parent. Says his organization
is making ready to combat it.

Our men on the western front
are fighting in far inches of snow
but are still going forward. The

MacArthur reports that the
Americans have captured the
strategic city of Ormoc on Leyte

siege for many weeks. Thousands
of Japs have been

remaining port available to the
Japs for the landing of heavy
supplies if and when they are
able to contact the port of an

eral weeks.

Tuesday Dec 12
Russo troops break into the
outskirts of Budapest. Moscow
broadcast says the German de-
fense in Hungary has collapsed.
Budapest can no longer be held

commonly regarded as the gate
way into Germany.

Tokyo no longer belittles the

Seven Months Flying "Hump" Brings Pilot Flying Cross

AIR TRANSPORT COMMAND BASE INDIA— 1ST LT. ALBERT D. BEAUPRE pilot 247 Kerby road Grosse Pointe Farms Mich. has been awarded a Distinguished Flying Cross. It was announced by Brig. Gen. William T. Tunner commanding general of the India China Division Air Transport Command.

The award was made upon completion of 300 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and

difficult India China air routes where enemy interception and attack were probable and expected.

The arduous trail over the Hump route through the towering peaks of the Himalayas Mountains blazed by the Air Transport Command is recognized by airmen as the world's only lifeline of a vital period of service from November 1943 to June 30, 1944.

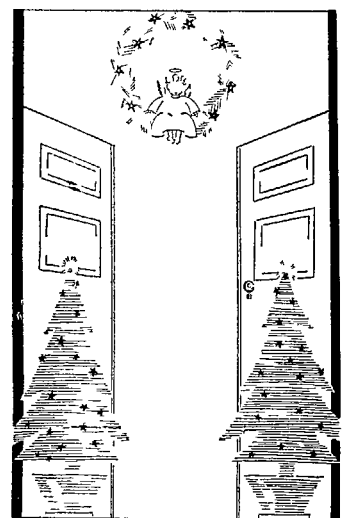
COFFEE FANS

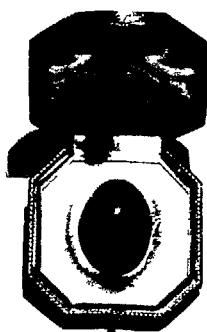

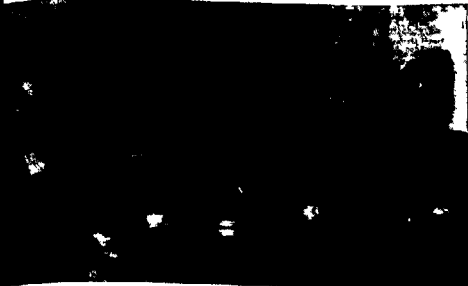

Glaze Your Fur Coat This Way

Glazing a fur coat which gives it a nice gloss and an appearance of newness can be done at home by fairly simple methods. Here are the directions outlined by Miss Nian Reilly of the Textiles and Clothing Department of Michigan State College. Use plain water or secure Chinese Wood from a furriers supply house. Soak the wood in water for several days. Using a clean comb and a large brush comb and brush the garment with the flow of the hair. Continue until fur is thoroughly wet. With a smooth wooden stick, push the fur backward against the flow of the hair. Then using a dry brush, smooth the fur down. Finally apply a warm iron with the flow of the hair. The iron can be used directly on the hair but it is safer to place a piece of oiled paper or a newspaper between the warm iron and the fur. If waxed paper is used care must be taken that the fur doesn't become sticky or waxy. Flat haired furs those that have more patterns in the curl and those with dyes that run or rub off should not be ironed. Fur garments should be glazed several times during the season as glazing straightens out the matted hairs and gives the garment a fresh appearance.

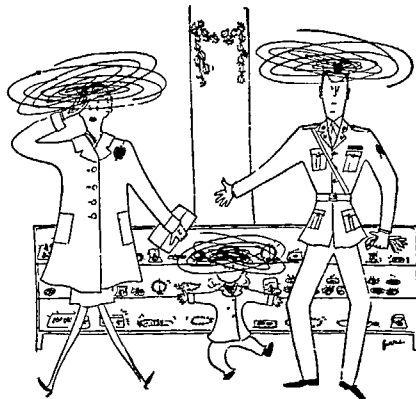

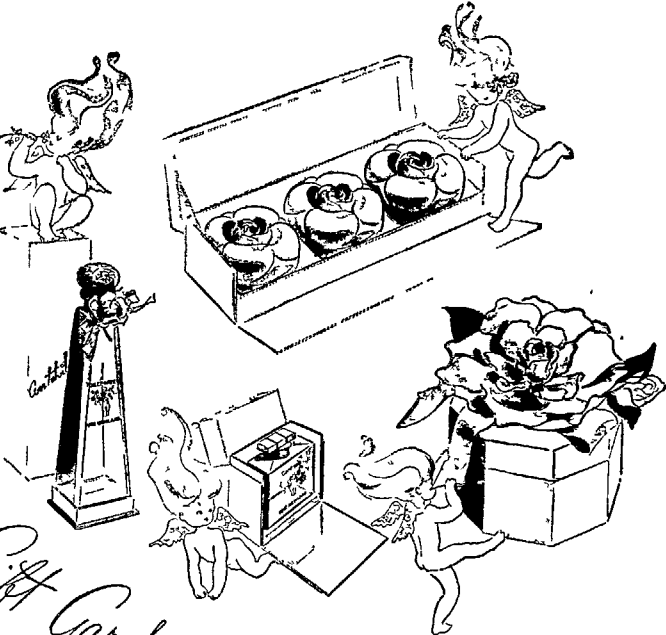

Michigan's system for handling rehabilitation of its veterans continues to be a model for the entire nation, Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, Administrator of Veterans Affairs said in Chicago last Wednesday.

Gen. Hines said that only three or four states had met the full requirements of Federal standards for readjusting former service men to civilian occupations.
