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## Park Debt And Credit Rating Told

Retirement Fund Plan's Influence Is Seen in Parish Review

Howard P. Marshall member of the Board of Commissioners of Grosse Pointe Park, serving as Commissioner of Finance of the Village Corporation, has thought it timely to call the attention of the taxpayers of the village to the present situation of the village debt and the credit rating which its securities have in the municipal bond markets.

"Mr. Marshall gives out this information as a matter of general interest to the taxpayers but, quite possibly also to apprise them with respect to what his future action might be if the proposed Retirement Fund plan for all of the municipal employees as provided in the charter changes on which they will vote next Monday should be adopted."

**Between Lines**  
Mr. Marshall does not say in his statement but it may be read between the lines. His statement follows—

"For the Citizens of Grosse Pointe Park  
To exercise our great American privilege of the ballot is to exercise it all the time, but to exercise it after informing one's self is still more commendable. When you vote, you are voting for the future of the village."

Grosse Pointe Park has a direct debt of \$3,022,000.00 "Less U. S. Gov't obligations, our own bonds and cash in our Sinking Fund — 992,235.67

"Net direct debt — 2,029,764.33  
"Estimated population—13,000  
1943-44 Assessed valuation — \$31,092,820.00  
Per Capita debt, based on above population — 157.64

Percentage of direct debt to present assessed valuation — 6 1/2%  
"In order that we might know our total debt we must, of course, include our portion of the school debt which makes our total per capita debt approximately \$24.90. This is a large debt, but when you consider the average wealth of our citizens, the debt should not be too burdensome if properly handled."

**Recalls Past**  
"You will note that our sinking fund now consists of cash, U. S. Government obligations and our own bonds. This was not true when the writer became your Commissioner of Finance and it was less true when the present administration took office approximately four years ago. At that time our sinking fund consisted of many sub-standard municipal bonds. All of these have been eliminated and replaced by U. S. Government obligations."

Moody's Investors Service (which is probably the foremost analysts of municipal bonds in this country) rated our bonds as

BA. The top rating or the best municipal bonds is of a rating of AAA. The next rating downward would be AA, A, BAA and B. The rating of our village were rated as fifth rate credit, until just recently.

"On October 16 last year our rating was raised to BAA, which now makes our bonds a fourth rate credit. If we handle our sinking fund, and finances generally in a proper manner it is my belief of our village were rated as fifth rate credit, until just recently."

"Our sinking fund is now in excellent shape so far as quality is concerned it is not sufficient as to amount. In other words we have not appropriated enough annually in the past years to meet our maturing obligations. This is being remedied, starting with our next annual budget by allotting an additional \$45,000 over and above the amount which has heretofore been allotted to our sinking fund. This is being done under the guidance and with full approval of the Municipal Finance Commission of the State of Michigan, and it is the writer's belief that approximately such a sum should be added to our sinking fund for the next several years."

**Practical Lane**  
"We have an excellent Manager in Mr. Lane. He is a sound financial man, acquainted with the handling of municipal affairs, and we are fortunate to have him. He and your entire Commission, I believe, are in accord with the views expressed in this letter."

"In addition to the above debt our citizens, of course, must take into consideration the Federal debt, and by the very nature of things this Federal debt can only go one way in the near future, and that is up."

"The value of our homes and the continued desirability of residing in Grosse Pointe Park depends upon our maintaining a sound financial program."

"As your Finance Commissioner I recommend that primary consideration be given to the orderly and continued reduction of our village debt, so that we will in the future be in excellent shape to provide the facilities that a good government should provide."

Measles of especially serious type now epidemic in Michigan have had after effects the health department warns parents to obtain medical attention for children who have been exposed to the disease.

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
