



The graph above shows that these grades (grades 10 and 11 and 12, the sophomore, junior, and senior years at the high school) have increased from 73 pupils in 1924 to 1066 pupils at the present time, an increase of 1360 per cent! These figures, released by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, illustrate effectively why the high school building — the only senior high school in the public school system — has become overcrowded again. 




