## All Employers Are Urged To Report on All Wages

All employers who have part-time workers in stores or other commercial establishments must report the wages earned by such employees when old-age and survivors insurance taxes are paid.

This warning was issued today by P. E. Pollock, manager of the East Side field office of the Social Security Board, located at 8077 Harper at Van Dyke. Commenting on this subject he said:

"Many stores hire part-time workers during the Christmas holidays. The wages of such workers must be reported and their social security account numbers given when the old-age and survivors insurance taxes for the final quarter of 1941 are paid in January of the new year. There are no exceptions to this rule, except in the case of certain types of family employment."

Many Applicants Rejected In Past Because of Minor Physical Defects May Re-apply for Re-examination

A relaxation of physical standards for enlistment in the U. S. Navy and the Naval Reserve was announced this week by the Navy Department. In consequence of this action, the Navy Department announced that numerous men who in past months have sought to enlist and have been rejected on the basis of minor physical defects will, because of the modification of physical standards, be encouraged to re-apply for enlistment in either the regular Navy or the Naval Reserve for the duration of the emergency.

## Goodwill Industries Give Chance to Many

More Than 200 Men and Women, Most of Them Handicapped by Physical Disabilities, Given Useful Work

Goodwill Industries of Detroit is organized to give "not charity but a chance."

From homes all over the city Goodwill trucks are sent upon request, to collect old shoes, clothing, pictures, toys, magazines and papers. These cast-offs are taken to the factory at 1335 E. Clay street, where more than 200 men and women, practically all of them handicapped by physical disabilities or old age, are kept at work repairing and re-conditioning articles so they can be placed on sale at 12 Goodwill stores throughout the city.

Goodwill employees receive regular wages and are thus able to keep the independent spirit and normal outlook which would not be possible if they were beneficiaries of charity.

The Junior Group of Goodwill Industries was organized in 1933 by a group of young women for the purpose of distributing Goodwill bags in which worn and used articles can be stored for collection by Goodwill trucks. The group also assumed the responsibility of keeping emergency supply shelves

constantly filled with food which is given to any needy family in Detroit who request it.

Junior Goodwill at the time of organization numbered about 30 members. Now it has 100 active members.

Mrs. J. "Willie" Grant was elected president in 1934 and served for three years. Miss Louise Owen led the group through 1937.

During the first few years the group was small and the projects limited, but as the group expanded the projects grew larger.

At the end of 1937 when Mrs. Roy E. DeHart was elected to the presidency, there were 126 members and the first of several large undertakings began.

An amateur theatrical "Crisis in the Bag" composed of Junior Goodwill members and their friends was given in Orchestra Hall. Mrs. Florence J. Read was general chairman and Mrs. Frank J. Mullen, co-chairman. Net profit from this show was \$3,848.00.

In November 1938, 3,000 cookbooks were compiled by a committee headed by Mrs. Edward A. Widdup and Mrs. Florence J. Read. The cookbooks were sold for \$2.50 each.

A second amateur musical show, "For Goodness Sake," with Mrs. Florence J. Read and Mrs. Frank J. Mullen in charge, was given in the Masonic Auditorium, December 18, 1939. Profit, \$2,263.00.

On May 7, 1940, Mrs. Florence J. Read was elected president. No member of the same year saw another Junior Goodwill cookbook.

This time 5,000 copies. Mrs. J. Thomas Smith was general chairman and Mrs. George H. Vaster chairman of advertising. Her committee and more than enough advertising to cover the cost of publishing the book leaving a profit from sales up to date of \$4,482.00. The few books left are still in demand and selling rapidly.

In between these large projects were three dinner dances and a Horse Show from which the group raised approximately \$500.00, making a grand total of \$19,993.00, in four year period.

This sum of money earned through the efforts of The Junior Group is being used to equip Goodwill Industries with various needs to give work to more handicapped men and women of Detroit.

Treasurer of the group for three years, Mrs. Richard Wagner represented the purchase of a complete set of kitchen equipment. A refrigerator, sink, range, and a fire spinning system, a stove, a table, a chair, a lamp, and the group retired and repaired all of the old trucks.

