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## Greenberg Praises Painter and Raps Remainder of Board

Local Draft Board Figures In Accord With State Average

Current Arguments As To Number Deferred and Classification of Draftees are Answered by Official Release

Complete figures through April 1 released by Lansing headquarters of the selective service department disclose local draft Board 57 is in accord with records of the other state boards.

Board 57 has 10.4 per cent of its registrants in 1A as compared to 11.6 per cent for the state total.

This officially answers the pro and con remarks circulating that the local Board's classifications were different from the majority of draft boards.

Other figures show that 1.9 per cent of Board 57's registrants are deferred because of occupational reasons as compared with the state total of 2.2 per cent. In the classification for 5A, the local board has 22.4 per cent, while the state average is 21.8 per cent.

Monthly figures in 1A and 1B reveal only 25 men in 1A and 147 men potentially 1A but awaiting physical examination.

1143 Men Are Classified  
The draft board has a registration of 2118. Of this total 1145 men are now classified. Also announced was the fact that 92 men have already been deferred because of occupational reasons.

Of interest in the local registration is the fact that only 45 colored men are enrolled at the board. There are also three Filipinos, one Mexican, and two Orientals registered.
