

Grosse Pointe Woods author Karen Dybis wrote a book about five men who brought a bit of Hollywood to Dearborn.

"The Ford-Wyoming Drive-In: Cars, Candy and Canoodling in the Motor City" is 127 pages of a Dearborn father and his three sons who bought a vacant parcel of land and built a drive-in, despite city fathers and mothers who were more than a little concerned such a business would give rise to "immoral behavior," Dybis said in an e-mail.

The family persevered and the theater hosted celebrities, rock stars and thousands of families, as well as children in their footie pajamas, she said.

The second owner, Charlie Schafer is 93 and has owned the drive-in for 30 years. Down from 120, the Ford-Wyoming is one of eight drive-ins left in Michigan, according to Dybis.

A graduate of Romeo High School and the University of Michigan, Dybis quit one job when she saw her first drive-in theater history last summer with a newspaper story about the

bucket list item happened.

Dybis has blogged for Time magazine, worked for The Detroit News' business desk and "jumped on breaking stories" for publications including Corp! Magazine, Detroit Unspun and Agence France-Presse newswire.

The mother of two was born in Bad Axe where she saw her first drive-in movie in the back of a Suburban, was raised in Romeo, worked on Mackinac Island and hangs out in St. Clair Shores.

Dybis said when she is not writing her blog, she is a freelance writer. She dipped her toes into the drive-in theater history last summer with a newspaper story about the

Honda drive-in preservation project that raised funds to convert the nation's drive-in theaters from film to digital.

"About the same time, I had taken on a 'ghost-writing project' where I hoped the outcome would be positive," her e-mail said. "Not only would I learn how to write a book, I'd get to know a little more about my community. Well, that project went bust. I ended up having to quit — something I never do — and was feeling like a huge creep about it.

"The morning that I quit that book project was the worst. I sent the e-mail explaining the reasons I was quitting at about 9 a.m. For the next two hours, I dragged around, feeling lower than low. Mainly, I was mourning the loss of a life-long dream."

The reason she said she got into journalism was to write a book. The opportunity arose again when The History Press contacted her to write about the Ford-Wyoming.

And, the rest, as they say, is history.

Crying foul over fowl

GROSSE POINTE SHORES — A homeowner is crying foul about a ban on chickens.

Councilwoman Kay Felt agrees, but only if letting residents own chickens doesn't cause a nuisance for neighbors.

She supports a request by resident Becky Booth to temporarily suspend enforcement of a Grosse Pointe Shores ordinance categorizing chickens as a nuisance.

Booth asked the council Tuesday, Nov. 18, to "consider adopting a reasonable ordinance that allows for 'backyard chickens,' a practice that is becoming more and more popular across the country."

Felt, agreed, citing certain circumstances.

"We have to look at the size of the (chicken owner's) property, proximity to neighbors and a variety of things that would take some study," Felt said.

Booth owns eight hens on 3.75 acres of lakeside property.

Their coop is 370 feet

from the house of one next door neighbor and will be 45 feet from the other neighbor's house upon its construction, she said in a letter dated Oct. 22 to the city manager.

The birds' organic upbringing includes natural feed, excludes chemicals and pays off with great-tasting eggs, Booth said.

"Hens do not really make any noise," she said. "Occasionally, they have a disagreement, but it's a lot less noise than a barking dog or honking goose."

Among Southeast Michigan communities allowing hens are Ann Arbor, Ferndale, Northville, Redford and Southfield, Booth said.

One of her neighbors, however, complained to city hall, leading to Booth being cited in October for violating an ordinance against owning livestock.

"Livestock means an animal, not of a wild nature, of a type normally found on a farm, including ... chickens," according to the ordinance.

Booth said she acquired

the chickens legally under the Michigan Right to Farm Act.

The act was amended in May, removing Booth from compliance because her chickens aren't at least 1/8 mile away from 13 neighboring houses nor 250 feet from one neighbor.

"The neighbor who complained is within his right to complain," Councilman Bruce Bisballe told Booth. "At this point, you're in violation of an ordinance."

Given the citation, Bisballe and most members of the council opposed a moratorium.

"Let the enforcement go forward," he advised Booth. "If you go before a judge, tell the judge that you're working with council."

While the complaint is under advisement for 90 days, the council may revise the ordinance, Bisballe suggested.

"If you have a 4-acre lot, it's a lot easier to justify this sort of practice as opposed to something on a side street property where lots are small," said Brian Renaud, city attorney.

Decorative lights replaced

GROSSE POINTE SHORES — City officials approved \$12,500 in matching funds for the Grosse Pointe Shores Improvement Foundation to complete the replacement of decorative streetlights on Vernier and the Lakeshore median.

Foundation members pledged to fund half the cost of replacing decorative streetlights, according to Councilman Robert Barrette, liaison to the Foundation.

There's 34 to go,

according to Barrette. "For the last couple of years, we've been putting in fiberglass poles," Ellis said. "They seem to hold up better than aluminum."

At \$750 each, fiberglass poles are more than five times less expensive than aluminum poles, which cost \$4,000 each, Barrette said.

Fiberglass poles are made of solid black material, eliminating dulling over time.

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Bashara's lifestyle 'shocked' his mother

Family and friends of Bob Bashara testified last week, expressing surprise to support of his alternative lifestyle.

Bashara is on trial for the murder of his wife.

Nancy Bashara, Bob Bashara's mother, testified as far as she knew her son and his wife, Jane Bashara, had a "very good relationship and were a loving family." She said she knew nothing of his mistresses or alternative lifestyle and was "shocked" when she

heard about it.

She also said the couple was well known in the Grosse Pointes for their fundraising abilities.

"They raised money for the Rotary, Grosse Pointe South and for St. Michael's Church," she said. "They were the perfect team."

She also testified she bought her son the infamous "Big Bobb" license plate that made his Lincoln Navigator easily recognizable throughout the Pointes, and over the years she had loaned her son and his wife considerable sums

of money.

While Nancy Bashara, his aunt, Gwenn Samuel and his cousin, Stephanie Samuel, supported Bashara and supported him even after he was arrested in June, 2012 for trying to hire a hit man to kill Joe Gentz. It was an incident less than a month after his arrest that caused all three of them to testify that their support for their son, nephew and cousin has wavered.

None of the three, as they were on the stand, looked at Bashara, nor did they acknowledge

him in any way.

Nancy Bashara testified in March 2012, Bob Bashara had given her a small package to put in a safety deposit box the two shared. He said it contained jewelry and other items he wanted to set aside to give to his son. In July 2012, Nancy Bashara retrieved the items with the intent to send them to the Bashara son, but when she opened the package, she found a gun.

The next day, Nancy, along with her daughter, Laura Maurer and Stephanie Samuel, returned to the bank,

opened the safety deposit box, removed the gun, and turned it over to Bashara's attorney at the time, David Griem.

"We were average people, thrown into a terrible situation," she testified. "We didn't know what to do."

Griem kept the gun in his office for more than a year, and it was only after Samuel turned over to police bullets she thought belonged with the gun that authorities learned of its existence. The gun was retrieved during a raid on Griem's office in

September 2013.

The gun is an important aspect in the case because Gentz, who pleaded guilty to killing Jane Bashara, said Bob Bashara forced him to do it by holding a gun to his head. Bashara told several interviewers that he never owned a gun.

Testimony begins again after Bashara health issues

Bob Bashara, on trial for the murder of his wife, kept a medical appointment Friday, causing court to be canceled with no advance notice to jurors or attorneys.

According to Bashara's

attorney, Lillian Diallo, the appointment was to follow up on whatever caused Bashara to collapse three weeks ago, resulting in court being canceled for two days. Diallo, citing HIPPA privacy regulations, said she was not at liberty to discuss Bashara's illness.

