**GROSSE POINTE WOODS** — The parks and recreation department in the Woods is looking for a few good men and women.

"The search is on," Nicole Byron, parks and recreation supervisor said. "We're looking for seasonal help right now." Duties include everything from cutting grass

to being a lifeguard at Lake Front Park.

"There are lots of things seasonal help does," Byron said. "So there is likely something that will fit just about anyone."

Grounds maintenance, bath house attendants, bridge attendants and lifeguards are all on the seasonal help list.

## LWV forum for Proposal 1

**THE GROSSE POINTES** — The Grosse Pointe League of Women Voters hosts a presentation on Proposal 1, the upcoming ballot issue related to how the State of Michigan funds road improvements.

The public forum is 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 14, at

the Grosse Pointe Public Library, Ewald branch, Grosse Pointe Park.

The league's state voter services director Eva Packard presents the facts related to the proposal which goes before voters Tuesday, May 5.

At issue is an amendment to the Michigan constitution "to increase the sales/use tax from six

percent to 7 percent and supplement reduced revenue to the School Aid Fund and local units of government caused by the elimination of the sales/use tax on gasoline and diesel fuel for vehicles operating on public roads, and to give effect to laws that provide additional money for roads and other transportation purposes by increasing

the gas tax and vehicle registration fees."

Complete ballot language, as well as additional information on the proposal, can be found on the league's website, lwvmi.org.

The league has not taken a position on Proposal 1. The library is located in the Park city hall complex at Jefferson and Maryland.

## Major crime next to nothing

**GROSSE POINTE SHORES** — Most of the evil that lurks in the hearts of men faded into the shadows last year.

Hardly any serious crime, as rated by the FBI, happened during 2014 in Grosse Pointe Shores. Only five cases were reported, down 50 percent from 2013 and only one-quarter as many reported during 2012, according to the public safety department annual report for 2014.

Chief John Schulte called the latest total "unprecedentedly low."

The Shores's roughly 3,000 population is too small for direct comparison with national statistics of crimes per 100,000 capita.

"If we were, we'd have one of the lowest crime rates in the nation, certainly in Michigan," Schulte said.

He and Mayor Ted Kedzierski credit crime prevention to the most well-stocked public safety department in six years.

"This is the first time since 2009 that we've had 18 uniform officers," Kedzierski said. "This is

## Businessmen rally with community

GROSSE POINTE WOODS — Paige Stalker died Dec. 22, when a gunman opened fire on a carload of teenagers near the border of Detroit and Grosse Pointe Park.

The University Liggett student and Grosse Pointe Farms resident's murder was national news. Locally, TV, radio and newspapers covered it for weeks.

Two local businessmen and residents of the Pointes noticed coverage has waned and they decided to do something about it.

They donated space on two of their billboards.

"We want to give the family closure and we think someone will come

forward if they're reminded of this tragedy," said Alex Lucido, broker owner of Lucido & Associates Realtors in Grosse Pointe Woods.

Sean Lane, founder of Clean Up Clear Out in Grosse Pointe Woods agrees.

"We have to take care of our own and step up to the plate," said Lane, a reserve officer in Detroit.

Lane said crime statistics are alarming in the city of Detroit and it's important parents communicate with their children.

"This happened near the border of Grosse Pointe Park, but in a bad area," he said.

Lucido said the lesson is a tough one.

"We can't expect children to make the right

decisions all the time, but we hope they make the right decision at the right time."

The reward money, through Crime Stoppers, tallies more than \$160,000 for the Stalker case.

"We just want to help the family get closure," Lucido said. "For us to help, we'd do it as long as it takes. We don't want people to forget about this."

Lane said many of the businesses in the area, including the Ray Laethem dealerships, Village Market and Village Ace Hardware, Beaumont Hospital and more have been supportive of a May 2 unity walk with Detroit and the Pointes. More details are on page 8A.

