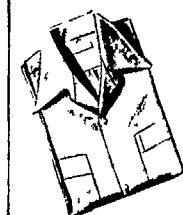

# Agreement Believed Near in Negotiations by Farms and City Over Boundary Line

Foot Strip of Private Property Not Paying Farms  
Taxes is Only Thing Stopping Final  
Settlement

Chester F. Carpenter, chairman and Building Inspector  
member of the committee representing the Grosse  
Pointe City in the negotiations with the Farms for the deter-  
mination of a suitable boundary line between the two mu-  
nicipalities met on June 27 in the Farms offices.

Trustee George L. Schriber  
chairman of the Farms cor-  
responding committee and Village  
Clerk Henry Furton. The City  
committee presented the City's  
proposal that the private claim  
line should be agreed upon by  
both places as the municipal  
boundary from the center line of  
Meek to the harbor line.

This would be practically  
in the middle of F. Street and the  
prolongation of the boundary  
from Jefferson to the lake would  
result in throwing into the City  
a 33 foot wide jog now in the  
Farms.

This is a private property from  
which the Farms now receive  
about \$700 per year taxes. The  
offer of the only objection to the  
committee plan of the pro-  
posal by the Farms committee is  
that it is not a municipal boundary  
which would be a practical one  
on the property line of the City's  
as should be corrected.

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## Victory Garden News

Anticipating an infestation by  
the Mexican bean beetles similar  
to the one which last year proved  
so destructive especially in  
southern counties of the state  
Paul R. Krone, chief of the Vic-  
tory Garden Section of the Mich-  
igan Office of Civilian Defense  
warns that war on this pest  
must be declared immediately.

Bean beetles, Krone said,  
are controlled by timely ap-  
plications of dust containing ro-  
ttenone or pyrethrin. For best re-  
sults, rotenone must be mixed  
with a carrier such as Pyrex  
ABB wheat flour, sulfur or clay  
in proportions of 60 per cent  
rottenone to 40 per cent carrier.  
A ready mixed dust is to be pre-  
ferred.

The amount of dust and the  
number of applications required  
will vary during the growth of  
the plants. As the vines grow  
larger more dust must be used  
to insure good coverage. Four  
applications should give control  
of both larvae and beetles the  
first to be made a week after  
the plants are set.

7 to 10 days later the third  
7 to 10 days after the second  
and the fourth 7 to 10 days  
before the first picking.

In case the beetle attack is  
severe, Krone said, the second  
treatment may be too long. If  
the plants are not too young  
the first treatment may be re-  
peated.

## Sidewalk Repair Program Gets Under Way in Farms

The sidewalk repair program  
approved by the Board of Trust-  
ees so recently ago is now under  
way in the Village of Grosse  
Pointe Farms. The mailing of no-  
tices and repair authorization  
forms has just been finished.

There are about 4000 parcels  
of property in the Farms owned  
by some 7500 persons and there  
are many cases where the side-  
walk is in need of replacement.

sibility of the property owners,

vides the means for requiring  
the repairs made the Board of  
Trustees felt that property own-

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### The "Artificial Barriers"

The international conference of money experts now in session at Bretton Woods New Hampshire is engaged in one of the most important and necessary early post war assignments as long as it is confined strictly to the letter of its commission.

There can be no hope for the resumption of international trade after the war until the currencies of the trading nations have first been stabilized at a fixed ratio of value to each other. This is the first step the same of any orderly and mutually profitable trade between nations.

To accomplish this it is proposed there shall be created an \$8,000,000,000 monetary fund to stabilize world currencies and a \$10,000,000,000 international bank for reconstruction and development. These are to be created by subscriptions on an agreed upon proportion by all of the participating nations. Gold will undoubtedly be the basis from which these international currencies will stem.

As long as this conference confines itself strictly to providing the mere mechanical mechanics for the new world trade all will go well. If it wanders away from the spirit of its task it will open a veritable Pandora's box that will plague and might destroy, every hope for the orderly and profitable resumption of the whole process of world production exchange and distribution.

There was a surprising note in President Roosevelt's message to the conference wherein he said that the blood stream (of commerce) must never again be clogged by artificial barriers created through senseless economic rivalries.

One might presume this to be a bid for free trade. The "artificial barriers" which he condemns have been named more than once as the protective tariff, which more than any other agency made this country the great industrial power it has become.

There are many commodities particularly raw materials which because of their scarcity or absence in other countries where they are imperatively needed, always figure prominently in world trade regardless of tariffs. There are many other commodities found in or capable of production in some countries whose appearance in world trade is determined upon a strictly competitive basis. Tariffs wages transportation and many other factors control.

Each country in the post war world will be in the past give first heed to the welfare of its own people. A government which failed to do so would not be tolerated by the people. This is as it should be. There is a prevalent school of economic thought in the country which is greatly intrigued by the vision of world trade. They say much about the impossibility of selling to other countries unless we buy from them.