Friday's medical

appointment had nothing to do with the eye surgery Bashara underwent last week, causing court to be canceled for a day.

The trial is now in its eighth week, with seven weeks of testimony. The prosecution is expected to wrap up in the first week of December. The defense, which is expected to call only two witnesses, will present its case once the prosecution

rests. Joe Gentz, who pleaded guilty to killing Jane Bashara, was expected to be called by the defense but has told the court he will not testify.

One of the two witnesses expected to be called by the defense is Lois Valente.

The prosecution originally stated it would call 84 witnesses, but that list has since been trimmed

to approximately 50 witnesses. About eight witnesses remain, including the Wayne County medical examiner who conducted the autopsy on Jane Bashara and Grosse Pointe Park detectives who investigated the case.

Grosse Pointe Park resident Michael Carmody, who Bashara said he was having drinks with the night his wife was murdered, returned to the stand Monday. Carmody testified he met Bashara at 7 p.m. at the Hard Luck Lounge on Mack, and stayed with him until about 7:45 p.m.

He said he spent the next several days with Bashara.

Carmody said over the next several weeks he caught Bashara in several lies. He said Bashara was not truthful with him regarding his relationship with Rachel Gillett,

and also told Carmody he never owned a gun.

Carmody also said while he stuck by Bashara for several months following Jane's murder, he began to draw a timeline of events in his own mind that made him rethink his relationship with Bashara. He said he pieced together all the times Bashara brought Gillett to Rotary functions and introduced her as a friend. He later realized Bashara had lied to him about that relationship. But it was his meeting with Bashara at the Hard Luck Lounge the night of the murder that gave him the most concern.

"I have a strong belief that I was manipulated to form a credible alibi for Bob," he said.

"Everything chipped away at our friendship. If Bob's lips were moving, he was telling me a lie. It was all part of the game."

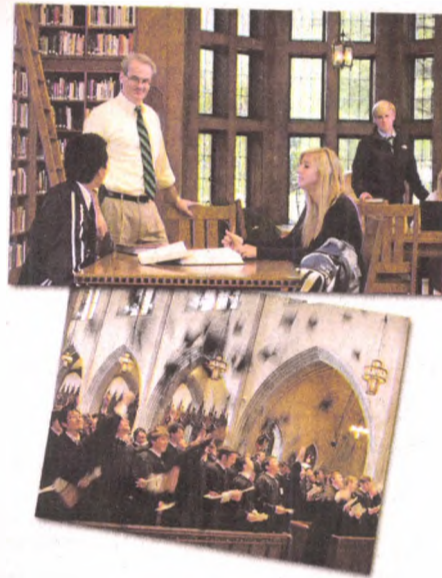
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Bikes hot item for thieves

