Civilian Defense Is Urged To Carry on Garden Program

Continuation of the Victory garden program in 1945 under the promotion sponsorship of the Civilian Defense organization was urged in a resolution passed at the National Victory Garden Conference in Washington, D. C., last week. Paul H. Krone, Chief of the Detroit Office of Civilian Defense, reported upon his return from the session.

The conference urged that a total of 100 million better gardens be established in the next year. This is the same as in 1944 but only 30,000 gardens were grown this year.

It was recommended that the one food preservation program be continued and that still water emphasis be placed upon water nutrition to raise health standards throughout the country.

Other recommendations included a proposal that there be a national effort to promote the growing of ornamentals in Victory gardens and that planning be encouraged and that the home grounds and community beautification program be considered as of equal importance with the food production program.

It was also urged that an extensive study be made of garden therapy and its possible application in the treatment of wounded war veterans.

Krone was chairman of a committee which recommended that

a national committee be set up to prepare a program for including gardening in the science section of the public school curriculum.

It is believed that the Victory Garden organizations should give more attention to the development of a gardening program in the schools, Krone said. Gardening can well serve as the basis for the study of natural science.

Krone is already preparing plans for the 1945 Victory Garden program in Michigan. He is also compiling information on the garden output for this year as reported in a state wide survey which is now being completed.

Parent Problems

Don't Ask Too Much of Baby

By Gerry Cleveland Myers, Ph.D.

Many Mothers expect too much of the baby any from 11 to 20 months of age such as that he shall toilet train when he needs to go to the toilet, that he shall come to her when she calls him or will stay alone happily in his room outside the house or inside it. Here let me suggest a few don'ts.

1. Don't expect the baby being trained in toilet habits to take responsibility for telling you when to go. Be very happy, however, if he does. Take sole patient and skillful as to win his gradual cooperation. I fear no mother would let herself grow vexed at a baby or young child over this training.

2. Don't expect this baby to be content for more than a few minutes at a stretch in his baby bed indoors or out with nobody else near or in sight. To let him cry it out at all the time he is tucked into bed for his nap or the night. Sleepless crying in bed should render him more ready to sleep.

Baby Likes Company

The same type of fatigue from crying while in his pen hardly prepared the youngster to amuse himself and be happy alone at play. While awake he likes company. If you can have his pen on the porch just outside your window or indoors where he can see you at his work except for very short intervals, he might gradually turn to his toys. If you must be out of his sight, let him cry but return after a few minutes and never stay away for a very long period. Wonderful for him if as he creeps or toddles he can follow you about the house as you make the beds and the like even while you are in the kitchen provided you have trained him that there are a few definite things he must not have or do.

3. Don't expect this baby to come to you from another room or in the same room when you call to him. Calmly go to him and if necessary get him with out making it a game of chase or a matter for your vexation.

Feeding Problems

4. Don't expect this baby to enjoy food that is pushed into him faster than he can comfortably masticate or pushed into him when he is off guard or after he has indicated he does not want it. My special but, eating Problems How to Prevent or Cure Them may be had for postage by writing me in care of this paper enclosing a self-addressed envelope with a three cent stamp on it.

5. Don't expect this baby to eat definitely at the age of 18 months or two years. He happy if he eats heartily with his bare

hands even though he makes a mess of it. When he feeds himself in his most comfortable way he gains added enjoyment of his food through the fascinating self-reliant activity. Even with the lot of four or five don'ts table manners from adult standards. Spanking him or slapping his hands in connection with eating tends to connect with food taking and leaves appetite. Limit necessary punishment to other times. If he plays with the food merely remove it without a word and let his meal end.

A Soup for Lunch or Dinner

Split Pea Soup Tossed or Cracked

Baked Apples Cookies

Tea or Coffee

Split Pea Soup

2 or 3 lbs ham 3 qts boiling water 4 stars

1 carrot Salt and Pepper

1 onion 2 tsp catnip

2 potatoes

Put end of a moderately lean smoked ham into a kettle with carrot and peeled onion whole potatoes and boiling water. Boil 1 hour and strain. Rinse ham thoroughly in hot water and return to strained stock with split peas which have been soaked if necessary and boiled 1 hour.

Season with salt and white pepper and add catnip. Serve at once. Thin with boiling water if too thick.

S/SGT THOMAS J. KAUFFMAN of 422 St. Clair, a squad leader in fighting in Italy with the 361st Infantry Regiment which spearheaded the advance of Lieutenant General Mark W. Clark's Fifth Army from Volturno to the Arno River without having once given ground.

The 361st is part of the 91st Airborne Division and is currently in the Florence Bologna drive.

The regiment landed in Italy last May 31 in two days moved into the line and fought its first battle just north of Volturno while attached to the 36th Texas Division. The 361st was one of the

units that took the Albano Hills and Lake Albano making possible the fall of Rome.

Bypassing Rome, the regiment continued to advance north on Highway 1 and participated in the capture of Terracina, which fell June 8 and Montalto 10 miles further north which fell on the following day. The 361st then went on to defeat the Germans at Magliana and capture the key strategic feature of Foggia di Moscano on June 17.

The outfit next won a signal victory at Ponte d'Alba where the unit captured more than 200 Germans. One company of the 361st had crossed the Ombrone River and entered the town. The other companies had flanked the village. A German force counter-attacked in the town and was taken by surprise by the flank companies.

The regiment advanced further to take Pagano Roccastrada Radicondoli and Casale D'Elsa. It was pulled out of the line for a rest July 4. Rejoining the 91st Division the 361st attacked again July 14 east of Cecina. It then moved through Orto Fossato and Pontedera and was the first in Italy to reach the Arno River July 17.

Colonel R. W. Broadford of Medford Oregon veteran of 28 years service commands the 361st. He has seen action on the Mexican border and in the first World War and served also in the Philippines and elsewhere in the Orient.

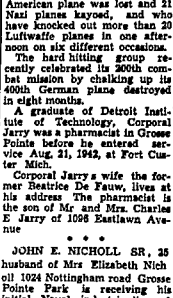
