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## Behind the Detroit Front

One of the most satisfactory forms of escape we've arrived in the form of an old cook book.

It belonged to our favorite aunt and must have been published at the turn of the century.

The wit and wisdom of this aunt as we remember them today are far in advance of 1944 and although she was as gentle as she was brilliant we wish we could have seen her face when she read the dedication in the front of her "Buckeye Cookery".

To those "Puck" Housewives it says "who master the work instead of allowing it to master them."

From the dedication right on through its 688 time-mellowed pages this cook book takes a patient patronizing tone we cannot imagine our aunt accepting.

That its recipes are elegant as ourselves are a living testament—we have spent our adult life sans starches just because we ate too much of the good things Aunt Mame's table always afforded.

Reading through "Buckeye Cookery" we are convinced that keeping a house in the nineteenth century must have been something.

In the first place we can hardly find a recipe that doesn't begin with a demand for half an ox and there's always that tone which upsets us. We keep finding a sermon in the middle of a soufflé.

Then we are charmed by the Housekeepers' Alphabet which sets in precise print.

Apples—keep in dry place, as cool as possible without freezing. Brooms—hang in the cellar to keep soft and pliant.

Cranberries—keep under water in a cellar during winter months.

Dust of hot water set in oven prevents cakes, etc., from scorching.

Economy time, health and means and you will never be a Flour—keep cool, dry and securely covered.

Glasses—wash with a quart of water mixed with a tablespoon of ammonia.

Hairs—Gather when beginning to blossom keep in paper sacks ink stains—wet with spirits of turpentine after three hours rub.

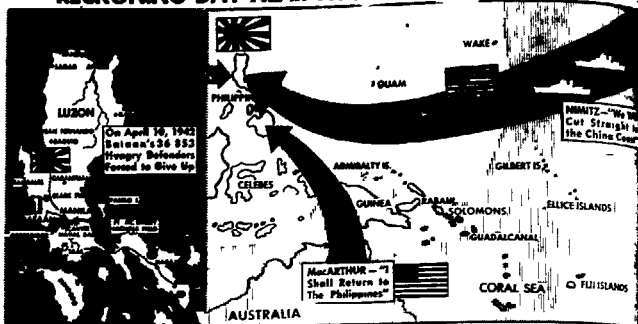

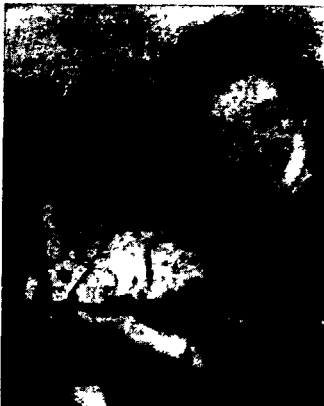

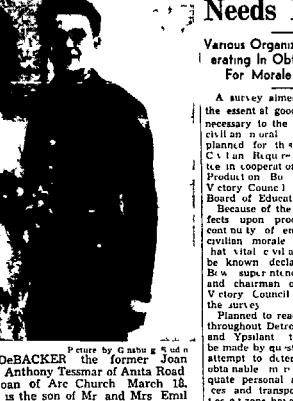