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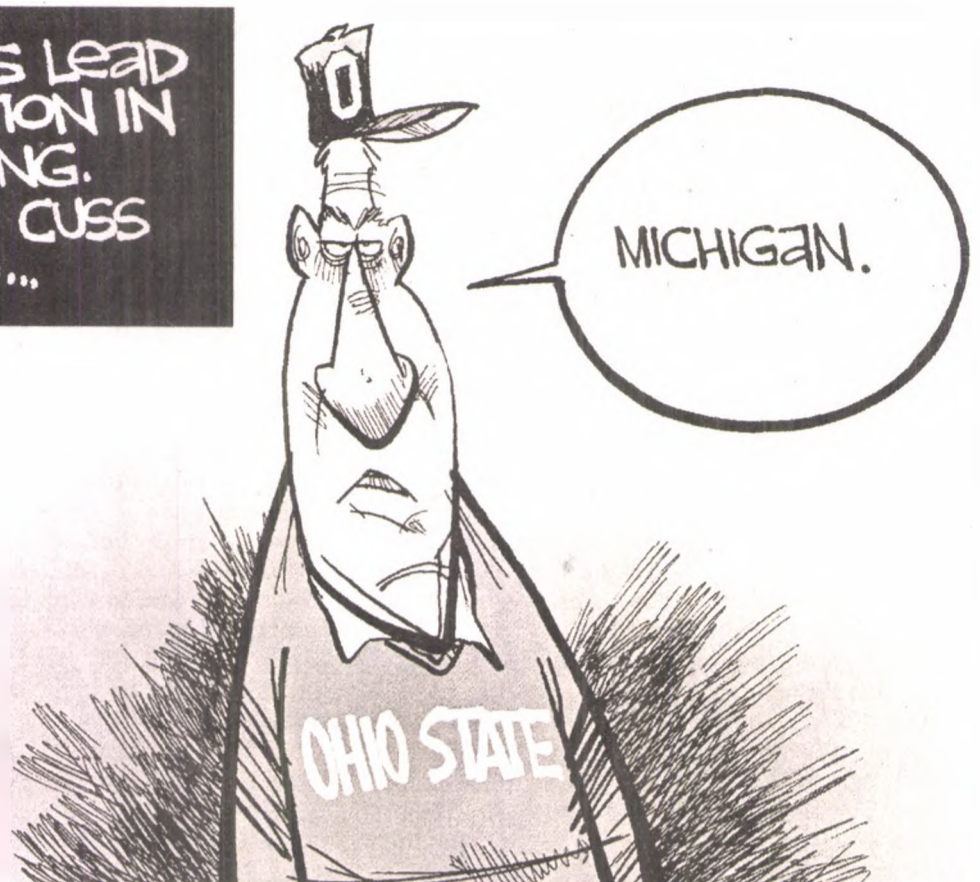

CITY OF GROSSE POINTE — Four crimes were reported recently on three contiguous blocks of Lakeland.

Another occurred one block over on Rivard.

They stain a typically drab public safety department blotter and foul crime statistics this autumn in the City of Grosse Pointe.

“You may go two or three years without a car being broken into and then get a couple kids or an adult that hits nine or 10 cars three or four days in a row,” said Stephen Poloni, public safety director.

“But, still, a very, very, very low number of incidents is going to be reported.”

He added, “We are pre-

dominately a very safe community.”

Poloni doesn't think the incidents are related to the Monday afternoon, Oct. 20, staved-off break-in of a residence in the 17000 block of Maumee.

A man rang the front doorbell, paused and kicked it in.

He fled on a blue mountain bike with the word, “Royal,” on the frame when the resident scared him off.

There are no suspects in the Lakeland and Rivard crimes, but Poloni suspects they're con-

nected.

“Any time you see a pattern where crimes are similar in nature, we tend to believe it's the same suspect,” he said. “However, we don't have a lot of evidence or a description at this point to tie anything together.”

The incidents, occurring between overnight Friday, Oct. 24, and Thursday, Oct. 30, are:

◆ In the 500 block of Lakeland Friday, Oct. 24, a 2006 Jeep Commander was stolen.

The Jeep was locked and parked at the head of the driveway near the garage, according to its owner.

◆ In the 500 block of Lakeland Friday, Oct. 24, a pair of \$135 sunglasses and portable DVD player of unknown value were taken overnight from a 2012 Jeep Grand Cherokee parked, possibly unlocked, in a driveway.

◆ In the 400 block of Lakeland, a man out of town from Thursday, Oct. 16 to Sunday, Oct. 26, returned to discover the theft of a \$400 Cannondale bicycle from the unlocked garage, according to police.

◆ In the 700 block of Rivard Wednesday, Oct. 29, a man said someone

smashed the rear passenger-side window of his 2014 Ford Fusion. The manual shifter had been put in neutral.

“(I) believe it was a failed attempt to push-steal (the car),” said a public safety officer.

◆ In the 600 block of Lakeland between 9:30 and 11 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 25, a woman reported her \$600 snowblower stolen from her garage.

◆ There were no signs of forced entry.

