### Major tragedy is narrowly averted when accident occurs shortly before girls were to assemble for roll call; three others escape.

One person was injured and what might have been a major tragedy was narrowly averted when a portion of the roof in the girls' gymnasium of the Senior High school collapsed shortly before 9 o'clock Friday morning.

John Lawson, agent 61, who had been employed just the night before to help with repair work on the roof, miraculously escaped serious injury when he and his wheelbarrow were plummeted 22 feet to the floor of the gymnasium amidst tons of gypsum blocks and gravel.

Within 10 to 15 minutes after the roof gave way, an entire girls' class would have been lined up for roll call directly above the position that collapsed, a major tragedy would have been inevitable. The weight of the accumulated gravel was blamed for the collapse, although the same procedure had been followed on other school roofs in the district without mishap.

Repairs on the roof, which is 13 years old, had been started the day before. Construction was of gypsum blocks and gravel. The first process in the repair job was the scraping of all gravel off the surface. The gravel had been piled in the east corner of the roof, preparatory to being trucked away to the dump.

### RECIPES

#### SHRIMP SALAD MOLD

2 chicken bouillon cubes  
1 tablespoon apple relish  
1 tablespoon cold water  
1 cup boiling water  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
5 lb. cooked shrimp  
Salt, pepper, paprika to taste  
Method: Dissolve bouillon cubes in boiling water, then lemon juice, salt, pepper and paprika. Rinse shrimp in cold water, place whole shrimp in bottom of mold. Now break the balance of shrimp and add to apple mixture and pour into mold. Place in refrigerator to set. Serve with mayonnaise dressing. Garnish with hard boiled eggs and tomato and stems of pimiento.

#### APRICOT WHIP

1 pint heavy cream-whipped  
2 cups cooked apricots—sifted to taste  
Method: Whip the cream stiff. Press drained apricots through sieve and fold into cream. Pipe lightly into sherbet glasses and set in refrigerator to chill.

#### RUSSIAN CURRY SOUP

1 can pea soup  
1 can tomato soup  
1 teaspoon curry powder  
2 cups milk or stock  
1 cup heavy cream  
Method: Heat pea soup, tomato soup, curry powder and milk to boiling point. Season to taste, just before serving, stir in cream. Garnish with cream. To make cream, cut dry old bread in very small cubes. Heat 1 teaspoon butter in frying pan and put bread cubes in, keep shaking pan until they are nicely browned and crisp.

#### SOUFFLE OF FLOUNDER

4 tablespoons butter  
3 cups whole milk  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper  
For baking dish: 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour  
Method: Melt a thick white sauce of the butter, flour and milk for a few minutes. Remove from fire, add shredded fish, seasonings and well beaten egg whites. When cool fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and season may it needed. Pour into well greased and crumbed baking dish, set in warm water bath and bake in a moderate oven—350 degrees—for 30 minutes or until firm. Serve with shrimp sauce.

## Baha'i Stand Against War Discussed By Study Group

Mr. Dudley M. Blakely spoke Monday night before the Baha'i study group of Grosse Pointe and their guests, meeting in the home of Mr. and Mrs. George B. Truitt on Morris road.

"The Baha'i stand against war," stated Mr. Blakely, "dates from the command of the Prophet Bahá'u'lláh in 1852 when He said, 'It is better for you that ye be slain than that ye slay.' Therefore, the Baha'i in whatever land they may live, neither take an active part in the mass murder being committed today, have applied for humanitarian service, and been accepted in such. There is no file in the Governments of many countries, this command of Bahá'u'lláh's against their participation in slaying and those countries at war, this matter has taken up with them so that the Baha'is in the world apply for work other than combatant activities."

The Baha'is have been admonished by 'Abdu'l-Baha, the son of the Prophet, to be obedient servants of a just and truly loving God. Therefore, if drafted, the Baha'is obey the law of the draft, and register as required, rather than refuse to answer the questionnaire. They believe that this refusal to do anything is in itself, potentially, anarchy.

