## GP, meet GP

Grosse Pointe, meet GP, a future service dog for a Michigan veteran in need.

Part of Guardian Angels Medical Service Dogs, Inc., GP is in the process of becoming a partner for a veteran with a disability, which may include traumatic brain injury or PTSD.

GP will be trained for two years at a cost of \$20,000 to \$25,000. Dogs are donated to veterans at no cost to them.

At 4 weeks old, the training has begun at the home of Guardian Angels in Williston, Fla.

Grosse Pointe Shores resident Mary Lamparter has done much for Guardian Angels, initiating fundraisers to help bring service dogs to

Michigan veterans. Lamparter spoke to a group of community leaders recently to garner more support and introduce GP through photos. She said 150 dogs have gone to veterans nationwide through the program, but there's a need for many more. Funding raised locally helps Michigan veterans.

## Questions about proposal

**GROSSE POINTE PARK** — What first appeared to be a routine city council action — approving language of a ballot proposal setting the salary for the municipal court judge — turned into a discussion as to why a district court might better serve the residents of all the Grosse Pointes.

The council, at its Monday night meeting, was voting on ballot language for four amendments to the city charter that will go before residents in the

## Another notch on the Tree City belt

**GROSSE POINTE SHORES** — An intangible that can make a community a destination place also is the reason Grosse Pointe Shores officials seek annual status as a Tree City USA.

"First and foremost, it's a matter of civic pride," said Brett Marshall, chairman of the Shores tree board. "All the Grosse Pointes care deeply about the tree population."

This is the 14th consecutive year the Shores won a Tree City USA award, a confirmation of tree stewardship from the Arbor Day Foundation, based in



## Budget maintains fund

**GROSSE POINTE SHORES** — Next fiscal year's general fund bud-

get totals approximately \$6.2 million.

"Of that, property taxes amount to \$4.7 million," said Grosse Pointe Shores Mayor Ted

Kedzierski.

The city council passed the budget, effective July 1, during its May meet-

November election. During discussion of proposal four, which would change the salary minimum and maximum for the judge, Councilman Dan Grano raised the question of whether a municipal court was in the best interests of Grosse Pointe Park.

Referring to the municipal court system as "archaic," Grano said he was "a strong proponent of a district court which would include the five Grosse Pointes."

The judge's salary is one of the main reasons.

"A district court judge is paid \$138,000 a year, with most of that paid by the state," he said. "We have the Grosse Pointes paying separate salaries. The Farms pays its judge \$12,000, the City pays \$15,000 and the Woods pays \$30,000. If we were to move to a district court system, our share of a salary would be less than what we are all paying now."

Of the \$138,000 salary, the city's contribution would be \$45,000.

Grano was quick to point out he had no prob-

lems with Park Municipal Judge Carl Jarboe.

"I think we have a great judge," Grano said, "but we need to look at sharing. We already share a police chief."

Grano also noted the Grosse Pointes' municipal court judges work part-time while still practicing law.

"These are the only judges who still do that," he said. The Grosse Pointes are the only municipal courts in Michigan, with district courts serving several municipalities being the norm throughout the state.

Councilman James Robson supported Grano, as did Councilman Dan Clark, but he reminded the council municipal courts were approved by the voters.

"The people spoke on this issue quite a while ago," Clark said, adding he supports a district court and has for years, with the discussion going back to council elections in the early 1990s.

"I deemed this issue important enough to campaign for council in support of a district court," Clark said. "The council approved it, but the people voted for a municipal court. And I lost the election. This is

not my hill to die on, but my position has not changed. I support a district court."

To convert the current municipal court system to a district court, according to Grano, only one Grosse Pointe would need to approach the state's court administration officer.

"The structure of a district court is in place and would be easy to adopt," Clark added.

The council set aside discussion of a district court, voting on the ballot language amending the city charter to adjust the salary range for the municipal court judge from \$6,000 to \$30,000. Current charter language sets the range. Current charter language sets a salary cap at \$15,000.

Council also approved ballot language for three other proposed changes to the city charter. Proposal one would remove references to a merit system for city personnel; proposal two would change the number of required monthly city council meetings from two to one; proposal three would remove references to the appointment of supervisors to the now defunct County Board of Supervisors.

Nebraska.

"We've planted hundreds — countless — of trees over the last 14 years," Marshall said. "We try not to plant too many of the same species on the same block to help diversity."

Cities qualify as a Tree City by having a tree ordinance, tree board, Arbor Day proclamation

and spending at least \$2 per capita on trees.

Tree maintenance is important for preserving the urban forest's health.

"It's a matter of monitoring it and removing hazardous trees," Marshall said. "It has to be done to keep the tree population young, vibrant and, most importantly, diversified."

Threats to the tree population include, as always since the 1950s, Dutch elm disease and, beginning in the early 2000s, emerald ash

borer.

A recent discovery is trellis rust, a European fungus that attacks pear trees.

Vulnerable species include Bradford pear, valued in the ornamental landscape for a pyramidal shape and spring colors.

"Bradford pears are becoming harder to plant because of the branch structure," Marshall said. "They split easily as they get older. Aristocrat pears have a different structure and hold together much better."

Forthcoming waves of trouble are Asian longhorn beetle and Hemlock woolly adelgid.

"We'll get through it," Marshall said. "We always do."

## Miller sworn in

Grosse Pointe Park Public Safety's newest sergeant, Michael Miller, was sworn in Monday, May 23, at the city council meeting. Director of Public Safety Stephen Poloni was joined by two dozen past and present Park officers in honoring Miller for his work. Miller was one of 13 officers who competed for the position, which included a written examination, oral interviews and seniority points. Miller has been with the department 18 years and has served as the youth service officer, a member of the ACTION team and field training officer.

"The fact that so many officers are here tonight says a lot about Mike," Poloni said. "I am extremely pleased to promote Mike to sergeant."

ing.

