



"We are in discussion with Wayne County and it is our intention to pay our taxes in full," he said.



What No One is Talking About

It is difficult to pick up any financial newspaper or magazine without at least one article devoted to the new Department of Labor (DOL) Fiduciary Rule. Brokers, bankers and other advisors compensated by commissions are scrambling to comply. The new rule

has three basic standards of conduct: acting in a client's best interest, receiving reasonable compensation for a recommendation and making no materially misleading statements to clients. What no one seems to be talking about is the new rule only applies to

retirement accounts. The rule seems simple enough, if you apply the Golden Rule to every decision you make and advice you offer it is a non-issue. However, if you receive compensation through commissions you may be tempted to recommend an investment that pays you the highest commission, rather than offers the best outcome for the client. Alternatively, as an advisor you may be

using expensive mutual funds because the fund companies take you out to lavish dinners, or offer you discounts for conferences, or invite you to golf outings or exclusive events.

In just the last month headlines in InvestmentNews were indicative of the rule's effect on big banks and brokerage firms: "DOL Fiduciary Rule [Brokerage Firm] Changing Stance on Mutual Fund Commissions in IRAs", "DOL Fiduciary Rule Pushes Indexed Annuity Carriers to Develop New Products", and "[Bank] Advisors Restricting Investments for Retirement Accounts". There is very little coverage in the press regarding bankers and brokers perhaps now being incentivized to make up

the lost compensation from retirement account commissions and other fees. After tax accounts: 529 savings, UGMAs, Living Trusts, joint, and individual brokerage accounts, etc., are only subject to the suitability standard rather than working in the best interest of their clients.

For example, a broker/ banker may use a low cost Large-Cap index in your IRA like iShares Core S&P 500 (IVV) with an expense ratio of .04%, while using an expensive mutual fund like American Funds Growth Fund of America C shares (GFACX) with an expense ratio of 1.46% (1% is paid to the brokerage firm or bank) and a 1% back-end load in your joint brokerage account. The

GFACX has consistently underperformed its benchmark in eight of the last ten years, while IVV has performed in-line with the returns of the S&P 500 for the same period. (Refer to "Tuition Bills Are Painful Enough" that appeared March 30, 2017 for another example of brokers and bankers not working in the best interest of their client).

Ironically, we may see at some point in the future legal proceedings where a banker/broker is subject to damages or penalties for using an investment in a retirement account, but receives a pass for using the same investment in a non-retirement account. Investors must remain diligent and be aware of how their banker/broker

is compensated, and ask themselves whose best interest comes first.






"May the footprints we have left here at South be followed by others and continue to lead us down new paths of adventure," she said.



Hamka closed by saying, "I am optimistic about the future of our