Mr. Blakely said Mrs. Blakely are the first people to be actively working on and participating in world citizenship to the extent that they realize that what they do is for the good of the world. He has his representations in other parts of the world. He explained that this was one of the principles which the people of the world failed to recognize at the time of the League of Nations, stating that the principle of sanction, in the League of Nations, because the law was a failure but because the safety of countries was lacking. # Question of Unemployment Compensation Is Discussed By Member of Draft Board

(This is another in a series of articles being written expressly for the Grosse Pointe News by Judge Joseph Belanger of the Local Selective Service Board.)

BY JUDGE JOSEPH BELANGER

There has been considerable discussion among the registrants as to whether or not they are entitled to unemployment compensation during the period when such selectees are in training after their induction. It might be well to discuss this problem at this time insofar as we are able with such information as is available.

Among the requirements for eligibility for unemployment compensation benefits is availability for employment (Sec. 28, subsection c, Michigan Unemployment Compensation Act). As a test of a worker's availability, he is required to register as an applicant for employment in the local office of the Michigan State Employment Service and must accept suitable employment in private industry at all times. Obviously, a worker who is drafted and is required to spend a year in the Army in training is not available for referral to private employment during that year and consequently this Commission is without power under the law to pay benefits to such persons.

Cite Proposed Amendment

In order that you may be fully informed in the premises we call your attention to the fact that there has been before the Legislature a proposed amendment to the present Unemployment Compensation Act which provides in substance as follows:

"Benefits after termination of Military Service"

(1) Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of this act the benefit rights of trainees shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of this subsection for the period and with respect to the matters specified herein. Except as herein otherwise provided all the other provisions of this act shall continue to be applicable in connection with such benefits.

(2) The term "Military Service" as used in this subsection means active service in the Land, Naval, or Air Forces of the United States.

(3) The term "Trainee" as used in this section means an individual who entered the military service after July 1, 1940, who continued such service for not less than ninety consecutive days and whose military service was terminated with an honorable discharge on or before July 1, 1941.

(4) With respect to any trainee, the first benefit year following the termination of his military service shall be the four calendar quarters beginning with the first day of that calendar quarter in which such termination occurred.

(5) With respect to the first benefit year as defined in paragraph (4) of this subsection the trainee shall be required to serve the waiting period required under subsection (b) of section 28.

(7) If under an Act of Congress, payments with respect to the unemployment of individuals who have completed a period of military service are payable by the United States, a trainee shall be disqualified for benefits with respect to any week beginning with a benefit year as defined by paragraph (4) of this subsection until he has exhausted all his right to such benefits from the United States."

## One Municipality

The agitation for the consolidation of the five Grosse Pointes under a single municipal charter is not a transient spasm of local interest which will die aborning. The proposal has too many bases of common sense and obvious advantages for such treatment. Sooner or later this question will be resolved into concrete form and the citizens of these communities will pass definitely and formally on this long suggested question.

The proposal suggests many advantages for the citizens and taxpayers and, after all, this issue should be discussed almost solely from the standpoint of their interest. Presumably the argument for the reduction of overhead by the consolidation of five municipalities and villages into a single act of public officers where five now exist, would not excite much enthusiasm with the office holding or office seeking element among our people.

The chief argument for a consolidation is the similarity in development and interest of all of the five points. In the event of the creation of a single municipality it would be freed from the conflicting desires and interests which so commonly plague city governments. All of the new separate municipalities are remarkably similar in character and it is difficult to envisage a single community objective which would not be common to all.

By pooling the resources of the five little municipalities and merging them into one large municipality for the enjoyment and advantage of all in almost every department and function of community life. At best the single municipality to be so created would be only a small part of approximately 100 municipalities which would have the same intimate knowledge of and contact with local government could be maintained by the individual citizen. Such an arrangement should permit a saving in the cost of local government. If it is to be a consolidation, it must be a consolidation, as always, against the indifference of the citizens.

One advantage of consolidation of no small importance would be the added prestige and political importance of the larger place and its more favorable position to benefit from such aid and grants as frequently flow to local communities from State and Federal government.