It includes an estimated \$30,000 from this fiscal year, ending June 30, transferred to unreserved fund balance, according to Rhonda Ricketts, finance director.

Unreserved fund balance, also called the rainy day fund, totals about \$1.3 million and exceeds the 20 percent threshold of the general fund recommended by auditors.

Meeting the threshold last year helped the Shores achieve a AAA bond rating, the highest possible, from Standard & Poor's.

"Our finance committee has done a stellar job managing our finances for the last six years, near-insolvent," Councilman Dr. Alexander Ajlouni wrote in an email.

Next fiscal year's budget provides for a full

staff of 18 public safety officers.

Also budgeted are 3 percent wage increases already negotiated with unionized employees.

The employee pension plan is more than 98 percent funded, Bisballe said.

A \$300,000 capital improvement fund is maintained to replace a:

- ◆ 22-year-old dump truck,
- ◆ public works pickup truck that has 160,000 miles on it,
- ◆ 19-year-old commercial lawn mower,
- ◆ public safety cruiser with more than 100,000 miles on it,
- ◆ police car radios and
- ◆ 17-year-old defibrillator in the ambulance, a \$40,000 expenditure being split between current and upcoming fiscal years.

Some \$80,000 is set aside to replace the elevator at city hall.

"The electronics are 1985," Bisballe said. "We had to spend quite a bit of money to get it repaired."

## Not guilty plea in stabbing

**GROSSE POINTE FARMS** — The best hope of a man being prosecuted for taking the life of another could be a sentence in prison lasting something less than life.

"Our goal would be complete exoneration. What is the reality of that? Probably very, very small," said Tim Doty, attorney for David Scott Corzilius, 49, of Warren, accused of stabbing to death Grosse Pointe Farms resident Daniel Edward Clancy, 69, during a home larceny Sunday afternoon, March 6.

Corzilius, originally charged with attempted murder, now faces the more serious offense of felony murder because Clancy died in hospital April 27, nearly eight weeks following wounds to his neck.

"Clancy was in extreme critical condition for about a month," said Farms Detective Lt. Richard Rosati. "It appeared he was recovering, but Mr. Clancy eventually succumbed to his wounds and passed away."

Farms Municipal Judge Matthew Rumora arraigned Corzilius on the enhanced charge Wednesday, June 8.

Corzilius pleaded not guilty.

The procedure doubled as a competency hearing ending with Rumora accepting a six-page report by a state forensic psychologist, dated Monday, June 6, finding Corzilius "competent to stand trial at the time of the current evaluation."

Rumora revoked Corzilius' \$1 million cash-only bond and remanded him to the Wayne County Jail.

A probable cause conference is scheduled at 8 a.m. Tuesday, July 19, followed by a preliminary examination 8 a.m. Tuesday, July 26, both in Farms court.

Doty's prospective defensive strategy challenges criminal competency and cause of death.

Although Corzilius was competent to stand trial June 6, that doesn't mean he was criminally responsible for actions at Clancy's house on Voltaire Place, according to Doty.

"Criminal responsibility is when you understand the nature of what you were doing and that it was a crime," Doty explained.

He also won't accept, without reviewing an autopsy report, a causal link between Clancy's wounds and death.

"Mr. Clancy has passed away and we all feel for his friends and family," Doty said. "We technically don't know what he died from. You heard the detective say, 'succumbed to his wounds.' I need medical records and examinations to say that was or was not true, or they're related or not related at all."

Corzilius is charged with seven crimes:

- ◆ Count 1, felony murder, or murder resulting from the commission of a felony, punishable by life in prison without parole;
- ◆ Count 2, armed robbery, in this case, a knife, punishable by up to life in prison;
- ◆ Count 3, home inva-

sion first degree, punishable by up to 20 years in prison and \$5,000 fine;

◆ Count 4, unlawful imprisonment for binding Clancy with duct tape, punishable by up to 15 years and \$20,000 fine;

◆ Count 5, larceny in a building, for stealing jewelry and paintings, punishable by up to four years in prison and \$5,000 fine;

◆ Count 6, assault with a dangerous weapon, the knife, punishable by up to four years in prison and \$2,000 fine and

◆ Count 7: being a habitual offender, punishable by up to life in prison, because his criminal record includes three felony convictions consisting of larceny from a person in Macomb County in 2001,

uttering and publishing in Wayne County during 2010 and possession of less than 25 grams of cocaine or heroin in Macomb County in 2011.

Police contend Corzilius was working at Clancy's house as a handyman the day before the alleged attack.

"There was a scuffle inside the house that went beyond the home and down the street," Rosati said. "According to (Corzilius') confession, he used a knife Mr. Clancy had in his hand. In that scuffle, he turned that knife on Mr. Clancy and jabbed into his throat and neck area several times."

Doty said Corzilius is a heroin addict and bipolar.

# City man transforms bedtime story

When his daughters were small, Lewis Gazoul made up an extravagant bedtime story to send them off into a fantastical slumber. The story continued to grow and change in his mind and his children soaked up every word.

Years ago, during an uneventful open house, the Realtor began putting his story to paper and rediscovered a hobby he couldn't stop.

"I always liked to write, in high school and college," he said, adding most of his early work ended up in the trash. "I found I wanted something else to do. Writing started coming back to me."

Gazoul started jotting down ideas, drawing from his studies of mythology, the British Isles and Arthurian legends.

"My idea turned into a storyline," he said. "That

storyline developed into something else. It developed into the need for a backstory and the backstory ended up being this book I wrote."

The City of Grosse Pointe resident said the more he wrote, the better he became and his original piece ended up 600 pages long. However, one stolen laptop later and Gazoul had to start from square one.

Luckily, he said, he kept handwritten notes — a method he prefers to this day.

"It was a blessing in disguise," he said of rewriting the tome. "As I rewrote it, I made it better."

