Complete Returns Show Community Cast Ballots Much As Rest of County

Complete returns from the five Grosse Pointe municipalities show Pointers in accord with the Wayne County final tabulation of spring county primaries held Monday.

Only six candidates out of 38 nominated by the Pointers lost out in the complete county balloting. Judges Lester Moll, Joseph Moynihan, and Homer Ferguson head the list of Grosse Pointe returns as voting in the primary was slight. With only 3,000 out of a possible 10,000 persons going to the polls.

The Grosse Pointe candidates, Theodore Richter, Henry Nichol and William Connolly, were out in a close fight for county auditor. The ability and wisdom of Judge Moll were all nominated.

Grosse Pointe Park Minute Men Form Organization to Combat Move and Promise to Wage Fight Against Campaign

Opposition to the proposed city plan for Grosse Pointe Park, sponsored by the Citizens' Association of that village promises to assume tremendous proportions before March 10th, when it will be voted on.
