The Fire Survey

The move initiated by Mayor Rummey of Grosse Pointe city for a survey of the fire protection facilities of the three communities of Grosse Pointe Park, City and Farms is to be commended as is any undertaking that aims at a betterment of the municipal service. Whether or not there is need for improvement will of course be disclosed after a careful examination of the subject has been made.

It may not be amiss however to point out here that such surveys are all too often the prelude to an unwarranted increase in the cost of municipal government. According to Mayor Rummey's own figures, published in the News recently, there are already 59 firemen in the three municipalities involved. This number of firemen, according to these same figures, provides one man to every 105 houses, most ample personnel for suitable protection. If the department is operated on the two platoon system, leaving a man to each 220 properties, it is still a most generous provision. If the two platoon system is not adopted, it must be remembered that the other half of the fire fighting force is always subject to call, wholly or in part, for second, third or general alarm fires.

So far as the quality of the mechanical equipment of the fire department is concerned there can be no argument if the coming survey shows that all or any part of it is not thoroughly modern and up-to-date. The Grosse Pointe communities, with their unusually high unit property values, will be satisfied with equipment that is better than the best.

Another feature of the general fire protection subject, which must be considered in justice to the citizens who must be faced with tax increases, is the fact that these municipalities appear to have a relatively small number of fire hydrants. The high proportion of detached dwelling houses, the absence of industrial properties stored with inflammable materials, the large proportion of properties of brick and stone construction, and the high intelligence of our people conducive to order and property cleanliness which does not tolerate the accumulation of combustible materials about the premises, are all important factors making for a fire protection which is not as serious a problem as it is in many other communities. The commission which is to undertake the examination of this problem should keep eternally in mind the important relationship of the taxpayer to the subject. The President, Mr. Knudsen and other leaders in the national defense movement have called upon the country for an all out defense effort by the nation, but the political end of the administration operates against this very effort. With one hand it warns that no element in our population shall profit out of war and with the other it encourages that no concessions are to be made even during this period of desperate national need in "the advantages which labor has gained in recent years." In other words all must make sacrifices, except labor.

The nation's peril is frankly conceived by the Federal authorities to be labor. They call upon all to make sacrifices, then cheerfully acquiesce in the enforcement of a labor union rule which compels the humble carpenter who presents himself for work at a cantonment to pay a union initiation fee of \$50 or \$75.
