Lieut. Fisher is Listed As Missing in Action

Mrs. Carrie A. Fisher of 71 University place was overheard by a War Department official at 1000 E. La. for word to her from her home in Grosse Pointe on January 25 which informed her that her son, Lieut. William A. Fisher, a pilot in the Army Air Force, was missing in action over Germany as of Jan. 11.

At the late of one of the first battles over Hitler's Europe in 1918, the flier's telegram came to tell her that a message is not to be construed as a notice of death. A considerable proportion of the women in the service are taken prisoner and continue to reach home in safety.

Lieut. Fisher was 33 years old. He graduated from the Grosse Pointe High School in 1919 and was a student at Wayne University at the time he heard the news on Aug. 1, 1943. His father, Dr. O. Q. Fisher of 528 E. Grand Blvd. At the time Mr. Fisher received the telegram which informed her of his son's disappearance, she was at the home of Mrs. Vincent, 1000 E. La. from where she was telephoned.

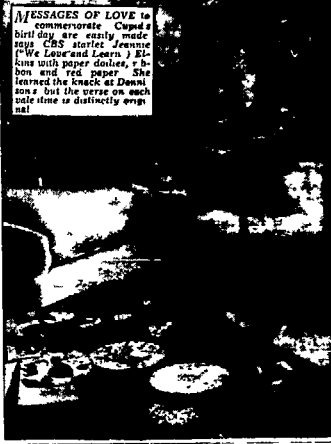

### Trombley Stays As Acting Chief Of Farms Police

Joseph Trombley, lieutenant of Police in the Farms department, was appointed temporary acting Chief of Police at the time Chief Flutt resigned. ### Be Sure to Keep Fuel Oil Reserve

In order to aid householders in budgeting their fuel consumption, the Detroit District Office of the OPA today issued the fifteenth in a series of weekly reports showing the maximum percentage of the fuel oil ration which should have been burned to date in this area.

The report shows that as of today consumers in this local city should not have burned more than 50 per cent of their total yearly fuel oil ration.

This percentage, which is based on the type of weather prevailing in each particular area and also on the proportion of the year which has elapsed to date, shows the maximum amount of the oil ration which should have been burned. Actual consumption should be less if the oil is being burned at this maximum rate. No reserve supply will be available to meet a sudden freezing spell.