In addition to all of this, once a year, either Thanksgiving or Christmas, The Junior Group give a basket of food to each employee of Goodwill Industries.

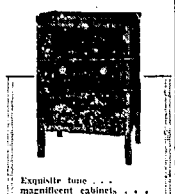

### Home Front

There are two fronts in this war in which we are entered, and only two. The battle front and the home front are as essential to each other as the bow and the cord of Hiawatha.

Our young men are going out by the millions to translate by their deeds and their sacrifices the Battle Hymn of the Republic into a living reality for us of this generation and for all those who will come after.

We at home must perform a service second only to that of the young men in the military and naval service of the Nation. We must inspire every thought, every temptation to coin the country, we'll into a personal profit and this spirit must apply to every unit and group of the entire home front. Every man and woman who comes to the must be reconciled to such arrangement of his or her personal interests as will make the largest contribution to the common welfare. The manufacturer, the merchant, the professional man, labor and service cannot escape a common responsibility.

The morals of the battle line will be best sustained in the consciousness that the home morale is high. Nothing would be more destructive of the home morale than the knowledge that certain elements were failing in their part. Never before in all history has the cause of freedom throughout the world so depended upon the efforts of the civilian population of a single country. A tremendous task is placed before the American people. We are the only people who ever could, either now or in any past period of history, have undertaken such a task with any hope of success. We must not be unduly affected by either successes or reverses when we come to us in the earlier stages of the struggle. They will be found when the history of this period is written to have had but little effect on the final outcome. This war is to be won, and won it will be, in the Mills, Mines and Fields of America if all our people dedicate themselves unreservedly and unflinchingly to the great cause in which we henceforth must play the leading part.

### Our Cup of Coffee

We must expect with the progress of the war a natural increase in the price of everything which the consumer buys. As production for civilian use is curtailed in almost direct proportion as production for war accelerates, the things which the citizen has to buy will cost more. What the country does not expect, and which it will not long tolerate, is an arbitrary increase in the cost of commodities yielding a profit to the vendor beyond that received for the same items in normal peacetime.

Food is the first necessity of life and it is in this category that the American people will show the least patience in any squeeze game played by the vendors. An interesting answer to a query along this line would be the explanation advanced by one of the great national food chain store organizations as to why it found it necessary to increase the price of a certain brand of coffee from sixteen cents a pound less than a year ago to twenty-five cents a pound today. With their roasting market practically cut off for the past two years it is quite probable that Brazil, the source of 75% to 90% of our coffee, has been forced by the operation of the law of supply and demand to make any material increase in its price to the American buyer. The situation does not make sense in Brazil's end of the problem.

Nevertheless the American chain store merchant has unblinkingly increased his price on this universally used beverage by more than fifty-six per cent.

It is experiences of this sort which will soon move a government noted for its concern for the welfare of the plain people to enter the price fixing field with a vengeance. When this comes, as it inevitably will if this "get it quick" spirit is not checked, some of the big retail food sellers of the country will have themselves to blame.

### Brave Little Bands

Some three or four years ago our naval strategists responsible for our defense in the Pacific strenuously urged appropriations to make Guam safe against successful attack. This is the easternmost of the three islands, Midway, Wake and Guam, which extends toward Japan.

Instantly a great concern was expressed in this country in widely varying quarters. In Congress itself the fear was heard that it "might offend Japan." The pacifists were convinced that such a move would only accentuate the tendency towards war which they so movingly deprecated in this country.

The result was that a mere token defense was arranged for this extremely strategic point and now with the coming of war a handful of heroic defenders has been left to make shift as best they can to hold the island. At this writing we do not know what fate has befallen the brave little band on Guam, but we do know that had the advice of those who know best been heeded, this point would have been held safe and secure to us as a spearhead of incalculable value for the aggressive war which we must eventually wage against Japan if the complete victory we are now so loudly proclaiming is to be achieved.

We venture a guess that when the final story of the little bands on Guam, Wake and Midway is told it will bring us one of the most inspiring chapters in American fighting annals.
