Woods Project Tossed Back Into Lap of WPB

Major General Philip B. Fleming of the Federal Works Administration fails to see why the War Production Board should withhold granting of priorities for the Federal project in the Woods sewer and storm water project.

The matter was referred to the FWA by the WPB inasmuch as the big interceptor sewer running along the river built by the County Board of Commissioners had been constructed largely with Government aid and the WPB has to consider the Woods project as a part of the same general engineering work although government aid does not figure at all in the Woods project.

The Federal Works Administration came into the picture in the big interceptor project because the rapid building up of Macomb county due to war work enterprises threatened a health and sanitation problem which the Federal authorities recognized and insisted upon remedying. This was the post from which Federal aid was sought and granted to the County Board of Commissioners.

General Fleming apparently wishes hands off the Woods project and the matter of priorities for storm water and sewage in the Woods is completely dropped from the issue of Federal aid. He made this very clear in a letter which President Chesnut read at the council meeting Tuesday night in which he cast several rather pointed immoderations at the practices of the WPB in the matter of priorities.

The Woods authorities are hopeful that the action of the FWA in dropping the issue back into the lap of the WPB will hasten early favorable action by that body.
