matic regulators or devices shut off the outlets into this new in-
terceptor and divert the water
into the old lines to the pump-
ing stations where it is again pump-
ed as it always has been in the past.

"We must therefore still de-
pend on our original facilities
during storms or heavy rainfall such
as at present has been the case
as priorities have been granted
and the new and additional
storm water pumping fac-
ilities are complete.

"The new proposed additional
pumping station, addition to our
present station and the necessary
trunk lines for which the tax
payers of the Village last sum-
mer voted authority to spend
\$250,000 is still being delayed
by lack of priority approval by
the W. P. B. in Washington.

"The engineering work on this
project is substantially complete
and the local W. P. B. has re-
commended its approval and it is
in process of investigation by
the Washington office. Even
though it is not good policy to
raise false hopes and even though
there is always the chance of a
complete refusal by the W. P. B.
within the next 30 days, the local
committee is still optimistically
hoping for a favorable reply.

Immediately upon receipt of a
priority approval bids will be
received and contracts let for the
construction work. At the same
time the bonds will be sold to
finance this construction. The
sale of the bonds which were au-
thorized last summer by the
taxpayers and which were also
approved by the Debt Commis-
sion in Lansing has been held up
until this priority was received
in order to save the payment of
interest.

Still in Danger
"Until all this work is com-
plete we are still in danger of
floods during severe storms. How-
ever since last spring some fur-
ther minor improvements have
been completed on our sewer
system which will to a slight de-
gree reduce the severity of the
flooded conditions. A priority
was finally received for a some-
what modified form of electric
standby service for the Water
road pumping station. This stand-
by service was designed to pro-
vide another source of supply of
electric current if the main power
line was struck by lightning as
has happened in the past. A
sewer line has been installed in
the easement between Staphole
and Allard avenues plus some
pipes on the Village line. This
will divert a good deal of the
surface water running out for
Gratiot Township in this area.

"The problem is also somewhat
threatening because at this
time we have had a long dry
season which has eliminated the
soaked and saturated ground
condition we had last year. The
run off will not be so rapid and
will not overload our sewers and
pumping stations so quickly.

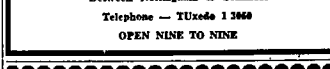

Post War Materials

As soon as the course of events in Europe immediately
after the fall of France in June 1940 indicated the proba-
bility of our involvement in the war there was great anxiety
expressed on the score of machine tools to equip our indus-
trial plants. It was the beginning of the beginning so
far as the transformation of the country's industrial machine
to war production was concerned. The gigantic flood of the
material of war that has poured out of American manu-
facturing plants since that time is proof that the answer
was found. The work performed by these plants in the
last two years will stand as a legend for all future time.

Now with the end of the war in sight another aspect of
it concerns our industrial problems the question of the orderly
disposition of this material is of tremendous importance.
Bluntly it is whether this great reservoir of the equipment
for production is to be wisely conserved for the use of our
own industries or are we to awake too late and find that
it has been spirited across the oceans by devious channels
to find in the hands of manufacturers abroad who will
quickly become our cutthroat competitors.

There are plenty of operators in this country who will
be eager to grab the enormous profits to be made out of
turning them over to foreign buyers yet even into the hands
of German and Japanese manufacturers.

It should be timely now to recall our disposition of

country's needs a single jot of anything she possesses is not
remembering the lessons of Bataan.

driven there.