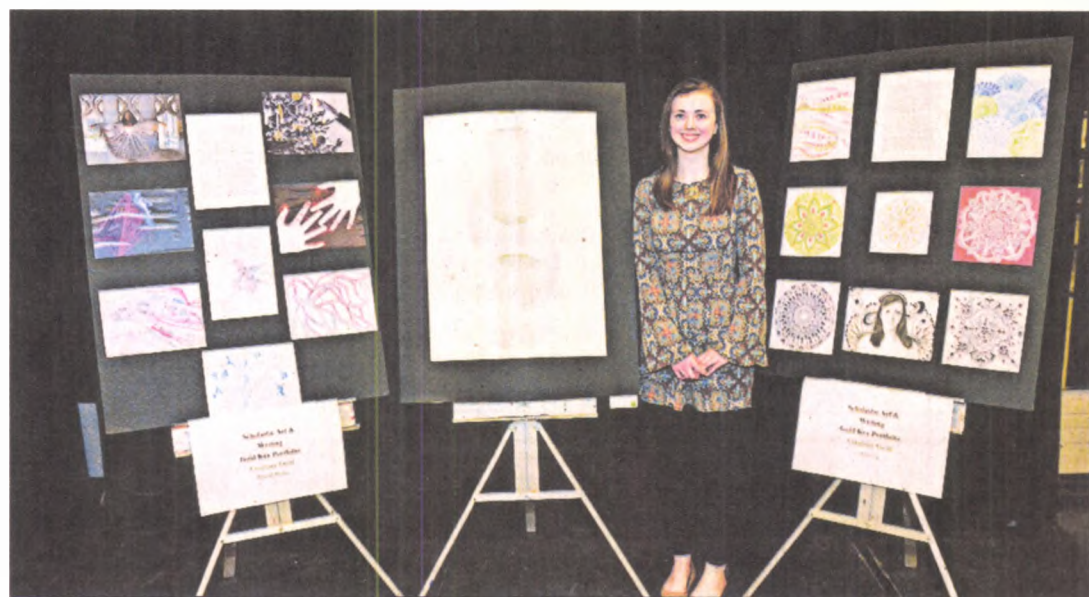

**THE GROSSE POINTES** — Household Hazardous Waste Drop-off Day is 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, April 11.

This year's drop-off is in the parking lot of Osius Park, 800 Lakeshore at the foot of Vernier in Grosse Pointe Shores.

Participation is open to residents of the City of Grosse Pointe, Farms, Park, Shores and Harper Woods, but not to residents of Grosse Pointe Woods. They have their own collection. A valid driver's license must be shown.

The free, annual drop-off day is an opportunity for residents to safely discard problematic household wastes.

Waste day offers something new this year: "Wayne County is dropping off a Dumpster"

for tires, said Helen Bai, chairwoman of the Shores beautification commission. "It's a free service."

From 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, April 11, a portable shredding service sets up shop in the Grosse Pointe Shores municipal parking lot next to city hall on Lakeshore at the corner of Vernier.

Enter the lot off Lakeshore.

Rates are \$5 for the first two banker-sized boxes of paper documents.

Costs increase to \$5 for each box thereafter.

Prices are less than taking documents to a shredding company,

according to Helen Bai, chairwoman of the Shores beautification commission.

The commission sponsors the event.

"We are good to go," Bai said.

# Strobl enjoys political spotlight

Grant Strobl can't understand why "The Conscience of a Conservative" is no longer on the top of the list as required reading for activists.

The book, written in 1960 by U.S. Sen. Barry Goldwater, launched the modern conservative movement and "is based on ideas most conservatives agree on," Strobl said.

He noted that the book is a required text in one of his classes at the University of Michigan, where he is a freshman studying political science.

"I have never read an article that showed so much vitriol toward a specific group of people," he told Fox News broadcaster Steve Doocy. "If this was against liberals, or religion, or really any other group of people, the response would be much different."