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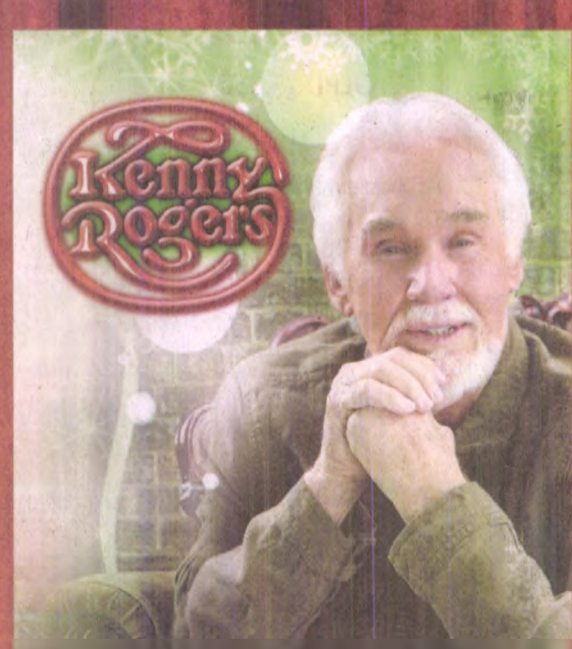

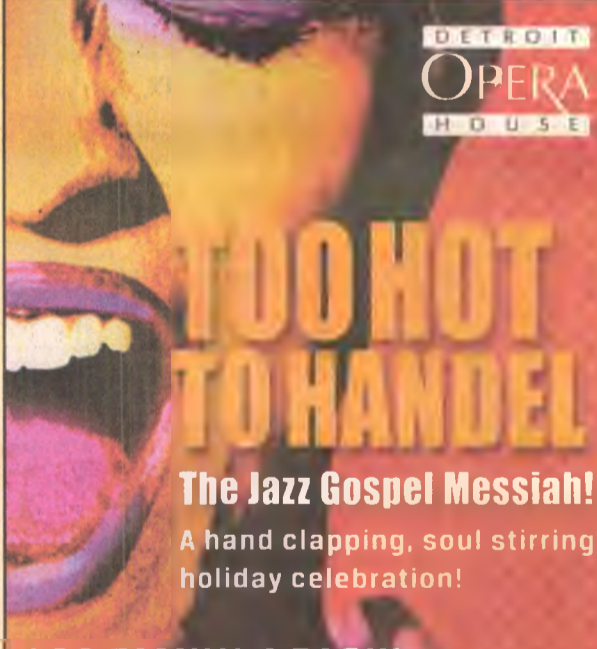

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 - 15 oz. can pumpkin puree
- 1/3 cup evaporated milk
- 1 small box (3.4 oz.) vanilla instant pudding
- 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla crushed ginger snaps for serving

Whip cream until medium peaks form.

In another bowl whisk together pumpkin puree with evaporated milk.

Add vanilla pudding, pumpkin pie spice and vanilla and stir well to combine.

Fold whipped cream into the pumpkin mixture and gently mix until thoroughly combined.

Sprinkle with crushed ginger snaps just before serving.

Know Your Skin

A sore or mole that bleeds and won't heal. Or a red bump that just won't go away. These are two of the classic signs of the skin cancer called basal cell carcinoma (BCC).

In addition to these classic symptoms, BCC also can appear as a shiny pink or white bump, a red flat patch or with-in a scar. Basal cell carcinomas most frequently appear where the skin has received significant sun exposure, including the head, neck, hands, back and chest.

Basal cell carcinoma is not only the most common form of skin cancer, it is the most common of all cancers, affecting nearly three million patients each year. For the most part, BCC cells remain in the layers of the skin and very rarely result in death, (almost always the result of advanced disease that was not treated).

