## Corp. Richard Livingston, Brilliant Pointe Student, Reported Killed in France

Was on Special Administrative Duty When He Met Death Presumably During Raid Staged by Enemy

A letter received on October 24 by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Livingston of 369 St. Clair avenue from Secretary of War Stimson has confirmed a previous message received from the War Department in August of the death of their son Corporal Richard Livingston somewhere in France on August 28.

When the first message was received Mr. and Mrs. Livingston were certain it was a mistake, as their son was not in combat service but was a member of the European Command in England. A corps of men especially trained to take over the administration of a nation which has been destroyed or is in the process of being destroyed.

A letter however written by Corporal Livingston's commanding officer on October 18 and received here on October 19 confirmed the August message and gave the details of the circumstances of his death. 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## 23,361 Votes Cast in City, Township

Poling Place on Maumee Was Probably Busiest in United States Tuesday

All voting records were broken in Grosse Pointe Tuesday as 23,361 qualified electors went to the polls to cast their ballots for national, state and county offices.

In view of the fact that the total population of the four villages in the township and the City of Grosse Pointe is but 36 and 3,300 and the turnout is little short of amazing.

The township elect on off calls totaled 19,355 votes in 26 precincts and 3,626 residents of the city balloted.

Any voter in the City who wished to vote on Tuesday had to go there. There was no other. The long waiting for several precincts in the City had no other materialized in any day being done about it, so when elect on day comes around, it is Maumee road or nowhere.

There are nearly 5,000 names on the elect on list. Some of these are of course men and women who are not eligible. Included also are a considerable number of elderly or infirm persons who are not able to get out to the polls.

A measure of the activity prevailing there is indicated in the vote of 3,625 that was handled during the voting hours. It is doubtful whether there is another district in the state that cared for more than half that number.

Before the polls opened a queue formed in front of the municipal building. Voters were admitted in blocks of 10 to 12 and a corps of clerks kept a hand on the elect on list. The task of handling a great number of elect on was a difficult job. 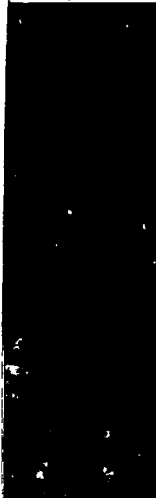
