

These were merely convenient jumping off places from which to plunge into what our government at the time regarded, and correctly, as an in-

The time had come in the Great War when it appeared unless America gave instant and substantial aid to Brit'. In and France they would be crushed and Germany attain the hegemony of Europe. With Europe under the Teutonic heel there would be not more than a breathing interval before he would challenge the primacy of America in the Western world. That was true then and the developments of the last months emphasize with tragic clearness the identical ation now, infinitely more imminent and more perilous.

Stuttion now, immirely more immerication more persons.

German foreign policy has not changed since the days
of Frederick the Great. General Frederick von Bernhardis
pronouncement that "Germany must have world dominion
or perish" occurring in his work "Germany and the Next
War" published shortly before the outbreak of the last war,
went far at that time to open the eyes of thinking Americans to the true situation.

to the true situation.

In all essential respects this remains the same. Germany has gone much farther in the schievement of her goal. The peril to America is far greater. Whether we like the British government or the English people has little to do with the question. Its principles and way of life are our principles and our way of life. The way of our own self interest need be our only guide. Our course of action is clear. All puny considerations of wages or profits must be junked in the shadow of National peril. This country must take every step at the quicket possible moment to carry aid to Britain.

We are faced with the imminent besshillity of world

We are faced with the imminent possibility of worl We are faced with the imminent possibility of world political and economic domination by a power which, gauged by its own pronouncements and acts within the last three years, we know to be as ruthless and harbaric as any that has visited the world since the days of Genghis Khan or Tamerlane. This country abhors war, but not all war. Wars fought for freedom and for the perpetuity of our own way of life might be of a holy quality. The institutions which we cherish came to us through our own sacrifice and courage: they were never the gift of foreign powers or peoples. Mere wishful thinking can easily lead to downfall.

We must send every needed thing to England's aid. If

We must send every needed thing to England's aid. If Germany sees fit to interpret this as war; so be it. Our only concern need be that we are right. Any other consideration has but a single foundation: cowardice.


