Wreckers Attack Shell Of Dodge Dream Castle

Uncompleted Palace On Lake Shore Road Being Torn Down; Estate's Great Grounds May Be Subdivided

Demolition of the Dodge mansion on Lake Shore road, fabulous dream castle of the late John F. Dodge which was never completed due to the death of its master, was started this week with wrecking crews clearing away underground and fallen timber in the building.

Altogether a legend to inquisitive youngsters, to whose ears tales of ghosts and secret parties are always incentive for investigation, the point and harbor of construction stood for 21 years, uncompleted and unshared.

Began in 1919, the building was in the first year of the building process but was halted a few months later with the death of Mr. Dodge. However in that time more than \$2,500,000 was spent in the steel and concrete frame and the hand cut stone work of the home, garages, greenhouses, dock wells, etc.

Contrary to most published reports there was no operative marble or tile installed in the mansion. This report, circulated in papers all over the country, has brought forth a mass of telegrams and letters from the anti construction firms asking if it would be possible to purchase the material.

According to Alfred G. Wilson, husband of the former Mrs. Dodge there is nothing of value left in the building. "The place was never plastered and windows were never put in," he said. "Guards were stationed around the property but this is because of the danger of falling timber and stone. The roof has almost fallen in and because of this even the wrecking crew must proceed with great care."

Mrs. Wilson further told the News that all materials (iron, concrete, etc.) in the house now belong to the wreckers. "They have salvaged rights and what they do with it is entirely up to them." The Bond Wrecking and Salvage Company is handling the job.

May Subdivide Land

Mr. Wilson told the News there had been nothing decided on what would be done with the property. Earlier in the week a spokesman for the estate announced that the home had been torn down to make the land more marketable.

Taxes on the property have amounted to about \$725 a year or about \$155,000 since the structure was abandoned. The amount in taxes paid, one of the ten largest estate taxes paid in the village of Grosse Pointe Farms, according to Harry Furton, village clerk.

Wanted It "Finished"

The lavish plans of the estate had been to make the home the "finest in the country." More than an acre of floor space is in the building which in its three stories has a reception room large enough to house a modern bungalow, a ballroom, swimming pool, 21 by 60 feet, 110 rooms and 20 baths. The grounds cover more than 11 acres in which are greenhouses, garages and a large boat well which is across Lake Shore road and is connected to the main house by a large tunnel, boarded up several years ago.

And this week where there were to have been sprawling lawns and gardens, workmen have begun to clear away the dense underbrush that has grown up, although nothing is known to grow out all evidence of the dream of the master who never saw his dream estate completed.

132 New Pupils Crowd High School Building

With 1536 Already Enrolled, Walter Cleminson, Principal, Predicts There Will Be 1700 Before Spring

With an increase of 132 students in the high school building, W. R. Cleminson, principal, yesterday estimated that the enrollment in that building would rise before spring to approximately 1700 students.

At the end of the first week of school, 1536 boys and girls had signed the rolls of the Township Junior High School and the Senior High School, both of which are housed in the high school building at Fisher Road and Grosse Pointe Boulevard. A year ago only 1464 were in the building at the end of the first week.

The increase was particularly marked in the junior high school grades, which showed a growth of nearly 50 per cent.

Students entirely new to the Grosse Pointe school system numbered 165 last Saturday, considerably more than at the same time last year, and their number will be increased within the next few weeks. A special open house for this group and their parents has been arranged for Thursday evening of this week to help with their orientation.

A project recently created to furnish recreational rooms for the men of the 182nd Field Artillery at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., is going forward under the direction of Mrs. Frank Thayer Nelson of Kenosha, Wis. and Mrs. Clyde E. Bickel of Detroit.

The committee, which includes mothers, sisters and friends of the men in camp, as well as many others who are interested in helping this worthwhile undertaking, has already sent two truckloads of furnishings with another truckload to go. The women hope for enough equipment to make at least four more deliveries before the end of September. This will furnish 12 to 14 recreation rooms at the fort, where there are between 30,000 and 40,000 men stationed.

Need Furniture

Articles most needed include chairs, sofas, radios, record players, lamps, rugs, books and all other furnishings that may be used by the men in camp during their leisure hours. "Two ping pong tables already have been sent. Four 10 pin bowling projectors with accessories are needed for recreational recreation in the hall." All articles sent must be strong and durable, suitable to the camp."

All Barred As Cameras Film Crash

Ticklish Scene Shot for "I Wanted Wings" Coming to Alger Friday

Because of its gruesome possibilities, all persons except those with vital functions were barred when Paramount filmed the crash and burning of an Army B-17 for a scene in "I Wanted Wings," the story of America's air program, which comes Friday to the Alger Theatre.

The location was kept secret from even the actors, until less than an hour before the scene was to be filmed. On hand for the filming of the spectacular sequence were several ambulances, an emergency truck equipped with firefighting apparatus, the cameramen and a group of technicians.

Food Is Sent To Prisoners In Germany

Pointer Hoang Red Cross Service Here, Tells of Safe Delivery

One of the bright spots in the European war is the way in which the American Red Cross has been able to ship more than 100,000 food boxes to Allied prisoners in Germany, according to Mrs. J. B. Brestoff, of McKinley road, director of War Inquiry and Information Service of the Detroit Chapter.

Not only has the American Red Cross been able to report safe delivery by the International Red Cross at Geneva but American donors of the food boxes are getting postage receipts signed by the prisoners.

Within a broader program in which the American Red Cross provides food packages, clothing and comfort articles for general distribution among Allied prisoners, special food packages are sent at \$2.40 each to identified prisoners on behalf of friends and relatives in this country.
