Dear Editor:
An item appeared last week in another Grosse Pointe paper announcing that Grosse Pointe Park had received \$381224 from the State intangible tax collection. This paper further stated that this disproved the claim of the Citizens Association that the Park would receive no part of this money unless it became a city.

Knowing that you are only interested in honest, truthful and accurate news reporting, I am writing you the facts regarding the intangible tax refund.

Just prior to the election last spring, the McCullum Bill, No. 17, was pending in the State legislature. This act amending the intangible tax refunds along with counties and cities, but it still excluded villages. This amendment to the original act was fully used by the opposition including another paper, to defeat the city plan. It seems they have a very short memory or perhaps it is just another example of inaccurate and prejudiced reporting.

Following the defeat of the city plan and, realizing that this denied the Village of Grosse Pointe Park any participation in the proceeds of the intangible tax, Commissioner Ward E. Van Deusen and Citizens' Association president, Paul I. Moreland succeeded in obtaining a special hearing before the House Taxation Committee. They presented what apparently were convincing arguments for the inclusion of villages in the refund provisions of the act. They were heard, also, by Senator McCullum, the author of the act.

The act was then further amended to provide or refunds not only to counties, cities and townships, but also to villages on a per capita basis.

tirely at their own time and expense and the \$381224 received by the Park Treasurer as the first payment under the Act is ample proof of their accomplishment for the benefit of Park taxpayers.

Commissioner Van Deusen and Paul I. Moreland, president of Grosse Pointe Park Citizens Association, are not interested in abolishing self-praise, but the distortion of the truth in another paper makes this letter seem necessary.