Caught early, BCC's are treatable with a high level of success; there is a better than a 95 percent cure rate if detected and treated early. Left untreated, the carcinoma will become more extensive and may require more radical therapies including surgical removal by a Moh's or plastic surgeon, with possible need for reconstruction of the affected area.

Q. I visit my parents, who are in their late 80s, at least once a week. Lately, I have noticed a difference in their behavior. Often, their refrigerator is nearly empty or the food is outdated or moldy. When I ask them about it, they seem angry and respond they planned to shop that day. Their home is unusually cluttered with old newspapers, sometimes the trash is overflowing and their mail goes unopened for days. My mother has

always been meticulous about running her household, so this is very strange behavior. Is this the start of dementia?

A. Your first step should be to speak with their physician. The change in their behavior could be a new adjustment to their medications or an undiagnosed infection, such as a urinary tract infection, which often causes confusion in older adults.

Beaumont offers a geriatric evaluation program to help patients work with their physicians to identify problems and suggest alternatives that might help them lead a

more active and comfortable lifestyle. The evaluation includes an extensive questionnaire, a thorough physical exam, testing and an assessment to determine the individual's mental abilities and psychological and social skills. We consider the needs of the patient first, but we also look at the needs of the caregiver.

it is a way to encourage residents to shop local, increase awareness and foot traffic to the variety of Grosse Pointe businesses.

Shop Small

There are a number of reasons to shop local Saturday, Nov. 29, on Small Business Saturday, and throughout December.

"We take good care of you," said Cindy LaLonde of LaLonde Jewelers & Gemologists on the Hill. "We provide the service."

She added, Grosse Pointers should shop locally to "keep us small owners in business. I try to frequent places on the Hill. You can pretty much find what you need — home design, dishes, jewelry (in the Grosse Pointes)."

"Patronizing independent, locally owned businesses has

been proven to greatly strengthen the overall economic base of a community," said Jennifer Boettcher, Grosse Pointe Chamber of Commerce's executive director. "About three times more of your local spending will stay in our local economy compared to buying from a chain or non-local business. Among many other benefits, that's three times more local taxes supporting our schools and vital services and more local job opportunities."

Butcher agreed. Small, locally-owned businesses provide customer service and shopping local keeps the community vibrant.

Supporting stores, such as Bellissima Boutique & Bridal Salon, Kramer's Bed, Bath & Window Fashion, Small Favors, The Jagged Fork and Mack Ave. Drapery, keeps tax revenues coming in thus providing community events that residents, like Butcher, enjoy attending. Amenities such as tree lightings, concerts and maintaining streets and side-

Gibson, who opened her store in Grosse Pointe Woods in November 2013, likes the old world charm of the Grosse Pointes so shopping local helps maintain the integrity of that atmosphere.

"You are supporting local businesses (and that) goes hand in hand with the integrity of what Grosse Pointe means to people," Gibson said.

"It makes for a strong community," Borchardt said. "It's a win-win. We thrive as a com-

munity. It has a ripple effect."

Coleen Downey, the executive director of the Grosse Pointe ART Center, added shopping locally is more convenient, especially in bad weather.

"You don't have to fight the crowds as you do at the mall. Shopping locally means not everybody will have the same thing," she said.

Presents are wrapped free at the art center. Gift items must be purchased in Grosse Pointe and a receipt presented at the time of wrapping.

"Everyone laments the loss of shops in our community," Boettcher said, "but they don't seem to equate this to their own spending habits. Online retailers may seem like a convenient alternative, but they're not creating any local jobs or sponsoring a local Little League team. 'Think Local' is also more than just retail, it's using a local landscaper, a local accountant, eating at local restaurants, buying produce from a local farm stand."

