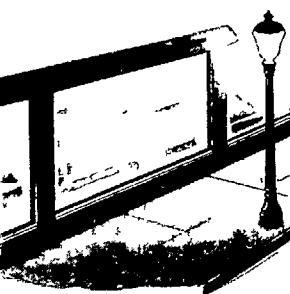

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War Film To Acquaint Pointers With Score

AWWS Unit to Usher and Sell War Stamp Campaigns When Picture Is Shown at Punch and Judy Theater Feb. 29

"War Department Report," the official government film issued by Undersecretary of War Robert Patterson to acquaint American war workers with the "score on the war" to date, will be shown Tuesday afternoon, Feb. 29 at 6 o'clock at the Punch and Judy Theater.

This cartoon showing has been arranged by the Conservation Area of the War Production Board of which Mrs. Frederick C. Ford is chairman. Mrs. Benj. J. Stephens, activities chairman of the committee, is in charge of arrangements for the program which will stress conservation of public utilities in wartime. The film has been released for the showing to adult residents of Grosse Pointe by the public relations bureau of the United States Army.

His introduction within the film, Secretary Patterson stated, "For the first time in its history the War Department is making an official report on the military situation directly to the war workers in America. This is a first."

General Staff Report "It is a report of your Government's progress in the war upon which the film is based. It is presented in a number of highly restricted War Department conferences to members of Congress and leaders of industry and labor, and the press. When the war was so impressed with the importance of making the public aware of the war situation, the War Department is making these facts available to the public. It is the sincere belief of the War Department that the public in the Army of management and of labor that even man and woman in America war industry should see it."

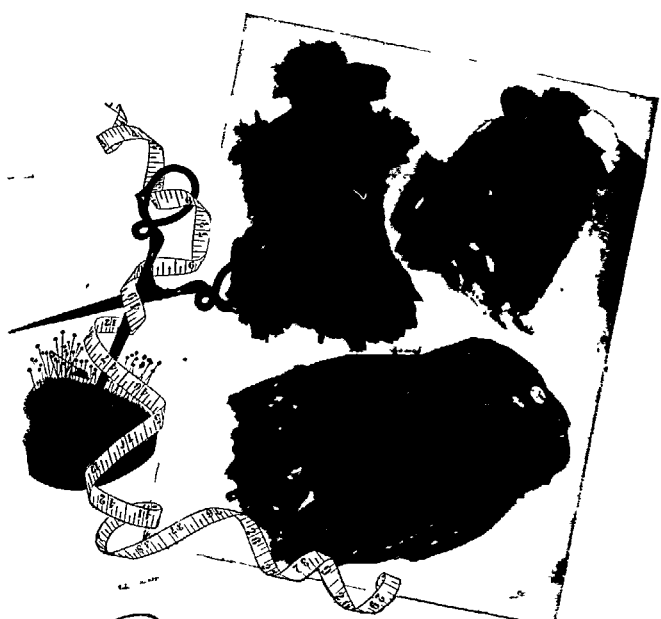

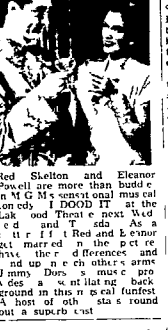

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Petition for Charter Amendment for All Village Employees of Grosse Pointe Park Retirement and Pension.

To the Village Commission of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park

We, the undersigned being duly qualified electors of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park, and residing at the place set opposite our respective names hereto do hereby request that a Charter Amendment pertaining to Pensions for All Employees of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park be placed on the ballot at the next Annual Election to be held March 13 1944. A full copy of the proposed amendment follows

Section No. 11 The Village Attorney shall be the Legal Aid to the Board of Trustees

Section No. 12 (a) The Board of Trustees shall appoint as Medical Director a physician who is duly authorized to practice medicine in the State of Michigan. The Medical Director is directly responsible to and shall hold office at the pleasure of the Board of Trustees

