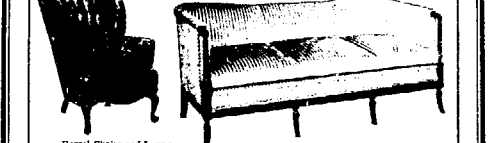

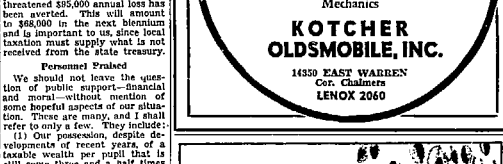

Household Hint

Women who find themselves "fresh out" of dishcloths at the crucial moment in the housecleaning will welcome the plan worked out by a housekeeper who used to find herself in the same predicament regularly. Instead of throwing out the dishcloths when they become grimy, as she did in the past, she now runs them in a bag made of table cloth. The shiny side is on the inside of the bag so that she can readily wash off the soil and oil that comes from the used dishcloths.

On washday, the week's accumulation of soiled cloths is put into a pair of warm socks and left to soak until all the regular wash has been finished. Then the pieces go into the washer, using the soapy water that is left from the last batch of clothes. After fifteen minutes of agitation all that the cloths need is the regular rinsing. By hanging them out on the line they dry smooth and do not need even a light pressing. They are then put into a second bag, which is kept near the soiled-dishcloths, all ready for use when required.

All sorts of dishcloths, towels and linens are saved in the clean-dish bag. For easier use, they are first cut into squares, eliminating thick seams, buttons, hooks and eyes, and anything else which might scratch the surfaces on which the dishcloths are to be used.