To publish the novel, Gazoul had to split it into two books, "Druids of the Faerie: Gather the Champions" and "Druids of the Faerie: Baytel and the Goblin Horde," which were self-published last summer. Grosse Pointe residents helped with editing and artwork.

"People ask when I'm

writing, has anyone read it," he said. "No, but I do have a sounding board. My children ... This book became their bedtime story throughout their childhood."

Gazoul and his wife, Therese, have two daughters, Claire, a Michigan State University graduate, and Camille, a sophomore at the University of Michigan.

"The biggest satisfaction is my kids are able to see something I created while they were growing up and they're sharing it with me," he said, adding a third book in the series, "Pilgrimage of the Faerie," is due this fall. He's working on a fourth and has ideas for a fifth, "and possibly a sixth."

The series, Gazoul said, features several characters who have camaraderie. They are righteous, polite and eloquent, he said.

"What I'm trying to have is my characters be champions of people," he said. "I'm trying to show

that my characters are educated and know how to speak to each other, too, a higher form of English."

The books contain a historic realness, he added, featuring fiefdoms and kingdoms, but also a fantasy element of faeries, dwarfs, goblins and trolls. While the stories originally were shared with his young children, the finished products aren't for young ones. They contain blood and war and death, he said, adding he wouldn't recommend them for anyone younger than middle school.

Despite the violence, Gazoul said his books carry a positive message.

"I wanted people to understand that where we live, how we're able to think and ... live our lives the way we can ... shouldn't take it for granted. We should take care of it," he said.

Gazoul often can be found at Grosse Pointe coffeehouses, scribbling

ideas into a notebook.

"Everywhere I go I am always thinking about what to write," he said. "I always have a little notepad in my car ... I'm still selling real estate. That is my job, but this is such a passion."

"I love doing it ... My ideas come and come and I write them down and incorporate them in one way or another. I love to write. I love to let my imagination flow. It's quite therapeutic."

"My life's dream is to do this instead of real estate," he continued. "I love real estate. It's been my life for 30-plus years ... but it wouldn't be a sad

situation if I got a call from Hollywood that they want to make a movie out of this book."

He also passed along words of advice for new writers.

"Don't give up on your writing," he said. "If you're writing, that's the truest thing to your own heart and soul. It's important that your book is within yourself. If you feel it's done, then it's done. Don't add to it because you feel like you have to make it better. If the critics don't like it, so what?"

## Woman dies in Park crash

**GROSSE POINTE PARK** — Police are unable to employ tire skid-mark formulas to calculate the speed of a compact car that jumped the curb on the north side of Jefferson Saturday evening, June 11, knocked over an Austrian pine and ignited, leading to the death of an 87-year-

old female backseat passenger from St. Clair Shores.

"There were no skid marks," reported City of Grosse Pointe Officer Daniel Eckert, assisting Grosse Pointe Park authorities reconstruct the wreck between Buckingham and Devonshire.

The victim died during transport between hospitals, according to

Stephen Poloni, chief of public safety in both the Park and City.

The driver, a 67-year-old woman from Sterling Heights, and the victim's husband, in the front passenger seat, survived.

Flames were extinguished and the tree removed before the car's occupants could be rescued, according to reports.

"The vehicle was propped upon the uprooted tree," Eckert reported.

He backtracked tire marks on the grass to trace the car's path.

"The vehicle was eastbound (on) Jefferson, crossed the curb at Birmingham, traveled approximately 306 feet along the easement and sidewalk and came to rest after (it) struck the tree," according to his report.



## Consider a trust

Single people who buy a home and apply for a mortgage almost always take title to the property as sole owner. Married people usually take title as joint tenants. With a little thought and the help of an attorney or financial planner, homeowners can see financial benefits by taking title to their home using a revocable living trust. This type of trust is created while you are still alive.

A revocable living trust means you can revoke or amend the trust whenever you wish. To create the trust, you deed your house and any other assets you wish to yourself as trustee. If you are married, both you and your spouse would typically be named trustees.

At the same time, you will name an alternate trustee - an adult child, an attorney or someone else who could take control of the trust should you die or become incapacitated. A trust agreement, which is much like a will, also must be drawn up. Because you are the initial beneficiary of the trust, as well as an initial trustee, you retain complete control of the property as if a trust wasn't involved.

Holding title to the property as a living trust provides several advantages. First, your heirs will avoid thousands of dollars and save a lot of time because your estate can avoid probate court when you die.

Your alternate trustee simply will take over control of the estate assets. Another advantage to the living trust is you minimize the chance that your family will have to ask the court for a conservator or guardian if you become incapable of running your affairs. Again, the alternative trustee would automatically take over and save thousands of dollars in legal fees. You also should know that the living trust can protect the privacy of both you and your heirs after you are gone. Your assets will not be listed in probate court records, which are open to public inspection. There is a cost to setting up a trust, but it is relatively inexpensive compared to the cost of probate fees after you die. Why not take the time to sit down with an attorney and discuss setting up a trust to protect your assets. Peace of mind is worth a lot.

### High standards

The Grosse Pointe Public School System holds its students, staff and families to high standards. An editorial titled "Alarmed" in the June 2, issue contained several inaccurate statements the district must clarify. The proposed changes to our Extracurricular Code of Conduct which go into effect Aug. 1 elevate our standards for all students participating in extracurricular activities to match those that have been in existence for our athletes.

A committee of 17 diverse team members representing parents, coach-

es, counselors, booster presidents, athletic directors and administrators spent four months reviewing the GPPSS Code of Conduct and those of other districts. Full consensus was reached before the draft was presented to the Board of Education policy committee and then the full board. The revised code applies to all extra curricular activities for grades 6-12:

- Increasing the academic rigor for participants with early warning and support systems

- Identifying additional code violations

- Ensuring due process with clear timelines and a method for both appeal and reinstatement

- Reducing ambiguous language and citing specific examples to further clarify.

