

SCHOOL CHORUS TO SING BALLAD FOR AMERICANS

Combined Singing Organizations of Senior High to Be Heard in Great Work

In a program interpreting the American spirit, "Ballad for Americans," by John LaTouche and Earl Robinson will be sung by the Grosse Pointe High School chorus, and a guest baritone soloist, in the Pierce Junior High School Auditorium, May 28. The chorus is a combination of the girls' glee club, boys' glee club, and a Capella choir. "The Call of Freedom," by Victor Herbert, and "Fratello Jehova," by Felix Mendelssohn, will also be sung by the chorus.

Soloist Not Picked
The soloist, who has not yet been decided upon, will contribute a recital to the program. "Ballad for Americans" was first sung by Paul Robeson and a chorus, on the CBS Radio of the American Program, November 8, 1939. This modern chorus is based on four highlights in the history of the United States: The Revolution, the growth of the Union, the Civil War, and the Machine Age.

John LaTouche, who wrote the words, came from Richmond, Virginia, to study at Columbia University. He won poetry awards at the university for two successive years, 1934 and 1935. He met Earl Robinson when both were submitting material to the Federal Theatre project. They wrote several other compositions, but "Ballad for Americans" remains their outstanding work.

Ed Symphony Groups
Earl Robinson played the viola in the University of Washington symphony orchestra. He sang in the men's glee club and mixed chorus and conducted the symphony orchestra in a program of his own compositions.

Grosse Pointe High School teacher Marietta Lannon, 30A, The Clyde Batty of Grosse Pointe High School is really busy these days training wild opossum.

This opossum, which is five or six months old, was given to the school by Chavney McElargie, 11B, whose sister found the animal in a tree in a woods near Birmingham.

Has Pouch For Young
The opossum is a very interesting animal. The most primitive of the mammals, it is related to the kangaroo family. It carries its young in a pouch, being the only pouched animal in North America.

A rather stupid animal, it is easily frightened. When full grown, it's about the size of a cat, it has a rat-like tail, long black and white fur, a long white pointed face, and paws which resemble human hands.

The biology I classes are studying learned responses in animals. In this connection they are studying the opossum's reactions and will

note the rapidly and extent of its learning power.

Aheadon Gloves
Marietta has taken it upon herself to tame the animal. She wears gloves at first upon entering the cage but has abandoned them. She admits she gets bitten once in a while but doesn't seem to mind. She now has a little harness for her pet.

"She's making progress," stated Mrs. Myrtle Wagner, instructor. "She can get him and he is growing accustomed to her."

While the picture was being taken the opossum slowly relaxed and began to get interested in what was going on around him. He curled his tail about the edge of the table, snuggled his heady eyes, and looked really interested.

Of course, everybody has heard of playing possum. Those who want to see how it's done should go down to 124 and watch this funny little animal—he started it all.

Pupils Sense Utopia; Lessons from Movies

Since "visual aids" have been introduced into classrooms, students of Grosse Pointe High school have a new dream of Utopia—throwing away books and learning their lessons by going to movies.

This winter visual aids have become an increasingly important part of the school to help students grasp ideas that they can't readily see and understand.

"The aids" are projected on the screen as slides and silent and talking pictures. Graphs, charts, and maps, as well as the movies, help to dramatize and clarify ideas. As an example, recently in W. A. Mann's physics class pictures of "The Transportation of Energy" and "The Molecular Theory" clarified the students' understanding of difficult theories.

Slides Simplifies Used
When an idea can be put across without involving motion, slides are used. When ideas involving motion is wanted, silent movies are shown, and when an idea that requires sound and motion is wanted, regular talking pictures are shown, although many ideas are sufficient illustrated by means of slides, graphs and maps.

"Visual aids" have been used in natural and physical science classes, journalism, Latin, home-making.

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Draftees Invited to Tell Of Special Qualifications

Information On Particular Experience Of Selectees Would Help Board In Making Assignments To Various Branches

(This another of a series of articles being written expressly for the Grosse Pointe News by Judge Joseph Belanger of the Local Selective Service Board.)

