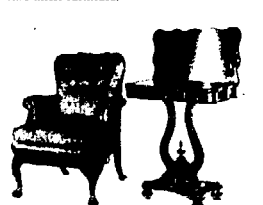

When Thieves Fall Out

The Russian and German despots, after indulging in friendly gestures and love pacts, are now at each other's throats. Which is very heartening news to the people who are still carrying on the fight for freedom.

It is a piece of irony that Comrade Stalin's original selves while he gathered up such stray bits of territory as might conveniently come his way, has gone sadly amiss. It was the arrangement entered into by him in August 1939 which gave gangway to the German blitz which has since blasted out most of the small free countries of Europe.

Stalin's great mistake was in failing to remember that Hitler presented the world with a blueprint of his whole scheme of conquest, eighteen years ago, including the annexation of the Ukrainian, white fields, and thus the promises to all and sundry are about the only ones he has kept.

The thing for Britain and America to note is that the force of neither was a tinker's dam, and just about as fragile. The only considerations that move either of these worthies is personal power, with inferential reference to the welfare of their people, and that both are equally enemies of humanity.

Danger From Chimneys

The ordinance passed by the City Council requiring a half inch mesh screen cover to prevent the escape from chimneys of heated sparks which are often the origin of roof fires, is a wise measure and should be observed by every home owner.

On the question of fire hazards from chimneys however, neither the ordinance nor the comments of our public officials on the subject take cognizance of one of the greatest menaces which the chimney presents. Flues which are used for wood burning fireplaces, will in time become heavily encrusted with soot which will collect in the flue, and a roar and force approximating an explosion. During such a chimney fire the force of the draught will belch out great clouds of burning soot from the unprotected chimney, which in a high wind will travel a long distance and alight on a dry wood shingle roof or any combustible material with almost the effect of an incendiary bomb.

Even with a protective screen of a one half inch mesh the force of a burning flue might easily scatter large size long burning sparks over an extensive neighborhood. In former times in the rural sections where the open fireplace was often the only facility for cooking and heating, close attention was given to this matter and the periodic burning out of chimney by inserting paper or an oil rag in or beyond the throat of the chimney and touching it off to burn out the dangerous accumulation of soot, was a well recognized code of country life. This was always done before a recent rain had saturated the surrounding buildings and neighboring woods. The growing use of wood burning fireplaces in urban homes should result in at least those of our citizens who are not too young to recall the wise precautionary measures employed by their pioneering forebears, to see to it that their own chimneys are periodically cleaned out by the modern scientific chimney sweep or burned in the good old way. It will be a practical cooperation with the wise local authorities and contribute to the safety of their homes and those of their neighbors.

Parental Police Auxiliary

The responsibility of our local police authorities to curb reckless driving by many of the youngsters in this community can hardly be diminished by their failure to take disciplinary measures in a given case because of lack of witnesses or for want of a good witness.

The action in the case on Fisher road in the early morning hours recently, when no summons was served, may have been warranted under the circumstances, but a proper alertness to the situation by the police will effectively discourage this habit among local youngsters. A few fines levied by the magistrates commensurate with the offense, and with particular reference to repetition of offences, will effectively squelch this practice.

After some indulgent fathers have paid a few such fines they will quickly develop into a powerful auxiliary of the police.

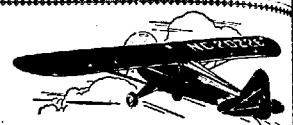