Granted that we should explore every possibility for our foreign trade expansion but it should not be to the point where it imperils the steady and profitable employment of American workmen in American factories. The home market is still the great outlet for our factories. It always will be. It was on this that we became what we are.

We would be in a sorry plight if when this war is over we discovered that the currencies of England, Germany, France, Italy, Russia and even Japan and China were making ready to supply all of the luxuries and gadgets of the bright new world we are so busily promising each other just now, and at prices as low as those at which the American manufacturer and the American workman could produce them if we had free trade.

Our President's outspoken animosity toward the artificial trade barriers would then fall on deaf receptive ears. If anyone has any doubt of this let him listen to the noise that would arise from the ranks of the workers in every great industrial center in this country who are looking forward to making goods for the people of America and without the competition of outside friends or enemies.

And by no means would our own good city of Detroit be the most restrained of these centers of outcry.

### The Lone Delegate

The lone delegate in a national political convention who persists to the end in voting for his heart's choice for President has not always voted as fatefully as did the lone delegate from Wisconsin who nailed his name to the MacArthur masthead in the late rather tame gathering in Chicago. True the dairy statesman was not called upon to endure the limelight for more than a single hour but as evidence of his loyalty to his hero he was right up front from first to last in all the polls caucuses and counts.

In the Republican national convention in 1880 the cards were set to nominate Grant. He entered the convention with a solid block of 300 delegates with all of the opposition rallying around a numerous group of favorite sons. Their only point of cohesion was their battle cry, anything but Grant. Hoping that sooner or later lightning would hit one of the sons.

On the first ballot and for all the innumerable ones that followed a delegate with ideas of his own from Luzerne county, Penna. voted for James A. Garfield of Ohio who by no stretch of the political imagination of the moment could be ballooned into a dark horse not even into a pale gray colt.

Garfield was far from a national figure. He had a creditable record but not outstanding, as a military figure in the Civil War. He resigned in 1863 to enter Congress as representative from an Ohio district. Prior to the war he had been President of Hiram College.

Grant's block of 300 stood fast and were dubbed The Old Guard. Thereby adding a new word to the vocabulary of American politics but like Napoleon's elite corps which first carried the title met their Waterloo in the late ballots. The favorite sons unable to agree on one of their own number at the end disintegrated and the lone patriot from the cold fields of Pennsylvania became the core of a mighty host that swept the convention in the final ballot.

The unhappy Garfield served only from March 4, 1881 until July 2 when he was struck down by the assassin's bullet of Charles J. Guiteau in the Pennsylvania Railroad station in Washington dying at Elberon N. J. on September 19. He was succeeded by Vice President Chester A. Arthur of New York as the Twenty first President.

Incidentally it was the absence of a legal successor to the Presidency during Arthur's term that lead to the enactment of the Succession Act of 1886 which provides for succession from the Cabinet in order of the creation of the office. Succession begins with the Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of War and so on down to the last created, the Secretary of Labor.

### War Father's Wish

Forward looking Republicans will hope that as the campaign progresses Mr. Dewey will not yield to the temptation to fish for support from that group which is supposed to incline towards a mild and easy settlement of the war with Germany.

If he is wise and his whole public career indicates him as a good sounder of public opinion he will realize that the one outstanding achievement of this second war with Germany on which public opinion is most uncompromisingly united is that there shall not be another war starting from the same place.

All other things to the average man and woman is mere confusion and side issue. On the thing that lies nearest to his heart he is crystal clear. If he was in the last war he remembers it was the war to end all wars. He recalls with bitterness how tragically it turned out that he has a son in this war fighting the same enemy and with the same purpose he will be adamant in his determination that there shall not be another war for his grandsons to fight a generation later.

In short the average American father is all fed up with this war stuff.

If the man who happens to be in the White House when the decisions are made whether it be Roosevelt or Dewey fails to bring this assurance of freedom from the fear of war from that quarter again he will be buried under an avalanche of public condemnation such as has never before covered any public figure in the history of this country.

Average man does not wish for cruel or oppressive treatment of the German people. He would prefer that they be permitted to work out their own salvation without hindrance to prosper and eventually to become an accepted and respected member of the circle of civilized states. He has no confidence that she will do so without control and direction. He believes that such supervision will have to be applied to this essential ally great people until an entire new generation has been trained in the way of decent international conduct. He recalls that twenty five years ago he fought and he knows how he was going to hang and the militarist class. He knows that this time we are fighting Hitler and the Nazis. He knows now that both times we have been fighting a well united German people determined and trained for generations to war conquest arrogance and total disregard of the rights of other peoples.

He knows that it is useless to indulge in day dreams of a bright new world until this basic assurance of peace and safety is guaranteed.

This is the one great issue in this war insofar as the average American or Englishman views it. Only as and when this is attained will he be greatly moved by the million and one other issues closely or remotely associated with this struggle.

