City of Grose Pointe police this week caught up with four youths who broke into the Phil Galt Beer store at 15332 Mack more than a month ago.

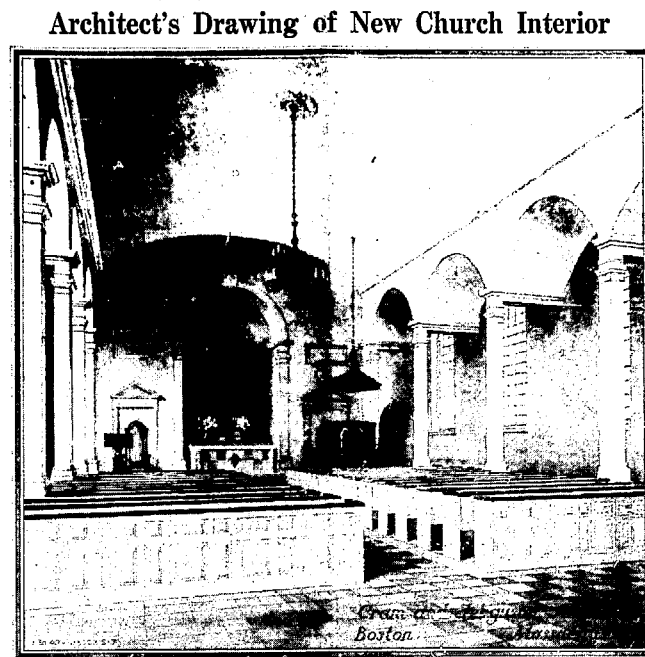

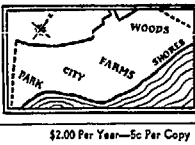

ANNE ELDRIDGE WINS COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP