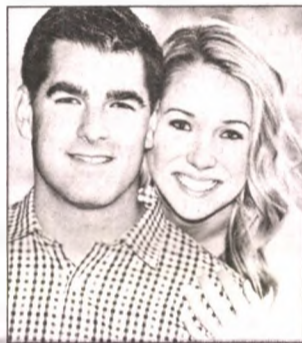

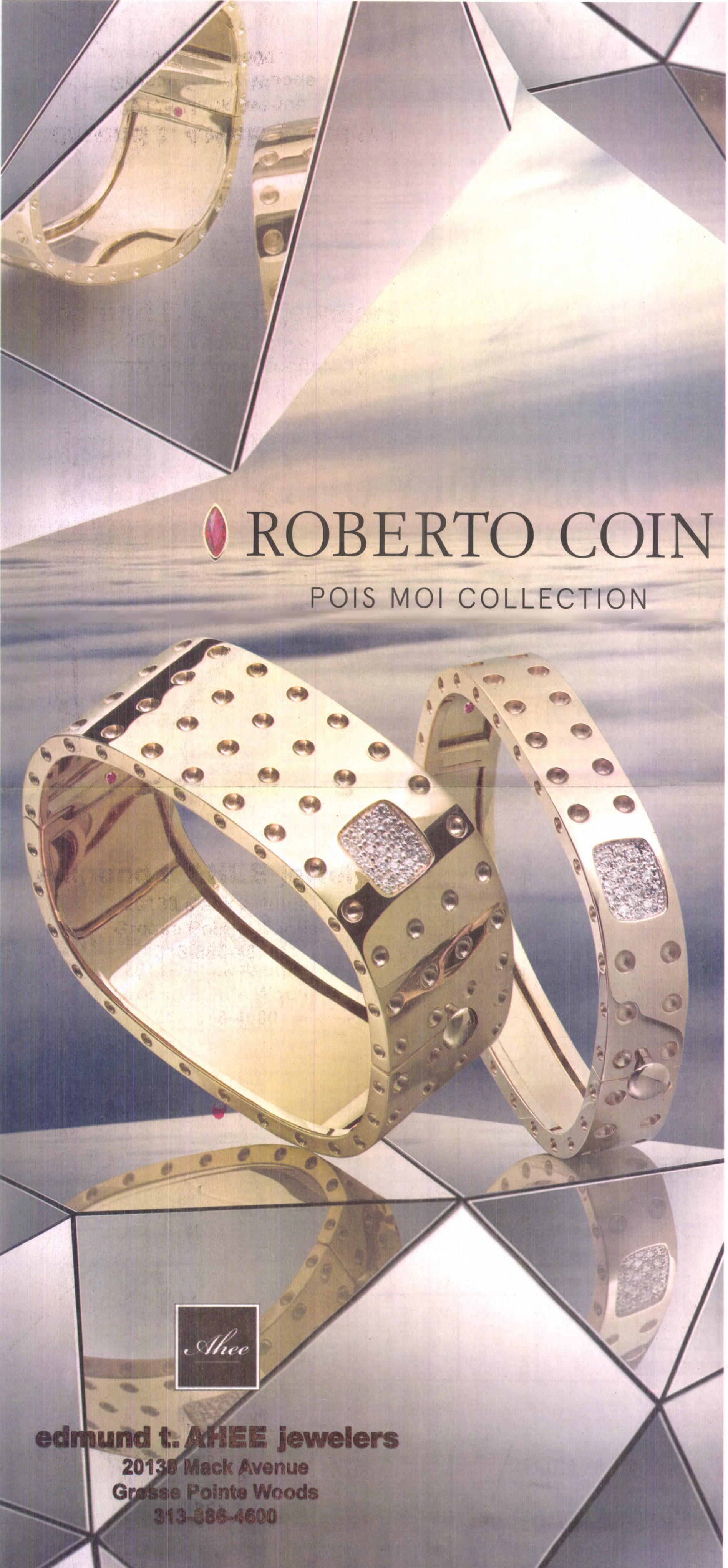

Grosse Pointe South girls' swimming and diving team hoped to capture a trophy last weekend at the Division 2 championship meet at the Holland Aquatic Center.