Strobl is attending U of M on a full, four-year Bentley scholarship. The Alvin M. and Arvella D. Bentley Scholarships recognize recipients as among the most outstanding Michigan residents to apply to the U of

M. The awards, for four years of undergraduate study, cover tuition, fees, room and board, and provides a book allowance.

Besides his involvement with YAF, Strobl was involved with Nick Hawatmeh's campaign for state representative as chief technological officer and strategist last year. He also served as a new media intern for Gov. Rick Snyder's re-election campaign.

Strobl has already found himself in the national spotlight.

In December, U of M professor of communications Susan Douglas, in the online publication "In These Times," wrote: "I hate Republicans. I can't stand the thought of having to spend the next two years watching Mitch McConnell, John Boehner, Ted Cruz, Darrell Issa or any of the legions of other blowhards denying climate change, thwarting immigration reform or championing fetal 'personhood.'"

Strobl, chairman of the campus Young Americans for Freedom at the University of Michigan, protested, and ended up on national TV.

Strobl plans to attend law school and envisions himself "somewhere in politics" 10 years from now, pushing for free enterprise, limited government, education policy reform and exposure of all viewpoints on issues.

His outside interests include skiing, hiking and enjoying nature, particularly in northern Michigan.

puppet show, and more.

"We're going to have library-related giveaways," Houser said. "The (Grosse Pointe Library) foundation and friends have joined forces to do two coffee and doughnut days, which are very popular."

Also included in the list of features taking place during the week is Blind Date with a Book.

"We've done it two or three times already," Houser said. "And it's been very successful each time. We have a display at each of the branches with books that are wrapped in plain brown paper. There's a description of the book that's written in dating website format. And there's an option for people to 'rate their date' after they've finished the book. It's fun for patrons."

Libraries have changed over the years, Houser said, and part of the purpose of National Library Week is to get this message out.

"We just want to let people know all the library has to offer," she said. "There are the traditional library offerings, but there is so much more now."

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# Stop leads to arrests

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Three men, ordered out of a black Jeep Cherokee packed with tree trimming equipment and a semi-automatic pistol hidden under the center console, obeyed orders to sit on the curb of a hospital parking lot while four public safety officers and a police dog named Duke searched the vehicle.

"The driver (32, of New Haven) leaned back, looked directly at (me) and pointed with his left hand at (one of the passengers, 33, of Warren) and nodded his head," said Grosse Pointe Farms Officer Matthew Hurner. "During this time, K-9 Duke was searching the vehicle."

The dog sniffed an odor of narcotics.

"There was loose marijuana shake on the floor, under (a) seat as well as on the seat," Hurner said.

Officers also found a syringe on the passenger floor.

The center console contained a 6-ounce pill bottle. It held six .32-caliber bullets; three hollow point and three round-tipped.

The men said there wasn't a firearm in the vehicle, police said.

Hurner discovered the console was loose.

"(I) checked the bottom and could feel a solid object, but could not retrieve it," he said.

"(He) was able to lift (the console)," said Officer Tim Harris, the K-9 handler. "(I) checked under the center console and observed (a) handgun."

He reached under and withdrew a KalTec P-32

.32 caliber pistol, which the Warren man initially denied, then admitted owning, police said.

Officers arrested him for carrying a concealed weapon.

They arrested the driver on two unspecified warrants from 36th District Court in Detroit.

The third man, 27, of Swartz Creek, was released.

Records listed the gun as "returned stolen out of Tennessee," police said.

The syringe contained heroin the previous day, the driver reportedly told Harris.

All occupants admitted smoking marijuana about 45 minutes prior to the stop, he added.

The investigation grew from a traffic stop at 10:01 p.m. Monday, March 23.

Harris pulled them over for driving erratically near the intersection of Mack and Moross in a 1999 Jeep registered to a woman wanted on an unspecified charge in Macomb County.

Exiting his cruiser, Harris walked toward the Jeep, detecting an increasing strong odor of marijuana.

