At the meeting of the Trustees Monday night this committee brought in a report that the auxiliary police which was set up at the request of the O C D was regarded by that organization as an integral part of the regular police for all purposes contemplated by the Civilian Defense and as such would have to remain under the command of the regular police authority of the municipality.

**Council Settles**  
Woods Pay Plea

The Highway employees in the Woods village have been objecting to the special work they are being called upon to do at unusual hours such as sanding street intersections late at night or early in the morning due to ice storms and other similar emergency work. They have asked that an arrangement be made so that they could get extra compensation for such work.

This led to the suggestion of a complicated scheme of compensation, with time off of regular hours and what you will at a pro rata meeting. When this alteration in pay was taken up by the village attorney with the WLD it was found to run counter to government regulation at many points.

At the Woods council meeting on January 18 all attempts to make these adjustments of hours with changed compensation was abandoned, and a motion was adopted to pay the men on the regular prevailing basis of a 44-hour week at \$1 per hour per unit and a half for overtime.