The top four teams earned the hardware, but the Blue Devils finished sixth in one of the most competitive title meets in years.

Birmingham Marian won the state title with 231.5 points, followed by Ann Arbor Skyline with 220, Portage Central with 219.5, Dexter with 217, Birmingham Seaholm with 211 and Grosse Pointe South with 202.

The good news, however, was the Blue Devils had several competitors earn All-State honors by finishing in the top eight in their respective events and a few set new school records.

In one of the closest finishes possible, Blue Devil Catie DeLoof was edged out by less than a fingertip in the 50-yard freestyle. Marian's Sophia Schott won with a time of 23.66 and DeLoof finished at 23.68, which was a new school record.

DeLoof also took home a bronze medal in the 100-yard freestyle, posting a time of 50.59, which was another school record. The time was 0.01 behind runner-up Katie

Portz of Skyline and only 0.38 behind champion Mollie Pulte of Marian.

In the 200-yard individual medley, Alex Hughes was fourth and Claire Young sixth with times of 2:07.49 and 2:09.43.

Ava Boutrous set a school record after she placed fifth in the 500-yard freestyle with a time of 5:06.31, and Claire Young was runner-up in the 100-yard backstroke with a time of 55.93.

Another top eight individual finish was turned in by Hughes, who was a bronze medalist in the 100-yard breaststroke with a time of 1:04.90. That was also a school record.

The Blue Devils also earned big points by placing in the top eight in each of the three relay events.

The 200-yard medley relay team of Young, Hughes, Abbey Schuetze and Amy Krausmann placed fourth with a time of 1:46.81, and the 200-yard freestyle relay squad of Catie DeLoof, Brigit Jogan, Jackie DeLoof and Krausmann took second with a time of 1:37.25, which set another school record.

The 400-freestyle relay team of Young, Schuetze, Hughes and Catie DeLoof placed sixth with a time of 3:32.48, which was only 0.10 behind the fifth-place squad and only 0.15 behind the fourth-place

Seniors Izzy Murphy and Carina Bertakis ended their high school volleyball careers by collecting 19 kills and 29

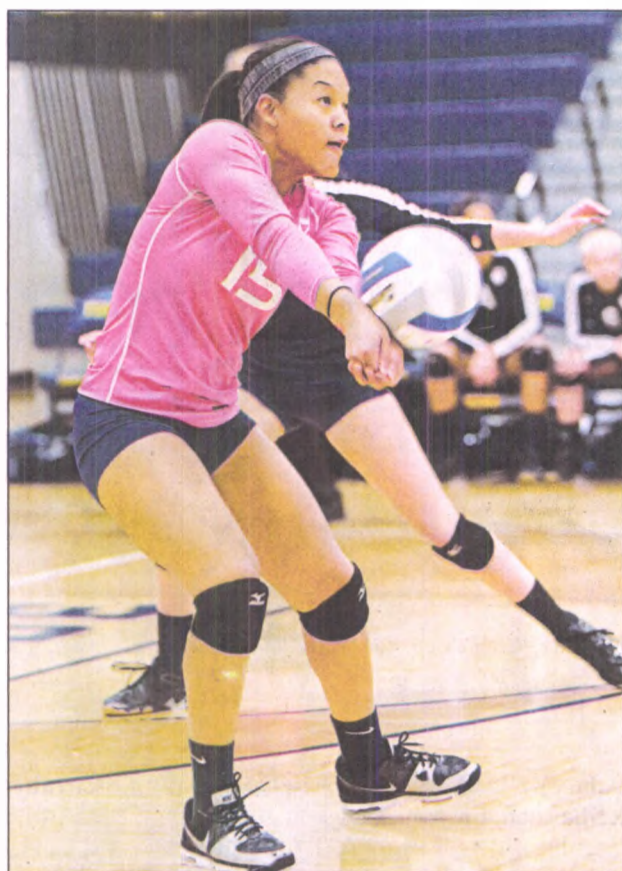