The driver lacked an operator's license and said the Jeep belonged to his ex-girlfriend.

Harris noted the Jeep's broken ignition and steering column, common to stolen vehicles, and called for backup.

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## Woods teens face 10 years

**GROSSE POINTE WOODS** — Two Grosse Pointe Woods teens were arrested Saturday, March 21, after allegedly robbing a pair of Harper Woods residents as they walked near Lochmoor and Sanilac in Harper Woods.

According to the Harper Woods Public Safety Department, Woods residents, Brandon James Zielke, 19, and Adam Jeffrey Baker, 18, are charged with one count of larceny from a person, and one misdemeanor count of larceny less than \$200 in 32-A District

Court.

A police report said that Baker and Zielke pulled up to the victims, a 17-year old Harper Woods resident and a female friend, at about 7 p.m. Saturday, March 21. Baker and Zielke allegedly exited a red pickup truck and approached the victims on foot.

Baker and Zielke demanded money from the male victim, who cooperated with the demands.

The two suspects fled the area.

The victims contacted Harper Woods public safety with a description of the suspects and the vehicle. About 90 minutes later, the vehicle

was spotted on Manchester in Grosse Pointe Woods. Grosse Pointe Woods officers stopped the vehicle and Baker and Zielke were taken into custody and transported to Harper Woods Public Safety Department.

The pickup was impounded and during this process, according to Harper Woods officers, evidence of other criminal activity was dis-

covered. An investigation into this other evidence is underway with detectives from Grosse Pointe Woods' Public Safety Department.

Bond was set at \$1,500 cash for Zielke and \$1,000 cash for Baker. A probable cause hearing was scheduled for Wednesday, April 1.

If convicted, Zielke and Baker face up to 10 years in prison.

## They meet again

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Luck ran out for a City of Grosse Pointe woman, 19, facing police the second time in four days during traffic stops that escalated into drug investigations.

Unlike the first time when police let her go, this time they arrested her.

In both cases, she was driving a black 1999 Jeep.

The first time, at 11:42 p.m. Saturday, March 21, on Fisher Road near Waterloo in the City, police impounded the Jeep and arrested a male teenage passenger from the Park for possession of 1.56 grams of marijuana with intent to sell.

This time, at 6:54 p.m. Tuesday, March 24, on southbound Moross near

Beaupre in Grosse Pointe Farms, police arrested her for possession of marijuana and narcotics paraphernalia.

The second incident happened so soon after the first that the Jeep was still listed as impounded by the City, according to the Farms Officer Vince Finn, pulling her over for the records discrepancy.

"(She) admitted she recently picked up the vehicle from impound," Finn said.

He summoned K-9 handler Officer Tim Harris and K-9 partner, Duke, to check the Jeep for drugs.

"The K-9 located a small bag of marijuana and a syringe of 'wax,' a marijuana derivative with an electronic device for smoking the derivative," Finn said.

Both tested positive for the drug, he said.

## Man charged with domestic violence and obstructing police

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Police received no explanation how a 12-round, semi-automatic pistol escaped a closed safe during a fight between an engaged couple at the house they share in the 300 block of Ridgmont.

"(She, 42 years old) stated she did not open the safe," said Officer Thomas Dionne.

"(He, 47) denied going for the gun in the safe," said Lt. Andrew Rogers.

Officers went to their house a few minutes past

9 p.m. Friday, March 27.

They were following up on a 911 call over a land line from the residence that ended abruptly.

Walking up the driveway, Dionne reported hearing fighting inside. He banged on the side door and announced himself.

"(A man) opened the door and immediately fled back into the home," Dionne said.

Rogers intercepted him running out the back door and over a four-foot metal fence into the north-side neighbor's yard.

"As (he) cleared the fence, he landed directly in front of (me)," Rogers said.

Rogers ordered him to the ground upon threat of being shocked with a Taser.

Charges against him are domestic violence and obstructing police.

The woman said they're engaged, living together and had an argument that escalated into physical violence, according to Dionne.

