Express Opinion that Big Business Methods Deflect from Community Spirit and Promise No Advantage to Workers
Many residents of the City of Grosse Pointe are reported to have voiced indignation over the demands made by union officials on behalf of city workers who are members of Local Union No. 681 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees.
The resentment expressed is based on the fact that the union officials are demanding a 15 percent increase in wages for the coming year. The residents feel that this is a high rate of increase for city workers, especially when they are asked to work longer hours and to accept more responsibility.
The residents also feel that the union officials are using their position to demand more money without giving anything in return. They feel that the union officials are more interested in their own pockets than in the welfare of the community.
The residents are incensed by the demands of the union officials and are expressing their opinion that big business methods are being used to deflect from the community spirit and promise no advantage to workers.

The second and third sentences are entirely false and untrue. The proposed Home Rule amendment has absolutely nothing to do with local rural upland governments. The amendment deals simply with County government. If it is adopted Wayne County will have no more and no less powers than it now has. Wayne County will have no power whatsoever so far as the municipal affairs of the City of Grosse Pointe or any of the Grosse Pointe Villages are concerned. Specifically Mr. Carpenter says they are the County Government could take over our police and fire departments. There is no semblance of truth in this statement. The City of Grosse Pointe and each of the Grosse Pointe Villages will have exactly the same powers as to the police and fire departments as they now enjoy and Wayne County will not have the slightest degree of control over them. As to the school system Mr. Carpenter must know that we have an agricultural school district in Grosse Pointe which is an independent municipal corporation. In Wayne County whether or not the amendment is adopted it will have nothing whatsoever to do with it in any way and certainly cannot take it over. County will.

Mr. Carpenter is one of the officials of an organization composed mainly of certain office holders who are attempting to develop opposition to the amendment. The statement attributed to him in the article in your issue of August 24th above quoted are typical of the cynicism of group conduct. I have no doubt that people may honestly differ as to the value of the proposed amendment but certainly if the arguments against it are to be founded on entirely false statements regarding it the position of the opposition is pitifully weak.

In closing may I emphasize that the proposed amendment deals simply with the structure of Wayne County government. It permits the citizens of Wayne County to adopt a charter form of government.