## Decisions To Make

There are certain decisions which the peoples of this country must make and quickly. If they are not made with its safety and protection and with the perpetuity of that way of life which has been its way from the beginning and which is part and parcel of the very body and soul of this land. Outstanding among these questions are:

To realize and act upon the knowledge that Unity is strength and Disunity is weakness, that the House divided against itself will fall.

That Courage in the foundation upon which this nation was built and the quality by which it has progressed to the highest plane of material and moral welfare ever attained by any nation in human history, and that Cowardice and Treason have been the shala upon which countless lesser states have wrecked, many by way of emphasis, in recent months.

To accept our President's warning that we must be realistic and recognize the fact that a great state has arisen in central Europe which is bent upon world political and economic domination, whose moral code and its contacts with other people is epitomized in the Dark Age philosophy that He shall take who has the Power and He may Hold who Can.

That this State, by its own frank declaration, is bent upon the destruction of Democracy wherever existing in the world; that its entire policy of human relations as determined by government is the antithesis of that enjoyed and practiced in this country and that an inevitable conflict impends between the Germanic and American concepts.

To realize that this march against Freedom has already advanced to the stage where its last great champion in Europe is fighting now for mere survival and that with the fall of the British Empire, the last vestige of the old world political entity since the fall of the Western Roman Empire would be our lot to carry the torch alone, not merely as reluctant champions of an already half lost cause, but for survival as a clearly defined and as certain as the issue which faces England today.

To recognize that the force of movements in Europe, fast overflowing into a world struggle, makes us, willy nilly, allies of Britain whatever may be the natural racial sympathies or prejudices of individual citizens and that we must act from the basis of common honesty in that the materials of war which have been promised, practically without limit for England, shall be delivered within her reach. Any lesser course would be rank hypocrisy and an irredeemable blot upon American honor.

To acknowledge at once that leadership is a first necessity in any undertaking and that in the present emergency we must accept with undivided loyalty the leadership of our constitutional leader, the President of the United States, who has told us the issues and their consequences with courage and clearness from the vantage point of the most comprehensive information possessed by any person in this country. To cease instantly this silly wrangle about his "leadership" and to act from the basis of common honesty in that the materials of war which have been promised, practically without limit for England, shall be delivered within her reach. Any lesser course would be rank hypocrisy and an irredeemable blot upon American honor.

Finally, and of most immediate importance, we must place our own house in order. The struggle that impends would be hard enough to carry on even with the united effort of every man and woman in the nation; without such support it would be impossible to wage war with plant ownership or management. Both are equally opposed to the country's welfare and unpatriotic in the highest degree. The government is in a position to do this with capital and labor on a fair profit and wage. It should do so with scrupulous insistence that neither should be on a scale which suggested using the country's peril as a source of inordinate personal profit. If this cannot be done quickly all talk about making America the arsenal of democracy is but a mere illusion. We shall have demonstrated completely our inability to bring aid to Britain, to whom we have made great promises, and shall have strengthened well founded doubts in the minds of our potential enemies of our capacity to defend even ourselves.

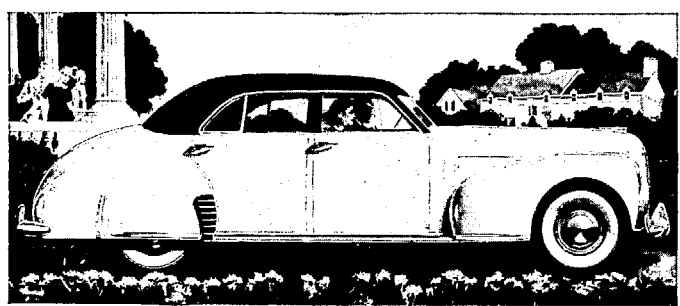

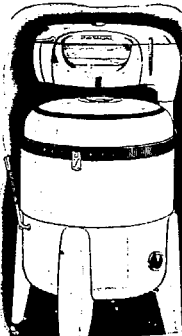