She said he shattered a glass of Schnapps, knocked glassware to the floor and kicked the stereo system to pieces,

according to police.

"As the argument became more heated, she called 911," said Dionne, citing her account. "As she was calling 911, (he) ripped the phone cord from the wall."

"(He) stated he was assaulted first and was scratched in the face," Rogers said. "(He gave) no reason for fleeing other than he wanted to go back home to Massachusetts. (He) appeared to be drinking."

Officers found a 9 mm semi-automatic pistol on a bed upstairs.

They confiscated it for safe-keeping.

## Officers work together on case

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — Sharing a border with the Motor City means Grosse Pointe public safety officers routinely monitor Detroit police radio reports.

A broadcast Sept. 14, prompted a response by officers on the Farms midnight shift that earned them a department Unit Award for 2014.

Shortly before sunup, they answered a Detroit report of fire in a storage facility behind Ace Hardware on Mack in Detroit.

Farms officers crossed Mack and caught five

juvenile suspects, recovered lighters, obtained confessions and turned the case over to Detroit.

For their actions that morning, the following Farms officers received awards: Lt. Andrew Rogers and officers Keith Colombo, Thomas Dionne, Vincent Finn and Paul Reygaert.

"All officers worked in unison, ultimately catching the responsible parties for a structure fire sustaining close to \$1 million damage," said Dan Jensen, public safety director, during a ceremony Monday, March 9.

## Disappointed with stance

To the Editor:

As a longtime reader of the Grosse Pointe News, I was truly disappointed to see an article like "Councilman Declares No Police Zone" in a paper whose mission is to publish "the most relevant, accurate, and timely information." Since when does a letter written by any citizen or councilperson to civic officials regarding dissatisfaction with city employee performance become a matter of public interest, or qualify as "most relevant?" This looks more like part of an ongoing attempt to malign a councilman who has brought positive change to the community. Obviously someone at Grosse Pointe Shores city hall passed Mr. Schulte's letter on to your reporter, Brad Lindberg.

It's healthy and productive for residents to communicate when they feel something is wrong in their community. But who will ever want to write city officials if their letters are going to be turned over to the local newspaper, printed out of context and used as tatter for gossip? Or is that done intentionally by the Shores to discourage complaints?

While a newspaper may have the right to protect its sources, as a taxpayer I think every resident of Grosse Pointe Shores is entitled to know exactly which official shared Mr. Schulte's letter with the paper. Was it the city manager, an elected official, or our police chief? Shores officials need to be forthcoming and answer this question.

A short article focusing on a letter that was selectively edited does not give your readers the proper context in which to view Mr. Schulte's expressed distrust of the Grosse Pointe Shores public safety department and the Shores Municipal government. A number of background incidents occurred over the years that can be verified from review of Shores council minutes, videotapes, and public documents.

1) Mr. Schulte was much more than "questioned" while campaigning door to door on foot

with his wife and children in 2009. In fact, three separate police cars halted him, sounding their sirens and making a scene obviously intended to discredit his bid for office. Ask the residents of S. Edgewood.

2) During the same campaign, incumbent Shores officials running for re-election paid our city attorney with public tax dollars to review the campaign material of Mr. Schulte and another candidate, apparently in hopes of discrediting them as viable challengers. Officials rebutted this claim, but the documents speak for themselves.

Without knowing the fundamental issues, readers can't possibly get a fair perspective on why Councilman Schulte might distrust our public safety department and other officials. Had it wished to; your paper could have verified these issues through meeting videos and city documents, also available through FOIA request. So how is this article "accurate?" And why would such a non-worthy article like this come to press in the first place, especially since we repeatedly see the type of vitriol whenever Mr. Lindberg mentions Mr. Schulte in a story.

While I and others sincerely appreciate the objective and balanced position the Grosse Pointe News has taken in covering past issues, this article is clearly out of line and demands redress on the part of all parties involved. Elected officials need to focus on the critical activities that the public elected them to solve. The press should focus on those issues that really make a difference to the public interest and not let interpersonal conflicts or sensationalism subjugate the critical role that they fulfill in this regard.

## Quote from council raises concerns

To the Editor:

"Live with it." That's a direct quote from the City Council to concerned residents at the recent meeting about Beaumont's latest expansion plans in the city. "You have to bend a little" and "It's for the greater good" were also quotes made just before their approval of a 50,000 square foot Medical Office Building next to Beaumont Hospital on Cadieux Road. The city approved Landmark Properties, a private company, to construct this building and lease to private physicians and their staff. They will also lease space to Beaumont for outpatient procedure rooms.

In addition to the heavy

traffic we are currently experiencing, the hospital estimates the traffic will increase by 165 cars with this expansion. That increased amount will be almost doubled when the 130 employees temporarily parking offsite will be able to park in the hospital parking structure once complete. Traffic on Notre Dame, Maumee, Harvard and Cadieux Roads which is already heavy, will continue to increase. I expect all of this vehicular traffic, as well as the additional pedestrian traffic this expansion will bring, will significantly impact the safety of our families as we walk through our neighborhoods, the safety of our children as they walk to school, and the ability to simply exit our driveways.

I moved to Grosse Pointe 16 years ago because I loved the small town feel and sense of community. However that small town feel continues to erode as my street evolves into a major thoroughfare with its traffic and noise. And the sense of community will all but disappear if the city council continues to make decisions with little regard to the residents.

## Objections to project approval

What make this even worse is, until a couple years ago, the 'Hospital District' (which was also approved by this same council, despite overwhelming opposition from the neighbors), was zoned residential, which means Mayor Scrace and the various councils over

## Park remains among the safest

**GROSSE POINTE PARK** — A Department of Public Safety annual report submitted to city council shows Grosse Pointe Park continues to be among the safest communities in the region.

The report also highlights the efforts of several members of the department for efforts worthy of recognition.

According to the report, a total of 499 crimes were reported in the Park in 2014.

This number is 9 percent less than the five-year average of 545 reported incidents and a 4 percent decrease in the three-year average of 517 reported incidents.

Larceny was the most common occurrence, accounting for 209 reported incidents in 2014, up from 171 in 2013.

Motor vehicle thefts were down from 56 in 2013 to 45, while damage to property incidents were also on the decline in 2014 with 27 reported incidents compared to 37 the previous year.

Non-aggravated assaults rose by four incidents over the past year, from 14 to 18, and burglary with intent increased from 22 to 26.

Obstructing justice saw a marked increase from 36 incidents to 52 as did OUIL or OUID incidents, which climbed to 25 from 22, according to the report.

Overall, the crime trend continues to move downward.

Fighting crime isn't the only duty the public safety department is responsible for on a daily basis.

This crew of officers also fights fires and handles emergency calls in the city, responding to a total of 127 calls in 2014. Calls regarding multi-

unit dwelling was the most notable increase, rising from two calls in 2013 to 30 in 2104.

False alarms continued to comprise the largest chunk of calls, accounting for almost half the calls last year.

The city's ambulance was busy in 2014, responding to 311 runs, according to the report.

The report also noted the more than 1,700 hours of additional education and training officers took part in throughout the year.

The report also listed the department's seven award recipients.

Officer Thomas Card and Sgt Jeffery Longo earned commendations, while the Chief's Award went to Capt. David Loch, Sgt Anthony Blain, Detectives Michael Narduzzi and Jeremy Pittman and Carol Seeman.

## Sentenced to stay away

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — An elderly man being punished for vandalizing the lawn of a Ridgemoor homeowner was sentenced last week to probation, but hasn't heard the last from police.

"I sent an investigator's warrant request to the Wayne County Prosecutor's office for charges of aggravated stalking, a felony," said Detective Lt. Richard Rosati, head of the Grosse Pointe Farms detective bureau.