The district encourages our community to read the full Code of Conduct which is posted on our website [gpschools.org](http://gpschools.org) under Headlines. This information also has been emailed to all parents in the district using our e-alert system.

In the letter to the editor, a specific objection to two components was made. Those include:

- Failure to cooperate with an investigation

- Supporting the Use of Illegal Substances

Page 6 of the Code specifically states: "A student will not be in violation of this portion of the Extracurricular Code of Conduct if the student makes a reasonable effort to remove himself/herself from the inappropriate situation."

Participation in extracurricular activities in the Grosse Pointe Public Schools System is considered an honor and a privilege that entails a commitment by a student to an individual school, the district and the community. This updated code has been thoroughly vetted by legal counsel. Working together with parents, coaches, teachers and community members, our students can meet these high standards. Our community expects no less.

Principal Moussa Hamka is a fine example of what a high school principal should be and we are very fortunate to have him here in Grosse Pointe.

Twice this year, high school students who are proud of behavior the rest of us find deplorable, have embarrassed the Grosse Pointes by exhibiting racist behavior that might have been overlooked in the "old" Pointes, but not now — behavior that used to be considered typical of the Pointes.

Each time, Hamka has acted quickly and decisively to represent the standards of the "new" Pointes, to help us live down that old reputation.

But now I hear that at least one person (perhaps

5111 by a 5-2 margin? Who is "more?" Teachers, union members or officials of the MEA and NEA? How many of them live in our district? No one consulted me, my wife and family, or scores of my neighbors, friends and acquaintances, who pay thousands of dollars in property taxes each year to support our schools. Secondly, Ms. Gafa's claim Policy 5111 is not free is not true. The \$7,550 we receive from the state pays for 57 percent of \$13,226 it costs to educate a student enrolled in our schools. Our district must make up the additional 43 percent shortfall of \$5,676 (\$13,226 minus \$7,550) out of our property taxes. Third, Ms. Gafa's promise, "We will not add students in classrooms where this would require additional staff," is reassuring because many of our classrooms are overcrowded. My children had several classes with 30 to 40 students at North in recent years; courses such as art, pastry, pho-

tography, and physical education, to name but a few. Fourth, Ms. Gafa's argument, "The district has confirmed Birmingham and Bloomfield will be continuing this program as it brings revenue to their districts," is meaningless. Treasurer Brian Summerfield previously admitted: "This is not going to cure our fund equity woes — it's going to help a little bit, but it's not going to get us to 10 percent."

The "elephant-in-the-room" Ms. Gafa, most on the board, and the administration won't discuss is districts like Birmingham and Bloomfield are able to do many things Grosse Pointe cannot do because they hold an Aaa general obligation bond rating that makes bank loans easier to get and less expensive to service. Moody's Investors Service downgraded our credit rating three times in recent years — from Aaa to Aa1 to Aa2 to Aa3 — with a negative outlook assigned to our general obligation bond rating. Today, we are on par with the Farmington Public and Kalamazoo City school districts after their general obligation bond

ratings were cut to Aa3 last year. One more downgrade by Moody's will drop us to A1 and place us on the level of Algonac Community Schools and the Saginaw Intermediate School District, who had their general obligation bond ratings cut to A1 this year. Instead of wasting time and energy on counterproductive proposals like Policy 5111, why doesn't our board strive to improve our general obligation bond rating, so our GPPSS will have a more secure financial future, as Bloomfield Hills and Birmingham Public school systems do? This is another case in point where our board does not work diligently to be transparent, particularly in difficult decisions that impact our budget. Once again, most of them shirked their fiduciary responsibility as stewards of taxpayer money and failed to represent our school system by best serving the interests of our students, which is the most important objective they were elected to perform. If they were to receive a performance review, like most of us do in business, they would be rated "Unsatisfactory" because their performance "Did Not Meet" objectives.

Contrary to claims made by many board members and the administration, Policy 5111 will cost taxpayers money and hurt our students by increasing student-to-

teacher ratios in our classrooms, while doing little or nothing to cure our fund equity woes. It certainly won't entice anyone to move into our district. On the contrary, we will probably lose students, and some residents too, from the fallout of this inane policy. I finally took the advice Ms. Gafa and Mr. Niehaus gave in their letter and visited the budget and transparency section of the GPPSS school board website — I was appalled — the most important piece of financial information is missing. Who in Grosse Pointe is satisfied we have an Aa3 credit rating for our schools with a negative outlook assigned to our GPPSS general obligation bond rating?

Is everyone pleased our district is like Farmington and Kalamazoo, and do we want it to be like Algonac and Saginaw in the future, or would we rather be like Birmingham and Bloomfield? These are the kind of questions voters must seriously consider before they cast their ballots in the upcoming election this fall for board members. Fortunately, one board member recently resigned, but several more are in need of replacement. Our district has tolerated mediocrity from too many of our board members for such a long time that working toward constructive goals for the future has been replaced with fashionable and stylish statements,

politically-correct platitudes, and flowery rhetoric. As an example, Ms. Gafa closed her diatribe with: "We appreciate our teachers and entire staff and the respectful tone and civil discourse that has occurred during this decision-making process. We are OneGP." This kind of jingoistic cheerleading sounds nice, but we won't be OneGP for long if our current school board members are allowed to continue along their merry way. It's interesting, as well as somewhat reveal-

ing, that Ms. Gafa refrains from using the possessive "our" when she refers to words like "board," "district," "students," "classrooms" and "schools." It makes you wonder who she thinks our board, our district, our students, our classrooms, and our schools really do belong to? "New blood" is badly needed on our board in our district for the sake of our students in our classrooms of our schools.







## Coming up roses

### 25th annual garden tour includes nine sites

As a child, Susan Svoboda lived near her grandmother. During each visit, they shared special moments straight away.