(b) The Medical Director shall arrange for and pass upon all paid-up annuities received under the provisions of this Charter Amendment shall investigate all essential statements and certificates in behalf of a member in connection with his application for retirement and in connection with his application for a pension benefit and shall report in writing to the Board of Trustees his conclusions and recommendations on matters referred to him

Section No. 13 The Board of Trustees shall appoint an Actuary who shall be a duly qualified actuary to the Board of Trustees on matters relating to the pension and retirement system of the Village of Grosse Pointe Park

Section No. 14 The Board of Trustees shall keep or cause to be kept a complete and correct record of the contributions to the Retirement System and of the annuities paid thereunder and shall cause the same to be audited annually by an independent auditor

Section No. 15 The Board of Trustees shall render a report to the President and Village Commission on or before the fifteenth day of the month of January of each year of the preceding year of the Retirement System and of the annuities paid thereunder

Section No. 16 The Board of Trustees shall cause an actuarial valuation of the Retirement System to be made annually by an independent auditor and shall cause the same to be audited annually by an independent auditor

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(b) A membership service pension, which shall be equal to one-half of the member's final compensation with the prorated amount of annuity as determined by the Board of Trustees. The member shall be paid the pension for the remainder of his life. The pension shall be paid in monthly installments of not less than twenty-five dollars per month.

(c) The Board of Trustees may in its discretion, withhold for not more than three (3) years after a member has ceased to be an employee all or part of his accumulated contributions.

PART B. OPTIONAL RETIREMENT ALLOWANCES
No option election shall be effective in case a member shall have elected to receive a pension benefit at the time of his death. The member may elect to receive his benefits in a lump sum or in monthly installments. The member may also elect to receive a reduced retirement allowance payable throughout life or he may elect to receive the accumulated contributions at the time of his death. The member may also elect to receive a reduced retirement allowance payable throughout life with the provisions of the plan.

Cash Refund Annuit
If he dies before he has received in payment of the annuity a portion of the reduced retirement allowance as was at the time he retired, the balance shall be paid in a lump sum to the person or persons entitled to the reduced retirement allowance as determined and filed with the Board of Trustees or if no such designated person or persons then to his legal representative.

OPTION 2. Joint and Last Survivor's Pension
Upon his death his reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to such person as he may have named by a designation on file with the Board of Trustees. If no such designation is made, the reduced retirement allowance shall be paid to the surviving spouse or to the surviving child or to the surviving child's issue.

OPTION 3. Modified Joint and Last Survivor's Pension
Upon his death, one-half of the reduced retirement allowance shall be continued throughout the life of and paid to the person as he shall have named by a designation on file with the Board of Trustees or if no such designation is made, the reduced retirement allowance shall be paid to the surviving spouse or to the surviving child or to the surviving child's issue.

PART C. PENSIONS OFFSET BY CO-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS
In case the present value of the total benefit which would be payable under the provisions of any workmen's compensation act or other law in effect at the time of the member's death exceeds the value of the reduced retirement allowance payable under the provisions of this Charter Amendment, the member shall be entitled to the excess of the workmen's compensation benefit over the value of the reduced retirement allowance.

RE-EXAMINATION OF BENEFICIARIES RETIRED ON ACCOUNT OF DISABILITY
The Board of Trustees may at any time cause a re-examination of the beneficiary of a reduced retirement allowance who is retired on account of disability. If the beneficiary is found to be capable of performing his own work, the reduced retirement allowance shall be discontinued.

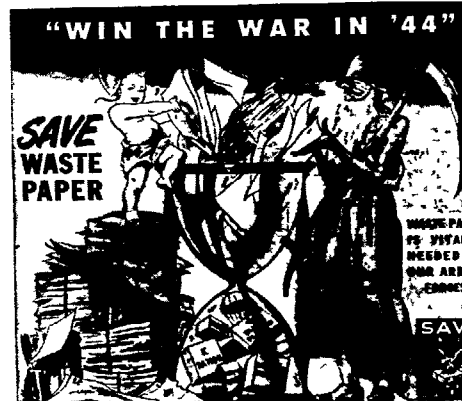
