Enrollment in Grosse Pointe's schools increased by 309 students from March 1940 to March 1941, according to latest figures just released by the Board of Education. This represents a gain of 6.79 per cent.

Total enrollment now is 4,861, of which number 2,550 are in the elementary schools, 1,197 in the two junior high schools, and 1,111 in the senior high schools.

2 teaspoons baking powder

It is the best to bake this bread the day before using.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) until crust is brown and crispy. About 45 minutes.