Due to a shortage of

Wayne County prosecuting attorneys, the warrant request may take months.

"My understanding is there's hundreds of warrants, piled high, waiting to be reviewed," Rosati said.

The offender, Richard Kneeland Ellis, 77, of the City of Grosse Pointe, already was on probation for malicious destruction of property when caught at 3 a.m. Friday, Feb. 13, driving drunk a half block from the victim's house in the 200 block of Ridgemoor.

"It was a violation of probation to commit a crime while on proba-

tion," Rosati said. During a hearing two weeks ago in Farms Municipal Court, Ellis pleaded guilty to impaired driving and violating probation.

Judge Matthew Rumora banned him at the time from all of Ridgemoor, not just the 200 block.

At another hearing Wednesday, March 18, Rumora sentenced Ellis to 24 months probation and ordered him, again, not to contact the victim, an ordinance enforcement officer in the City.

"The victims are fearful of this man," Rosati said.

## New cop cars coming for Park public safety

**GROSSE POINTE PARK** — Council voted to approve the purchase of two new vehicles for the public safety department at its Monday, March 23, meeting.

"The vehicles will be replacing two of our current vehicles," Public Safety Director David Hiller said. "These vehicles are from 2010 and have over 70,000 miles on each of them."

The bill for both comes in at \$51,726.

"We are again asking to go with the Ford Motor

Leasing Program," Hiller told the council. "We would have a three-year annual payment of \$18,405."

The vehicles need to be equipped for public safety duty, but Hiller explained the costs of these renovations are covered through the sale of the used vehicles.

"That's going to be about \$4,500 each," he said. "But that is going to be offset."

The addition of the two vehicles catches the city up with its sequential purchasing, and the costs have been budgeted already, Hiller said.

Councilman Daniel Grano pointed out the difference in cost between the sale price and the price to lease the vehicles as proposed by Hiller.

"There's a \$3,000 difference," Grano said. "Wouldn't it just be better for us to buy these?"

Hiller explained the reasoning behind the decision to lease.

"There's less impact on the budget each year by doing it this way," Hiller said. "It's been very successful the last five years we've been doing it. It turns out, this is a better way to do it."

## Officers awarded for capture of escapee

Shortly after the school day ended Sept. 19, a Grosse Pointe Farms patrolman trying to pull over a man for driving fast near Richard Elementary was soon joined by five officers in a foot chase ending a few blocks away on the Hill.

Pursuit resulted in the tackling and arrest of an escaped criminal from Pennsylvania.

Officers also recovered

a car stolen 10 days earlier in Chesterfield Township.

The car contained a note investigators think was intended for use in a bank robbery.

It read, "No paint packs. No alarms. It's not your money. Give me all the money."

"All officers are to be commended for the professional and safe manner in which a dangerous, wanted felon was taken into custody during a

crowded school dismissal and busy afternoon on the Hill shopping district," said Dan Jensen, director of public safety.

On Monday, March 9, Jensen presented Commendation/Citations to the officers involved: Detective Lt. Richard Rosati, Sgt. Antonino Trupiano; officers Matthew Hurner, Thomas Dionne, Vincent Finn and Lt. Andrew Rogers.

# Alzheimer's — know the 10 warning signs



## Early detection matters

**Q** I am 82 years old. Last week in the middle of a conversation with a friend, I simply forgot what we were talking about. I completely lost my train of thought. Just yesterday, I became disoriented when driving to the beauty salon I've patronized for the past 30 years and couldn't remember how to get there.

