Food Production
At All Time High

Michigan's 1943 seven year record of rainfall during the growing season of 1943 has been blessed by some crops exceeding previous years production, according to the Michigan and United States Crop Reporting Service.

Leaders in the record breaking field especially are beans, potatoes and buckwheat. The production of buckwheat increased 20% over 1942 and 24% over the ten year average. 809,000 bushels were produced this year compared to 391,000 bushels in 1942 and 323,000 on the ten year average enough to make two as much buckwheat per acre as in 1942.

The farmers of Michigan in 1943 produced \$500,000,000 worth of food products an all time high. Charles F. Gray, Commissioner of Agriculture and he is pleased to report this state again produced 90% of the nation's navy bean supply. This year's 1943 100 pound bags were produced or 10% larger than 1942 in fact an all time high product on Sixty per cent of the state's bean supply has been frozen by the United States Government for the men in service and lend lease food supplies.

Pot to production jumped 35% over last year when 22,365,000 bushels were produced. Oats and barley have suffered more than any other crops. They were down 10% in 1942 and 10% in 1943. 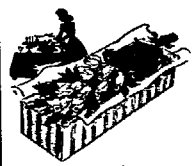
