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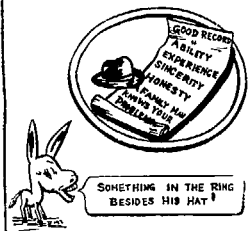

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Shadow Boxing

The attempt to make the international post war arrangements an issue in the presidential campaign in the United States bears about the same relationship to the final decisions that shadow boxing does to a finish fight under old London prize ring rules. How can the people be expected to be worked into a lather of excitement over a situation of which no one in this country from Mr. Roosevelt down knows the beginning middle or end of the answers?

Or if Mr. Roosevelt does know some of them he hesitates to put them on the table for his fellow citizens to shoot at.

They say that Roosevelt Churchill and Stalin are united in the determination that Germany's capacity to make war shall be destroyed but on how even this elementary first step is to be achieved no one sheds any real light.

They also say many months ago that Stalin was opposed to the complete destruction of all of Germany's military power. So what?

The future disposition of Poland depends upon the state of Mr. Stalin's digestion at the moment when decisions must be made. America had a leading part in the reconstruction of Poland at the end of the last war. Poland had been non-existent as a political entity since the end of the Eighteenth century. Germany and Russia carved her up to their mutual satisfaction at the beginning of the war in 1939 and this situation continued until the Russian Revolution. Poland was not until Germany committed the irreparable faux pas of attacking her great and good friend. And things are different again.

But a couple of scowling blinks Mr. Roosevelt felt unwelcome to drag the Polish question into view at the various moments. There are said to be 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 Polish votes in this country. So out of the present discussion picture.

Mr. Churchill has said in unmistakable language that he is not going to surrender to the Japanese Empire. There is an extremely valuable crown colony in China which Britain has possessed for a century which she surely still regards as a part of the Empire which is not to be parlayed by an armistice. What is to be done with this good friend China? And the discussions get around to the Hong Kong colony.

And by and large how far is the United States going to go to guarantee the status quo ante bellum of Britain's empire? Another bridge that can only be crossed when reached by her side by just shooting at targets she no longer mortal can see at this stage. Mere clanging at relatively small aims of omission will not arouse a people who are holding their breath in the looming vision of the immediate questions that will be pressing for decision in the immediate future.

These questions must be met as best we can whether Mr. Dewey, or Mr. Roosevelt is in power at the time of decision and with the examination and patient study of the Congress of the United States.

What we do need and what we must decide in this campaign is whether any man is to be permitted to be President of the United States for four terms double the time which George Washington decreed was enough for any President and scrupulously adhered to by every President up to the present incumbent.

Whether the great departments set up by the Congress are to continue to function as executive and administrative arms of the government or are they to quickly fade away and be supplanted by a bureau serving as the creature of a self-perpetuating executive?

Whether the two party system which has been the guarantor of popular rights as a wholesome balance and vehicle of public opinion is to continue or pass away? This is not idle thought. The United States has already been in training for twelve years. They and their newly adopted brothers the PAC are champing to take over.

MacArthur Goes Back

Every patriotic American heart beats faster with the news of MacArthur's return to the Philippines. It is not the reaction from the gloom and humiliation which he had laid upon us on that dark day two and one half years ago when the word came that Corregidor our last stronghold in the islands had fallen.

To thousands of homes in the land the event had a deeper meaning. It meant the beginning of the avenging crusade for the sons and husbands who fell defending the soil over which our flag had flown for nearly a half century and which we had promised to return in sovereignty to its native people and rightful owners.

And in many of these homes it meant the great first step toward the release from a vile captivity of the sons and fathers and husbands who may have survived the brutality of the Japanese in the awful months from Bataan.

The attack on the Philippines and our expulsion from the islands was the most humiliating war experience the American people ever suffered. Our war with Japan was something every body understood. It was a direct and simple matter. The interpretation of statesmen or historians to justify our participation as was the case among great elements of the people toward the European war. We had been treacherously attacked by these enormous dwarfs at the very moment when their diplomatic representatives in Washington were ostensibly trying to compose the differences that had arisen between the two countries.

What fools the leaders of Japan must have been to plan such an attack upon the greatest nation on earth a nation that had never been defeated in war.

The answer to that attack is now in process of fulfillment. How long it will take to make it complete what it will cost in lives and treasure we do not know.

We only know it will not be recorded except with the complete destruction of Japan as a great power.

Non Partisan Scheme

There is no avoiding this as long as the people remain privileged to select their own public officials. When they cease to do so free government will have passed out and with it parties of any designation.

What the non-partisan ballot can and does do is to permit the election of a public official who is not answerable to the party for a good administration of his office. The old restraining influence of party responsibility for decent government is abandoned. In its place is substituted an individual answerable to no organization.

The party system, which provides the vehicle for the registry of public opinion from period to period is of the very essence of democratic government. It cannot be lightly set aside.

The non-partisan election scheme is a commonly employed tactic of the professional reformer and no group has more often brought war and chaos into the administration of public office in America than this same general group. One of their common characteristics is that they are invariably strong for the enforcement of the law, on the other side of the law.

If the party system is to be retained in this country, means for the respective political groups must be had. Its abolition in the selection of all public officials would mean the abolition of the party system and the destruction of the whole mechanism of popular government.

Another angle of this issue which is often overlooked is that national political organizations cannot exist if their roots are destroyed. There would be no Republican or Democratic or even Communist party in the nation unless the roots of the party and tendrils extended down through the State, County, City and even into the precinct itself. Orphan these roots of party and the scheme of government which has obtained in this country since its beginning would be destroyed.

For an extreme illustration suppose this had been done already in this country. Then this year we would know only the Dewey, or Roosevelt group and the top man in this election in November would be the rubber stamp of the so-called Republican answerable to no one least of all to his fellow citizens. Then we have a Stalin or a Hitler head of the only party tolerated in the country.

In the opinion of many who have studied the proposed charter amendment conferring Home Rule upon Wayne County one of its basic weaknesses is that it proposes to select the officials of the County on a non-partisan basis. These are to be answerable to no party for the faithful administration of the office and each recurring election is to be a scramble for office punctuated with endless deals and jobs arranged wholly without the restraining influence of responsibility to party.

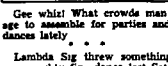
