"Paging Mr. Samson" or, Where's He Off to Now?

If you want to know the meaning of wanderlust, we'd suggest you strike up an acquaintance with Clint Sampson. That is if you can find him. He's just as likely to be on a peak in the Canadian Rockies or poking around Mexico City as at his desk in the Pierce Junior High School, where he is a teacher. Clint's eyes are always on the far horizon. His mind is ever on the open road and he never seems happy unless he is going somewhere.

This extensive traveling of which Mr. Sampson makes so avidly began in 1939 when he toured Michigan with 20 boys in a truck. They were gone three weeks. That just whetted his appetite and brought the eyes that must be in him, to the surface.

In 1940 he conducted a three-week Boy Scout canoeing trip to Ludington, Mich., and a 10,575 mile, six week tour with seven scouts through the West. Two trips in 1941 covering 16,000 miles with four station wagons, one to California and the southwest and the other to the Canadian Rockies, enabled 45 boys, most of them from Boy Scout Troop 29, to see some of the most beautiful country in America.

Members of Boy Scout Troop 29 have camped out 145 nights in the last three years. So has Mr. Sampson. Mr. Sampson, who has been actively associated with Boy Scouts for the last 12 years, allured that camping out, with each of the boys doing his own work, was excellent training in itself, and that it was unfortunate that it was not being offered to boys other than the Scouts.

He offered boys who were not Scouts the opportunity to go on these extended tours.

This year a trip will be conducted during the Thanksgiving weekend to the Mammoth Cave in Kentucky and will give the boys an opportunity to see the beautiful farms maintained in many instances solely for breeding thoroughbred horses. A Christmas trip will take the group to Florida and the Southwest, covering in all 16 states. During spring vacation, Mr. Sampson and his boys will be bound for Washington, D. C.

During the month of May short weekend trips to Niagara Falls and to the Holland Tulip Festival will also be on the schedule. Mr. Sampson is again planning to make a trip to Washington, D. C., and the Canadian Rockies during the summer vacation.

An extended tour to Southern California and Mexico City to spend five weeks in this territory with the boys of Troop 29, who earn their own expense money in the months previous to the trip, is also scheduled for this summer.

University of Michigan Sponsors Courses Again

Three of the four courses offered in Grosse Pointe this fall by the University of Michigan Extension Service are being given in conjunction with the adult education program of the Grosse Pointe Board of Education. Forrest L. Grady, director of the program, announced.

"Current Affairs" is a non-credit course which will take up problems confronting us as a nation in a world at war. Sufficient historical and comparative material will be included to contribute to the better understanding of these problems. Lecturers will be Prof. Hartwig J. Heremans and Lawrence Pressa of the university's political science department. The eight weekly sessions will meet at 8 o'clock, Thursday evenings, beginning October 2, in 216 Grosse Pointe High School. The admission fee is \$1 for the series or 50¢ a single lecture.

"Geology of Our National Parks" is designed to present popular settings of many of the national parks in such a way that visitors to the parks may find increased enjoyment in their often overlooked entirely or ob-

served without an appreciation of meaning or origin. Prof. George H. Stanley is the lecturer. This is an eight-week non-credit course with an enrollment fee of \$1. Class sessions will meet at 7:30 on Wednesday evenings, beginning October 1, in 216 Grosse Pointe High School.

The third of these courses is "Practical Public Speaking," which is devoted exclusively to training in public speaking. Class work consists of study analysis, practice, and criticism designed to promote the acquisition of proficiency in extemporaneous speaking. This course carries two hours credit or may be elected without credit. Kenneth G. Hance, of the speech department, is the instructor. The 16 class sessions meet weekly at 7:30, Monday evenings, beginning September 29, in 106 Grosse Pointe High School. The tuition fee is \$12.

The fourth course to be given in Grosse Pointe is "The New Books and Plays," a series of eight monthly lectures by Olive Deane Hornell, sponsored for the second season by the University of Michigan Alumni Association.

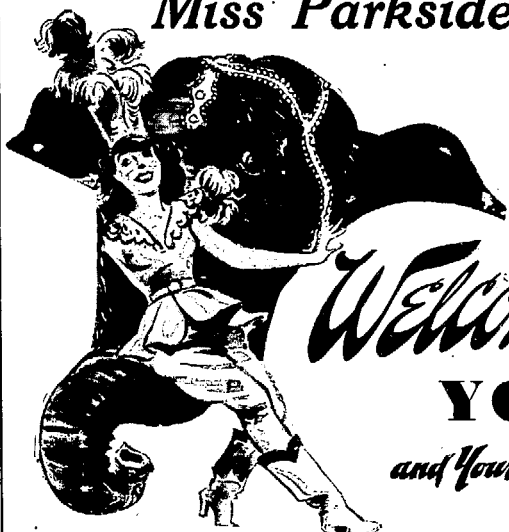
