

Don't Be Misled By Proposed Budget:

Don't Be Misled By Proposed Budget:

At the last minute the Township officials have prepared the new budget for the coming fiscal year, showing decided decreases in estimated expenses. Practically no reduction has been made where duplication in government exists. The total expenditures still remain high. The Township, received a windfall in delinquent tax collections and large sums in refunds from the County Treasurer, reducing the amount of taxes to be collected this year. This is not likely to occur again.

This is obviously a last supreme effort to defeat the City Incerporation proposal. It does not change the fact that saving can be made by permanently ridding ourselves of Township taxes. Park taxpayers paid 539,000 Lest year. What will be paid when future budgets are drawn? Is this an admission that the Township taxpayers have been soaked?

Confusion of Mochine Dadies.

Confusion of Machine Politics:

The opponents of the plan, who have been identified with the Garska machine, in defending the jobs of the Township politicians have made deliberate mis-statements of figures; have twisted the proposal to suit their own arguments and in fact have tried to read into the plan things that are not contemplated — the obvious purpose is to confuse the people.

Public Health:

Opponents have misrepresented what will happen to this service and have resorted to the trick of playing on the fear of the people. No person of sound mind would want the public health jeopardized and the plan does not contemplate doing so. The duties of the Health Board are technical. It is headed by a doctor who runs it as he deems most beneficial—it functions as a separate unit. The Health Board was independent of the Township not so many years ago.

Police Radio:

TOILUE KARIO:

The City Plan does not abolish police radio. Three methods are pointed out by which this service may be handled by the new city.

1. Subscribe to the present Township radio service.

2. Combine with the City of Grosse Pointe.

3. Establish our own radio system as did the City of Grosse Pointe.

The City Plan does not require the adoption of any specific one of these methods. Which method should be used is a technical police problem. We entrust the protection of our lives and property to our own local police, not to the Township; therefore, we surely can trust that they will decide which is the proper way to handle police radio.