"The first thing we would do when we visited each other's houses is we would walk around and see what was new and blooming," Svoboda said. "My mom and my grandma, they're both gone now, they were gardeners. So when I garden, I feel like I'm with them."

Svoboda and her husband, Bill Kishler, wel-

come the public to the gardens at their Grosse Pointe Shores home during the Grosse Pointe Garden Center's 25th annual Garden Tour, Friday and Saturday, June 24 and 25.

When the couple moved to 583 Lakeshore five years ago, there were only trees and shrubs on the property. Svoboda has changed that, planting hundreds of flowers in the front and back yards, including two popular gardens along the sidewalk.

Svoboda's approach to gardening is simple: "I just plant what I like," she said. "I plan it so they rotate, so I'm always

thrilled with what's coming up lately."

Lesley Loffredo plants according to color, a technique she's incorporated the four years she's lived at 725 Grand Marais.

"I tried to do different colors in different areas to keep it interesting," she said, pointing out clusters of white, coral, pink and yellow blooms. "I had previous gardens that were all greens. This one I wanted to turn into a true English garden to match the architecture of the house."

Close to 100 roses dot the landscape of the Grosse Pointe Park home, each selected for their fragrance. The property includes a knot garden and a secret garden.

"It's not for somebody who doesn't want to work," Loffredo said.

In celebration of its

25th anniversary, the Grosse Pointe Garden Center has grown its offerings this year to include "a little more flash" at each home, said co-chairwoman Ginny Brown, noting artists, musicians and costumed actors scheduled during the tour.

At Stephen and Nancy Hansen's home, 350 Stephens, Grosse Pointe Farms, the Ecology Center hosts a conservation table. The garden, cared for by Stephen Hansen, stands out for being pesticide-free.

"I have a pet and a young daughter," he said. "It's safer for them ... I buy plants that are disease-resistant. I put a lot of organic matter into the soil in the spring."

Apart from a variety of plants, trees and flowers, the yard includes a fairy garden and Hansen's favorite feature — a koi pond.

A Master Gardener table is available at the home of Dr. Ned Chalot, 10 Cameron Place. And just down the road at 2 Cameron Place, James

and Harriet Tepel's home includes a Deborah Silver-designed landscape.

"We built the house four years ago," Harriet Tepel said. "The garden, equally as important as the home, was built right along with it."

Featuring climbing roses, pergolas and a parterre garden on the lake-front property, Tepel said, "There are so many different personalities here. I can't take any credit for the design."

Her father's bed frame from his childhood has found a home in her flower bed, adding a personal touch to the grounds.

"I love my home," she said, "but I love my garden."

Laura and Jay Kennedy, 821 Trombley, Grosse Pointe Park, love their garden, too. Laura Kennedy quit working after 18 years to be home with their children. At the time, none of the gardens existed.

"I started with a 5-foot



# War Memorial hosts quilt-themed gardens

There are 10 local garden clubs involved in keeping up the Trial Gardens at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial. Each spring, members create a plot that reflects a theme, which this year is "Quilts — Using Color and Texture to Create Pattern and Design."

"When I heard the theme was quilts, I said, 'I'll chair that,'" said Cindy Pangborn, chairwoman of the Grosse Pointe Shores Garden Club. "I thought, I'd like to see a chair with a quilt thrown over it."

The Shores club hasn't participated in the competition for a while, but elected to this year due to new members, including

Pangborn. The club's plot stands out for the moss-covered chair that bears a quilt of flowers.

"The garden is the chair and the chair is the garden," she said, explaining the woody floor of the plot doesn't require maintenance. The chair is always wet, she continued, so it provides moisture and mold for plant growth. "All the maintenance is done at waist level, so you can work on it if you're in a chair."

Added Shores club president Shirley Hartert, "We focused on making it more handicap-accessible, so the quilt can be handled by a person up in years."

To start the project, titled "Reading in the Woods Under Aunt

Gladys's Quilt," moss was stapled to the upholstery and flowers were sewn into the quilt, in pockets of dirt and fertilizer. As the flowers grow, they'll need to be watered and trimmed, but they'll fill out to look like square sections of a quilt.

The arrangement includes ageratums, wax begonias and creeping Jenny.

"It's a very economical garden," Pangborn said, explaining the chair, a wood table and footstool were all discarded items members collected curbside. A small stack of books and dollar-store glasses complete the display.

"It was a ton of fun," Pangborn said. "Everyone worked on this and it kept evolving until we got it right. We all have a warm place in our hearts for a quilt."

The Trial and Veterans gardens at the War Memorial are featured during the Grosse Pointe Garden Center's 25th annual garden tour, June 24 and 25.

"It's going to be a wonderful tour," Hartert said. Added Pangborn, "There are so many hidden gems all through the

# Revue for renovations

## Fundraiser helps improve GPT rehearsal space

The space at 315 Fisher has long been known as the rehearsal home of the Grosse Pointe Theatre.

Purchased in 1982, the space was converted from a nursing home to host throngs of actors and other theater members over the years.

"Our membership renovated the entire building themselves and converted it to be a proper rehearsal space," said Danielle Caralis, vice president of the theater's board of directors. In addition to hosting rehearsals, the building also is used to store costumes, build and store props, among other uses.

"Over the last 30 or so years, essentially 180 productions have rolled through that building, so you can imagine the wear and tear that has taken place, not to mention the number of people who've been through it," Caralis said.

To combat water damage and breathe new life into the facility by way of flooring, paint, drywall and windows, the Grosse Pointe Theatre hosts "A Future for Fisher Road," a musical revue fundraiser

for building renovations Sunday, June 26.

"We don't often fundraise this way, so this is a special event for us," Caralis said. "As a nonprofit, all the money we generate through ticket sales goes to keep the lights on. It doesn't leave us any extra for repair work. In order to do extra, we need to raise the funds."

