PARENTS BLAMED IN ACCIDENT MISHAPS

Children Shielded From Police Action In Law Violations

Spending Tickets Mean No More Than Movie Tickets to Pampered Youngsters, Letter to Grosse Pointe News Claims

The Grosse Pointe News has received the following letter from J. R. Sutton, Jr., who is the Commissioner of Police in Grosse Pointe Farms:

"Recently, there has been an increasing incidence in fatal automobile accidents, involving our young boys and girls of school age. Statistically, the first thought is to put the blame on the various police departments of the community for failing to curb the speeding. Admittedly, the Police do not do everything humanly possible to check speeding, but in the case of the trouble lies with the parents who are responsible for the safety of their children. It is not the fault of the police to take their boys and girls to task, or simply don't know where they go, or what they do."

Rabaut Goes To High Post In Congress

Seniority Rule Puts Grosse Pointe's Representative In Powerful Position

Grosse Pointe's representative in Congress, Louis C. Rabaut, has succeeded to one of the most powerful positions in the House. Through the seniority rule which requires representatives to serve consecutive terms at the foot of the class and climb up as places ahead of them are vacated, Mr. Rabaut has become chairman of the subcommittee on appropriations for the State, Justice and Commerce Departments.

Three members of the President's Cabinet, the solicitor-general of the United States and the chief justice of the Supreme Court will appear before Mr. Rabaut and his committee to advocate appropriations for such activities as the State Department's foreign service and the conduct of international relations; J. Edgar Hoover's Bureau of Investigation, whose Government is fighting out fifth columnists and saboteurs; the entire Federal judicial system; the Civil Aeronautics Board which administers the laws regulating and controlling commercial aviation; the most highly developed penal system in the world and others.

To take this post, Mr. Rabaut is giving up the chairmanship of the appropriations subcommittee for the legislative branch of the Government, which is one of the most powerful in the House. He had to leave the committee because he was not a member of the House when it was created. He is now a member of the House and is in a position to make the largest percentage reduction of all the bills sent to the Congress.

POINTE WOMEN AID RED CROSS

Mrs. Dwyer and Mrs. Robinson Heading Important Divisions

Lady Stella Reading, chairman of the Women's Voluntary Service Organization in England, has requested the American Red Cross to send 20,000 air raid shelter kits for women.

The Detroit chapter has accepted a quota of 1,000 of these kits to be filled and sent immediately. The kits are designed to be used by women who are forced to leave their homes without warning or preparation and will be distributed at the air raid shelter in England.

They will contain a comb and mirror in case hair goes out of place, soap, toothbrush, tooth powder, soap, armers, buttons, safety pins, handkerchiefs, spoons of thread, needles, darning cotton, absorbent cotton, band aids, gauze bandages and flash lights.

This movement has been made by Mrs. J. Vincent Dwyer, of Lakeland, Grosse Pointe, chairman of the production corps of the Detroit chapter. A. R. C. Mrs. Dwyer reported that the Detroit chapter is rapidly reaching its quota of 60,000 garments to be shipped by January 15. This quota involves work done during a three-month period.

The surgical dressing division, under Mrs. W. Dean Robinson, has completed training women in surgical dressing instructions and has started on the quota of 50,000 surgical dressings which the War Department requested.

Another Is Killed As Machine Cracks Up On Lake Shore

One Girl Dies and Five Others Injured as Car Full of Youngsters Piles Into Trees at High Speed

The toll of last week's traffic accidents in Grosse Pointe was one dead, five seriously injured.

In an accident that occurred early Thanksgiving morning on Lake Shore drive near Seven Mile road, six boys and girls in their teens were involved. One girl was killed and five were injured. It was the third fatal fatality in Grosse Pointe within a week.

The car, driven by David Rieck, 16, of 206 S. Clair, spun out of control on east side of Lake Shore drive, crashed into the driveway, bounced a large tree and turned over.

On 11 Dead

Marjorie Alexander, 16, of 1164 Lenox, avenue, who was riding in the back seat, was killed when admitted to the Grosse Pointe Hospital.

Young Rieck, a suffered skull and internal injuries of his Samuel Davidson, 17, of 1442 Westlawn, and Miss Jay Austin, 14, of 422 Hastings street, Detroit.

Rieck has now been removed to the Detroit Receiving Hospital where his condition is reported as critical.

Austin was taken home from Cottage hospital Thursday morning.

The other occupants of the car, Roy Tashman, 16, of 2728 Westlawn, and Ruth Jewell, 15, of 1115 Gray were taken to the Cottage Hospital and released. All are pupils of the Fox Intermediate School in Detroit.

Are No Witnesses

There were no witnesses but police believe that the car must have been going at a terrific rate of speed when it crashed into the driveway curb, turned over and plowed its way 50 feet into several trees.

The car was driven very quickly and worked for more than half an hour extracting the trapped passengers.

Levi Joseph Tremblay and Sergei Eugene Boda are in charge of the investigation, but as yet have not been able to question Rieck, due to the seriousness of his condition.

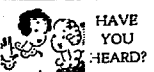

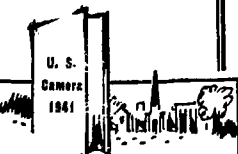

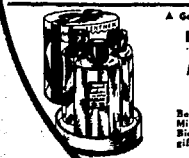