Your Local Board has received many inquiries from registrants requesting information as to the branch or arm of service, the station, unit, and duty to which he would be assigned upon induction. In addition, many registrants state they have special qualifications or special training which they desire to have taken into consideration in making assignments. This desire for such information is understandable inasmuch as the average selectee is desirous of continuing along lines, while in the army, which he has followed in civilian life, or of endeavoring to do so.

It is the policy of the Selective Service Act, as amended, to require that each registrant be classified in accordance with his special qualifications. Such evidence should be included in or attached to the questionnaire, and may include any documents, affidavits, or other evidence which the registrant deems to be of value in making assignments. The Selective Service Act, as amended, provides that the Selective Service Board shall have the right to require any registrant to furnish such evidence as it may deem necessary to assist the Local Board in determining his proper classification. Such evidence should be included in or attached to the questionnaire, and may include any documents, affidavits, or other evidence which the registrant deems to be of value in making assignments.

Any person other than the registrant who has cause to claim that the registrant should be deferred on the basis of his special qualifications should be notified by the Local Board. Such notification should be in writing and should be filed with the Local Board. The Local Board will then have the opportunity to consider the claim and to make a determination thereon. If the Local Board determines that the registrant should be deferred on the basis of his special qualifications, it will so notify the registrant and will also notify the Selective Service Board. If the Local Board determines that the registrant should not be deferred on the basis of his special qualifications, it will so notify the registrant and will also notify the Selective Service Board.

Consideration of the claim of a registrant that he is a conscientious objector is a matter of special importance. It is the policy of the Selective Service Act, as amended, to require that each registrant be classified in accordance with his special qualifications. Such evidence should be included in or attached to the questionnaire, and may include any documents, affidavits, or other evidence which the registrant deems to be of value in making assignments. The Selective Service Act, as amended, provides that the Selective Service Board shall have the right to require any registrant to furnish such evidence as it may deem necessary to assist the Local Board in determining his proper classification. Such evidence should be included in or attached to the questionnaire, and may include any documents, affidavits, or other evidence which the registrant deems to be of value in making assignments.

The registrant should be notified by the Local Board of the results of the consideration of his claim. If the Local Board determines that the registrant is a conscientious objector, it will so notify the registrant and will also notify the Selective Service Board. size to find out who started such rumors and "tell them to the crew." He alluded to talks with Mr. Kelly and his attorney, Mr. Lynch, in an effort to get them to sign affidavits saying Mr. Damman had never asked for or received any money from them. He did not obtain them.

Mr. Pfeffer, mumbling disapproval of the way the subject was handled, would not charge on the matter when later questioned by the News, but was hard to ask Mr. Damman if he and Mr. Pfeffer could discuss the matter further in private session following the meeting. It was learned that Mr. Pfeffer, stating he did not feel well, had requested that this private discussion be postponed until Saturday afternoon.

The background of this matter

Investigation by the News disclosed, goes back to 1929, when William Kelly, of 10509 Charleville, applied to the Park Commission for approval to seek a liquor license. It is necessary for the commission to grant such approval before the State body will consider granting a license. At that time Commissioner Pfeffer offered the motion that the approval be granted. It was, but the State later refused to grant the license.

Last March 12, while President Goddard was in Florida on vacation, Mr. Kelly and his attorney, Raymond J. Lynch, sought approval from the Park Commission to apply for a license. This time Mr. Pfeffer, supporting the motion, when he saw he was alone in opposing the granting of approval, Mr. Pfeffer asked to change his vote and the approval of the commission became unanimous.

Questions Damman It is understood that the following day Mr. Pfeffer asked Mr. Damman if he had taken any money from Mr. Kelly. When Mr. Damman denied the allegation, it is reported Mr. Pfeffer went to Mr. Kelly and Mr. Lynch who were insulted at being suspected of having offered or given a bribe, and refused to have anything to do with the matter.

Upon hearing of the act that was being called, Mr. Damman asked that the entire commission when he said that not a single member of that body questioned Mr. Damman's integrity for an instant.

The meeting closed with the commission approving Mr. Damman's motion to grant approval to a request from the Homeing Pigeon Society of Grosse Pointe for permission to apply for a Class A liquor license.