"A Future for Fisher Road" kicks off with a silent auction 2 to 3 p.m. at the Grosse Pointe War Memorial, 32 Lakeshore, Grosse Pointe Farms.

"The War Memorial was generous enough to donate the space at our performance theater," Caralis said, adding the silent auction includes big-ticket items like theater tickets, Detroit Tigers paraphernalia, a boat cruise and the weekend use of a member's cottage, among other items.

The auction is followed by a musical performance at 3 p.m. Theater members Don Bischoff, Stephanie Butler, Caralis, Doug Clark, Catie Hauff and Tom Woodman are set to perform.

"There will be six extremely familiar faces up there," Caralis said. "We will come together for a musical revue, called 'The Golden

Age,' with music from movies and musicals from the '30s, '40s and '50s. We're talking big production numbers — old standards and favorites of shows gone by."

Caralis said she and the other performers are looking forward to getting onstage in full costume with a full set and five-piece orchestra.

"It's a full-blown show," she said.

Ticket prices are set at three donation levels: \$25, \$50 and \$100.

"For each increasing level, your donation helps us do more," Caralis said, adding the higher the donation level, the better the seat.

The theater set a goal of raising \$15,000 and hopes to start renovating immediately.

"We hope to get most of it completed before our fall show," Caralis said.

"We are coming off an incredibly successful season," she continued. "We are incredibly thankful for the Grosse Pointe community's support. We sold 15,000 tickets this season. We can't do this without the support of our local patrons and theatergoers."

# No escape

Karl Marx famously wrote, "(Religion) is the opium of the people. The abolition of religion as the illusory happiness of the people is the demand for their real happiness."

His assertion: Religion is an escape. Real life is found in shedding the illusion.

We're an escapist society. So much of our activity is designed to distract us from the harsh realities of an imperfect world. Why would religion be any different?

The reality is most people suffer the deprivations and indignities you and I strive to escape. Efforts to alleviate humanity's suffering often seem futile. Even if we have invested ourselves in making the world a better place, there comes a point we throw up our hands in defeat. At best we pursue "doing good" to salve our consciences. At worst we demand our economic, political and military systems help shore our defenses against the most needy and vulnerable people in our world. Our nation in general and our community in particular are some of the best in history at keeping a suffering humanity at bay.

But we have a problem. Suffering inevitably seeps through our defenses. No matter how thick the walls of our affluence or willed ignorance, we find ourselves face to face with it. An addicted child. A terminated job. An ailing or aging body. Unforeseen and uncontrollable evils assail us. Even religion — our defense of last resort — is

no sure defense against suffering.

In Romans 8, the Apostle Paul spells out the heart of the Christian faith, describing the world's brokenness as inescapable: "Creation groans in pain ... Not only so, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for ... the redemption of our bodies" (Romans 8:22-23).

The Bible paints a picture of a world in pain and a God who, far from ignoring the pain, enters into it. A God who takes on human flesh and dies to atone for human sin. A God who is, even now, intimately connected with the most vulnerable. Utterly contrary to Marx's assertion, Paul argues true religion is belonging to a God who is with the hurting. Far from jettisoning us from the world's suffering, God connects us with it. How is this tolerable? Paul concludes, "... the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans" (Romans 8:26).

God meets humanity in our suffering. He promises one day to heal it. Even as God brings us into greater awareness and more contact with the broken people and places of our world, he gives us the courage and hope we need to engage it. To belong to God is to share his heart for the hurting and his hope in our ultimate healing.

# Dental evaluations: When is the right time?

**Q:** Our dentist hasn't yet said anything about orthodontics for my 6-year-old. Does that mean he won't need it or should I have him evaluated on our own?

**A:** I recommend evaluation for all children no later than age 7 by an orthodontist. Although many people associate orthodontic treatment with young teens, most orthodontists can spot subtle problems with jaw growth even when "baby" teeth are present. Your child's teeth may appear straight; however, there could be a problem only an orthodontist can detect.

I can't emphasize enough how important it is that parents understand the value of an orthodontic evaluation. By age 7, enough permanent teeth have arrived to evaluate how the teeth and jaws meet and work and if the relationship affects a child's ability to bite, chew and speak effectively. Between ages 3 and 5, orthodontists can evaluate airway restrictions such as tonsil and adenoid problems that can affect sleep.

Parents should notify an orthodontist if there are psychosocial concerns or your child is being teased at school. Intervention is necessary to prevent mouth-deforming habits such as thumb sucking, tongue thrusting, lip and nail biting.

A visit to the orthodontist can simply ease a parent's mind. The recommendation may be to "wait and see" while the face and jaws continue to grow. On the other hand, jaw problems may be better treated early, giving the patient a better prognosis for improved function and aesthetics of the adult teeth.

If your child is older than 7, however, it doesn't mean it's too late. Patients

differ both in psychological development and treatment needs and can be treated appropriately.



# Talking Pointes

## Millennials discuss Detroit, diversity and drugs

The fourth installment of Talking Pointes, bringing together millennials to give them a stronger voice in the community, took place Thursday, June 9, at the Grosse Pointe News office.

Emily Goltz, Lewis Thomas and JD Andrews answered questions fielded by Caitlin Rose, marketing specialist for the Grosse Pointe News.

The group was asked their thoughts on Detroit, specifically what comes to mind when they think of Detroit.

"Mostly restaurants and nightlife," Goltz said. "At first when I think of Detroit, I think of going downtown at night."

"We're kind of jaded, because we've seen what it was like 10, 15 years ago," Andrews said, adding he has been "urban exploring" to different areas of Detroit. "But on a national scale, people still make fun of it all the time."

Thomas said the city makes him think of athletics and culture.

"Through different programs I worked with as an undergrad, I went down there for community service," he said.

