Post-War Transportation Program Being Mapped Out

A comprehensive program, designed to meet Detroit's post-war public and private transportation needs was assured recently when the Common Council and the DSR Jointly agreed to engage one of the country's top transportation experts and two consultants to make a complete diagnosis of the city's transportation ills.

The men engaged are W. Earl Andrews, expressway designer and builder of New York City's Charles De Leuw, Cathers & Company Chicago, and Lehigh Valley of Cincinnati De Leuw & Co. The program is in charge of the city's transportation planning and is being handled as a consultant to the City Planning Commission.

The survey will require approximately three months, included in the scope of the survey will be an appraisal of Detroit's proposed network of express ways with recommendations for selection of routes, design, method of land acquisition and other related factors including estimated cost of the proposed express ways.

Andrews and his associates will also make a complete analysis of the DSR's revenues and expenses, rates of fare, traffic characteristics of routes now in operation and all submitted recommendations for modernizing and re-equipping the system.

It is expected that following the recommendations of the transportation authorities, Detroit's traffic accident rate will be substantially reduced as authorities agree that an efficient transportation system means a safe transportation system.
