Valuable Property Removed
From Tax Rolls By Churches

Park Commissioners Opposed to Move Made Mandatory
by Decision of Supreme Court;
Urge Law Revision

Final action was taken Monday night on the application of two churches to have the properties they have recently purchased for parsonages in the Park Village removed from the assessment rolls. The applications were made some time ago but after the properties had already been assessed for the year and were a part of the basis of the village revenue and hence could not be removed. The action now is to get them off prior to the 1944 assessment.

The Commissioners have looked unfavorably on such action. Not only does it remove valuable real estate from the taxable resources of the municipality but in the cases of the two churches in question the properties acquired for parsonages were a long distance away from the church edifices themselves.

The churches were the Church of the Messiah at Lafayette and Grand Boulevard and the Grace Evangelical Church. The former has bought a property at 1209 Yorkshire and the other at 1318 Lakepointe.

President Van Deusen explained that a recent Supreme Court decision on a similar case had been favorable to the churches and the striking of these properties from the assessments were mandatory.

Mr. Van Deusen spoke earnestly against this practice of

tax abatement for such properties and urged that the State law be amended so that claims for tax abatement would be allowed only where the parsonage is adjoining or in the near neighborhood of the church proper.

"This is a very delightful residential community and I can well understand," he said, "why the first thing we know churches in Cleveland will have their scouts up here looking for parsonage bargains."