The scene was differ-

ent for the three when they were growing up. Thomas said he felt like he knew nothing about Detroit then. Andrews said he recalls seeing lots of vacant fields, abandoned houses and broken windows, but his grandfather, who worked for the Detroit Police Department, would praise the city.

"I think we're so close, that makes it easier for us to have a positive view of downtown now," Goltz said.

Andrews said he and his friends debate if it's better to be alive now during the city's resurgence or back during its boom.

"The city used to be amazing," he said.

Panelists agreed Detroit seems to have a "boom" in the works, but issues such as public transportation are hindering that growth.

"It's hard to put in mass transit to a city that wasn't built for it," Andrews said.

The group said they see both sides of the issue when discussing making connections between Detroit and surrounding communities.

"Some are for it and some are against it," Thomas said. "Some people say let's build connec-

tions with downtown and the outskirts, but others say let's make progress until we're golden again and then build bridges."

"It's always going to be split," added Andrews. "People want things to change, but others want things to stay like they are."

The panelists agreed Grosse Pointe is quiet about assisting with Detroit's resurgence.

"Grosse Pointe is pretty quiet when it comes to a lot of things," Thomas said.

"I feel like we're not open to change," Goltz added.

The subject changed to bringing a Detroit nightlife atmosphere to Grosse Pointe.

"My qualm with moving back (to Grosse Pointe after college) was I couldn't go anywhere or eat anything or do anything after 9 p.m.," Thomas said.

Added Andrews, "It's also unsafe. I don't go as crazy as I did in college, but I prefer to walk (home). There's nothing within walking distance here .... Royal Oak has a bunch of bars downtown, but it's also family friendly."

Goltz said she can't imagine Grosse Pointers being OK with intoxi-

cated millennials walking home from bars.

Transportation also was mentioned as a source of connection between the Pointes.

"If the Pointes were all connected, maybe there'd be a little more going on in the Pointes," Thomas said.

Transportation options include Uber, which panelists agreed can be expensive.

The topic moved on to drug use in Grosse Pointe. Marijuana was the biggest issue when the panelists were in high school and none of them learned about harder drug use until after they'd graduated. They said boredom — not having anything to do in the community — was a reason for drug use.

"There's nothing for kids to do in Grosse Pointe, so many are turning to that because there aren't many options," Thomas said. "Alcohol is a big drug of abuse, too .... We get early exposure to alcohol here. There's

easy access .... And what else are you going to do when you're sitting in the basement?"

Recent instances of racism in the Grosse Pointes also was discussed and Goltz said they were a "nice wake-up call for a lot of people here."

"It comes down to education," Thomas said. "We never got exposed to Detroit, so we never got exposed to diversity. Even the Detroit Zoo isn't in Detroit .... If there had been early exposure, the less chance (students) would have done what they did."

Andrews said his mother is a teacher in Hamtramck, so he was exposed to different cultures outside of Grosse Pointe. Goltz, however, said there were "obvious differences in cultures" with a college roommate from Thailand. "If I had exposure to a diverse community, it would have been a little bit easier," she said.

She continued to say issues of race in the Pointes are frustrating because, "people think it's all of Grosse Pointe when it was just those kids," she said. "It's frustrating when that shows up."

Andrews said he wasn't shocked by the racist incidents and Thomas said the fact it wasn't shocking is the saddest part.

Panelists agreed more exposure to other cultures would go a long way in ending racism. Programs with Detroit schools could help, they said.

They all agreed the chances of things changing are close to none as Grosse Pointe seems pretty set in its ways.

"The way it works right

now is nothing ever changes," Andrews said. "I wish there was new light in things."

"People need to be more open to change," Goltz said.

Added Thomas, "We need new ideas .... Our city officials, I have no idea who's really governing here. They have no exposure to anyone under 18."

As for issues swept under the rug in Grosse Pointe, Thomas said race always tops the list.

"A lot of people just don't want to talk about it," he said.

The group discussed missing the Pointe parks while away at college and think residents should take better advantage of having them.

They said Grosse Pointe's reputation, schools and safety are all reasons people choose to stay in the area.

"It's the bubble," Andrews said. "They're comfortable."

As for improving Grosse Pointe, Goltz said in general the community needs to be more open minded.

"And we need to be careful we're not going to play white savior to Detroit," Thomas said. "Just embrace the culture that's there, embrace your culture and come together."





"We can do everything for an interior and exterior of a house. The key today isn't historical restoration, it's historic preservation."

Services include historic restorations, kitchens, baths, basements,





warranty. It's a one-piece system with a protective overhang, ScratchGuard paint finish and it's custom-designed and made at the customer's house.

LeafGuard of Michigan was purchased by John Chambers to be part of 27 LeafGuard branches. Based in Indianapolis, Chambers quickly established a local touch, opening a Michigan location to serve existing clients and grow the base.




row Gushee has ended Bishop Foley's season in the state playoffs.

Sophomore Kelly Solak scored five minutes into the opening half, with senior Kira Borum netting the assist.


After that, the Knights' defense played well in front of junior goalkeeper Kara Francis.

couple of big saves to thwart the Pirates.



In the home half of the second inning, with two outs, Williams singled and junior Ryan Mazzola reached via an error.





The Norsemen had to play on Athens' home turf in front of a boisterous crowd.


It was a scoreless battle until the 15-minute mark of the second half when Athens junior Ashley Leonard scored the lone goal as North lost 1-0.

## Poupard hosts first leadership day

Visitors to Poupard Elementary School's first Leadership Day were met by a student band playing in the parking lot at the entrance. Student greeters at the door shook hands with guests and welcomed them to their school. Invited to learn about Poupard's first year as a Leader in Me school, visitors received a packet with instructions for the day, samples of student leadership notebooks and a bookmark with the motto: "Poupard grows great leaders."

