Home Rule Drive Is Progressing

President James K. Watkins of the Farms Village who is the chairman of the Wayne County Home Rule Committee, expresses himself as much better pleased with the response on the petitions now coming in.

There are petitions circulating all over the state but not many more in Wayne county as this is the area that is concerned with the home rule issue.

The number of signatures cannot be known until the petitions are turned in and the names counted.

It is estimated that to date about 70,000 names have been signed.

The deadline for the return of the petitions to the committee is fixed at July 1. Within the week after that the petitions will be filed with the Secretary of State at Lansing and after they have been gone over and checked by his office, for duplications or errors he will issue a certificate officially placing the Home Rule amendment on the November ballot.

The required number of names to assure the constitutional amendment vote this fall is approximately 130,000.
