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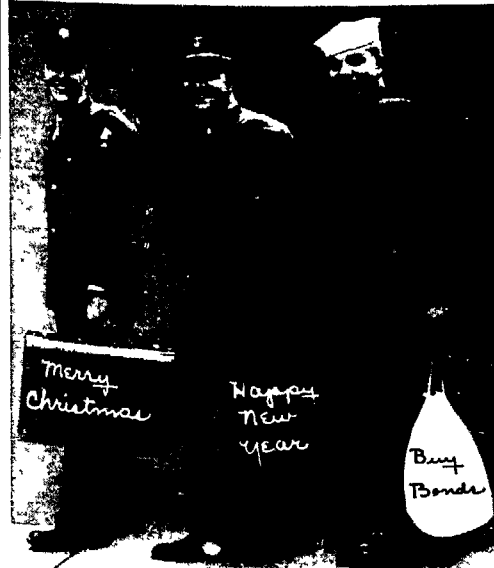

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Fine Financial
Condition Told
In Farms Report

The excellent financial condition of the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms is shown in the November monthly report filed with the Board of Trustees at their meeting Monday night by Arthur Furton, Village Clerk.

The financial report for the first nine months of the current fiscal year, which starts March 1, shows that revenues are approximately \$2,400 higher this year than last.

Total expenditures as of November 30 are slightly lower than last year, \$212,302.23, as against \$212,121.29. The highest per cent expended to date on any normal operating account is 23.2 percent with three quarters of the year past.

Cash and investments of \$360,001.62 are considerably higher than in 1943 when the total was \$279,402.87. Revenues are \$22,900 higher caused principally by the unexpected sale of real estate on Mack avenue between Kirby and Seven Mile road. Tax collections are already \$15,000 more than the amount of the current disbursements.

The trustees spent some time Monday night discussing the desirability of establishing a reserve fund for extraordinary improvements with cash from unusual revenues. The finance committee will meet and it is expected a final report on this matter will be given sometime before the start of the next fiscal year, March 1.

Assets and liabilities as of November 30 are set at \$407,968.38. The liabilities including a surplus of \$228,753.44. It has cost the village \$512,302.23 to operate for the first nine months of the current fiscal year.

Provençal's Private Drifts
Will Be Removed by Farms

Provençal and Beverly roads the two privately-owned streets in the Village of Grosse Pointe Farms were the subject of discussion at the meeting of the village trustees Monday night. The recent snow brought the thoroughfares into the limelight.

Murray Smith village engineer asked for a recommendation that the village employees be authorized to plow these streets just as they do all the other streets in the village when it snows. From the engineer's standpoint it meant extra gas for the garbage and rubbish trucks greater fire safety in case three happened to be a fire on one of them following a storm.

The discussion produced the information that in the past the village has plowed the streets some times and some times it has not. There is no reason why the village should pay for this service other than those reasons mentioned above.

Mr. Smith said he had a vote Provençal after last week's storm and had nearly been stuck in the drifts. These drifts are the rule rather than the exception on Provençal for the wind blows hard and long across the reaches of the Country Club golf course which borders one side of the street. It was necessary to plow there three times last week to keep the road open. If there had been a fire it would have been almost impossible to get equipment in had it not been for the plowing.

Another matter was brought up during the discussion on Six of the properties on Provençal road lie partly in the village of Grosse Pointe Woods and partly in the Woods and Farms.

The Farms alone were at all private about the expense of the plowing even though it is a private road. The fire hazard element we should have to live with them. 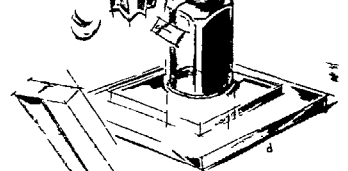

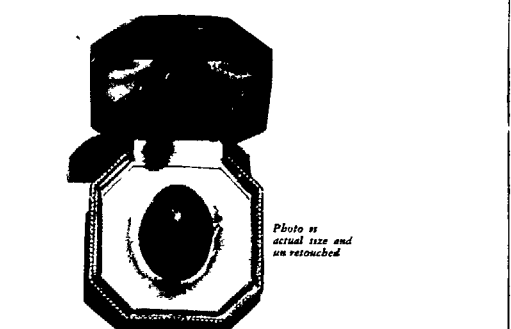

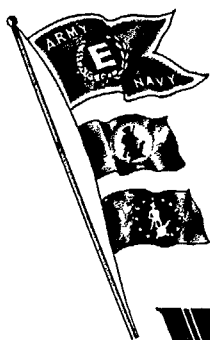

President Ghequiere Answers Questions On Special Election

Woods President Responds to Communication from Torrey Woods Residents Asking Enlightenment On Various Matters

Residents of the Torrey Woods section of Grosse Pointe Woods who submitted a series of pertinent questions having to do with the special election called in the village for December 27 will find their answer in the following letter sent in by Alous A. Ghequiere, Woods president.

To the Editor:
Grosse Pointe Woods
Dear Sir:
In your addition of Dec 14 you publish a letter prepared by residents of the Torrey Woods section in which a number of questions were submitted regarding the proposed bond issue of \$45,000 to purchase a site for a future municipal building park and recreational facilities.

The questions are well advised and on behalf of the Village Commission I will attempt to answer them clearly in order that the residents may be assisted in making an intelligent decision regarding this proposition. The answers are in the sequence in which they were asked in the letter by the Torrey Woods residents.

(1) It is true that a real estate and building firm was negotiating with the owners of this 14 1/2 acres on the west side of Mack between Kenmore and Huntington drive when the Village Commission decided to make an offer to give the taxpayers of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods a chance to purchase the lot. It could be sold to subdividing and building.

(2) The village zoning ordinance does permit the erection of private business establishments on the west side of Mack between Kenmore and Huntington drive. In fact it permits the erection of business buildings on both sides of Mack to a depth of 300 feet from the center line the full length of the Village except where subdivided on state or other rule.

(3) We have no way of knowing what the real estate firm contemplated placing on the lots to be subdivided. However, restrictions on property adjoining subdivided areas are between \$4,000 and \$8,000 a fact which may have some bearing on the restriction of any subdivision in the future in this general area.

(4) This proposed site is a planned undeveloped and has no utilities installed there. While it is true that no subdivision can be planned without the consent of the Village Commission, certain improvements such as sewer main, water main, alley and street, pavements, sidewalks and that certain setback lines and grades for buildings are required by the zoning ordinance before approval can be given to the village. It is not possible to enforce the subdivision of a minimum amount of money, although a contribution in the real estate of any subdivision. That the right and prerogative of the owner or the village.

tion of utilities or the construction of buildings until war time priority restrictions are lifted unless the property could be established and used as a site for defense housing.
(6) The zoning ordinance permits the use of any property anywhere in the village for municipal purposes so therefore it would not require any vote by the people to permit the erection of municipal buildings or recreational facilities.
(7) There is no rule by which a fire department could be considered as a noise nuisance. However if the fire alarm now in use is meant by this question let us assure you that by the time this new building is built and the new equipment acquired it will be necessary to have a full time fire fighting crew. At present the alarm is used to call the volunteers of which 4/5 of the fire department is comprised.
(8) The residents have full assurance that this property if purchased cannot be sold or used for other purposes such as business frontage without permission of the taxpayers but it is possible for the Commission to grant certain small concessions for the sale of refreshments in connection with some of the recreational facilities. This would of course have to be controlled by the Commission to eliminate all nuisances.
(9) It is possible that buildings could be erected by direct taxation and some minor improvements will probably be so. (Continued on Page 28)

handed but it is highly probable that any major expenditures for any sizable construction will be made unless first approved by a vote of the taxpayers. The village operates on an annual budget which must be prepared in advance published and a public hearing held thereon before being approved by the Commission. Any major construction would have to be paid out of one year's budget unless a bond were approved by the taxpayers. An item in an annual budget like for instance constructing a new municipal building would so increase the tax millage rate for that year that it is probable that the taxpayers would be loath to do so because they are after all residents of the village and no others of all of you.

(10) The balance of the questions regarding design, beauty, landscaping parking can possibly be best answered by the following statement. This proposition is referred to the taxpayers because of requests and desires by a great number of our people for better recreational facilities because of the need for an adequate municipal building and fire hall and because the desirable acreage for rapid being purchased by real estate developers.

Sketches or plans for any sort of structures municipal or recreational have ever been made by request of the Commission. It is a very difficult design anything until the site is known. If the purchase of this site is approved then the Commission will be engaged to design a building and landscaping to be in keeping with the neighborhood and community. All recreational parking facilities will of course be provided on the in-

terior and to the rear of the site. The parking problem will probably be not too serious because the park will be restricted to use by only residents of the Village of Grosse Pointe Woods.

If this proposition is approved it is my intention as President to approve a Recreational Planning Committee of citizens from various sections of the village to work out details design and utility of desired picnicking and playgrounds bathing pools and general recreational projects. The engaging of architects and engineers and the Citizens Committee will all lead to a development that will be in line with the wishes of the residents and will tend to keep the nuisance features to a minimum.

Other locations have been considered but due to inadequacy for all purposes high price or lack of availability or geographical location all to date have been eliminated. In the opinion of the Commission the proposed site is the most desirable.

If the proposition is rejected by the taxpayers by a No Vote on the bond issue then the Commission will have to alter its plans and consider the construction of a municipal building only on some other site.

The decision is to be made by the property owning residents on Dec. 27. I hope this information is of some value in helping to make that decision for or against the proposition. It is not the desire
