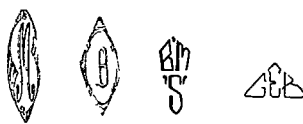

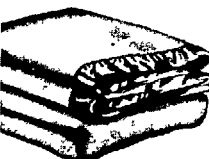

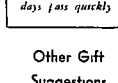

Motion Picture Council Elects

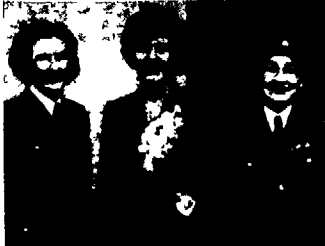
Officers have been elected by the Grosse Pointe Motion Picture Council at its annual session in the public library.

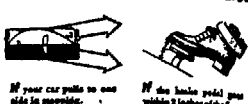

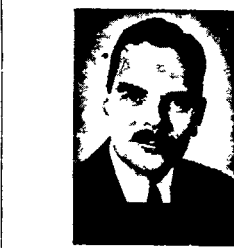

WAYNE COUNTY HOME RULE

- 1—Proposal Number 4 provides representation for all the people. Proposal Number 4 specifically provides for the direct election of supervisors, the majority of whom are now political appointees. Every Voter of Wayne County will under this amendment have a direct voice in the election of his county officers.
- 2—Proposal Number 4 protects minority groups. Direct election of supervisors by district provides more equitable representation. Detroit with 4/5ths of the county population is expressly limited to not more than 2/3rd representation on the board of supervisors.
- 3—No other county will be affected. The amendment specifically states that it will apply only to Wayne. It has nothing to do with legislative representation. It does not abolish any municipal, village or township government.

Section 19—Description of Districts

DISTRICT A

Shall embrace all land within the confines of the Village limits of Grosse Pointe Woods which is not a part of Districts B and C

DISTRICT B

Shall embrace the following described parcels of property:

That part of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods bounded on the South by the common line between the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods and the City of Detroit on the East by the westerly line of Mack Avenue (66 feet wide) on the North by a line parallel with and distant 200 feet northerly from right angles from the Common Line between the City of Detroit and the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods and on the West by the line between lots 82 and 83 of Grosse Pointe Country Club Woods Subdivision extended to the Common Line between the City of Detroit and the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods

"All the remaining land fronting on Mack Avenue for its entire length within the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods from the center line of Mack Avenue as established by the Wayne County Road Commission excepting, therefrom the Southernly 60 feet of said Mack Avenue from a line which is to be dedicated for public highway purposes provided however that in no event shall the depth of said district exceed the plat depth of lots as determined by the recorded Plat thereof

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England Ready

To Free India, Angell States
Noted British Economist Addresses Large Audience at Cass Town Hall.

Sir Norman Angell, the noted British economist and interpreter of world movements, spoke at the Cass Town Hall on Friday before a large and interested audience.

While the subject of his lecture was the rather ambiguous title "What the People Do Not Know," the core of his talk was obviously a bid for progressively better understanding between the great English speaking people.

He freely acknowledged that both England and the United States neglected the opportunity to secure the world peace after the last war and insisted that the best hope of securing it after this one lies in the strengthening of the natural ties between the two countries.

England's position on the first line of the defense of democracy he illustrated in his remark that if Britain had done down in the last war there would have been no British Empire with its great while down to meet the first shock of the second as a result of the first.

Following the formal address in the Cass theater there was a luncheon in the Book-Cadillac which Sir Norman discussed with great frankness numerous questions addressed to him. One of the luncheon guests asked certain irrelevant question on going back to the most Englishman preferred to regard the American revolution as a sort of family scrap which when carried on long enough convinced the English people that the American colonists were determined to attain complete independence and in effect called it a day.

At most he said it could only be regarded as a civil war and that he recalled his own realization that the American revolution was a civil war in this country about 1917 years later.

One interpreter asked why England was so reluctant to grant independence to India. To Sir Norman that was a very complex answer. He said England was definitely not averse to India's independence. She had already offered India dominion status exactly comparable to that of Canada, Australia, New Zealand or South Africa to be granted as soon as the war was over. She had given her pledge to that but only such a radical shift cannot be arranged during the war.

Britain's great problem with respect to India is not so much her reluctance to confer independence as it is to assure the establishment of a native government which will assure the rights of minorities. Britain cannot count 1,500,000,000 humans to anchor by as soon as a constitution is adopted which will assure such protection for minorities as they will be entitled to.

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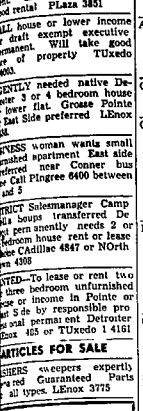
