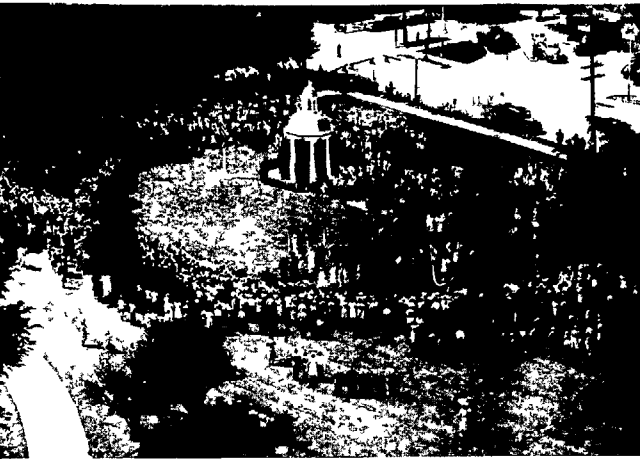

## Fear Malaria Outbreak in Pointe Region

Soldiers and Southern Labor Carrying Disease May Infect Local Mosquitoes

Continuing the discussion of the possibility of a malaria outbreak in the region mentioned in the NEWS last week based on an interview with Dr. Thomas S. Davies the Township Health Officer he furnishes these additional observations on the subject this week.

It is well known the Anopheles mosquito is the vector of malaria. Such an insect biting a human suffering with malaria at once becomes infected with the malarial organism. This mosquito then a vector and moves to infect other human beings and this cycle goes on and on.

The question arises: Is the stage set here in Michigan for a possible epidemic of malaria?

A recent survey and notes that the Anopheles is present in large numbers throughout the state. We have normally about 800 cases of malaria in Michigan each year. The outlook is that in the future more cases will be found due to influx of southern labor from endemic areas and soldiers returning from both the Mediterranean and Pacific theaters.

The attack on malaria is made by biting humans such as mosquitoes and malarial parasites.

Mosquitoes breed in water and the local conditions may aid in each dual endeavor to eliminate standing water near ovens. The mosquitoes are found in cans, broken bottles, tin cans, gutters as well as in places such as holes and excavations.

Prevention of access of the mosquito to human beings is advisable. But not necessary to expose yourself and keep your home well screened.

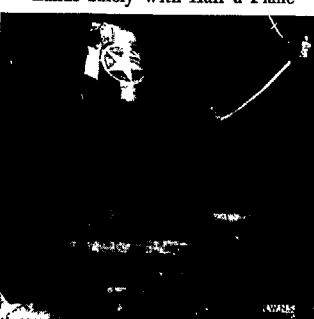

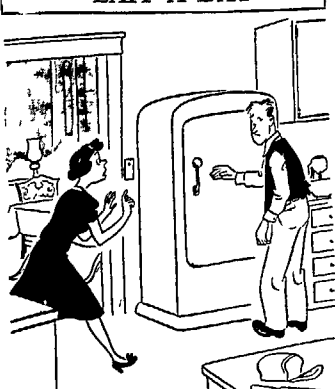

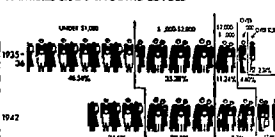
