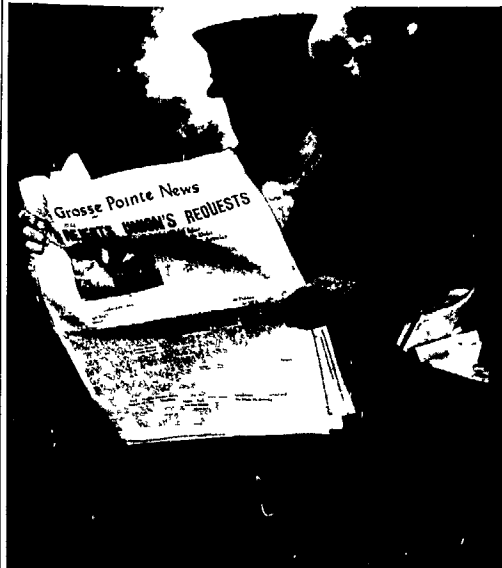

Resolution Unanimously Adopted Stating Belief of Amendment Would be Contrary to Best Interests of People

The Grosse Pointe Township Board met on record at its meeting on August 22 at its regular session at the Home Rule plan for Wayne County. When it came to the vote on the resolution, the board unanimously adopted a resolution stating its belief that the amendment would be contrary to the best interests of the people of Grosse Pointe.

WHEREAS the proposed so-called Home Rule Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Michigan to be voted on in the November election of 1944 is being examined at length by the Township Board of Wayne County, Michigan.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Board of the Township of Grosse Pointe in the County of Wayne State of Michigan that the proposed so-called Wayne County Home Rule Amendment to be voted on in the November election of 1944 is believed to be contrary to the best interests of the people of the Township of Grosse Pointe.

Prosecution of Criminals a la Wayne County

There is need for a radical change in the procedure which seems to be followed in this country in the prosecution and conviction of criminal offenders.

The practice under which the County Prosecutor's office pleads its inability to serve as a public prosecutor unless some private citizen can be found to attend to the case is intolerable. The private citizen who may be the immediate injured party seems to be expected to stand up and subject himself to the threats and pressure brought to bear by the crooks and their friends.

Prosecutors offices in most parts of this country function for this identical purpose and it is up to them to effect the punishment of crime and the protection of society against the criminal.

A few days ago a party in Grosse Pointe Park hailed a taxicab and directed the driver to take him to an address on Lake Shore drive. A mile farther the fare stuck some on Lake Shore drive. The Park officers accompanied him. The woman who fortunately had also kept her head down, went right down there into those bushes, and quicker than it takes to tell the police had hauled the robber out. They even recovered the money which he had thrown in the bushes when he saw he was about to be captured.

The cabbie at the time was strong for prosecuting the robber to the limit. The usual procedure followed the police going down to the County Prosecutor's office for a warrant. Two attaches of the Prosecutor's office solemnly and ponderously weighed the case. They found the robber had an honorable discharge from the Army. He was also about to try to get into the normal world of the law.

This latter discovery seemed to be the final and complete absolution of guilt for the Prosecutor's office. They let him go without further formalities.

A few days later a thief was caught red handed in robbing a store in the Village on Kercheval. The thief confessed to this robbery and previous ones in the same neighborhood. The merchandise was recovered. The Prosecutor's office refused to issue a warrant.

Possibly the cabbie and the store manager got cold feet in playing the role of prosecutor. Maybe both of them had been subjected to threats or pressure which they feared and of which no one but themselves knew.

But why in the name of law and justice and the safe guarding of society against criminals should not the duly elected public prosecutor of this county have gone about with these cases? All the facts proving the indubitable guilt of both parties were complete and the cases are clear. All that was necessary to send both of these worthies to the pen would have been to subpoena the witnesses, make the necessary arrangements, place them on the witness stand under oath. No jury, remotely conscious of its sworn duty, could have failed to find them guilty.

The police of both the Park and the City laid all of the facts before the Prosecutor's office and in both cases they were summarily turned down.

A method which might possibly edge this reluctant office a little nearer to its line of duty might be for the Chiefs of Police in the affected municipality to take the role of nominal prosecutor. In many parts of the country this is the established practice.

But until some method is found which relieves the injured citizen from assuming this role there is no assurance that justice can ever be meted out to criminals in this country. This practice, reduced to an absurdity, could result in the not only of even a murder case because the injured is murdered party was not on hand to push the case.

If the law of Michigan is such that no other procedure is open to the Prosecutor's office it is high time somebody went to Lansing with the single purpose of changing it.

Decisions at Dumbarton Oaks

Word seeps from the Dumbarton Oaks conference that the three dominant powers, the United States, Britain and Russia have decided that the moment has not yet arrived to attempt to set up a permanent continuing association of the sovereign states of the world to be known as a League of Nations or by some other title.

It may be that the creation of such a global association of nations will be a matter of development covering several years. Many of the nations, which ultimately will become member states of a world league are now in such a state of internal instability as to disqualify them for effective membership in any association of states whose sole purpose would be to bring stability and maintain it for all countries with respect to their international contacts.

It is premature to comment on the results of the Dumbarton Oaks conference before it is even well underway. The rumor, however, that there has been an early realization of the insuperable difficulties confronting any attempt to provide at this moment for a completely functioning, international mechanism for control and justice is reassuring.

For the time being the three great powers which fight the war to victory and which have the power to enforce the peace upon those outlaw nations that have brought this holocaust on the world must take the responsibility of making the immediate decisions. This power will doubtless include even the disposition of territories of the offending countries Germany Japan and Italy.

In a calmer time all sovereign states must be invited to participate in the realization of that age-long dream of a Parliament of Man.