"See for yourselves what our students can accomplish when they are given the chance to be leaders," said Principal Penny Stocks during her opening remarks in the gym. Stocks outlined the process the school underwent last year to earn a grant to become the only

Leader in Me school in the Grosse Pointe Public School System. The four-year \$60,000 grant includes training and all materials except student workbooks.

"Because of the training, we have become better people, better educators and overall bonded as a staff," Stocks said. "This is what can happen if you synergize and begin with the end in mind."

Stocks was alluding to two of the seven habits highlighted in the program developed by Stephen Covey, best-selling author of "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People." The first three habits — be proactive, begin with the end in mind and put first things first — foster independence. Habits four through six — think win-win, seek first to understand, then to be understood and syner-

gize — involve interdependence. Habit seven, sharpen the saw, involves nurturing the whole person through care for the body, heart, mind and spirit. All seven habits were listed in a performance by the Poupard choir.

"You are in for a real treat. We have an amazing afternoon planned for you so you can see all the awesomeness that is Poupard," said DeJa Hill, a fourth-

grader who served as emcee along with third-grader Farae Wilson. The students also recognized Stocks' influence.

"We are motivated to be leaders every day because she has been such a great example to us," Hill said.

Following the presentation, guests were divided into groups for student-guided classroom tours. Among the

# Start spreading the news

## Brownell art student attends New York awards ceremony


Winning a regional Scholastic Art & Writing Gold Key is a big deal, said Margaret Rose, art teacher at Brownell Middle School. Winning a National Gold Key — as eighth-grader Ada Marotzke did this year in the drawing and illustration category for her self-portrait — is an even bigger deal.

Marotzke was among more than 660 creative teens from across the country who gathered at Carnegie Hall in New York City Thursday, June 2, to be recognized as national recipients of the 2016 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards, the country's longest-running scholarship and recognition program for students in grades 7 to 12 administered by the non-profit Alliance for Young Artists & Writers.

"I've been teaching almost 29 years and this is (the) first gold medal a kid has won on a national level," Rose said.

Marotzke also was the only student in Grosse Pointe this year to receive this distinction.

Students across the country and abroad submitted nearly 320,000 works of art and writing. Nearly 18,000 works earned regional Gold Keys and advanced to New York City for national adjudication. Of those Gold Key works, only 2,400 received

national medals.

"The work is in the top 1 percent of art and writing submitted," Rose said.

The opportunity to go to New York for the awards presentation was afforded not just to students and parents, but to teachers as well.

"We felt we had to go to New York," Rose said. "I don't know whether I'll have the opportunity again."

Rose credits Brownell Principal Mike Dibb, "who insisted on finding money to help us out." With a donation from the school store, Dibb was able to help pay for the

flight and stay at the Roosevelt Hotel.

"It was my first time in New York City," Rose said. "We did a lot. Ada and I had time to do sight seeing, we went to Central Park, the Museum of Modern Art. We walked, walked, walked. We went to the best place for bagels and lox. We just had a ball. We squeezed in a lot."

It was Marotzke's first time in New York as well. In addition to sightseeing with Rose, she went to see "Kinky Boots" on Broadway with her mother, who arrived later due to other commitments, but was able to

join her daughter for the awards presentation.

A highlight of the experience was meeting other award winners who shared the same interests and pursuits, Marotzke said.

"That was a really cool thing because everyone there was so talented and it was really cool to see other people who would know what you were talking about and you could relate," she said. "There was an instant chemistry between the other kids who were there."

Special guests honoring the teen artists and writers included actor Alec Baldwin, Project Runway's Tim Gunn and award-winning filmmaker and documentarian Ken Burns, who won a Scholastic Art & Writing Award at 17 and was presented the Alumni Achievement Award.

"It was one of those goose-bumpy nights," Rose said. "The depth of talent, the artwork — it just choked you up. At one point they had the students give the parents and the teachers a standing ovation."

"It was an honor and an adventure I will not soon forget," she continued.

Marotzke, who will attend Grosse Pointe South High School next year, is signed up for Drawing and Painting I. She said Rose taught her a lot about drawing and she looks forward to exploring it more and growing her skill set.

Said Rose, "She has so many things going for her, that kid. She will do well, whatever she chooses to do. What a great way to start off her soon-to-be high school career."

Students' artwork was on display at the Art. Write.Now.2016 National Exhibition June 2 to 12 at the Sheila C. Johnson Design Center at Parsons School of Design at The New School and Pratt Institute's Pratt Manhattan Gallery. The exhibit featured more than 1,000 original visual and literary works and can be viewed at [artandwriting.org/galleries](http://artandwriting.org/galleries).

At each stop on the tour, visitors learned about some facet of the Leader in Me program,

from school-wide jobs, in which each of 294 students in kindergarten through third grade were assigned a leadership job, to Dragon Dens, where students met in cross-grade level groups throughout the year to do

activities structured around the seven habits.

Visitors had the opportunity to review and discuss leadership notebooks with students; meet with town hall leaders responsible for coordinating monthly town hall-style meetings for students, staff and families; learn about the school's video announcement program; talk with student and parent lighthouse leaders; and enjoy the sunshine in the garden while the Green Team presented environmentally friendly student-directed projects, such as the recently installed raised garden bed funded by a grant initiated and written by students.

The afternoon concluded with members of the student, teacher and parent lighthouse team answering questions. In response to their favorite part of the Leader in Me program, students mentioned learning how to use the seven habits at home and school, with family and friends and around people not doing the right thing.

Parent Lorenzo Sewell said the habit impacting his family the most was "being proactive because you're in control of yourself."

Said Sewell, "My daughter and son govern themselves. It's amazing to see the habits they learn in school translate to the kitchen table. We have a common language now. We are able to communicate on the same level and have the same values."

"I'm overwhelmed with pride when I hear my students," said Stocks. "These seven habits are going to stay with (them) for a lifetime."



