

City Police Chief Replies To Story On Radio Systems

Trombly Defends Independent Wave Length in Use by Department of One of the Five Grosse Pointes

Chief of Police Thomas V. Trombly of the City of Grosse Pointe, has sent the Grosse Pointe News the following letter:

Dear Editor: Much has been said recently about the Grosse Pointe radio system service and wave length in use at the present time.

"The WRDR radio on Eight Mile Road in Grosse Pointe would now service all of Grosse Pointe."

The City of Grosse Pointe's three-way radio operates on a frequency of 27,000 cycles and of 5 watt power, which is a radio of approximately one mile. We have receivers and transmitters in four scout cars which are serviced by this radio. The radio operation from car to car or station to car, is not necessary for an operator in the car to pick up a receiver and talk to another car. This is done by the station operator. This is a necessary in case of emergency within the City. In addition to the radio, the City is in the Wayne County and State Police.

The "recent article in your paper referred to the pursuit of a speeding car by one of our City scout cars, stating that the City had been on the same radio wave length as the rest of the Township units, direct had, broadcasting the call to the other districts and the car not followed by a car so unsuited to the purpose."

However, a speeding car traveling in excess of seventy miles an hour would be out of the district before contact could be made with other units through the radio station inasmuch as in this instance the pursuing car developed mechanical trouble and went out of commission at the eastern line of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms.

"Every Police Officer and each of the Firemen in the City are licensed radio operators for the type of equipment (three-way) used in the City of Grosse Pointe Police Department. The Federal Communication Commission insists upon the additional requirement that at least one man on call must be a radio operator."

"During the five years that the City has had its own radio system in service, it has been satisfactory and economical to operate."

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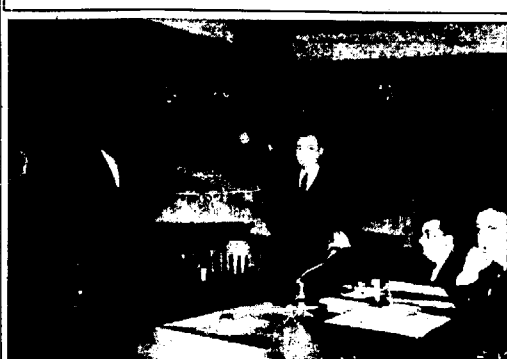

Swimmers Beat Youthful Speeder Trenton Team

The Grosse Pointe High School swimming team chalked up its second victory of the season as they overcame the Trenton High School, 55 to 20, last Thursday afternoon in the local pool.

Having begun its season with a 40 to 35 victory over Pontiac the week before, the Grosse Pointe squad had very little trouble in continuing its victory march from the Trenton team. Trenton was only able to win one of them though they managed to finish second in three races.

Opening the meet with the 40 yards free style event, Blue Devil Ray Weaver sprang the distance in 20.2 seconds to take first place while John Brink, also of Grosse Pointe, finished second in 21.8 seconds. Third was left to Byard of Trenton.

"Sword" Carlson and Bud Lester both of Grosse Pointe, took all of the points that the 100 yd. breast stroke race had to offer, Carlson taking first in 1:11.1 and Lester second. Third was left to Byard of Trenton.

Wally Pritchard took first with 2:47.8 and Frank Mumford took second in the 220 yd. free style event. Carlton finished third in 5:20.2.

Ben Orr, one of the youngest members of the squad, finished first in the 100 yd. back stroke race with a time of 1:13.8. Second and third went to Trenton with Kennedy and Williamson finishing in that order respectively.

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Plan to Consolidate Five Pointes In One City Causes Comment

Unusual Interest Aroused Among Citizens; Suggestion Made That Commission Be Appointed to Look Into Matter

Unusual interest has been aroused among the citizens of the five Grosse Pointe communities by the suggestion advanced in the News last week regarding the consolidation of all five municipalities under a city charter.

The thought on the part of the News was that the consolidation now under way in the Park from the change from village to city status. Obviously there is a substantial group of citizens in the Park who believe that certain tangible advantages would accrue to the people there by such a change. A special committee of the Citizens' Association has been formed to study the subject for nearly a year and we are informed that in the near future this organization will be ready to present a detailed series of facts and figures for the information of the citizens.

In Natural Query Inasmuch as one of the Pointes has already within the last few years changed to a city form and another one is already seriously considering a like change, the query naturally arose why it might not be advantageous for all of them to unite under a single city charter. Such a change would obviously hold promise of reducing municipal overhead and leading to uniformity of public service not possible under five separate municipal organizations regardless of their structure.

Several of the civic minded citizens of the Pointe communities have already expressed themselves on the subject. There is a general unanimity that the loss on the surface seems to suggest a better return for the taxpayers' money in the public service and also that it merits serious study by a commission of citizens representative of the whole Pointe area.

Should Be Advantageous Harrison Watson, attorney and resident of Grosse Pointe City, said that upon first glance a consolidation of the five Pointe communities under a city charter should be of advantage to the taxpayer. Centralizing in a single group of officials the functions now carried on by five separate groups should save money. "It is also reasonable to assume," Mr. Watson added, "that a consolidation of the five municipalities would make for a more efficient administration."

Mr. Watson suggested that one of the first and most difficult problems to be adjusted in the early steps toward consolidation would be to arrange a mutually acceptable plan under which the now existing bodies of the five separate municipalities could be taken over by the proposed new city or some plan within the present structure of the law, which would permit the consolidation and the city to carry on its present debt to final amortization and meanwhile make its proportionate contribution to the maintenance of the created city of which they were an integral part.

Could Be Problem He believed however that if the advantages of a consolidation under a city charter were sufficiently apparent to win the approval of the taxpayers, the ways and means could be found to accomplish them under existing law. He thought the suggestion was of sufficient merit to warrant the naming of a commission made up of representatives from each of the four villages and the City of Grosse Pointe, to go into the subject thoroughly and treat with every angle of the problem.

Erna Lockwood, attorney and resident of the Farms said that any advantage to be gained by the taxpayer by a consolidation would be a matter to be lightly regarded. Without having gone into the matter at all she thought it was reasonably obvious that economies could be effected which might be lost to the plan would best be discovered by naming a competent committee or commission of citizens representing the entire Pointe area to study the subject thoroughly.