The people would be greatly relieved if both Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Dewey could give assurance it can be attained in cooperation with Britain and Russia and there is every reason to believe both peoples are of this mind.

Mr. Roosevelt's pledge of Unconditional Surrender scarcely goes far enough but such as it is still goes farther than any assurance that Mr. Dewey has so far uttered.

### Money Against Health

It was good news to the people of the Pointe area last week that the sewage that has been polluting their public bathing beaches was to be directed into the big interlakes neighboring Macomb county and sent on its way for treatment in Detroit.

It was a comforting instance of the power of public opinion. The governing bodies of some of the local communities were inclined to view this situation with undue concern, trusting to a leisurely and unburned abatement of the nuisance. When the really hot weather set in however and thousands of the youngsters and their elders were being deprived of their privilege of bathing things began to stir.

Waves and means were suggested for getting at the heart of the trouble. They decided there was no sense or reason in tolerating a menace to their health while municipal authorities to the north wall gled over a division of costs.

Thanks are due also to local and state health authorities for their insistence that quick action be taken by the state's legal authorities. When this was about to break our tax minded neighbors saw the light.

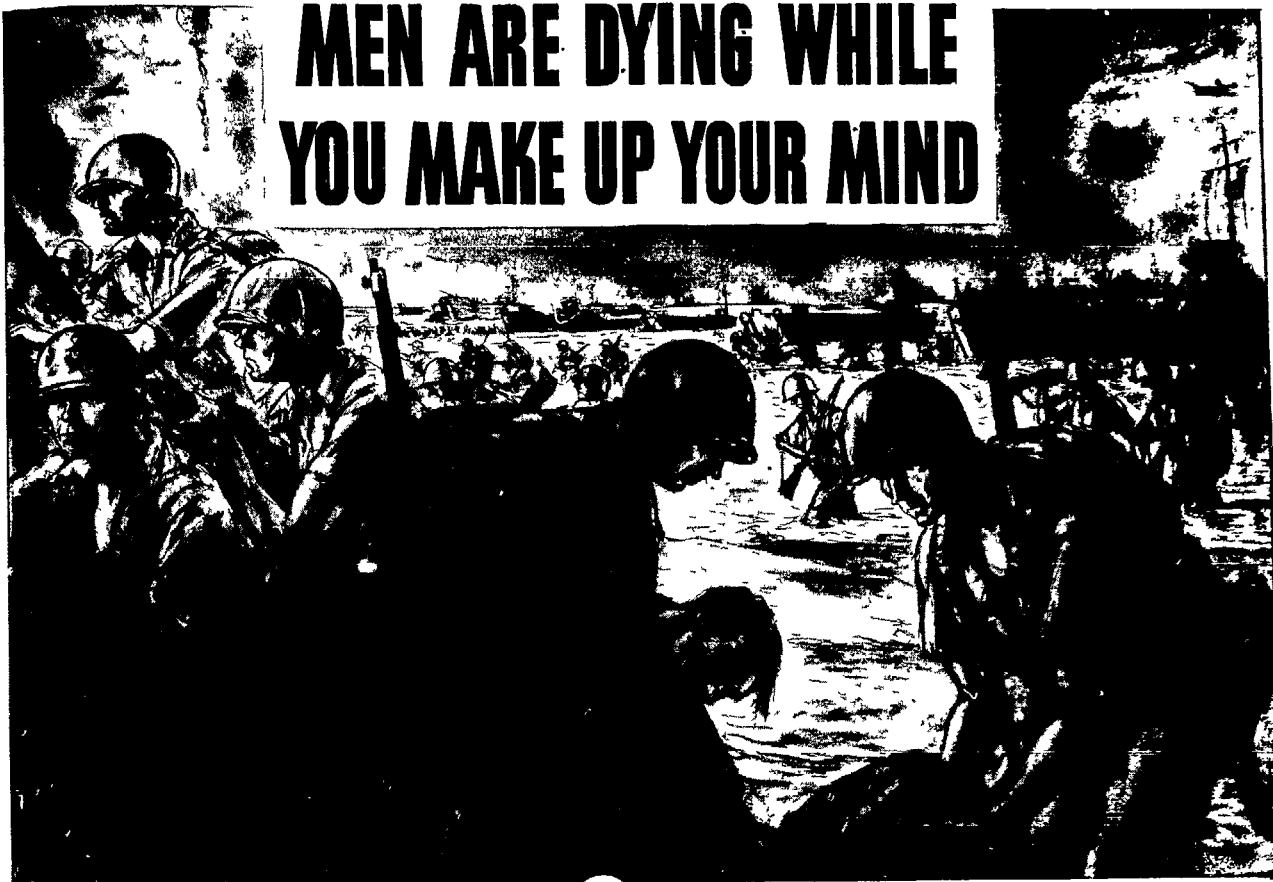