**A.** Those can be very scary situations, but don't necessarily mean you have Alzheimer's disease, one form of dementia. There can be other forms of dementia, as well as numerous physical factors that could cause the symptoms. These symptoms include metabolic and endocrine abnormalities (e.g. thyroid imbalance), infection (e.g., meningitis, encephalitis) and impaired cerebral spinal fluid flow causing hydrocephalus, radiation, brain trauma, or stroke. Even urinary tract infections and depression

can contribute to dementia. Physical, neurologic, and psychiatric assessments are essential parts in evaluating dementia. If you are concerned, the best recommendation is to ask your physician for a referral to a neurologist or psychiatrist for a thorough evaluation. The Alzheimer's Association developed a checklist of common symptoms to help recognize the warning signs. It is important to differentiate between Alzheimer's warning signs and normal age related changes. One of the warning signs is disorientation to time and

place. People with Alzheimer's disease can become lost in their own neighborhood, forget where they are, how they got there and how to get home. Normal age-related changes would be forgetting which way to turn to get to a store location that you go to occasionally. While memory loss is another warning sign, there are many issues that can factor into the cause. The 10 warning signs of Alzheimer's disease provides a starting point for your exploration of the disease, its symptoms and treatments. You're asking the right

# Reflect on your relationships

**I**n Japan there is a craft known as "kintsugi." Kintsugi is the practice of restoring valuable china with a golden lacquer. In this manner, the vase increases in value over time, not because its original state has been maintained, but contrarily, because it has been broken and beautifully restored. It is in the golden seams that "healed the brokenness" of the vase that its in-

creased value is to be found. As I reflect on kintsugi vases I think back over the many years of my ministry and my own life, recalling how much time has been spent healing that which was broken. Certainly life is full of abundant blessings, but so, too, brokenness. The experience of brokenness in life is unavoidable, especially when it comes to relationships. Sometimes we simply fail

to hold one another with enough care and consideration. When relationships break, too often we recoil in our woundedness or shame or self-righteous indignation, sweeping up the pieces of our shattered selves only to walk away. At the same time, I have seen times when this doesn't happen;

times when, rather than walking away, people decide to do the hard work of piecing a relationship back together. I have seen people sit together in their woundedness and find a greater strength than the wound itself. I have seen people admit their shame and al-

## PASTOR'S CORNER By Rev. J. Krister Ulmanis

It was only a few months ago I wrote my farewell column as I was leaving my position as interim pastor at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Grosse Pointe Farms. Turns out I didn't move very far — just a few blocks east — and am now serving in the same capacity of interim senior pastor at First English Lutheran Church in Grosse Pointe Woods. I am extremely happy to be staying in the Grosse Pointe area I have come to know and love.

The tail end of the month of March and early April 2015 will be a tremendous week in the life of the Christian churches in our area and beyond. And the reason for that is that during this time period we will celebrate the most important festival of the church year — Easter.

I know many people feel Christmas is the most important event in the church year. But the event the entire Christian faith is centered around is not the birth of a baby in a manger. The event the entire Christian faith is centered around is the new birth for that baby, now as a grown man, which came on Good Friday and Easter day.

Babies are born every day of the year. Though we all think the birth of a baby is something special, the fact that Jesus was born is, in itself, not that surprising

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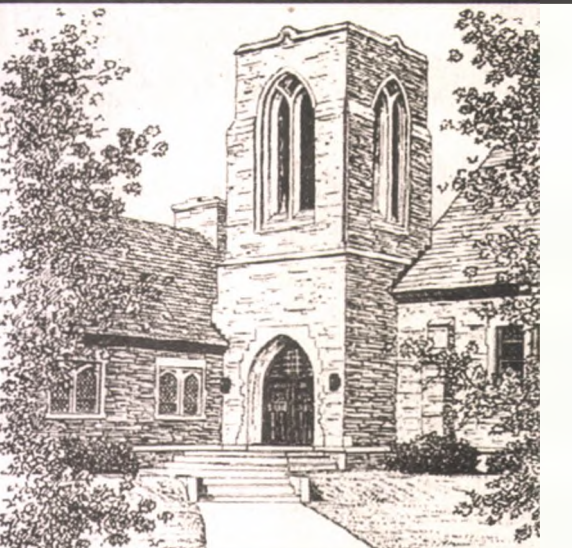
