

Bazookas Halt Japs on Saipan

FORT WAYNE DETROIT MICHIGAN Tank attack coming! It was the night of D Day plus 2 on Saipan. The Second Marine Division had advanced half a mile inland from the beach and had established a front line in a

two-foot deep stinking drainage ditch. Jap artillery shells screamed overhead. Our own shells whizzed over in reply going on the beach and in the hills. In the ditch felt the concussion of the tanks and the Marines. It wasn't like Tarawa or Tulagi, or Bougainville. On Saipan the Japs had fallen back from the beaches and even from their pillboxes. They were relying on artillery—and tanks.

A company runner inching along the dark ditch passed the word along a tank counterattack was on its way. In a little while the crouching Marines could hear the Jap tanks clanking and squeaking through a cane field. Marine mortar flares revealed that the tanks were moving abreast, parallel to the Marine line from left to right. Then they executed a right column turn straight for the ditch. The Marines opened fire with

rifles machine guns and 37 mm anti-tank guns. But it was actually a field day for those Marines who were armed with Army Ordnance bazookas. One man lying near the outside of the turn and working alone fired three reloads. He stopped three tanks. Another bazooka man an ex-roofer from Cabot Ark was credited with five. When the tanks were hit the Jap crews swarmed out and started run-

ning back. Marine riflemen picked them off like so many clay pigeons. According to Colonel Alexander G. Stone commanding Fort Wayne Ordnance Depot, who received a Marine report on the 30th engagement, not one of the Jap tanks got away that night. There were twenty-seven altogether. Not one got beyond the command post which was only 70 or 80 yards back of the ditch.



Constitutional Amendments

- 1 Proposed amendment to the Constitution to change the restriction of furnishing water by any city or village to an amount not to exceed 25 percent of that furnished by it with its corporate limits.
- 2 Proposed amendment to the Constitution to relate to the eligibility of members of the Legislature to be candidates for and elected to State offices.
- 3 Proposed amendment to the Constitution to relate to the compensation of the members of the Legislature.
