Dr. Van Kleeck Submits Annual School Report

Superintendent of Pointe's Educational System Traces Progress Made During 1940-41 Term

(The Gross Pointe News presents below installment number one of Dr. F. B. Van Kleeck's annual report. The other two installments will appear in the next two issues of the News.)
In the latter issue, Chas. A. Farrell, President of the Board of Education, reported in last week's installment that the Board's objective is to furnish a superior school system at reasonable cost. Three years ago today, in his eleventh and final annual report, my predecessor, Dr. Brownell, discussed "problems which he faced." The principal problems that he mentioned were:
Improvement of the instructional program.
More nearly adequate provision for the needs of the non-college preparatory pupil.
Development of the physical plant, especially the junior high and Kerby, Mason and Richard elementary schools.
An increase in public support for the school system.

In the full attainment of these goals much remains to be accomplished through more progress. I think it can be said that the progress made during the past year has been very good. There is not time here for an instructional discussion of any or all, but a few comments may indicate the trend during the past year. The following recommendations were made:
First in importance, and first in this report, is the improvement of the instructional program.
Achievement Improves

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School Report

The annual report of the Grosse Pointe Public Schools for the school year 1940-41, presented by President Charles Parcels, makes agreeable reading for both the taxpayers and the parents of these communities.

Not the least of the advances made in public education in the Pointes is the increasing use of the schools for adult education. It will come as a surprise to many of us that 1800 adults were enrolled in the local schools last year, which is a robust percentage of the total day school enrollment of 4500. The addition of the Industrial Arts Building to the High School plant will greatly widen the facilities for industrial training and technical education which is a most practical preparation for defense industry. It is a suitable acknowledgement of our responsibility to prepare for service in this field of national effort which is especially in evidence of the great Detroit area. This new addition to the high school plant will permit an additional enrollment in the high school and the Brownell junior high of approximately 200 students.

With the exception that a change in the state law during the last session of the Legislature necessitates a local readjustment to a smaller allocation of state funds, the financial picture of the school district is most pleasing. Since the sale of the Kew-Forest estate in 1939 two junior high school sites have been purchased at figures favorable to the taxpayers. It is good to learn that the practice of our school authorities to underspend the budget has been the rule for a number of years past, was continued during the year just closed. Improved business conditions among the residents of the Pointe area is evidenced in the step-up in the percentage of tax collections from the low point in the year 1932-33 of 98.5 per cent to 101 per cent in the year just ended. President Parcels expresses the belief that with the clearing up of many subdivisions and the financing of so many homes by the FHA there will be an even better assumption of this respect in the district. In fairness to Mr. Parcels' prophecy, however, it should be noted that since this writing for his report the imminent priorities to be granted for war industry for many of the materials used in construction work will curtail home building operations through government aid.

The operation of the school district sinking fund also exhibits a healthy state. After retiring \$102,000 in bonds during the year there yet remained a net increase in the resources of the Fund of \$87,900 available for future debt retirements.

In concluding his report President Parcels gives well merited praise to the teaching staff of the district, making special reference to the great services of Dr. Van Kleef, who soon leaves his post as Superintendent of Schools to enter the larger field of services offered by the post as Assistant Commissioner of Education for the great state of New York.

The Right To Strike

The drastic action which the President of the United States was compelled to take in the case of the North American Aviation plant in California to effect the resumption of the production of the much needed war planes should shock the people of this country into a long overdue revision of their understanding of public and private privileges and responsibilities.

The right to strike, i.e., to stop working in a body by concerted action is thoroughly embedded in the law of the States and of the Federal government and confirmed by innumerable court decisions running up to and including affirmation by the United States Supreme Court.

This right, however, is a strictly private right. It today is within the individual and can be exercised by him at will. The causes which inaugurate a strike have little or nothing to do with the right which inheres in him as a worker to stop working.

This right ceases the moment it runs counter to the public safety, and the National Defense is the highest expression of the public safety. In a time of National Emergency the common welfare and defense becomes the supreme law of the land, and it has always been so and it is right that it is so recognized and arranged. The most drastic power existing in government is that which permits power to take its own manhood and force it into military service, thereby exercising a power of life or death. This power has lodged with our American government since the formation of the Federal Constitution, which automatically makes every citizen in the land a member of the unorganized militia when he attains the age of eighteen and continues him in that status until he is forty five. All subsequent acts of the Congress are merely the enabling measures which put into effect a basic law that has existed in the organic law of the Nation since its birth.

It is futile to argue that a people who prudently made such provision for their safety and defense in the beginning would long tolerate any exercise of private privileges which in any degree nullified such purpose.

It is unfortunate that considerable numbers of the people are so unfamiliar with the history of this country that they should not realize the instant action which government authority would take whenever the intrusion of private rights constituted a threat against the public safety. Our past both remote and recent is crowded with instances which should illustrate most pointedly the action by government in any circumstance of vital emergency. One of the most recent was in the case of the Boston Police strike soon after the last war. Calvin Coolidge, then Governor of Massachusetts, took charge of the situation in the city of Boston when it became apparent that local authority was unable to do so. It was during this episode that Governor Coolidge laid down the principle that the right to strike against the public safety did not exist, at any time or under any circumstances, "and was hereby denied." This courageous and clear visioned stand by Coolidge eventually lauded him in the Presidency, although the issue presented involved only the temporary withdrawal of protection for life and property in a single city.

The issue in strikes in plants engaged in national defense work is vital to the country's ability to defend itself. It is a question with which the country can neither debate or temporize. In time of war or imminent war all other considerations must give way. Justice can and will be done for the workers in such plants. The machinery already in being in the government is ample to assure this, but the right to strike against the Nation's safety does not exist under any circumstances, and is hereby denied.

President Roosevelt has done a sensible, patriotic and courageous thing in the California aviation plant issue. The overwhelming majority of the people are with him and hope that this incident may prove a sure harbinger of the policy he is to pursue during this time of peril which he has so frankly disclosed to the people.
